

REVISED CLASSIFICATION OF DAFFODILS 1978

1. The classification of a daffodil cultivar shall be based on the description and measurements submitted by the person registering the variety, or shall be the classification submitted by such person.
2. Colours applicable to the description of daffodil cultivars are abbreviated as follows:
W—white or whitish: G—green: Y—yellow: P—pink: O—orange; R—red.
3. For purposes of description, the daffodil flower shall be divided into perianth and corona.
4. The perianth shall be described by the letter or letters of the colour code most appropriate.
5. The corona shall be divided into three zones: an eye-zone, a mid-zone, and the edge or rim. Suitable coded colour descriptions shall describe these three zones, beginning with the eye-zone and extending to the rim.
6. The letter or letters of the colour code most accurately describing the perianth shall follow the division designation.
7. The letters of the colour code most accurately describing the zones of the corona shall then follow, from the eye-zone to the rim separated from the perianth letters by a hyphen. In Division 4, the letters of the colour code most accurately describing the admixture of petals and petaloids replacing the corona shall follow in proper order, using 3, 2, or 1 colour codes as appropriate.
8. If the corona is substantially of a single colour, a single letter of the colour code shall describe it.

Using these basic requirements, daffodils may be classified as follows:

DIVISION 1: TRUMPET DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; trumpet or corona as long or longer than the perianth segments.

DIVISION 2: LONG-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 3: SHORT-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona not more than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 4: DOUBLE DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Double flowers.

DIVISION 5: TRIANDRUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus triandrus* predominant.

DIVISION 6: CYCLAMINEUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus cyclamineus* predominant.

DIVISION 7: JONQUILLA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus jonquilla* group predominant.

DIVISION 8: TAZETTA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus tazetta* group predominant.

DIVISION 9: POETICUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus poeticus* group predominant.

DIVISION 10: SPECIES AND WILD FORMS AND WILD HYBRIDS

All species and wild or reputedly wild forms and hybrids. Double forms of these varieties are included.

DIVISION 11: SPLIT-CORONA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Corona split for at least one-third of its length.

DIVISION 12: MISCELLANEOUS DAFFODILS

All daffodils not falling into any one of the foregoing Divisions.

TERMS

All bulbs are offered on condition that the crop is satisfactory and subject unsold at time of receipt of order.

We will not be responsible for results of planting or forcing, but guarantee all varieties true to name.

Orders cannot be cancelled except by mutual consent.

All prices are for net cash within one month from date of invoice, invoices including postage and packing will be included in all parcels.

Orders will be executed in strict rotation.

All bulbs travel at customer's risk and expense.

Postage and packing charged at cost on all orders.

Please order before the middle of July to avoid disappointment, because some stocks are small and all unsold bulbs are replanted by beginning of September. Figures following the names of varieties denote approximately the relative times of flowering. No. 1 being the earliest, and No. 6 the latest.

A.M. — Award of Merit.

R.H.S. — Royal Horticultural Society.

Wisley Trials — Trials conducted by the Royal Horticultural Society in their gardens at Wisley, to test suitability for garden decoration.

EXCHANGE RATES

For easy calculation the exchange rate of 2 dollars to the pound will be used, we will try to make up any differences with gratis bulbs.

CULTURAL NOTES

For best results, choose a well-drained, sunny plot of ground.

Deep digging to aerate the soil is very important, but too much organic manure is not recommended except in very dry areas, as this is liable to start fungus diseases. Bone meal helps bulb and flower of production and sulphate of potash is a great help for producing intensity of colour. Bone meal not more than three ounces per square yard, potash a light sprinkling over the beds.

If it is desired to plant in beds, these should be made up some weeks before planting which, ideally, should be completed in September.

We plant the bulbs in about 1½ times their own depth, i.e., a bulb that measures two inches from crown to base is planted in a hole three inches deep. We plant our bulbs eight per row in four foot beds, with a path about 18 inches between the beds. If the bulbs are a very small variety, nine may be planted. The rows are planted far enough apart to allow hoeing between them during the growing season to keep the weeds down. If the bulbs are not being grown commercially they can be left down for several seasons without being lifted, and will flower extremely well. If desired they can be planted in clumps for garden decoration, but if Show specimens are aimed at the raised bed method is the best.

Many people like to grow bulbs in pots, and this method, certainly gives one great pleasure and a chance to study the flowers in comfort without the cold winds, rain, hail and even snow conditions which we have come to expect during the daffodil season.

It is not usually successful to try and force the bulbs, the best rule is to leave them sunk in the ground outside until the flower buds show above the ground. Then they may be brought into a cool greenhouse or a cool light window.

When the buds are starting to open they need a great deal of water and must never be allowed to dry out.

Five bulbs can be planted in a nine-inch pot or more if the bulbs are small. Potting does not improve the condition of the bulbs, but we have found that by replanting them in the lump as they come out of the pot immediately after flowering they do not suffer much.

- 2 w-p ALICE'S PINK** (Carncairn Daffodils). 4. Breeding unknown.
Pure white perianth with a neat smallish cup of deep salmon-pink slightly frilled at the edge, which holds its colour without fading for a considerable time.

- 1 w-w BALLYLOUGH** (Carncairn) 2-3. Broughshane X Easter Moon.
A very strong plant with tremendous texture in the perianth. The trumpet has a greenish tinge resembling the colour of Easter Moon. This is a useful addition to the white trumpet class as it seems to have a stronger constitution than most.

- 6 w-p LITTLE PRINCESS** (Richardson) 3-4
A very strongly coloured pink corona with a satiny pure white perianth. We are getting very good results using this as a pollen parent.

- 2 w-o ORANGE SHERBET** (Carncairn) 3. Blarney X Self
Rounded perianth very white and smooth. Flat cup with outstanding colour having a dark eye and clear orange halfway down the cup and then a paler yellowish orange to the edge. Statiny texture. Strong stems.

- 2 w-w PORTAVO** (Carncairn) 3-4 Easter Moon X G.LW. 45/115
Resembles Easter Moon in colour and texture, but the perianth is more rounded and the cup larger and frilled at the edge with a beautiful green eye. Best bloom Bangor (N.Ireland) 1977.

A very large flower carried on a tall strong stem. The perianth is slightly reflexed, but the petals lie flat. A graceful flower in spite of its size. First prize 1A Class Ballymena 1975 and 1977.

NEW INTRODUCTIONS
FOR 1977

- 1 y-y BALLYARNETT** (Carncairn) 1. Goldcourt X Moonstruck.
This is a large soft yellow trumpet which was full in bloom on 6th March, 1976, in the open. The long, slender trumpet is very serrated and curled back at the mouth. The perianth segments are shovel shaped and pointed, the eye is green, and there is a faint greenish tinge in the perianth. This is the earliest large 1a we have grown.

- 2 w-p BELTRIM** (Carncairn) 4. Rosario X Irish Rose.
A pink of good deep colour, and coming in consistently good form. with a very rounded perianth and round cup with a green eye. An extremely good increaser.

- 2 w-p CLARE PARK** (Carncairn) 3-4. Rosario X Debutante.
This flower has been one of my favourites for several years, but it is definitely not for the show bench unless fashions change. It has a huge crinoline like cup of a deep pink which opens very wide, backed by a pure white perianth which does not overlap enough. A magnificent plant in pots and in clumps in the garden. Has been much admired. Good lasting qualities, and tall strong stems. A good breeder.

- 2 w-w COLUMBUS** (Carncairn) 3-4. Easter Moon X Guy Wilson seedling 45/115. This is a sister of Churchfield. A flower of the most wonderful substance and texture, standing proudly on a tall stem. In some seasons it opens with a tiny yellow rim which quickly fades, leaving the whole flower a very pure white with a greenish-grey eye.

- 2 w-w CREME DE MENTHE** (Carncairn) 4. Chinese White X Seedling 11/39/59 which came from a Guy Wilson seedling X Cotterton. This is a very tall flower, unfortunately too late for most shows. We have only tried it in a pot once, in 1975, when it was in our winning group of twelve in Omagh. It has an eye like an emerald, and an expanded, crinkled cup of pure white, and a pure white perianth of very smooth texture. The snags are:- not enough overlap in the perianth segments, and a slightly long neck, but it does hold its head quite well up in spite of this, and is definitely an outstanding flower.

2 y-r FEUGO (Richardson) 2-3. Cathay X Patagonia Firecracker Seedling. This flower won the 2a single bloom class against strong competition at the Daffodil Show in London 1976. It has an expanding cup slightly frilled at the edge, which opens yellow, and gradually turns a rich orange-red which is sunproof. The perianth is of a very smooth texture, a beautiful deep yellow flushing slightly with red. One of the brightest flowers in our collection, and of great lasting qualities.

2 w-gww INNIS BEG (Carncairn) 3-4. A very clear cut 2c of good texture and consistency, and a green eye. Very short necked and with strong, tall stems. Selected for trial at Wisley 1977.

2 y-r MARCH MADNESS (Carncairn) 1. Armada X Fury. A very early red and yellow. In 1976 it was in full flower in Mid March. The flowers stand on very tall stems high above the leaves. The perianth is a good yellow, and the corona is circular and expanded, of a solid red which will stand a good deal of sun so early in the season. A very brilliantly coloured flower, but the perianth does need flattening for the show bench.

2 w-p MOYOLA (Carncairn) 4-5. Templemore X Rose Caprice. This is a very beautiful flower, coming in consistently good form with wonderful smooth texture. The cup is of an unusual peach colour with a greenish-grey eye. Unfortunately the rather pale colouring makes it little unobtrusive on the show bench, but it has won in the 2b class.

4 w-r SNOWFIRE (Richardson) 3-4. Falaise X Rockall. One of the outstanding red and white doubles raised at Prospect House. Very like Acropolis, but not quite as well doubled, though the colours are even more striking and it is a taller, stronger plant. Has won prizes in single bloom classes. Scented.

2 w-w TULLYGIRVAN (Carncairn) 3-4. Blarney X Irish Rose. An unusual flower, opening with a buff cup, which changes daily till the flower, is all white, lasting for weeks. Quite a large flower with a straight edged cup and no-nicked petals. A good increaser and a strong grower.

3 w-y AIRCASTLE. 4. (Green Island X Chinese White). Bred and raised by Mr. Mitsch in America, this flower is an almost certain winner at shows. The perianth is very rounded and in perfect balance with the shallow crown which is a pale apricot lemon with a narrow margin of a deeper shade. The petals after opening milk-white take on an unusual greenish tint. A beautiful flower of great substance and vigour.

4 w-w ALBUS PLENUS ODORATUS 6. Old sweet-scented double white. Resents being moved, but once established flowers well.
