SOUTHEAST REGIONAL DAFFODIL SHOW AND GEORGIA DAFFODIL SOCIETY SHOWS

On April 3rd and 4th, the 1980 Southeast Regional Daffodil Show will be held at the Rich's Garden Center (Downtown), Plaza Auditorium. This will also be a Standard Flower Show, co-sponsored by the Georgia Daffodil Society and the Garden Center of Atlanta, members of and approved by the American Daffodil Society, the Garden Club of Georgia, Inc., and the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

Members of the Southeast Region of the American Daffodil Society are invited to participate in this Show, and for details should contact Mrs. Jeanne O. Lynch, The Garden Center of Atlanta, Rich's, Inc., P.O. Box 4539, Atlanta, Ga., 30302.

Persons who plan to make entries in the show should plan to park their autos in Rich's garage, and enter the Plaza Auditorium through the garage entrance to the store for Homes on Spring Street. Arrangements are made for admittance through the garage at 8:30 A.M., on April 3rd, as all entries must be placed on the show floor before 10:30 that morning.

As of the time of the writing of this article, the winter has been mild and our planting of daffodils is much advanced for this season. If we do not have more days of quite cold weather, we will encourage you to consider this show.

We are fortunate in having the "Rural Beauty Garden Club of Paulding County," sponsor a small show Daffodil section in their Flower Show, which will be held March 26, 1980, at the Hiram Methodist Church, Hiram, Ga., which is only about 30 miles west of Atlanta.
