





NEW INTRODUCTIONS FOR 1973

ATTENTION IS DIRECTED TOWARDS THE FOLLOWING NEW INTRODUCTIONS AND ALSO TO THE MANY OTHER NEW VARIETIES THROUGHOUT THE CATALOGUE.

ASHANTI, Div. 2A, 3-4 (David Bell) — Bred from Checkmate x Falstaff this flower shows strongly the best characteristics of these two fine flowers. With richly coloured perianth favouring that of "Checkmate" and corona, blazing in richest red to the base of the cup, rather reminiscent of "Falstaff" in appearance. This is a fine Show flower and a definite advance in this Class. Tall and vigorous in growth. Each \$30

AZTEC GOLD, Div. 1A, 3-4 (David Bell) — This is an excellent Exhibition trumpet of uniform rich golden yellow throughout; smooth in texture, strong in substance and of fine Show form with well proportioned nicely flanged trumpet. Bred from (Ranalagh x Gold Court) x David Bell. Strong and vigorous in growth and a Show flower of merit. Each \$10

BRAMBLE HILL, Div. 2B, 3 (David Bell) — This is a first class flower of fine Exhibition quality. Rather earlier than is usual for the better flowers in this division, this flower is valuable not only for this reason but also for its value as a first class Show flower. Nicely formed pure white perianth of good substance and fine texture; shapely saucer shaped crown nicely shaded red. With line of breeding soundly based on (Mannequin x Garland) x Arbar, I have used this flower extensively in my breeding programme to produce earlier Red and White flowers of improved quality. COOL FLAME, Div. 2B, (Mitsch, U.S.A.), (Precedent x Accent) — Only on rare occasions do real colour breaks occur. A step forward has been achieved in this, one of the numerous progeny of "Accent". Cool Flame's immaculate white perianth is flat and well overlapping, while the medium sized cupshaped much fluted crown is coral red, suggesting the name. Good tall stems. Each \$70

GAY SONG, Div. 4, 4-5 (J. L. Richardson) — One of the largest and most impressive white doubles yet introduced, a flower of gigantic proportions and wonderful substance, bred from "Gay Time" x "Brussels". The large outer segments are very wide and overlapping, the inner ones are not so large and interspersed among these are smaller segments. The whole flower is glistening white throughout with a very faint touch of very pale primrose in the centre. A first class Show flower with strong stem and a good neck. Each \$15

GOLDEN DAYS, Div. 1A, 3-4 (Cotter, N.Z.) — A most glorious golden trumpet of a distinctive new shade of rich, bright gold carried evenly throughout the flower. The immaculate perianth is perfectly flat with wide, overlapping segments of superbly fine exhibition quality. The trumpet is elegantly formed and is evenly rolled at the mouth which is neatly serrated. The exquisite, large blooms are held erect on strong straight stems. Bred Glenfalloch x Arctic Gold. Each \$20

HONEY BELLS, Div. 5A, Height 10" (Fowlds, U.S.A.) — A clear medium yellow triandrus hybrid of nice form, having two or three blooms per stem. Where most triandrus hybrids are sterile, this sets some seed although we have not found it to be a free seeder. Each \$4

IRISH LIGHT, Div. 2A, 3-4 (J. L. Richardson), (A.M., R.H.S., 1970. Best Bloom in Competitive classes, R.H.S. Daffodil Competitions, 1971.) — A striking Show flower bred from Patagonia x Border Chief with lovely smooth rich golden yellow perianth segments, rather pointed and overlapping, and a nice bright orange red crown which is slightly expanded and deeply serrated at the edge. An outstanding flower of first class form, grand quality and substance and with good strong stems. Each \$20

PINK CAPRICE, Div. 2AP, 3-4 (David Bell) — This is another of my most attractive new series of flowers with lemon coloured perianths and pastel pink crowns, bred from a line of breeding based on "White Sentinal" x "Seraglio". This flower is most harmonious in the gentle blend of lemon perianth and the soft pink of the neatly serrated crown. A good doer and free in increase. Each \$10

PINK JEWEL, Div. 3BP, 3-4 (Cotter, N.Z.) — Here is an exquisite gem and is, I believe, the first "pink" of 3B dimensions. The three inch circular perianth is of wax like substance, perfectly smooth and glistening white. The small, perfectly flat white cup has a wire rim of bright pink and emerald green throat. A flower of ethereal beauty and impressive purity. Bred from Dallas x Dreamlight. Each \$6

SNOWSONG, Div. 3C, 3-4 (Cotter, N.Z.) — Large, dazzlingly white 3C of perfect exhibition form, bred from 3C seedling x Bryher. Perianth is comprised of rounded segments of exquisite quality and flatness and extends to 4½ inches. Cup is of similar whiteness excepting for the sage green base. These large flowers have an upright pose on strong eighteen inch stems. Flowers open freely and are earlier than others of the type. Each \$8

SURVEYOR, Div. 1A, 3 (Cotter, N.Z.) — The tall flowers and foliage of this magnificent variety are always conspicuous in the beds. The large blooms are of superb show form and quality and of rich yellow colouring throughout. Perianth composed of broad pointed satin smooth, leathery segments of smooth flawless quality; trumpet crown is beautifully formed and neatly rolled and serrated at the mouth. A commanding show flower and good laster. This flower, formerly registered in Division 2A, has now been transferred to the Yellow Trumpet division as measurements have indicated that it is fully of trumpet dimensions. Each \$8

YELLOW TRUMPETS

ARCTIC GOLD, 2-3 (J. L. Richardson)—A flower of superb quality bred from Goldcourt x Kingscourt. The broad overlapping perianth is of smooth waxy texture, and the well-proportioned trumpet is widely flanged and serrated at the mouth. The whole flower is of even deeper gold than Goldcourt. Tall plant. Each 75c

BAYARD, 4-5 (J. L. Richardson), A.M., R.H.S., 1958.—Bred from seedling x Goldcourt this is a Show flower of the highest class, medium sized with very round broad perianth of beautifully smooth, thick texture, and a well proportioned trumpet, nicely flanged and serrated at the mouth; deepest gold throughout. Each \$1

CARRICKBEG, 3-4 (J. L. Richardson)—A first class Exhibition Yellow trumpet of faultless form and quality; the perianth segments are broad, overlapping and slightly pointed, the long trumpet is beautifully proportioned, neatly flanged and indented at the brim. The whole flower is deep intense "Goldcourt" colour throughout. Strong grower. Each \$3

CAVALCADE, 3-4 (David Bell)—This is one of the finest pure self yellow trumpets on the Show bench. The perianth is broad in segment, smooth and strong in substance; the trumpet in good neat balance is nicely frilled and serrated. Tall and vigorous growth. Each \$1.50

COMMANDING, Div. 1A, 2-3 (David Bell)—Of commanding appearance in garden or on showbench this Yellow Trumpet is a flower of truly gigantic proportions. Very broadly overlapping perianth of fine form, smooth and of good substance; nicely balanced trumpet, neatly frilled and serrated. Opening early in the season, this flower lasts well on the plant and makes a magnificent display in the garden. Of erect carriage and tall and vigorous in growth. Bred from Ranalagh x Val D'Or. Each 75c

DAWNGOLD, Div. 1A, 2-3 (David Bell)—This is a Yellow Trumpet of the very finest Show qualities. Nicely proportioned, evenly frilled trumpet achieving a perfect balance with the broadly overlapping perianth. Smooth in texture, strong in substance and of even golden yellow throughout. Bred from (Braemar x Barrington) x (Braemar x Gold Court). Tall and vigorous in growth. Champion Yellow Trumpet, C.H.S. Show, Christchurch, 1961. Each \$2

DIVISION I.A

DRUM ROLL, 2-3 (David Bell)—This is a fine quality Yellow Trumpet which will be of great value for the earlier Shows. Of purest yellow throughout, the trumpet is neat in frill and fine in form, forming a perfect balance with the smooth, broadly overlapping perianth. Tall and vigorous in growth and a Show flower of merit. Each \$1

GOLDEN BROCADE, 3-4 (David Bell) — This is a fine Yellow Trumpet of more than usual size and vigour of growth. Smooth, broadly overlapping perianth of good substance; the shapely trumpet is in good neat balance and is nicely frilled and serrated. This trumpet is strongly stemmed and upstanding in growth. Each \$2

GOLDEN CAVALIER, 3-4 (David Bell)—Of pure gold throughout, flat, smooth, overlapping, rather pointed segments and well balanced not over wide trumpet of beautiful form. This flower is not unlike a much improved Gold Court, much larger and taller and of upright vigorous growth. Bred from Val D'Or x Seedling. Each \$2

GOLDCRAFT, Div. 1A, 3 (David Bell)—Commanding immediate attention on the Showbench this is a fine Yellow Trumpet of the very best Show quality; broad, smooth and broadly overlapping in perianth, firm in substance and with slim, rounded barrel expanding to neatly frilled circular flange to the trumpet. Of purest golden yellow throughout this is a large flower of upright carriage, carried on an extra long stem. Bred from Val D'Or x Treasure. Each \$2

GOLDEN FORTUNE, Div. 1A, 3 (David Bell)—This is a fine large Yellow Trumpet with very flat, smooth and overlapping perianth, rather pointed in the segments; nicely balanced, neatly frilled trumpet of best Show form and the flower uniform self yellow throughout. Very vigorous and carried erect on a fine tall stem. Shown in my winning N.Z. Raised twelve, C.H.S. Show, Christchurch, 1961. Bred from Ranalagh x Val D'or. Each 75c

GOLDEN GLISTEN, 3-4 (David Bell)—This is a fine upstanding Yellow Trumpet of good carriage, smooth and of best Show form. A flower of the largest size and good glistening yellow to trumpet and perianth. Each \$1

GOLDEN HORN, 3 (J. L. Richardson), (A.M., Wisley, 1971) — A magnificent yellow trumpet bred from self pollinated Kingscourt which it strongly resembles. The perianth segments are wide and overlapping, of grand substance, very smooth and slightly pointed; the trumpet is well proportioned, nicely flanged and serrated at the mouth. Consistent Show flower, good robust grower. Each \$1.

GOLDEN MILE, Div. 1A, 3-4 (David Bell)—This fine Yellow Trumpet created much attention when shown in my winning N.D.S. New Zealand Raisers' Cup at Timaru, 1964. Of faultless form and of even golden yellow throughout. The nicely flat perianth is broad in segment, smooth and of good substance; the trumpet is of fine balance and with neatly frilled circular flange. Tall and vigorous and a Show flower of merit. Each \$1.50

GOLDEN RAPTURE, 3-4 (J. L. Richardson), F.C.C., R.H.S., 1959, as a Shower flower.—Bred from Pretoria x Goldcourt this magnificent large flower is almost 5 inches across. The large broad perianth segments are beautifully smooth, much overlapping and of lovely thick texture. The long trumpet is widely flanged and frilled at the mouth; the whole flower is uniform clear golden yellow; Best bloom in R.H.S. Daffodil Show 1959. Each \$1

HIGH SCORE, Div. 1A, 3-4 (David Bell).—Another fine yellow trumpet bred from Treasure Trove x Treasure. Broadly overlapping perianth, smooth and of good substance. Nicely balanced and neatly frilled trumpet of good Show form. Of uniform golden yellow throughout. Tall and vigorous in growth. Each 75c

IBERIA, 3-4 (David Bell)—One of the most perfectly formed of all Yellow Trumpets, this flower is of good strong, uniform golden yellow throughout. The perianth is broad in segment, smooth in texture and of firm substance. The trumpet is of good balance, nicely circular and evenly flanged and frilled. This is a flower of the very finest Show quality. Bred from Ranalagh x Val D'Or. Champion Yellow Trumpet and Best Flower in Show, C.H.S. Show, Christchurch, 1965. Each \$8

MAJORCA. 4. (J. L. Richardson)—Bred from Royal Mail x Malta this is a fine large flower of excellent Show quality exhibited in my winning 12 seedlings for the Engleheart Cup, 1956 and 1958. The perianth is clear yellow, much rounded and of immense substance, the large well proportioned cup is of slightly deeper tone and has a broad rim of bright orange. A fine robust plant. Each 50c

MASAI KING. 4. (J. L. Richardson). A.M.R.H.S., 1960 as a Show flower—A really outstanding “red and yellow” and one of the best show flowers that I have. Bred from Bahram x Alamein the perianth segments are clear deep yellow, very broad, much overlapping, perfectly flat and just slightly pointed at the tips. PRINCE ROYAL, 4 (J. L. Richardson)—A very late superb red and yellow flower of lovely quality and grand smooth texture which came from Air Marshall x Firecracker. The deep golden yellow perianth segments are of good form, slightly pointed at the tips; the medium sized crown is bright orange right down to the base and is neatly frilled at the mouth. Daffodils to London Show

The early part of September last season saw me fully occupied in preparing to send a representative selection of Daffodils raised by myself for Exhibition at the Autumn London Show field under the auspices of the Royal Horticultural Society. Finally some fifty varieties were chosen and despatched in care of Qantas Airways and thanks to the vast increase in speed of the modern aircraft and to the special care taken with the exhibit in transit, they arrived in excellent condition for the Show. The R.H.S. Daffodil Committee were all there to examine the blooms and five of them (City Lights, Overcall, Caprice, Stanford, and Highfire) were given Certificates of Preliminary Commendations by them. Also the Lindley Medal was awarded for the exhibit.

The exhibit created quite a lot of interest in England and perhaps the story can be best told by some short excerpts from some of the reviews in the various papers and magazines:

GARDEN NEWS, Friday, October 2, 1970: "Highlight of the Royal Horticultural Society's great Autumn Show were daffodils flown in by David Bell, who is a grower and breeder at Christchurch, New Zealand, where they are currently appreciating the joys of spring.

The flowers were cut on Saturday, flown on Sunday, and arrived at the R.H.S. Hall at midday on Monday.

Two distinct breaks which, so far, have not been achieved by breeders in this country could be seen in the collection. Red Conquest, and two other similar seedlings, had pink cups on yellow petals, two qualities which have not been combined before and Checkmate was a flower with large petals of elegant shape."

NOTTS GUARDIAN JOURNAL, NOTTINGHAM. "An exhibit of unusual interest at the Royal Horticultural Society's Autumn Show is a collection of daffodils flown direct from New Zealand. The 50 different varieties were packed for their 12,000 mile journey in cooled containers and looked remarkably fresh on arrival."

NURSERYMAN AND GARDEN CENTRE. 1.10.70: "Widely as the seasonal spread of flowers ranges these days, it was still a surprise to find an exhibit of daffodils at last week's R.H.S. Autumn Show. Grown by Mr David Bell of Christchurch, New Zealand, the daffodils were flown in by Qantas Airways and staged by Mrs Lionel Richardson, who described them as "at their best, equal to any we have over here."

AMATEUR GARDENING, 3rd Oct., 1970: "A surprise group of daffodils bred by David Bell of Canterbury, New Zealand, and flown over by Qantas Airlines stole the show, the judging committee spending nearly two hours admiring new colour breaks. Among these were Red Conquest with soft yellow petals and a large pink trumpet, and City Lights, probably one of the finest daffodils raised in recent years, with a circular white perianth and wide soft lemon trumpet rimmed with Orange."

DAILY TELEGRAPH, 23rd Sept., 1970: "An exhibit of unusual interest is a collection flown in from New Zealand of daffodils from the raiser David Bell. Fifty varieties of daffodils were flown here in specially cooled containers. The shipment may be the start of a trend towards the Show's becoming more international."

GARDENERS CHRONICLE, Oct. 2nd, 1970: "The most interesting exhibit at the Great Autumn Show held in the Royal Horticultural Society's halls, was a display of Narcissus Cultivars from New Zealand. All of them were raised by Mr David Bell (Templeton, Canterbury, N.Z.) and flown here by Qantas Airways."

"Three New Zealand daffodils had pink trumpets and yellow perianths—a colour combination not seen in this country before according to Mr Lloyd. Other narcissus in the exhibit (prepared for display by Mr Lloyd and Mrs Lionel Richardson of Prospect House, Waterford, Ireland) were noticeable for their fine shape, having broad overlapping perianth segments forming a solid bloom. Three that were pointed out to me by Mr Lloyd were 'City Lights', 'Caprice' and an unnamed Seedling. "City Lights", probably the finest of the three, is a Division 2B Narcissus, a seedling from 'Fairy Mother' x 'Green Island'.

Seedling 126A (Air Marshall x Checkmate) had smaller flowers but the distinctive yellow perianth segments were so broad that half of each segment was covered by its two neighbours. The half inch long narrow cup is yellow orange becoming bright orange at the mouth. Mr Lloyd believes that the broad overlapping perianth segments are the result of using 'Checkmate' in the breeding programme.

"**CAPRICE**", a Division 3B narcissus, has pure white perianth segments and a short flared orange cup with the colour deepening at the edge. This cultivar is particularly noticeable for the purity of the whiteness of the petals."

THE TIMES, London, 23rd Sept., 1970: N.Z. DAFFODILS AN RHS SHOW NOVELTY. "Among the glories of the Royal Horticultural Society Autumn Show which fills both halls at Westminster it is somewhat incongruous to see an exhibit of Daffodils. They were grown by Mr David Bell of Canterbury, New Zealand, and flown here by Qantas Airways. Many of the varieties, new to Britain, have large and flat perianths."

***REDWING, 3** (D. Bell)—This is a very decorative flower with wide bowl-shaped crown of fiery red and rounded perianth of broad segments and deep yellow colouring. Class 2A, red predominant. Each 75c

REVELRY, 3-4 (J. L. Richardson) (A.M., R.H.S., 1951, as a Show flower). A flower of grand quality, bred from Carbineer x Bahram. The perianth is soft yellow, very broad and perfectly flat, of immense thick substance and lovely smooth texture; the crown is long, slightly expanded, of intense flaming orange-red. Tall, strong grower and a first-class exhibition flower. Each 35c

RINGMASTER, 3-4 (J. L. Richardson)—A Show flower of superb quality with very round, flat, clear yellow perianth of fine substance. The large, expanded saucer shaped crown is of slightly deeper tone with a broad sharply defined margin of bright orange red. Tall, strong plant. Each \$1

RODEO, 3-4 (David Bell)—This is a fine Show flower with good quality widely overlapping, smooth perianth of yellow and neat circular vase shaped cup brilliantly red to the base. Bred from Pencarrow x Burgundy. Tall and vigorous in growth. Each \$1

ROYAL CHARM, 3-4 (J. L. Richardson)—Bred from Air Marshall x Jaguar, this is a large flower of outstanding quality and colour, with a lovely smooth overlapping pointed perianth of deep golden yellow. The cup, which is rather straight and slightly serrated at the edge, is bright orange red, becoming paler towards the base forming a perfect contrast. A first class Show flower with good strong stems and foliage. Each \$3

***ROYAL MINSTREL, 3, 4** (David Bell)—This flower, bred from Artist's Model, has a rich yellow, broad and overlapping perianth of true Show form. Perfectly circular, rich orange crown which lies flat on the perianth. A very striking flower. Each 50c

ROYAL REVEL, 4 (J. L. Richardson)—A very fine bold red and yellow flower with large, shovel pointed, deep golden yellow and much overlapping perianth of grand quality and substance. SAROBIN, Div. 2A, 3 (David Bell)—This is a very brightly coloured flower. Perfectly smooth in texture and rounded in form, the clear yellow perianth is nicely overlapping in form; the round saucer-shaped cup is widely banded bright red to contrasting yellow centre. The rich deep yellow perianth is broad and overlapping, smooth and of good strong substance.

The gently imbricated crown is nicely circular and of a most intense red right to the base. This flower combines excellent Show form and good quality with an intensity of colour contrast that must be considered the best I have seen to date in this Division.
