3. Please note classification for Dik Dik is now 2Y-R and Stratosphere is 7Y-O.

Order Information

1. Please include **Item Number** on order blank. (Number preceding Price. . . i.e. Accent — **02-100** \$1.50 each net.) Each of the collections will have an individual **Item Number** just preceding price as well.
2. **Payment:** Please send payment with order and make check or money order payable to Richard Havens.
3. **Postage and Handling:** Prices quoted include prepaid postage on orders \$20.00 and over. Orders less than \$20.00 to one address, please add \$3.00 for postage. If total Gift Collection is less than \$20.00, per location, please include \$3.00 postage.
4. **Acknowledgement:** Orders \$20.00 and over and received before August 1 will be automatically acknowledged — Orders under \$20.00 will be acknowledged by request.
5. **Extra Copies of 1991 Order:** We encourage the writing of an extra copy of your 1991 order to be retained for personal reference upon receipt of bulb shipment. If there should be a question concerning your order, please do not hesitate to contact us immediately.
6. **Substitution:** It is not our policy to freely substitute; however, on occasion, a variety is sold out. In this case, a similar substitute of equal or greater value may be made. Please advise on order blank if we may substitute. If you should have any special instructions, please place on order blank as well. It is most important to us that we respect your wishes. All of our bulb offerings are **subject to crop. On orders sent after August 1**, alternate choices should be listed.
7. **Order Date:** The bulk of the orders are arriving during the spring and early summer, so we encourage early orders to avoid disappointment. Bulbs offered for sale are subject to crop.
8. **Shipping Rotation:** Bulbs are shipped by Parcel Post and United Parcel Service. We endeavor to send orders in rotation as received with the complete shipping process starting the first week of September. **Orders arriving during July through September will have a good chance of being shipped during the month of October**, for spring and early summer orders deserve our first attention.
9. **Retail Bulbs:** Nearly all bulbs sent out are double nose except in the case of miniatures, most of which are rounds. Some tazettas and species hybrids produce primarily rounds as well. If ordering for the first time, please note that bulbs will vary in size as to their variety and genetic makeup. All bulbs are hand cleaned, graded and selected. We personally grow and care for all of our retail bulbs from planting and harvest to order filling and shipping on our Oregon farm. The smallness of our business permits the preceding.
10. **Bulb Care:** It is our goal to send out good quality bulbs and if upon receipt, they prove otherwise, please notify us immediately. If ordering for the first time or if one is a beginner, please read complete culture sheet when order first arrives for general advisement. Due to the value of the bulbs, every effort to avert disappointment is important.
11. **Extra Bulbs:** Orders over \$10.00 received by August 1, will include extra bulbs worth at least 10% of the order value.

ORDERS OUTSIDE THE UNITED STATES

We wish to request payment with **International Money Orders in U.S. dollars** for they are well accepted by our local bank.

It is imperative that we receive all foreign orders by **July 1** to permit correct timing for inspection and the necessary preparation to avert delays.

Overseas orders: We advocate sending bulbs by airmail, cost of which is prohibitive on lower priced bulbs, but surface transportation is so slow that we can give no assurance of bulbs arriving in good order. Cost of air transport to be paid by purchaser.

FOR THE NEW CUSTOMER

1. **Flower Color** — Our descriptions are based on observations of the blooms when they reach maturity as they bloom here. The preceding has involved several years. In many cases, pinks may open a yellow or greenish color. The intensity of the pink color develops with maturity of the bloom. Reverse bi-colors will open all yellow with the corona reversing to a white as the bloom matures. Many of the red cups develop their brightness with maturity as well. It is not unusual for a double to require more than one year to adapt to its new habitat and climatic conditions.

2. **Culture Sheet** — We would like to give additional encouragement for the reading of entire Daffodil Culture Sheet of which will be enclosed with bulb parcel when it first arrives for general advisement. It is felt that the preceding is very essential because of bulb value. Thank you very much.

COMMON QUESTIONS

Frequently, we are asked what is the difference between narcissus, jonquils and daffodils.

1. The daffodil as we know it belongs to the genus narcissus. The word daffodil is the English term to refer to the preceding.
2. Daffodils which belong to Division 7 (see page 27) are correctly called jonquils.
3. Generally, jonquils (Division 7) and tazettas (Division 8) do particularly well in warmer climates.

1991 Daffodil Introductions

- CONCERTINA** (Mitsch) 1991 2W-P. LM 18" ((Precedent x Accent) x F67/1) KK25/5. A spectacular multi-faceted flower, the deep rose pink bowl shaped crown which is heavily frilled, fluted and lacinated is complemented by a broad white perianth with a suggestion of pink. Robust growth habit and heavy substance make this a long lasting flower. 02-591 \$15.00 each net.
- COOL WHITE** (Mitsch) 1991 3W-W. L. 19" (Aircastle x Verona) NN34/6. Somewhat atypical of the seed parent, this is one of the purist white flowers we grow. In fact on the stake my father had written "bluish white". Flat ruffled cup with rounded broad perianth which resists tears. A lovely show quality flower with heavy substance and style. 03-592 \$25.00 each net.
- COOL EVENING** (Mitsch) 1991 11W-P. M. 15" ((Precedent x Accent) x Phantom) 206/11. One of the most refined of all of the pink split coronas bred by Grant Mitsch. His goal was to combine appealing color with a show quality perianth and here we feel this was attained. Endowed with a delicate pink flat split cup and a well formed rounded white perianth. Pictured on cover. 11-593 \$25.00 each net.
- GOLD VELVET** (Mitsch) 1991 1Y-Y. M. 18" (Aurum x Arctic Gold) NN19/2. As indicated by the parentage, a very well formed deeply colored flower of silken texture. The straight trumpet has a slightly ruffled margin, and in the right weather conditions has a distinct orange overlay. Broad spade shaped perianth segments of deep gold complete the picture. 01-594 \$25.00 each net.
- GOLDEN YEARS** (Mitsch) 1991 6Y-Y. E. 14" ((Focal Point x Salem) x N. cyclamineus) 0047/20. Clear yellow, a similar color to Rapture, but with much broader perianth segments; the trumpet is very slightly flared and ruffled giving character, but maintaining tailored very classically cyclamineus appearance. One of the best show flowers of this group. Offered under seedling number 1990. Pictured on cover. 06-595 \$30.00 each net.
- HONEY PINK** (Mitsch) 1991 2Y-P. LM. 16" (Euphony x Amberjack) KK40/1. Honey Pink has been grown for a number of years and has always been a favorite. Not being of deep color this one might be overlooked by the casual observer, but it certainly has not been overlooked when entered in shows. Unique pastel shade—creamy lemon in the perianth and creamy pinkish hue in the cup—a very subtle coloring. A flower of heavy substance and smooth texture. Spade shaped perianth segments with a slightly flared and ruffled long crown. A good increaser. 02-596 \$10.00 each net.
- ICE DIAMOND** (Mitsch) 1991 4W-W. LM. (Gay Time x Stainless). A truly beautifully formed clean white smooth double. For us, the inner petaloids open creamy yellow and soon fade to white. Broad symmetrical petals, heavy substance and consistency are indispensable traits in a show double. All are evident in this flower along with smooth texture. The best white double we have grown. Pictured on page 24. 04-597 \$50.00 each net.
- LEMON BROOK** (Mitsch) 1991 2YW-W. L. 17" (Euphony open pollinated) 2002/. Another open pollinated flower from Euphony—very distinct from the others (Spring Morn and Euphonic Grace) a reverse bicolor with excellent contrast. Straight cup with ruffle at the border, becoming pure white at maturity, the spade shaped flat broad deep lemon perianth with white halo resists tears making suitable for shows. Heavy substance with very striking clean contrast. 02-598 \$20.00 each net.
- LEMON SAILS** (Mitsch) 1991 2Y-Y. LM. 16" ((Playboy x Daydream) open pollinated) MO25/20. Heavy substance and broad very flat smooth perianth segments, augment the beautiful subtle coloration of this exceptional flower. A lemon yellow perfectly flat perianth with buff yellow cup, somewhat reminiscent of the color of Top Notch, but with considerably distinct form and character. In summary, the first impression of this flower is its perfection of form in the broad waxen perianth. 02-599 \$20.00 each net.
- LITTLE SUNSHINE** (Frey) 1991 6Y-Y. E. 5½" (Wee Bee x N. cyclamineus) PEF9/2. A delightful cyclamineus hybrid with extremely attractive form and good substance. It displays the very reflexed perianth of cyclamineus; however, it has much broader perianth segments that are 5 mm shorter than the corona. It is one my father, Grant Mitsch, liked. 06-600 \$20.00 each net.
- PINK EVENING** (Mitsch) 1991 3W-YWP. L. 21" (Coral Light x Pigeon x Carnmoon) LL18/5. Division 3 pinks have been a long sought after goal and to our knowledge Audubon was the first with really distinct pink coloring. In common with the preceding, the most immediately noticeable characteristic of this flower is the clean color and form. Pure white broad but pointed segments in the perianth accentuate the small cup with deep pink distinct rim. 03-601 \$20.00 each net.
- PINK HOLLY** (Havens) 1991 11W-P. LM. 13" (Space Ship x Accent x Q97/2) PEH 26/4. Seed parent is Space Ship and pollen parent is sibling to Phantom. This one did very well in the RHS show we attended in 1989. Rosy pink slightly frilled split corona with quite well formed broad perianth makes this one a contender on the show bench. 11-602 \$25.00 each net.
- PINK TANGO** (Mitsch) 1991 11W-P. EM. 16" ((Loch Maree x Radiation) x Accent) x Phantom) KK28/1. One of the earlier pink splits of acceptable form. Slightly ruffled clear pink corona split and laid back against broad clean white perianth segments. Heavy substance and strong color are the finest attributes of this flower. A good doer and increaser makes possible a moderate introductory price. Picture on cover. 11-603 \$20.00 each net.
- SCARLET CHORD** (Mitsch) 1991 2Y-R. E. 17" ((Chemawa x Brer Fox) x Loch Hope) 2Q15/5. Perfectly flat clear yellow rounded perianth, contrasts sharply to the straight red cup. The flamboyance of Brer Fox has been given refinement with the use of Chemawa and Loch Hope in the parentage. Received very positive comments at the NCDS show in 1990 for its outstanding coloration and form. A very striking flower indeed. 02-604 \$35.00 each net.
- SWIFT ARROW** (Mitsch) 1991 6Y-Y. E. 15" ((P50/1 x Flaming Meteor) x N. cyclamineus) 2N41/1. Resembles Warbler, but a little earlier and less green at the juncture of perianth and trumpet. In some seasons, this one has a distinct undertone of orange in the trumpet. An excellent long-lasting flower of classical cyclamineus form and show quality. Pictured on page 24. 06-605 \$15.00 each net.
- WOODSTAR** (Mitsch-Frey) 1991 5Y-YW. L. 14" (Triandrus albus x N. jonquilla) E42/1. Very lovely soft lemon with reflexed perianth and goblet shaped crown. It displays 5 to 6 (or more) flowers on a stem. Fairy Chimes is somewhat similar but color is reversed, developing nearly white on outer portion of corona. Good increaser. 05-606 \$25.00 each net.



ROBERTA WATROUS

Three of Roberta Watrous' miniatures, Curlilocks, Flyaway and Kibitizer had been introduced in our catalog in 1973. All have demonstrated their excellence with their popularity and success in shows. We wish to acknowledge her outstanding contributions to this very elite group. She was given the prestigious Gold Medal for hybridizing from the American Daffodil Society in 1987, a highly deserved honor. This year two more of her originations, both on the ADS list of approved miniatures, are being introduced.

LITTLE RUSKY (Roberta Watrous) 7Y-GYO (Ruby x N. scaberulous) 691-1. Smaller and better formed than Bobby Soxer, this beautiful new jonquil hybrid usually comes with one, occasionally 2 to a stem; it has a soft yellow perianth with a slightly deeper yellow shallow bowl shaped crown, edged with orange and possessing a lovely green eye. Strong grower and good increaser. Received the Larus award in 1988 and the Rose Ribbon on several occasions. 07-607 \$25.00 each net.

SEWANNE (Roberta Watrous) 2W-Y (Seville x N. waterii) SW5. Glistening smooth white perianth with clear lemon yellow neat bowl shaped cup. Consistency and beautiful clean form make this clear division 2 miniature very desirable for showing. In addition it is very good in the garden. Has won the Rose Ribbon several times. 02-608 \$25.00 each net.

Novelty Daffodils for 1991

EXPLANATION OF DESCRIPTIONS

In the descriptions of the varieties as listed below, the name of the variety is given first in capital letters, followed by the name of the originator in parentheses. Then there is the date of registration or introduction. Next there is the classification symbol, flowering season, E. for early, M. for mid-season, L. for late, etc. Approximate height in inches or centimeters follows. **Just preceding the price is an item number to be used on the order form.** Following are two definitions of terms:

Corona: The cup, or trumpet-shaped or disc-like outgrowth, arising from the inner surface of the perianth at the base of the segments. Perianth: The six floral leaves, comprised of three sepals and three petals.

ACCENT (Mitsch) 1961 2W-P. M. 18" (Interim x Interlude) Q40/1. For several years this has been the most popular Daffodil in our list based on the number of orders for it. The deep salmon rose color has enough concentration of pigment to give this more garden value than most of the pinks, and added to this are good poise, nice form, and much substance. Quite flat, clean white perianth that sometimes reflexes slightly. A strong, vigorous grower and fine increaser. Unable to supply large quantities. 02-100 \$1.50 each net.

ACE (Mitsch) 1980 2W-PPW. M. 15" (Accent x Luscious) F5/1. Quite similar in size and form to Credo, but with a light pink crown, bordered white. A lovely color, with vigorous plant, good poise and substance. Attractive and different. 02-101 \$3.00 each.

AFFABLE (Mitsch) 1978 4Y-O. L. 20" (Gay Time x Daydream) H102/1. Like Elixir, this has fewer perianth segments than most doubles, and like them, the width and form of the petaloids makes for a good full flower. A distinctive color in this class, being of pale buff apricot, with the shorter ruffled petaloids of pale orange. Very rounded flowers of good size, with nice stem and neck. Very attractive. 04-103 \$3.00 each.

AKEPA (Mitsch) 1980 5W-P. L. 14" (Accent x N. triandrus albus) HH4/2. The first outstanding pink triandrus hybrid we have seen. A goal long sought appears to have been achieved if this flower performs as well elsewhere as it has done here. Usually two blooms of small to medium size, with well formed milk white perianths, and goblet shaped soft pink coronas are borne on a good, medium small stem. 05-105 \$40.00 each net.

- ALAMO** (Mitsch) 1974 2Y-R. EM. 20" (P50/1 (Narvik x California Gold) x Flaming Meteor) B45/5. Having a rich gold yellow, flat, very smooth perianth of good substance, and a somewhat frilled, well-balanced crown of rich orange red, this is a good show flower and is striking in the garden. Good stems. 02-106 \$4.00 each.
- ALLAFRILL** 2W-P. M. 18". Offered exclusively as an unusual decorative flower. Possessing an intense bright pink crown of heavy substance with well-defined ruffles extending from the margin, deep into the crown, with a milk white perianth. A very fine garden flower with strong stems. 02-107 \$3.00 each net.
- ANGEL SILK** (Eve Robertson) 1987 2W-W. LM. 24" (Easter Moon x Glenmanus) #262. A most beautiful silken smooth flower befitting its name. The broad white perianth is flat with heavy substance and the straight white crown lends the perfect form necessary for the show table. Very limited stock. 02-110 \$30.00 each net.
- ANGKOR** (Mitsch) 1981 4Y-Y. LM. 20" (Gay Time x Daydream) H102/3. Ivory lemon perianth with slightly deeper central petals and petaloids having a greenish cast throughout the flower. Widely overlapping perianth that is sometimes reflexed. Good stem and neck. Should be a good show flower. 04-111 \$3.00 each
- APRIL PRINCESS** (Frey) 1989 7Y-Y. L 11" (Bantam x juncifolius) LEE1/3. An attractive small yellow, sister seedling to Sweet Treat; possibly not as refined in form although very appealing. Its "smiling face" is a bit larger than Sweet Treat with a much wider flat corona, sometimes having two blooms to a stem. 07-472 \$6.00 each net.
- APRIL TEARS** (Alec Gray) 1939 5Y-Y. LM. 9". A delightful little flower with two or three exquisitely formed pendant lemon blossoms on a stem. 05-112 \$1.30 each net.
- ARCTIC CHAR** (Murray Evans) 1974 2W-P. One of the best pinks. In appearance it resembles Accent, but is deeper in color, larger, and a better quality flower. 02-113 \$14.00 each.
- ASHMORE** (Blanchard) 1974 2W-W. LM. Perfectly formed smooth all white flower. 02-114 \$6.00 each net.
- ASTRODOME** (Mitsch) 1983 2W-PPW. LM. 17" (F34/3 (Precedent x Debutante) x Space Ship) LL39/3. A large flower with ivory white perianth of quite good form, with a much flared crown of soft apricot pink, having a narrow cream margin. Not a show flower but very showy! 02-116 \$7.00 each.
- AT DAWNING** (Mitsch) 1W-P. EM. 16" (Radiation x Rima) C38/1. A medium sized flower with a nice, flat white perianth of very good substance. The trumpet is quite straight and neatly tailored, pale pink fading to white near the base. Considerably smaller and more formal than Rima. 01-117 \$3.00 each.
- AUDUBON** (Mitsch) 1965 3W-WWP. M. 22" ((Interim x Mabel Taylor) x Caro Nome) R110/1A. A startling bit of color, the rosy pink to coral rimmed cup with good sized, flat, very white perianth make it an excellent flower for cutting or exhibiting. Tall strong stems. One of our better ones. 03-393 \$2.00 each net.
- AUTUMN GOLD** (Mitsch) 1985 7Y-Y. L. 49 cm. (Quick Step x Daydream) D80/13. A perfectly formed small flower, this is a profuse bloomer with obvious jonquil ancestry. A slightly flared and ruffled cup is complement to a smooth flat perianth. 07-119 \$2.00 each.
- AVOCET** (Mitsch) 1983 7W-YYW. L. 20" (R33/32 (Green Island x Chinese White) x N. jonquilla) KK102/3. A tall stemmed, vigorous growing jonquil hybrid with nearly white flowers, usually borne three on a stem. Rounded white perianths of good substance with saucer shaped crowns. 07-120 \$7.00 each.
- BARBET** (Mitsch) 1977 2W-P. LM. 13" (A5/8 (Caro Nome x Accent) x A34/10 (Precedent x Carita)) G36/1. Handicapped with the fault of hanging its head when first open, this would not have been named excepting for its beautiful color. The crown is of a rich rose pink, deeper in color than our other introductions except for those leaning more to true red such as Rubythroat. It holds its color well. Quite a good-sized bowl-shaped crown, with a flat white perianth. 02-123 \$3.00 each.
- BEAUTIFUL DREAM** (Mitsch) 1985 3W-W. L. 50 cm. (Silken Sails x Audubon) JJ12/20A. A giant magnificent flower with a rounded and very broad perianth endowed with a great amount of substance. The small cream cup (fading to white at maturity) is ruffled and much flatter than that of Sacramento, but not flat to the perianth. At the same time, a large, almost snow white halo develops on the perianth, making it a most striking contrasty flower. Good stems with one or two blossoms on each. CORAL CLOUD (Knouse) 4W-P. M. (Pink Chiffon x Mabel Taylor). A sibling to Coral Strand, this contains considerably deeper pink petaloids intermixed with white in a good full double having slightly shorter stems than foliage, it makes an appealing decorative flower with intense pink coloration. 04-433 \$3.00 each net.

CORAL LIGHT (Kanouse) 2W-WWP. LM. 20" (Green Island x Interim). It is a flower of excellent form with rounded, overlapping white perianth of fine substance. The rather small crown has a wide, deep pink band on opening, the color soon spreading until it nearly reaches the cool green base. Strong, tall stems. 02-155 \$2.00 each net.

DESERT BELLS (Mitsch) 1984 7W-Y. L. 12" (Quick Step x juncifolius) II134/1. Small flowers, two or three on a stem, with flat perianths and attractive goblet shaped crowns. Petals are quite rounded and nicely shaped however having a tendency to reflex at maturity. The corona lightens as flower matures to almost white with soft yellow rim. The very broad golden yellow perianth is nicely reflexed and of good substance. The crown of gold is heavily flushed deep orange and is widely flanged and flared. Well formed individual deep lemon gold flowers are borne doubly on tall stems, the cup being a slightly deeper shade than the perianth. One of the truly most beautiful of the small cupped yellows, Golden Pond is a large flower of impeccable form, having very broad overlapping yellow perianth and a small saucer shaped crown of golden glowing yellow with a slightly darker rim which borders on orange. GRADUATION (Havens) 1976 2W-WWP. M. 13" (Empress of Ireland x Accent) E64-1/1. Very few seedlings from this series gave any of the hoped for pink coloring, but this is an attractive flower with a white perianth and a rather long, trumpet shaped crown of white, shaded with quite pure pink near the mouth. GREBE (Mitsch) 1979 4Y-O. M. 23" (R63/1 x Enterprise) F133/1. The seed parent involves Playboy, Klingo and Ardour. A tall, quite large double with sturdy stems. The outer petals, making for a double perianth are clear mid yellow, while the very full center consists of yellow and orange petaloids. A symmetrical flower; some blooms having rather long necks. GREEK KEY withdrawn.

GULL (Mitsch) 1979 2W-GWW. LM. 21" (Easter Moon x 2/417 which is a Broughshane seedling) W65/2/7. A large clean white flower with a satin smooth finish. Both the perianth segments and the crown are rather longer than most flowers in its class. Nicely balanced show flower with green shadings at the base of the crown. HERON (Mitsch) 1978 2W-P. M. 18" (Magic Dawn x Carita) D95/1. Smooth, flat, and very large white perianth well overlapping, with a matching crown of solid light pink. A large pink, and a flower of good form. 02-202 \$5.00 each.

HIGHPOINT (Frey) 1984 2Y-Y. M. 16" (Playboy x Chilouin) JEE8/10. Large nicely poised flower with lemon yellow perianth of good form and substance. Almost apricot colored corona with lighter lemon halo around the corona slightly frilled. Sturdy stems. 02-204 \$4.50 each net.

HILLSTAR (Mitsch) 1979 7YW-YWW. LM. 16". (Daydream x N. jonquilla) F72/6. Medium sized, bright lemon yellow perianth with a white halo. The crown is ivory, shaded buff, with a white edge. ICE CHIMES (Mitsch/Havens) 5Y-Y. LM. 30 cm. (Silver Bells x T. aurantiacus) F153/1. Beautifully formed tiny bell shaped flowers of ivory yellow, the perianth a shade lighter than the corona. A typical representative of Class 5 with two or three florets per stem. The appeal of Ice Chimes is many faceted and first for showing and hybridizing, but is also a lovely rockery subject. 05-512 \$35.00 each net.

ICE RIM (Mitsch) 1986 7W-YW. L. 20" ((Green Island x Chinese White) x N. jonquilla) KK201/1. A most unusual and pleasing flower with good substance, the butterscotch yellow bowl shaped cup on this jonquil is enhanced by a narrow distinct white rim and a white round "Aircastle-shaped" perianth, the blooms about the size of Oryx. Very floriferous and late in the season, this provides a welcome addition to its class. 07-210 \$6.00 each.

ICELANDIC PINK (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 2W-P. LM. 20" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/29A. A lovely all purpose flower, we feel this has prospect of being a strong standard in the future of pink daffodils. IMPRESARIO (Mitsch) 1975 2Y-WWY. EM. 16" (W12/1 (P5/8 x Lunar Sea) x Salem) F88/2. The quite long, narrow crown makes this appear to be a trumpet, but measurement indicates otherwise. Perianth opens pale lemon and deepens in color as it ages, reflexing somewhat in maturing. The crown opens lemon, fading out to nearly white, with a little gold rim. One of the best reverses we have raised. 02-213 \$7.00 each.

INCA (Mitsch) 1985 6Y-WWY. E. 30 cm. (Barlow open pollinated) JO1/1. The fruition of Grant Mitsch's work with reverse bicolor cyclamineus hybrids has been in Swallow and Wheatear and now Inca, with a form very distinct from the previous two. Of beautiful glistening color, the slightly reflexed greenish lemon perianth segments are quite broad and complement the long straight cup which fades to nearly white with a distinct gold band. 06-214 \$20.00 each.

INDEPENDENCE DAY (Mitsch) 1990 4W-R. L. 17" (Gay Time x Bantam) LL60/1. A well formed double with symmetry and clean, bright color. IRRESISTIBLE (Mitsch) 1982 2Y-P. EM. 13" (Milestone x Sugar Maple) LL8/2. Another of that relatively new class of yellow-pinks, and we believe that some who do not ordinarily care for these colors may like this flower. The large, very flat, well formed perianth is of soft pale buffy lemon. LAPINE (Mitsch) 1982 3Y-YYO. LM. 20" (Aircastle x Ardour) II88/1. A small cupped yellow with a red rim. The perianth is flat, broadly overlapping and bright yellow in color. Coronas are long and open lemon, fading to near pure white. Usually, only one drooping bloom on a stem. Another first, a reverse bicolor triandrus hybrid outside the miniature class. LEMON CREMES (Mitsch) 1990 2YW-W. LM. 20" (Top Notch x Chiloquin) NN23/2. The name is descriptive of this lovely succulent smooth textured flower. LEMON SILK (Mitsch) 1987 6YW-W. E. (Nazareth x cyclamineus) G78/2. Another exquisite reverse bicolor Division 6, this one is a sibling to Swallow. Beautifully smooth nicely reflexed perianth, narrow enough to have the classical cyclamineus grace, maintains its color and develops a white halo. LEMON SPARKS (Mitsch) 1990 4Y-Y. L. 16" (Gay Time x Chiloquin) LL61/1. It is rather similar to Moonflight except that the flower even though very large is more formal. Very symmetrical, the broad rounded segments of clear lemon yellow, reminiscent of Chiloquin, are centered with tufts of slightly deeper shade. LEMON TARTS (Mitsch) 1985 7YW-W. L. 48 cm. (Quick Step x Daydream) D80/11. The deep lemon coloring of the perianth contrasted to the white halo and cup at maturity, make this a very striking flower. 

In making this cross, our goal was to produce a jonquil hybrid with the color of Lime Chiffon and this one definitely deserves the name Limequilla. LYREBIRD (Mitsch) 1977 3Y-GWW. LM. 19" (Irish Coffee x Rich. 3Y-W) H123/3. The pale lemon, broad and nearly flat but somewhat reflexed perianth is about the same shade as seen in Binkie. The rather flat, funnel-shaped, fluted crown opens pale lemon but fades to nearly pure white, with a grey-toned eye. 03-236 \$8.00 each.

MAGICIAN (Mitsch) 1982 2W-R. M. 18" (W17/1 (Accent x Rose Caprice) x Cool Flame) JJ16/1. While a magician may deceive the eye with his slight-of-hand, the eye could scarcely be believed when it first focused on this flower. It is certainly not all that the exhibitor could desire in smoothness and balance, but is so striking that some flaws can be overlooked. When Rubythroat first flowered, the color could hardly be accepted as real, but it now looks pale by comparison with this flower. The perianth is large with lots of substance. MARQUE (Throckmorton) 1974 3Y-ORR. LM. 40 cm. (Old Satin x Russet) T66/17/1. Upon opening, the perianth is nearly white with the yellow color deepening with maturity. The strongly frilled cup has a greenish-yellow eye leading into a sharp orange band with a broad reddish rim. An extremely good grower. 03-238 \$5.00 each.

MEDITATION withdrawn.

MELODIOUS (Mitsch) 1983 2Y-Y. EM. 14" (Jetfire open pollinated) KKO2/9. A small to medium sized flower with satin smooth finish. The perianth is broad but pointed and is very flat even though it shows quite definite cyclamineous characteristics. The rather long crown is nearly straight. A beautiful smooth flower of soft bright yellow throughout. 02-241 \$5.00 each.

MEMENTO (Mitsch) 1981 1YW-P. M. 18" (Gloriola x Rima) KK4/2. Another addition to the yellow-pinks, this has a pale lemon, shading to ivory, perianth of very nice form, being flat and overlapping. The long, rather straight trumpet is light apricot pink. Tall stems which could be a bit stronger. Good show form; gives good increase. 01-242 \$9.00 each.

MILESTONE (Mitsch) 1971 2Y-P. LM. 15" (Leonaine, open pollinated) AS11/3. There may be a plethora of pinks but distinctiveness is certainly not lacking here. MISSION BELLS (Mitsch) 1984 5W-W. LM. 15" (Silver Bells, open pollinated) GO27/1. An open pollinated seedling from Silver Bells, this is very similar in appearance, but much superior in health and propagation ability. The slightly reflexing ivory white perianth is relatively broad for a triandrus and the long bowl shaped crown of the same color with a yellow green eye lends grace and charm. MISTIQUE (Mitsch) 1982 2W-W. L. 18" (Pigeon x Wings of Song) HH80/3. The graceful, well reflexed perianth and fluted funnel-shaped crown make this a very attractive decorative flower. Good stems and a good grower but sometimes produces a rough appearing bulb. 02-246 \$4.00 each.

MISTY MEADOW (Mitsch/Havens) 1981 7YW-W. L. 16" (Quick Step open pollinated) HO8/. Misty Meadow resembles High Note, but blooms have more contrast and many are borne one per stem. MONITOR (Mitsch) 2W-WWP. M. 48 cm. (Precedent x Audubon) G10/1. Immediate attention is drawn to this flower by the brilliant red thread-like rim on the cup, accentuated by a perianth of glistening white. The cup opens pale yellow with the red frilled margin, the yellow soon fading to white, making the flower even more spectacular as it matures. 02-250 \$12.00 each.

MOONFLIGHT (Mitsch) 1979 4Y-Y. L. 20" (Gay Time x Daydream) G69/6. A large bloom with pale soft lemon outer segments, with the center of similar shade, interspersed with lemon gold petaloids. A very lovely flower for the garden and great for arrangements. Fewer petals than many of the doubles, but because of their width and form, they make an appealing bloom. 04-252 \$4.00 each.

MOTMOT (Mitsch) 1979 8Y-R. LM. 18" (Matador x N. jonquilla) G82/1. Like its sibling, Hoopoe, this is a distinctive addition to the Daffodil family. Smaller flowered than Hoopoe, this has more flowers to a stem. The rich yellow flat and rounded perianths provide a foil for the ruffled bright orange red crowns. Those who prefer fragrant flowers will find something to their liking in these tazetta-jonquil hybrids. 08-253 \$5.00 each net.

MOUNTAIN POET (Mitsch/Havens) 1988 9W-GYR. L. 20" (Quetzal x Smyrna) D94/3A. Another from the Quetzal x Smyrna series that has given many well formed poets, ranging from green eyes (i.e. Angel Eyes) to all red cups (i.e. Tart). This one resembles Angel Eyes with its crisp clean color and sparkling white broad perianth. The cup of yellow band and bright red rim is a bit flatter with the net result of being a very striking flower. 09-423 \$12.00 each net.

MUSIC (Mitsch) 1988 2W-PPY. LM. 18" (Romance x Cool Flame) LL14/5. By far the most refined flower raised here, with a perianth displaying a definite pink cast. It has been relatively easy to obtain pink coloration in perianths of very informal flowers, but much more challenging to produce show flowers with this characteristic. Music has been consistent for several years in producing the distinctive pink cast in the perianth along with impeccable show form and heavy substance reminiscent of Refrain. The flat broad perianth resists nicks and tears; the salmon rose corona is rather straight, somewhat flared and fluted near the narrow amber margin. A very prolific breeder, both seed and pollen parent, passing its form as well as perianth color to its progeny. 02-424 \$27.00 each.

MYSTERIOUS (Mitsch) 1983 2W-W. LM. 22" (Silken Sails x Wings of Song) HH100/1. A large flower with very rounded white perianth. The large white crown is quite flat, tending to reflex as it ages after the manner of Artist's Model. 02-255 \$3.00 each.

NEW SNOW (Mitsch) 1984 2W-W. L. 18" (Silken Sails x Wings of Song) H100/4. Particularly noticeable is the purity of white of this flower. It is interestingly formed with a nearly flat scalloped corona and very broad slightly reflexed perianth, beautiful even from the back. Faces slightly down. 02-258 \$3.00 each.

NIGHT MUSIC withdrawn.

NILE (Mitsch/Havens) 1W-W. M. 46 cm. ((Vigil x Empress of Ireland) x Panache) JJ57/10. Very large white flower with a greenish cast at the throat, the trumpet is of classical style with narrow base and a slightly rolled flange. The broad spade shaped perianth segments of equal length to the trumpet make a nicely balanced flower. The perianth may tend to slightly campanulate, but can easily be groomed. Hardy, prolific and floriferous, it makes a welcome addition to the white trumpets. 01-259 \$7.00 each.

OCCASIONALLY (Mitsch) 1986 1W-Y. M. 18" (Wahkeena x (Silver Dale x Kancenjunga) x Preamble) H122/4. The beautiful clean color of the broad pointed white perianth and lemon yellow trumpet combines with a silken texture and classical trumpet form to bring notice from Phil Phillips when he was visiting, with the comment this would be a good addition to the bicolor trumpets currently being shown. OCEAN BREEZE (Mitsch) 1981 6W-W. E. 12" (Titania x cyclamineus) G91/2. This might be described as a smaller whiter version of Ibis. A very precisely formed little flower with a nearly flat perianth but yet exemplifying characteristics of the species. The long crown opens pale yellow but soon goes to near white. Limited stock. 06-407 \$25.00 each net.

ONCE-IN-A-WHILE (Throckmorton) 1977 2W-GPP. M. 17" (Carita x Salome) T65/1/2. A very nice flower with quite smooth white perianth that seems to be improving with the years. The green throated pink corona is rather long but usually misses trumpet dimensions. 02-262 \$4.00 each.

ON EDGE (Throckmorton) 3Y-GYR. 59 cm. L. (Old Satin x Altruist) T67/24/4. Pale-toned perianth and corona with deep green eye, edged with a very narrow rim of vermilion orange. Strong contrast. 03-263 \$4.00 each.

ORCHARD PLACE (Throckmorton) 3Y-YYO. L. 15" (Aircastle x Irish Coffee) T66/12/5. Later in the season, many of the division 3 flowers show prominence and this one in particular. OREGON GOLD (Morrill) 1974 7Y-Y. LM. 22" (red cup x jonquilla) 55-2-1. A tall golden yellow flower with somewhat deeper colored crowns, rather like Trevithian but with a larger cup, and usually more flowers to a stem. It is floriferous and prolific, and is imbued with fragrance. 07-264 \$2.00 each net.

OREGON MUSIC (Mitsch) 1984 2W-W. LM. 21" (Easter Moon x (Broughshane x seedling)) W65/2/4. A lovely smooth flower with slightly pointed broad perianth segments. The straight cup is three fourths length and has a slight frill at the margin. In common with most whites, it opens yellowish and changes to a clean white. A sister seedling to Gull, this one is similar, but has a flatter perianth and slightly more flared cup. 02-265 \$7.00 each.

OREGON SNOW (Mitsch) 2W-W. M. 18" (Z40/5 x Queenscourt) JJ56/2. Well formed long cup white with strong growth habit and good increase. As is typical with whites, the entire flower opens cream colored becoming white at maturity. Long tailored cup with spade shaped slightly campanulate perianth segments which are easily flattened. An exceptional garden flower which is well formed. 02-523 \$3.00 each net.

OUZEL (Mitsch) 1987 6W-W. EM. 15" (Dipper open pollinated) 2NO1/1. A welcome addition to its class and color, as most whites it opens with a white perianth and pale lemon crown which becomes very white at maturity. Uniform flowers are especially beautiful in spite of being a little large for cyclamineus. Perianth segments are broad and well reflexed and in proportion to the long slightly flared crown. PAINTED DESERT (Throckmorton) 1974 3Y-GYO. LM. 16" (Old Satin x Altruist) T76/24/7. Luminous glowing yellow-gold perianth. The outer petals overlap behind, and the inner ones are nearly as large. Very rounded. The cup is deep gold with frilled vermilion edge and green center. 03-269 \$4.00 each.

PANACHE (G.L. Wilson) 1962 1W-W. EM. 16". A large flower, with broad, flat, overlapping perianth, and well balanced trumpet, clean, white throughout. 01-271 \$6.00 each net.

PARODY (Mitsch) 1983 2Y-W. M. (Daydream x Binkie). Pale lemon perianth and a crown of similar coloring fading to white as it develops. When compared to standards, this is a relatively small flower, whose perianth tends to reflex after the style of cyclamineus. It's form and size would possibly suggest hybridizing with cyclamineus. 02-273 \$2.00 each.

PASTELINE (Mitsch) 1979 2W-P. EM. 18" (A5/8 (Caro Nome x Accent) x A34/10 (Precedent x Carita)) G36/2. Most of the better formed pinks tend to be rather late in flowering. This is quite a large flower with smooth flat white perianth of good substance. The somewhat flared large crown is of rich deep pink. A bit later to bloom than Dawncrest and of better form. 02-275 \$4.00 each.

PATRICIAN (Mitsch) 1974 2Y-Y. M. 20" (Galway x St. Keverne) A17/8. With its smooth, flat, rather pointed golden perianth, and the beautifully balanced trumpet-like crown of slightly deeper gold, this is one of the most beautiful yellows that we grow and gives a high percentage of real show blooms. Fine stems and good poise. A good all-purpose flower. 02-276 \$4.00 each.

PAY DAY (Havens) 1977 1YW-W. L. 17" (Royal Oak x Daydream) GEJ9/1. Some years this might more appropriately be classed as a yellow trumpet, but either as a yellow or reverse bicolor it has been quite the best late trumpet in its class here. Broad, flat, golden lemon perianth and well-formed trumpet, flared and frilled near the margin. White halo on the perianth. 01-277 \$7.00 each.

PERFECT SPRING (Mitsch) 1990 6Y-Y. EE. 12" (N. obval-laris x N. cyclamineus) KK100/1. Each year our season is greeted with this very lovely clean yellow flower, among the first to bloom in our field—about the same time as Dik Dik. The entire flower is impeccably smooth with a long trumpet and relatively short reflexing perianth segments. The trumpet base is a bit larger than we would like for perfect balance, but does reflect the seed parent in that respect. The cyclamineus charm and grace and smoothness are its most noticeable characteristics. 06-536 \$10.00 each net.

PERIPHERAL PINK (Mitsch/Havens) 1986 2W-GWP. LM. 17" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/18. Another exquisite flower from this cross and one of the best, Peripheral Pink meets the primary goal, namely intense coloration of Eclat with impeccable show form of Precedent. It combines the attributes of an intense red pink rim, white mid section and green eye in the flared crown with clean white neatly formed round perianth segments. We think those who enjoy rimmed show flowers will find one to their liking here. 02-278 \$9.00 each.

PHALAROPE (Mitsch) 1985 6W-Y. E. 33 cm. (Titania x N. cyclamineus) JJ81/5. A beautiful cyclamineus of classical form somewhat similar to Perky, but this one has a long narrow crown accentuated by a more flared and ruffled rim, the entire corona of clear lemon yellow. The reflexed perianth has relatively broad segments. One of the very early flowers, it is floriferous, characterized with cyclamineus grace. 06-279 \$12.00 each.

PHANTOM (Mitsch) 1975 11W-P. 16" (Accent x Q97/2 (Wild Rose x Hillbilly)) D7/2. White perianth of rather mediocre quality, with a soft, light, clear pink corona which splits and lays back tight against the perianth segments. The corona opens yellow and pink coloration develops with maturity. Quite unlike anything else we have seen, being attractive in arrangements. 11-280 \$4.00 each net.

PHILOMATH (Fowlds) 1970 7Y-Y. M. 12" (small cyclamineus hybrid x N. jonquilla) F332/1. Another interesting hybrid that has evidence of both species plainly visible in its form, but being closer to its jonquil parent, it is classified in the "7" division. A suitable cultivar for the rockery, this is a bright yellow little flower with long crowns and quite flat, rather narrow perianths. One or two blooms on a stem. PINK BOMB (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 2W-PPR. LM. 17" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/25. Perhaps the most deeply colored of the (Precedent x Eclat) series, the large flared scalloped cup develops deep pink color after opening, the rim remaining rose red. The broad white perianth seems to intensify the brightness of the cup making a most startling color in the garden. 02-283 \$7.00 each net.

PINK DECLARATION (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 2W-P. LM. 18" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/16. A large flower whose trademark is heavy substance, combines with bright color. The flared ruffled apricot pink cup is more deeply colored at the scalloped rim. Broad rounded thick perianth segments and tall stems provide an excellent flower for garden and cutting. 02-284 \$4.00 each.

PINK FROST (Mitsch/Havens) 1985 2W-P. M. 44 cm. (Lough Mauree x Radiation) Q52/1. The long narrow crown of nearly trumpet proportions is a pleasing color of pastel pink with a suggestion of lavender. The lovely color makes a bouquet of this one very attractive and has brought many favorable comments locally. A good grower and excellent increaser. PINK ICE (Havens) 1980 2W-P. LM. 19" (Precedent x A5/12 (Caro Nome x Accent)) GEJ5/17. A lovely smooth flower of much substance resembling Coral Light in form, except it is smaller. The well rounded overlapping perianth segments accompany a deep pink slightly ruffled crown. The flower's refinement, smoothness and well balanced appearance make it a worthy contestant for the show bench. Limited supply. 02-286 \$10.00 each net.

PINK MIGRATION (Mitsch/Havens) 1988 4W-P. M. 17" (Precedent x Pink Cloud) G70/6. Some years ago Lawali, a slightly pink semi-double was used quite extensively to breed pink doubles. Pink Migration is a much more refined flower with broader petaloids and much deeper pink coloration. It is a semi-double with a broad perianth, backing broad petaloids with less in the corona, nearly every flower containing a stigma and most containing pollen. For this reason it has been most useful in hybridizing for us, setting copious quantities of seed. Many of the progeny are full doubles with deep color. Late in the season, it possesses a strong stem and short neck, thus creating a fine decorative flower as well. 04-426 \$7.00 each.

PINK PARADE (Mitsch) 2W-P. M. 17" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/42. Another of the brightly colored flowers from this cross, the deep pink cup is quite flat with a ruffled margin. Broad well formed perianth segments and tall stem, make it suitable for exhibiting or cutting. 02-287 \$6.00 each net.

PINK PERFUME withdrawn.

PINK PLANTATION (Mitsch) 1986 2W-P. M. 20" ((Precedent x Carita) x (Radiation x (Mabel Taylor x Interim))) F67/3. A gigantic pink flat cup with heavy substance is the hallmark of this daffodil. The cup is a deep pink fading to pastel at maturity with a frilled and lacinated rim a shade darker. The very broad rounded perianth with the petals nearly touching in back is excellent foil for the huge cup. PINK SATIN (Mitsch) 2W-P. EM. 18" ((Radiation x Rima) x C.E. Radcliff) JJ22/4A. From the appearance of this daffodil one would immediately think, "What a lovely pink trumpet!"; however upon measurement, the corona is two millimeters short. Entire flower is silken smooth and well formed. The flat white perianth is foil to the long straight crown of clear mid pink. A lovely flower showing strong potential on the show bench. 02-477 \$15.00 each net.

PINK SILK (Havens) 1983 1W-P. M. 15" (At Dawning x Graduation) NEJ11/1. Show quality pink trumpets are a rarity. A smooth silken texture, good substance, clean pink and white coloration characterize this well formed flower. The tailored, clear pink trumpet with its slightly flared margin is enhanced by the broad, flat overlapping perianth segments. Compared to At Dawning, this flower is much larger and more intensely colored. A worthy contender for the show bench as well as possessing potential for hybridizing for pink trumpets. PINK SPARKLER (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 2W-P. LM. 18" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/15. A unique flower with bright apricot pink flat cup, interspersed with a few white flecks, suggested by its name. Broad rounded perianth heavy with substance completes a delightful tall flower for the garden. 02-291 \$5.00 each.

PINK VALENTINE (Mitsch/Havens) 1986 2W-WPP. LM. 18" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/23. One of the best of the many selections from this cross, Pink Valentine combines the special beauty of deep pink coloration and a smooth white perianth with a very appealing style all its own. The somewhat flat cup is white with a wide ruffled border of bright pink. Tall strong stems combine the grace and elegance of the flower with ability in the garden and for arrangements. 02-293 \$6.00 each.

PINK VALLEY (Mitsch/Havens) 1985 2W-P. M. 46 cm. (Precedent x Carita) A34/22. A well formed flower endowed with heavy substance, this is a fine long lasting pink. The broad white perianth segments are spade shaped with a bowl shaped crown of lavender rose, becoming buff near the margin. A fine show flower and good increaser (Pictured on page 28.) 02-294 \$4.00 each.

PITTA (Mitsch) 1979 2W-P. LM. 20" (Precedent x Debutante) F34/2. Carrying many of the good points of both parents, this has produced consistently high quality show flowers. The ivory white perianth is very rounded, much overlapping, and flat. The saucer shaped corona is apricot pink to the base. Good balance and great substance. 02-295 \$4.00 each.

PIXIE'S SISTER (Mitsch) 1966 7Y-Y. L. A small flower with two or three blooms on a stem. Intermediate between *N. juncifolius* and *N. jonquilla* in size. Quite prolific bloomer. Very similar to Chit Chat. 07-445 \$2.10 each net.

PLANET (Mitsch) 3Y-YYO. LM. 23" (Kingbird x Moonfire) LL53/3. A very large flower with tall stems, the perianth is a soft smooth yellow, the short cup being deeper yellow with a narrow orange band. Very nicely formed with broad overlapping perianth of smooth texture. The neck is a bit long; its smoothness and unique form compensate. Good supply allows moderate price. 03-436 \$5.00 each.

PLOVER (Mitsch) 1976 2W-P. M. 19" (Precedent x Carita) F33/20. At the 1975 American Daffodil Society show in Portland, we set up perhaps the finest lot of pinks that we had ever assembled, and of this lot, this was esteemed to be one of the best. Very broad, rounded, flat, but somewhat reflexed perianth, with slightly frilled and fluted saucer-shaped crown of apricot pink. Good stems and poise. 02-296 \$4.00 each.

PRESIDENTIAL PINK (Mitsch) 1986 2W-P. LM. 21" ((Mabel Taylor x Green Island) x Caro Nome) x Spaceship) LL20/3. All the bright color and regal poise commanding attention befitting its name. Intense reddish orange pink cup brings notice across large seedling plots while smooth broad rounded perianth of white accentuates the cup color. The crown is very interesting to study with its color innuendoes from rosey pink to orange, deeper near the margin. Heavy substance throughout the flower gives long life to the bloom, and its color intensity has merit for its name. 02-299 \$20.00 each.

PROSPERITY (Havens) 1979 1Y-Y. EM. 20" (Nazareth x Butterscotch) FEJ6/4. A clear bright yellow smooth flat overlapping perianth, and a nicely flanged trumpet of similar shade. The trumpet is quite narrow giving it a classical show form. This appears to be one of the finest yellow trumpets raised here and should prove a good show flower. 01-303 \$12.00 each net.

PUNCHLINE (Mitsch) 1982 7Y-YYP. LM. 19" (Quick Step x Silken Sails) HH109/1. Quite an unusual flower with good sized rounded perianths of ivory buff, and nearly flat crowns of buff yellow with pinkish rims. Two or three good sized flowers on each stem. Very prolific bloomer. 07-304 \$7.00 each.

PURE JOY (Mitsch) 1976 2W-Y. LM. 22" (Easter Moon x Aircastle) D34/1. The svelte poise and classic charm, along with the smooth silken texture of this flower has captivated many visitors. The tall, strong stems hold the graceful blooms well aloft. Very rounded clean white perianths and bowl-shaped lemon crowns with a deeper frill characterize this show flower. 02-305 \$3.00 each.

QUAIL (Mitsch) 1974 7Y-Y. M. 20" (Daydream x jonquilla) F72/1. Rich golden yellow, quite flat, overlapping perianths. The crown is of very nearly the same shade and is long and relatively narrow, slightly flared at the mouth. Two or three blooms to a stem and very floriferous. A distinctive and long lasting flower. Produces some odd shaped bulbs. 07-306 \$1.50 each net.

QUEEN SIZE (Mitsch) 1978 3W-Y. LM. 22" (Pretender x Aircastle) D47/2. A very large, well-rounded overlapping flat, white perianth. Saucer-shaped, ruffled and frilled, small lemon crown. This should be a beautiful show flower. The strong tall stems hold the big blooms well aloft in the field. 03-308 \$6.00 each net.

RADIANT GEM (Mitsch/Havens) 1985 8Y-R. LM. 51 cm. (Matador x *N. jonquilla*) JJ77/5. One of the best of this series, Radiant Gem is most similar to Hoopoe, but has a broad rounded perianth of deeper golden color. Contrasted with the bright orange red cup the flower stands out among others in the garden. Generally 3-6 florets per stem. 08-309 \$12.00 each.

RAPTURE (Mitsch) 1977 6Y-Y. E. 13" (Nazareth x cyclamineus) G68/1. Though not possessed with a broad perianth nor with formal build, this has been one of our favorite cyclamineus hybrids due to its very smooth texture, the cool clear lemon yellow coloring, and its keeping qualities, both in the field and when picked. Quite long, narrow trumpet, and strongly reflexed perianth. Produces a very rough appearing bulb for us. 06-310 \$6.00 each net.

RECITAL (Mitsch) 2W-P. M. 20" (Carita x Tangent) D29/2. This has been one of our best pinks during the last two or three years. A large flower borne on tall strong stems. Perianth is broad and overlapping and whiter than most. The large crown is rich deep salmon pink. 02-311 \$5.00 each net.

RED ARIA (Mitsch) 1989 20-R. LM. 24" (Kindled x Feeling Lucky) MM16/1. A lovely flower bred for later season red cups, but with the additional attribute of having a well formed very coppery orange perianth. The fiery orange red cup is flared and nearly flat with a ruffled border. Blooming a little later than mid season, it is relatively late for red cups. A most interesting addition to the growing group of 20-R's. 02-450 \$10.00 each net.

RED HAWK (Mitsch) 2Y-R. E. 18" ((Campfire x Fortune's Blaze) x Armada) R98/1. An early flower possessing a rounded bright golden perianth with a slightly flared radiant orange-red corona. The color combination of the perianth and corona gives the entire flower a glowing appearance. A fine flower with good substance, strong stems and good health. 02-313 \$2.00 each net.

REFRAIN (Mitsch) 1983 2W-P. M. 21" (Romance x Cool Flame) LL14/4. Much like Culmination, this is usually a little taller and a few days earlier to bloom. It is a good show flower. Good form, fine substance, strong stems, and attractive color make this one of our best pinks. Produces rough bulbs some years. 02-314 \$30.00 each.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SCENT

In recent years more attention has been given to fragrance in daffodils, regarding the new as well as the older cultivars. It is realized that the fragrance will vary as to local climatic growing conditions.

REPLETE (Evans) 4W-P. EM. (Pink Chiffon x Accent) A fine pink double, having a white perianth with white and pink center petals. 04-411 \$10.00 each net.

REPOSE (Mitsch) 1984 2YW-YYW. L. 18" (Quick Step x Daydream) 2H107/5. A very flat lemon perianth with a white halo complements the well balanced unique crown of apricot buff, shading to cream white at the margin. A beautiful flower at the end of the season. 02-315 \$4.00 each net.

RINGING BELLS (Mitsch/Havens) 1984 5W-W. L. 16" (Quick Step x triandrus albus) C52/3. A sister to Petrel this is very similar, being a little less formal and slightly larger with a light pleasant fragrance. There are up to 8 flowers per stem, generally 3-7; extremely floriferous, in a row which had been left down for 3 years here, the blooms nearly hid the foliage. We think this one will make an ideal rockery plant having many secondary stems of varying heights. 05-412 \$15.00 each net.

RINGO 2W-WWP. M. 13" (Deodora x Caro Nome) W7/4. Far from being a show flower this one has commanded so much attention to its intense wide red rim in our fields that we decided to offer it. In hot weather it fades quickly, but makes a very nice showing when picked in loose bud. Particularly attractive to those who enjoy a bright flower when first opening. Has proven to be a good flower for garden and cutting. 02-318 \$2.00 each net.

RUBYTHROAT (Mitsch) 1973 2W-P. M. 14" (Precedent x Accent) C35/5. This is a larger, more rounded flower than Cool Flame, and it has much more color on first opening. The stems are shorter and do not have as good pose as that of Cool Flame, but otherwise we think it a better flower. Good flat overlapping white perianth, and a bowl-shaped crown of quite brilliant rosy red. One of our favorites. 02-319 \$17.00 each.

SCHOLAR (Havens) 1977 2Y-W. LM. 18" (Bethany x Butter-scotch) FEJ4/3. This definitely appears to be a trumpet and pressing the perianth forward against the corona would confirm this, but measurement with a rule contradicts the other evidence. Perhaps grown in other gardens will indicate a new classification. A very large flower with broad, flat overlapping perianth and corona with nicely rolled flange. 02-321 \$6.00 each.

SEAFOAM (Mitsch) 1978 2W-W. LM. 21" (Easter Moon x Carnmoon) F139/2. Rather like its seed parent but with shorter, more fluted crown, and a whiter perianth. Fine stems, uniform growth, and quite consistent performance. Should be a show flower and be of value to hybridizers. 02-322 \$4.00 each.

SENTINEL (Mitsch) 1974 2W-P. M. 18" (Precedent x Carita) A34/3. Among the larger pinks we have introduced. Certainly not for the show bench but for those wanting something splashy and spectacular one need look no further. Has been dubbed the "pink Pinwheel". Tall stems with large rounded flat perianths, and a huge, nearly flat crown of apricot salmon to pink. 02-323 \$4.00 each.

SHEARWATER (Mitsch) 1981 2Y-WWY. LM. 21" (Aircastle x Homage) D21/4. Large, very rounded flower with broad, overlapping flat perianth which opens white but turns to beige lemon. The crown is rather small and nearly flat, opening pale lemon and turning nearly white except for the rim. Of good show form. 02-325 \$3.00 each net.

SHIPSHAPE (Mitsch) 1976 4W-Y. EM. 18" (Pink Chiffon x Carita) E22/4. Quite a large flower with tall stems. Very fully double, having a white perianth with a center of cream and buff. 04-414 \$4.00 each net.

SHOWBIZ (Throckmorton) 1988 3W-OW. LM. 35 cm. (Green Island x Russet) T66/18/7. Unlike any flower we grow, Show Biz's unique flaring ruffled corona of deep yellow orange, with a white picotee border, make it a delightful flower with carrying power in the garden. It's rounded broad well formed white perianth makes it suitable for the show bench, a welcome addition to division 3. 03-427 \$8.00 each.

SHRIKE (Mitsch) 1990 11W-P. M. 14" (D7/12 x Cuckoo) LL34/3. Breaking with tradition another split corona is being offered. The symmetrical white perianth complements a brilliant orange pink frilled corona splitting evenly between the perianth segments. One of the strongest attention callers in our plantings. It definitely has carrying power in the garden, for it is easy to spot this one from the other end of the field. Definitely not for the purist! However, one of the most popular with visitors wherever this flower is shown. Pictured on page 5. 11-537 \$30.00 each net.

SILVERTON (Mitsch) 1982 5W-W. L. 11". (Quick Step x T. albus) C52/17. A very floriferous cultivar, Silverton bears three to seven ivory white flowers per stem. Although a sister to Ivory Gull, it is unique in that it is smaller and better formed. The cup is very similar to Petrel's cup and its reflexing perianths are broad and symmetrical, making this a lovely little flower suitable for showing. Some of the selected clones from this cross, among which is Silverton, have a yellow ovary, which gives it a very unusual but appealing appearance. 05-503 \$15.00 each net.

SKATER'S WALTZ (Mitsch) 6Y-Y. 12" (Vulcan x cyclamineus) G59/5. A well formed cyclamineus hybrid, the clean yellow perianth is slightly reflexed with a beautiful long crown of yellow with a hint of orange. A lovely floriferous show flower. 06-524 \$6.00 each net.

SNOW FRILLS (Mitsch) 1978 2YW-W. M. 20" (Rushlight x Daydream) F84/1. While we have raised many seedlings from Daydream, it is difficult to get one that is either better or distinctive from it. Combining some of the good qualities of both parents, this is a flower of excellent form, being a soft light lemon yellow throughout, the long, heavily frilled crown fading out to almost pure white, without the slight lemon or gold rim usually found in most other reverse bicolors. It also develops a nice white halo on the very flat smooth perianth. Flowers stand at about a 90° angle from the strong upright stems. A beautiful garden flower that should prove a winner on the show bench. 02-329 \$9.00 each net.

SPACE SHIP (Mitsch) 1978 2W-P. LM. 19" (((Precedent x Carita) x (Radiation x Mabel Taylor)) x Interim) F67/2. A very large flower with round, much overlapping, milk white perianth; the huge saucer shaped crown is of deep salmon rose, sometimes "watermelon red". Bears a little resemblance in form to Sentinel, but is much deeper colored. Anything but a show flower. It does give great intensity of color to a large proportion of its progeny, and we suspect it might be good for breeding pink split coronas. Very limited supply. 02-332 \$18.00 each net.

SPARROW (Mitsch) 1987 6W-Y. E. 14" (Trousseau x cyclamineus) JJ83/2. Another classically formed cyclamineus with strongly reflexed well formed perianth, a bit narrow perhaps, but conveying the characteristic grace of its class. The long lemon crown is slightly flared and fluted, considerably lighter in color than Phalarope. A delightful addition to its class. 06-333 \$12.00 each.



The huge very rounded broad perianth segments are perfectly formed with heavy substance and pure clean white. It is one of a number selected which retains its strong double form consistently for us over several years of observation. The cup is of an unusual color of lemon cream with pink undertones. - WALDEN POND** (Throckmorton) 3Y-Y. 17" ((Oasis x Green Island) x (Aircastle x Irish Coffee)). T70/2/7. A most beautifully formed rounded yellow division 3 flower. Resembling its sibling Golden Pond, but somewhat lighter in the perianth. Another beautiful addition to its class. A melting color combination, the clean light yellow spade shaped yet relatively rounded perianth elegantly sets off the deeper colored slightly expanded and frilled cup gradually darkening at the frill. 03-482 \$30.00 each net.
- WARBLER** (Mitsch) 1987 6Y-Y. EM. 17" (B45/12 x cyclamineus) NN41/2. The culmination of a great many crosses toward the "perfect" cyclamineus form with deep yellow color. 

WHOA (Throckmorton) 1980 2W-GYO. LM. (Kilworth x Russet) T66/24/3. A very large flower with an enormously broad crystalline white perianth. 


