| <b>ACCENT</b> (Mitsch, 1960)<br>(‘Interim’ x ‘Interlude’)<br>A richly colored pink daffodil which is a reliable and good grower. Pictured on page 4.  | 2W-P   | M  | \$1.00      |
| <b>AMBERGATE</b> (Milne, 1950)<br>A truly unusual and beautiful flower with a deep orange perianth and a red cup. One of the few daffodils of this color. Very popular.   | 20-R   | M  | 6.00        |
| <b>ALLUREMENT</b> (Mitsch, 1961)<br>(‘Glenshane’ x ‘Mabel Taylor’)<br>The white perianth is rounded with overlapping petals. The large crown is ruffled, frilled and a beautiful salmon pink which holds its color very well. Increases well and blooms prolifically. | 2W-P   | E  | 4.00        |
| <b>AMOR</b> (Leenen, 1971)<br>A wavy white perianth with a bright flaring cup which has a yellow center and a bright orange rim. Pictured on page 4.  | 3W-YYO | M  | 2.00        |
| <b>ARCTIC GOLD</b> (Richardson, 1951)<br>(‘Goldcourt’ x ‘Kingscourt’)<br>One of the best deep gold trumpets. Smooth waxy texture. A classic garden and exhibition daffodil. Pictured on page 4.   | 1Y-Y   | EM | 5.00        |
| <b>BACCARAT</b> (Gerritsen & Son, 1960)<br>A split corona daffodil with a pale yellow perianth and a darker yellow collar. An excellent grower, increases well and is great as a cut flower. Pictured on page 4.  | 11Y-Y  | M  | 3.00        |
| <b>BANTAM</b> (Barr & Sons, 1950)<br>A smaller flower with very smooth texture and rich brilliant color. Has been a show winner.  | 2Y-YRR | LM | 4.00        |
| <b>BOBOLINK</b> (Mitsch, 1965)<br>A large white perianth backs a beautiful yellow and orange cup.   | 2W-GYO | E  | 4.00        |
| <b>BUSHMILLS</b> (Dunlop, 1961)<br>This truly beautiful daffodil is pictured on the front cover. The cup has a deep green eye blending to yellow and rimmed in orange. Excellent as a cut flower, for show or for garden display.                                     | 3W-YYO |    | 4.00        |

| <b>CASTLE COOLE</b> (Dunlop, 1953)<br>A large white flower except for a rim of brilliant orange. Very long stems.  | 2W-WWO | M  | \$4.00      |

| <b>CHEERFULNESS</b> (Van der Schoot, 1943)<br>Several double flowers grace each stem of this older classic. Very fragrant, excellent cut flower.   | 4W-Y   | LM | 4.00        |
| <b>CHILOQUIN</b> (Mitsch, 1968)<br>A smooth perfectly formed reverse bicolor. The broad perianth has satiny texture. The trumpet becomes pure white after being open for a few days.                                     | 1Y-W   | LM | 5.00        |
| <b>CHINOOK</b> (Mitsch, 1952)<br>Wide white perianth petals with a wide flared and ruffled cup beginning light yellow and ending with a darker yellow rim. Pictured on page 4.   | 2W-Y   | M  | 1.00        |

The perianth is rich golden yellow and the cups fade to pure white with the white blending back into the perianth. 2 or 3 flowers per stem. | <b>MABEL TAYLOR</b> (Clark, 1944)   | 2W-YYP | EM | 3.00        |  |  |  |             |
| Prolific and vigorous with interesting color especially for hybridizers. The trumpet is large and pale yellow with a frilled edge of pink developing pink throughout the trumpet with age.  |        |    |             |  |  |  |             |




