AFFODIL LIST

Daffodils are very easy to grow, doing well in any reasonable soil. They like an open, sunny position, a dry Summer rest period, and plenty of moisture while in growth. Plant bulbs from January till mid April.

The bulbs need to be planted reasonably deep (about 15cm (6 inches) in light soil, a bit less in heavy soil). Do **not** plant bulbs on a very hot day (hot, moist soils could cause the bulb to rot) and **don't** plant back in the same spot you last had daffodils growing. We lift and divide our garden planted bulbs each three years. If fertilizing your bulbs, potash is all that is required.

Never, never ever cut the foliage off your daffodils while it is still in growth. This year's foliage is next year's plant and flowers!

If you wish to grow daffodils in pots please read our notes "Growing Bulbs in Pots" on Page 6.



Division 1 Trumpet, All Yellow (1 Y-Y)

AH GEE - (Glenbrook, Tas.) Seedling 17/85, bred from two superb Australian parents (GOLDEN x RISTIN) with lovely, smooth yellow petals and narrow trumpet. Just medium size and exceptionally consistent. Mid to mid-late season. 1st Prize Westbury and winning Bulman Cup team, 1985 and regularly in winning teams since. \$8.00

ALWON - (Jackson, Tas.) a robust, golden yellow daffodil with flared and frilled trumpet. Consistent show form. Early-mid season. \$4.00

BEGA - (Jackson, Tas.) a fine yellow daffodil with very good, rounded petals and straightish trumpet. Good show record. Mid season. \$7.00

BIOGRAPH - (Jackson, Tas.) superb quality daffodil. Beautiful, even form and very, very smooth petals. One of the finest yellow trumpets in cultivation. Early-mid season. Many awards. \$15.00

GARGLEBLASTER - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred GOLDEN x HEART OF GOLD. An early, large flowered, all yellow trumpet. Very robust and a fine garden plant. Champion Yellow Trumpet, Hobart 1984 and in winning Duncan Cup, 1987, also in winning 3 Trumpets, Canberra '90. \$7.00

HITCHHIKER - (Jackson, Tas.) superlative, huge yellow trumpet with great size, form and smoothness. Early flowering. A striking variety, strong grower and Show Champion winner. \$15.00

KARMA - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred from AKKAD x KOROMO. An exceptionally smooth and consistent yellow trumpet. Broad petals and neatly formed trumpet, even yellow throughout. Particularly consistent show flower; First Prize Westbury 1986, Hobart 1987, Glover Trophy Launceston 1987, winning Radcliff team Hobart 1989 and winning Class 1 Claremont '91. Early to mid season. \$15.00

MADRUGA - (Jackson, Tas.) beautifully smooth yellow trumpet of medium size. 1st Prize Open Class 1 Y-Y at Claremont and Hobart, 1987. \$6.00

MELDRUM - (Lea, Eng.) a very good, mid-season cultivar. Bright gold colouring and very neat show form. Also a fine garden plant. \$8.00

ODIN - (Jackson, Tas.) another classical yellow trumpet. Early-mid season. Lovely garden plant and excellent for breeding. \$4.00

PINK BOMB - (Mitsch/Havens, U.S.A.) superb decorative with giant white perianth and very large, wide-open crown toning from bright pink at the rim to a lemon centre. Mid-late season. \$8.00

PINK SPARKLER - (Mitsch/Havens, U.S.A.) a sibling to PINK BOMB. Refined white perianth and wide open crown with scalloped edge of pink. Mid-late season. Fine quality. \$9.00

DAFFODIL COLOUR DESCRIPTIONS



Some plants are rather variable e.g. RAGBAG which has egg-yolk yellow petaloids just as often as orange. In warmer climates we would not expect either the pink or red cups to be so bright in colour as when grown in cold-climate gardens.

IMPORTANT CULTIVATION NOTES FOR HOOP-PETTICOAT DAFFODILS:

In our garden we flower our hoop-petticoats (the species *N. bulbocodium*, *N. cantabricus*, *N. romieuxii* and their hybrids) prolifically every year. We believe this success is due to planting the bulbs in a situation where they get **no** water from November through until March. The easiest way to achieve this is by planting in pots and tipping these on their side for the Summer. This long, hot, dry spell certainly seems to be the key to prolific flowering.
