I have now written the introductions to four catalogues and over the last two years I have been rather surprised at the extent to which they are actually read. Certainly as a result of soliciting letters from customers in this year's Spring List, my personal post bag has increased enormously. As I warned at the time, it has in fact taken me rather longer to answer all these than I might have hoped, but they have all been answered within a week or so. May I please make one request? This is that those letters which are not accompanied by an order should be sent with a stamped, addressed envelope which should speed up the reply service considerably.

You will see that we have again changed the catalogue slightly and hope that we have made it easier to read especially the Daffodil Section (pages 15-23). We have also tried to put in much more information and to this end we have put back the section telling you about items for despatch in the spring. This shows no prices as, with the best will in the world, at the time of going to press at the beginning of March 1974 we simply don't know what the prices will be in February 1975. However the full Spring List will be sent out as usual in January next year, by which time we hope we will have whetted your appetites.

The weather has rather defeated our expansion policy this winter and, in common with most of the country, we had more rain in January and February this year than in the first six months of 1973. However, Broadleigh speaking (!) gardeners are on the whole optimistic people and I am no exception. I always think at the beginning of a season that I hold large enough stocks to satisfy the demand for all the items that we sell, but I am almost always outguessed by the demand for some bulbs, so in your own interests please order early.

It is not unusual to receive orders with no name and address on them. We always try to trace these but with a customer list of well over 10,000 names this is not easy, so please double check that you have filled in the most vital part of the order form.

As many of my overseas customers did not receive the Spring List owing to postage problems, I think it is worth saying again that, as my father died last summer, I am now no longer Roger Bootle-Wilbraham but, although I sign myself as I do below, I am still exactly the same person, trying as always to give a personal service to all my customers.

NARCISSI (DAFFODILS)


A daffodil is probably one of the easiest and least demanding of plants to grow. Normally when a bulb is planted it will come up and flower, provided that an unbalanced fertilizer is not put on. Fertilizers containing an excess of nitrogen should be avoided, as should manure. However, the species do need more understanding and care and must be treated with the respect accorded to most plants in the garden. If they are happy they will become established and multiply.

The varieties we offer vary from 3" to 18" in height. Only a few are species and are clearly marked as such. The remainder are hybrids, being crosses between small species and larger-flowered varieties and, as normally happens, the hybrids have more vigour and adaptability. The hybrid daffodils which we list will grow almost anywhere, but this only applies to a very few of the species, many of which are alpine and need treatment, especially drainage, suitable for these subjects. Species daffodils may be seen all over the high ground in Spain and Portugal, where *N. asturiensis*, *bulbocodium*, *rupicola* and *triandrus* are found growing through the melting snow like Crocus in the Alps.


The *jonquils* however seem to like places where the soil is often heavy and where they get a thorough baking in summer. Few of the *tazetta* group are hardy in this country and then only in unusually warm spots — in other words their growth is restricted to south of a line from the Severn to the Wash. However, together with the North African species, they will grow well if brought in to a cold house by the middle of November but *not forced*.

The *bulbocodiums* grow almost all over the Iberian peninsula in varying conditions from marshland to dry road verges. When grown in this country it is found that those which increase by seed flower well but those whose bulbs split are likely to be flowerless after a few years. These trends can only be found out by experience as they seem to vary from garden to garden. Many of the *triandrus* family, all of which need good drainage, flower in partial shade, often on northern slopes.


Many people like to grow *daffodils* in grass. However it should be remembered for this form of naturalising that the bulbs should be planted 6" deep — in other words rather deeper than usual — and the grass should not be mown until after the leaves have died down. Many of the hybrids we list are suitable for this purpose, especially *February Silver*, *Peeping Tom*, *February Gold*, *Beryl* and the *poeticus* varieties. Also of course the wild daffodil of Northern Europe, now called *pseudo narcissus*. Many of the smaller hybrids are better grown in the border and rock garden where their daintiness can be appreciated to the full.



BULBODIUM SPECIES




CYCLAMINEUS HYBRID

HALINGY. An exquisite little plant with several milk-white flowers with pale yellow cups.

HESLA. An attractive twin-headed jonquil of an unusual shade of soft yellow with a green-tinted centre.

HORN OF PLENTY. A very vigorous white triandrus which can bear two to three flowers on a stem. These have an expanded trumpet.

ITALICUS. A very floriferous tazetta species. About ten flowers on a stem with straw coloured petals and lemon cups.

IVORY GATE. A sturdy triandrus hybrid with two to four ivory-white flowers on a stem.

JACK SNIPE. A delicate little cyclamineus whose long creamy petals and dark primrose cup make a striking contrast.

JANA. A striking deep yellow cyclamineus hybrid with the broad petals slightly reflexed at the tips.

JENNY. An exquisite cyclamineus hybrid with milk-white petals. The trumpet opens lemon coloured but quickly fades to a lovely creamy-white.

JEZEBEL. A most eye-catching small-cupped daffodil with deep yellow petals and vivid red cup.

JUNCIFOLIUS. Quite exceptional and one of the smallest jonquil species. Several tiny yellow flowers which are sweetly scented.

KEATS. A most unusual poeticus. The white petals shade to green at the centre and are not fully formed — what should be a cup is in fact five or six segments not joined together. Very exciting for floral decoration.

KEHELLAND. A very pretty soft yellow double with a stiff stem. An excellent garden plant.

LA BELLE. A very charming jonquil. It has a largish flower with very clear yellow petals and rather flat orange-red cup.

LACTICOLOR (Canaliculatus). A very prolific sweetly scented miniature tazetta species. White petals and lemon-yellow cup. Needs a well-drained position.

LADY BEE. A very beautiful large-cupped daffodil having white petals and a very unusual delicate pink cup. Excellent for flower arranging.

LARKELLY. A very fine cyclamineus hybrid of great substance. Bright yellow petals and orange-tinted cup.

LE BEAU. Drooping flowers of softest yellow with a long graceful trumpet. A very fine cyclamineus hybrid.

LENT LILY. (See pseudo narcissus.)

LIBERTY BELLS. A triandrus of outstanding beauty with several citron-yellow drooping flowers to the stem. Very colourful and excellent in the garden.

LINTIE. A dainty little jonquil. Each stem bears one to four flowers with butter-yellow petals and flat orange-red cups.

LITTLE BEAUTY. A charming little well contrasted trumpet daffodil. Twisted white petals with a lemon trumpet.

LITTLE GEM. An exquisite little pale gold trumpet daffodil. Free-flowering.

LITTLE WITCH. An exceptionally beautiful cyclamineus hybrid. Bright gold throughout with very reflexed petals. Extremely long lasting. Good in the garden and for pots.

MARCH SUNSHINE. A free-flowering and quite outstanding cyclamineus hybrid with an almost flat canary-yellow perianth and orange-tinted trumpet.

MILLENIUM. This singularly attractive miniature trumpet daffodil produces a large number of flowering stems per bulb. It has pale yellow petals with a pure lemon trumpet. Picture back cover.

MINNOW. An exquisite little tazetta hybrid with several creamy flowers on each stem with contrasting yellow cups. Does very well and increases rapidly. A good garden plant.
