

In closing, we trust that everyone will experience an outstanding growing and showing year with much success.



Business will be done from P.O. Box 218, Hubbard, Oregon 97032. The 1993 prepared display at 6247 S. Sconce Rd., Hubbard, Oregon, will be **open to visitors between noon and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday** during the flowering season. On Sunday the display will be **open from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. for viewing**. We respect and appreciate your observation of designated viewing areas and open hours.

Cut flowers are available at the display. If quantities are desired, please do not hesitate to call us in advance, so that they will be ready for pick-up. At different times of the season, a few selected miniatures are available in pots at the display. Thank you very much.



COMMON QUESTIONS

Frequently, we are asked what is the difference between narcissus, jonquils and daffodils.

1. The daffodil as we know it belongs to the genus narcissus. The word daffodil is the English term to refer to the preceding.
2. Daffodils which belong to Division 7 (see page 27) are correctly called jonquils.
3. Generally, jonquils (Division 7) and tazettas (Division 8) do particularly well in warmer climates.
4. Seedling—a seedling is a blooming size flower which has been selected, but not named.
5. The word NET after price means that bulb is NOT subject to early discount which is offered on orders arriving before May 1 from customers in the United States. Discount does not apply to cards.
6. A culture sheet will be sent with bulb order for advisement.

GENERALIZATION OF DAFFODIL CLASSIFICATION

(as defined by the Royal Horticulture Society)

Color codes are as follows: white or whitish W, green G, yellow Y, pink P, orange O, red R.

Division 1 — TRUMPET — one flower to a stem; trumpet at least as long as perianth segments. Division 2 — LARGE—CUPPED — one flower to a stem; corona more than $\frac{1}{3}$, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments. Division 3 — SMALL—CUPPED — one flower to a stem; corona not more than $\frac{1}{3}$ the length of the perianth segments. Division 4 — DOUBLES — doubling of the perianth segments or the corona or both. Division 5 — TRIANDRUS — usually two or more pendent flowers to a stem; perianth segments reflexed. Division 6 — CYCLAMINEUS — usually one flower to a stem; perianth segments reflexed, flower at an acute angle to the stem with a very short neck. Division 7 — JONQUILLA — usually one to three flowers to a rounded stem; leaves narrow, dark green; perianth segments spreading not reflexed; flowers fragrant. Division 8 — TAZETTA — usually 3-20 flowers to a stout stem; leaves broad; perianth segments spreading not reflexed; flowers fragrant. Division 9 — POETICUS — usually one flower to a stem; perianth segments pure white; corona usually disc-shaped, with a green or yellow center and red rim. Division 10 — SPECIES. Division 11 — SPLIT-CORONAS — corona split rather than lobed and usually for more than half its length. Division 12 — MISCELLANEOUS — all daffodils not falling into any one of the previous.

Classification for daffodils is composed of division number, color of perianth — color of corona.

Order Information

1. Please include **Item Number** on order blank. (Number preceding Price. . . i.e. Accent — **02-100** \$1.00 each net.) Each of the collections will have an individual **Item Number** just preceding price as well.
2. **Payment:** Please send payment with order and make check or money order payable to Richard Havens.
3. **Postage and Handling:** Prices quoted include prepaid postage on orders \$20.00 and over. Orders less than \$20.00 to one address, please add \$3.00 for postage. If total Gift Collection is less than \$20.00, per location, please include \$3.00 postage.
4. **Acknowledgement:** Orders \$20.00 and over and received before August 1 will be automatically acknowledged — Orders under \$20.00 will be acknowledged by request.
5. **Extra Copies of 1993 Order:** We encourage the writing of an extra copy of your 1993 order to be retained for personal reference upon receipt of bulb shipment. If there should be a question concerning your order, please do not hesitate to contact us immediately.
6. **Substitution:** It is not our policy to freely substitute; however, on occasion, a variety is sold out. In this case, a similar substitute of equal or greater value may be made. Please advise on order blank if we may substitute. If you should have any special instructions, please place on order blank as well. It is most important to us that we respect your wishes. All of our bulb offerings are **subject to crop. On orders sent after August 1**, alternate choices should be listed.
7. **Order Date:** The bulk of the orders are arriving during the spring and early summer, so we encourage early orders to avoid disappointment.
8. **Shipping Rotation:** Bulbs are shipped by Parcel Post and United Parcel Service. We endeavor to send orders in rotation as received with the complete shipping process starting the first week of September. **Orders arriving during July through September will have a good chance of being shipped during the month of October**, for spring and early summer orders deserve our first attention.
9. **Retail Bulbs:** Nearly all bulbs sent out are double nose except in the case of miniatures, most of which are rounds. Some tazettas and species hybrids produce primarily rounds as well. If ordering for the first time, please note that bulbs will vary in size as to their variety and genetic makeup. All bulbs are hand cleaned, graded and selected. We personally grow and care for all of our retail bulbs from planting and harvest to order filling and shipping on our Oregon farm. The smallness of our business permits the preceding.
10. **Bulb Care:** It is our goal to send out good quality bulbs and if upon receipt, they prove otherwise, please notify us immediately. If ordering for the first time or if one is a beginner, please read complete culture sheet when order first arrives for general advisement. Due to the value of the bulbs, every effort to avert disappointment is important.
11. **Extra Bulbs:** Orders over \$10.00 received by August 1, will include extra bulbs worth at least 10% of the order value.
12. **Gift orders, gift certificates:** In recent years, an increasing number of requests to send bulbs as gifts has been received. We are very pleased to do this and will enclose a card with bulbs if desired, indicating they are a gift from you. Also, gift certificates are available—if recipient has not recently ordered from us, please advise, so that we can send a 1993 catalog with the gift certificate. Thank you so very much.

1993 Daffodil Introductions

AMERICAN HERITAGE (Havens) 1993 1YYW-P. M. 18" (Memento x Lorikeet) SEH21/2. One of the best of this series, refinement is the keyword for this flower. Perfectly flat and smooth, spade shaped perianth of deep lemon gold, with each segment broad and symmetrical. The tailored trumpet is straight, about 2 mm longer than the perianth, with a very slight frill at the margin. In our opinion, it is in a class with its siblings, American Shores and American Dream, pictured on the cover of the June, 1987 *American Daffodil Journal*. Pictured on the cover. 01-684 \$90.00 each net.

AMERICAN SONGBIRD (Frey) 1993 7Y-GOO. L. 8¼" (Bantam x juncifolius) LEE1/5. Beautifully formed small flower with soft orange corona deepening in color edging the green eye. Some have more than one flower per stem. 07-696 \$25.00 each net.

ASTROPINK (Mitsch) 1993 11W-P. M. (C53/11 (Pink Frost x Accent) x D7/ (Accent x Q97/2)) 2Q8/2. Show quality split corona of mid pink deepening in color to dark apricot pink near the margin. The corona, fluted and frilled, fits neatly back against the spade shaped white perianth segments. A striking flower, more formal than most. 11-685 \$20.00 each net.

COOL PINK (Mitsch) 1993 7W-P. L. 14" (Quick Step x Cool Flame) 2J79/1. A most unusual and beautiful little flower of jonquil heritage. A symmetrical, flat perianth, white with a definite pinkish undertone, enhances the rounded cup-shaped corona of mid pink. Generally one flower per stem. Pictured on page 21. 07-686 \$20.00 each net.

HEARTLAND (Havens) 1993 3W-Y. L. 16" (Merlin x Gold Frills) TEH107/1. A strikingly rounded flower, the inner perianth segments sometimes touching and very flat. The broad perianth of white, sets off a short, deep yellow straight frilled cup. We think this is a very lovely flower useful at the later shows. 03-687 \$25.00 each net.

HOMECOMING (Frey) 1993 2W-GWP. L. 13" (Coral Ribbon x FEE5/2) PEF1/4. A rich watermelon colored rim edging a white cup with green eye, enhanced by pure white perianth segments beautifully shaped. One of the best seedlings of this cross. 02-697 \$30.00 each net.

MAYA DYNASTY (Mitsch) 1993 2Y-Y. L. 20" (Camelot x Chiloquin) 2O16/9. There may be a plethora of long cupped yellows, but we feel this one is worthy of introduction on basis of sheer beauty. The fact that it blooms after most other yellows are gone, adds to its desirability. Heavy substance, waxy smoothness, flat, broad perianth and pleasing proportions add up to make this a favorite. The long deep golden yellow corona is funnel shaped flared slightly, complemented by a beautifully formed perianth of the same color. A plentiful stock allows a low introductory price. 02-688 \$12.00 each.

NORDIC RIM (Mitsch) 1993 3W-WWY. L. 20" (Silken Sails x Merlin) 2R32/10. As would be assumed by the parentage, this cross produced a number of noteworthy seedlings, most with rims of gold. Superlatives can be overused in descriptions, but it is difficult not use words such as "very" in reference to the whiteness and broadness of the perianth. Again, the inner segments nearly touch at times. A scalloped rim of golden yellow, heavily ruffled, on a relatively flat corona completes the effect. Pictured on page 5. 03-689 \$25.00 each net.

OXFORD (Mitsch) 1993 3W-Y. L. 21" (Impala x Green Hills) 2P59/1. This cross has been made a number of times over the years, producing beauties such as Cedar Hills, and again, the cross did not disappoint in quality and distinctiveness. A stately flower with very tall stems, and healthy growth habit, Oxford has the refinement for showing and the contrast to call attention in a group planting. Very broad clean white perianth segments reflex slightly with pleasing grace, making a background for a flat frilled crown of clean intense deep yellow. As a number of Green Hills progeny, it possesses a pleasing fragrance. 03-690 \$25.00 each net.

PEND OREILLE (pronounced pond o ray) (Havens) 1993 3W-Y. LM. 19" (Silken Sails x Verona) REH45/1. Named for a beautiful sparkling clear lake in Northern Idaho. Perfectly rounded, flat perianth composed of broadly ovate white segments with a refined round, cup-shaped corona of most unexpected color, perhaps best described as butterscotch yellow, then becoming nearly white at maturity. An elegant large flower with appealing proportions, balance and pose. 03-691 \$30.00 each net.

POTENTIAL (Havens) 1993 1W-P. M. (LEJ21/ (Rima x Graduation) x Pink Silk) REH52/1. Befitting its name, we feel this one may have *potential* to the hybridizer of trumpet pinks; for us the trumpet measures 6 mm longer than the perfectly flat broad white perianth, which is large enough to appear nicely proportioned. The trumpet is straighter than that of Pink Silk and about its color, but the intensity of pink goes all the way to the base. A refined smooth flower even with its imposing size and proportions. 01-692 \$35.00 each net.

PRINCETON (Mitsch) 1993 3W-WWY. L. 17" (Limpkin x Wedding Band) TT47/24. One of the most elegant flowers on our place, we consider this a true landmark of Grant Mitsch breeding work with daffodils. Perfectly rounded very broad, flat perianth 47 mm. in length, the inner segments, nearly touching at times, accentuates a most refined, rounded white cup 14 mm. long, with a neat distinct band of gold. The diameter of the flower is 110 mm., very massive for such refined qualities. Limited stock. Pictured on front cover. 03-693 \$70.00 each net.

RED SHEEN (Havens) 1993 30-R. L. 13" (Bantam x Kindled) REH7/1. A rather intermediate sized flower near the size of its sibling Scarlet Tanager and its parent Bantam. Its refinement, size and cup color are reminiscent of Scarlet Tanager, but that is where the similarity ends. Red Sheen has a distinct orange underlay in the perianth, which is much less rounded than that of its sister. The perianth consisting of spade shaped segments, is very smooth and is evenly reflexed. 03-694 \$35.00 each net.

STRAIGHT ARROW (Mitsch) 1993 6Y-R. E. 11" (Jetfire open pollinated) M010/2. More intensely colored than Jetfire, this is a spritely opening to the season with its classical cyclamineus form, a tubular orange red corona and well reflexing bright yellow perianth. Growth habit somewhat more prostrate than that of Jetfire. Pictured on page 24. 06-695 \$35.00 each net.

PINK SPLIT CORONAS (previously offered under seedling numbers)

DECEMBER BRIDE (Havens) 1993 11W-P. M. 16" ((Precedent x A6/5) x (Accent x Q97/2)) PEH28/1. Corona of bright pink with a hint of lavender, fits flat against white corona. 11-634 \$12.00 each net.

PINK FORMAL (Mitsch) 1993 11W-P. M. 16" (Recital x Phantom) 2O5/3. Delicately ruffled corona of apricot pink, splits into the ovate perianth segments. 11-632 \$10.00 each net.

PINK GLACIER (Mitsch) 1993 11W-P. M. 16" (Recital x Phantom) 2O5/1. The light pink corona shading to deep pink at the ruffled rim lies flat back against the broadly ovate perianth segments. 11-675 \$12.00 each net.





We wish to acknowledge the tremendous contribution Roberta Watrous has made to development of new miniatures. She was given the prestigious Gold Medal for hybridizing from the American Daffodil Society in 1987, a highly deserved honor. This year two of her originations are being offered. In the near future, additional cultivars are planned for introduction.

LITTLE RUSKY (Roberta Watrous) 7Y-GYO (Ruby x N. scaberulous) 691-1. Smaller and better formed than Bobby Soxer, this beautiful new jonquil hybrid usually comes with one, occasionally 2 to a stem; it has a soft yellow perianth with a slightly deeper yellow shallow bowl shaped crown, edged with orange and possessing a lovely green eye. Strong grower and good increaser. Received the Larus award in 1988 and the Rose Ribbon on several occasions. On the approved list of miniatures; very limited supply. 07-607 \$40.00 each net.

SEWANEE (Roberta Watrous) 1991 2W-Y (Seville x N. watieri) SW5. Glistening smooth white perianth with clear lemon yellow neat bowl shaped cup. Consistency and beautiful clean form make this clear division 2 miniature very desirable for showing. In addition it is very good in the garden. Has won the Rose Ribbon several times. Limited supply. 02-608 \$35.00 each net.

Additional New Listings

LEMON LYRIC (Mitsch) 1993 2YW-Y. L. 21" (Top Notch x Camelot) 2O27/10. Elegant improvement on its seed parent, blooms late in the season with silken smooth textured broad, flat perianth segments, the entire flower of luminous lemon, except for its white halo. Due to having been down longer than usual, bulbs may be rather rough appearing. 02-682 \$10.00 each.

OWYHEE (Mitsch) 1993 2Y-P. LM. 15" (Milestone x Sugar-maple) LL8/3. Offered under seedling number, this one has evoked a number of favorable comments. Quite similar to its sibling Irresistible except that it is a bit smaller, less formal and has a slightly reflexing perianth. 02-579 \$4.00 each.

QUEEN CITY (Mitsch) 1993 2W-P. M. 18" (Romance x Cool Flame) LL14/3. Named for the city of Cincinnati, this has been a wonderfully consistent flower. Very nice tailored, mid-length, slightly ruffled cup with a well formed spade shaped perianth of pure white. 02-566 \$7.00 each net.

TREASURE VALLEY (Havens) 1993 2Y-YYP. L. 14" (Spun Honey x LL20/2). TEH80/2. Unique color combination here-to-fore not seen in our seedling plots. Smooth flat perianth segments of lemon (apparently inherited from its seed parent); funnel shaped long corona of similar lemon, bordered with a defined red pink rim, probably from its pollen parent, which is a sibling to Presidential Pink. 02-699 \$12.00 each net.

VICKSBURG (Mitsch) 1993 6Y-O. E. 15" (Ardour x N. cyclamineus) II122/2. Unique in its class, broad, pointed, reflexed perianth segments of bright yellow. Funnel shaped, half length corona of red orange becomes mid orange at maturity. A real eye catcher. 06-563 \$6.00 each net.

YELLOW SHOW FLOWERS

Have been previously offered under seedling number.

GOLD BEACH (Mitsch) 1993 2Y-Y. LM. 17" (Camelot x Aurum) 2O15/2. A very large flower combining heavy substance with refinement. Deep spun gold throughout with a large corona, flared at the mouth. An excellent all around flower with great keeping ability. 02-618 \$10.00 each.

GOLD SAILS (Mitsch) 1993 2Y-Y. M. 19" (Camelot x Rich Reward) 2O17/1. Perhaps the smoothest of this group, the perianth is of soft clear yellow and the corona a deeper color. A relatively flat perianth with a bit of waviness. 02-616 \$10.00 each.

OAKLAND (Mitsch) 1993 2Y-Y. LM. 18" (Camelot x Aurum) 2O15/1. As is suggested by the parentage, robustness and refinement have been combined here. Beautiful clear deep yellow throughout, flat spade shaped perianth with trumpet like corona which is slightly rolled at the border. 02-617 \$10.00 each.

PIZARRO (Mitsch) 1993 2Y-Y. M. 15" (Executive x Golden Aura) 2O23/2. This one has fine form and intensity of color. Capable of a number of uses, as well as being a show flower, the heavy substance, clean color and health make it ideal for the garden as well. Flat spade shaped perianth segments of deep yellow, are in proportion to the mid length golden corona, slightly flared at the margin. 02-615 \$10.00 each.

Novelty Daffodils for 1993

EXPLANATION OF DESCRIPTIONS

In the descriptions of the varieties as listed below, the name of the variety is given first in capital letters, followed by the name of the originator in parentheses. Then there is the date of registration or introduction. Next there is the classification symbol, composed of a division number and color code, (see page 2); flowering season, E. for early, M. for mid-season, L. for late. etc. Approximate height in inches or centimeters follows. Just preceding the price is an item number to be used on the order form. Following are two definitions of terms:

Corona: The cup, or trumpet-shaped or disc-like outgrowth, arising from the inner surface of the perianth at the base of the segments. **Perianth:** The six floral leaves, comprised of three sepals and three petals.

ACCENT (Mitsch) 1961 2W-P. M. 18" (Interim x Interlude) Q40/1. The deep salmon rose color has enough concentration of pigment to give this more garden value than most of the pinks, and added to this are good poise, nice form, and much substance. Quite flat, clean white perianth that sometimes reflexes slightly. A vigorous grower. 02-100 \$1.00 each net.

ACE (Mitsch) 1980 2W-PPW. M. 15" (Accent x Luscious) F5/1. Quite similar in size and form to Credo, but with a light pink crown, bordered white. A lovely color, with vigorous plant, good poise and substance. Attractive and different. 02-101 \$3.00 each.

ADORABLE LASS withdrawn for increase.

AFFABLE (Mitsch) 1978 4Y-O. L. 20" (Gay Time x Daydream) H102/1. Like Elixir, this has fewer perianth segments than most doubles, and like them, the width and form of the petaloids makes for a good full flower. A distinctive color in this class, being of pale buff apricot, with the shorter ruffled petaloids of pale orange. Very rounded flowers of good size, with nice stem and neck. Very attractive. 04-103 \$3.00 each.

AKEPA (Mitsch) 1980 5W-P. L. 14" (Accent x N. triandrus albus) HH4/2. The first outstanding pink triandrus hybrid we have seen. Usually two blooms of small to medium size, with well formed milk white perianths, and goblet shaped soft pink coronas are borne on a good, medium small stem. Pictured on page 15. 05-105 \$40.00 each net.

ALAMO (Mitsch) 1974 2Y-R. EM. 20" (P50/1 (Narvik x California Gold) x Flaming Meteor) B45/5. Having a rich gold yellow, flat, very smooth perianth of good substance, and a somewhat frilled, well-balanced crown of rich orange red, this is a good show flower and is striking in the garden. Good stems. 02-106 \$4.00 each.

ALLAFRILL 2W-P. M. 18". Offered exclusively as an unusual decorative flower. Possessing an intense bright pink crown of heavy substance with well-defined ruffles extending from the margin, deep into the crown, with a milk white perianth. A very fine garden flower with strong stems. 02-107 \$3.00 each.

AMERICAN SHORES (Havens) 1992 1Y-P. LM. 14" (Memento x Lorikeet) SEH21/20. One of the best of its class we have introduced thus far. Perfectly flat broad light ivory lemon perianth complements a mid pink classically formed trumpet, which expands slightly with a beautifully ruffled margin. Very nicely balanced with excellent pose and silken smooth texture. It is very difficult to capture the uniform lemon coloration of the perianth, but the photograph demonstrates its consistent perfection. Pictured on page 14. 01-660 \$50.00 each net.

ANGEL (Wilson) 1960 3W-GWW. L. Very beautiful small cup white with a green eye. 03-109 \$4.00 each net.

ANGEL SILK (Eve Robertson) 1987 2W-W. LM. 24" (Easter Moon x Glenmanus) #262. A most beautiful silken smooth flower befitting its name. The broad white perianth is flat with heavy substance and the straight white crown lends the perfect form necessary for the show table. Very limited stock. Pictured on page 24. 02-110 \$30.00 each net.

The small cream cup (fading to white at maturity) is ruffled and much flatter than that of Sacramento, but not flat to the perianth. Possessing robust foliage and excellent plant vigor as well as tall height, this one is a worthy contender for showing and may have potential for breeding small cup pinks. 03-124 \$5.00 each.

BEAUTY TIP (Mitsch) 1980 2W-W. LM. 20" (Easter Moon x 2/417) W65/2/3. A rather pointed but well overlapping, very smooth white perianth. A sister to Music, this one also contains evidence of pink coloration in the perianth in our climate most seasons and may be valuable for breeding all pinks. - DAWNCREST** (Mitsch) 1978 2W-PPW. E. 16" (Carita x Accent) C7/22. One of the very first pinks to open. - FAIRY CHIMES** (Mitsch) 1977 LM. 5Y-Y. 14" (N. jonquilla x N. triandrus) C76/1. This flowers earlier in the season than April Tears which it resembles somewhat. It is taller and larger, and a bit paler in general appearance. Very floriferous, giving three to five or six blooms on most stems, with several stems from established bulbs. 05-516 \$8.50 each net.

- FALCONET** (Mitsch) 1979 8Y-R. M. 18" (Matador x jonquilla) G82/5. A delightful rather small flower with three to five or more florets on a stem. - GAZELLE** (Mitsch) 1972 7Y-Y. LM. 23" (Aircastle x N. jonquilla) Z2/40. Somewhat like Oryx, this is a reverse colored jonquil hybrid. Pale lemon, rounded, quite flat perianths, and lemon crowns, fading to white with an amber throat. 07-191 \$2.00 each net.
- GHOST DANCER** (Throckmorton) 1975 3W-YOY. L. (Old Satin x Green Howard) T68/19/2. - GREEK KEY** (Mitsch/Havens) 1W-Y. LM. 45 cm. (Spitzbergen x Prologue) JJ42/1. In common with many bicolors, the perianth opens light lemon yellow becoming very white at maturity. The long narrow deep lemon trumpet is bordered with a definite roll on the flange making a very distinctive flower. ICE DIAMOND (Mitsch) 1991 4W-W. LM. (Gay Time x Stainless). A truly beautifully formed clean white smooth double. For us, the inner petaloids open creamy yellow and soon fade to white. Broad symmetrical petals, heavy substance and consistency are indispensable traits in a show double. All are evident in this flower along with smooth texture. The best white double we have grown. ICE RIM (Mitsch) 1986 7W-YW. L. 20" ((Green Island x Chinese White) x N. jonquilla) KK201/1. A most unusual and pleasing flower with good substance, the butterscotch yellow bowl shaped cup on this jonquil is enhanced by a narrow distinct white rim and a white round "Aircastle-shaped" perianth, the blooms about the size of Oryx. INDEPENDENCE DAY (Mitsch) 1990 4W-R. L. 17" (Gay Time x Bantam) LL60/1. A well formed double with symmetry and clean, bright color. IRRESISTIBLE (Mitsch) 1982 2Y-P. EM. 13" (Milestone x Sugar Maple) LL8/2. We believe that some who do not ordinarily care for pink and yellow may like this flower. The quite flared and frilled crown is of a creamy buff on the outside with much more pink inside, and with an apricot pink frill. 02-216 \$8.00 each net.

JETFIRE (Mitsch) 1969 6Y-R. E. 10" ((Market Merry x Carbineer) Armada) x cyclamineus) A52/1. The broad, silken smooth, reflexed perianth is of rich lemon gold with a hint of green where it joins the trumpet, which opens pale golden orange but gradually develops to intense vivid orange red. LEMON CREMES (Mitsch) 1990 2YW-W. LM. 20" (Top Notch x Chiloquin) NN23/2. The name is descriptive of this lovely succulent smooth textured flower. Flat spade shaped perianth segments of deep lemon complement the creamy buff cup which becomes pure white at maturity. A well balanced flower, the mid length tailored corona is bordered with a ruffle giving a special character of beauty. 02-533 \$8.00 each net.

LEMON SAILS (Mitsch) 1991 2Y-Y. LM. 16" ((Playboy x Daydream) open pollinated) MO25/20. Heavy substance and broad very flat smooth perianth segments, augment the beautiful subtle coloration of this exceptional flower. A lemon yellow perfectly flat perianth with buff yellow cup, somewhat reminiscent of the color of Top Notch, but with considerably distinct form and character. In summary, the first impression of this flower is its perfection of form in the broad waxen perianth. 02-599 \$16.00 each.

LEMON SILK (Mitsch) 1987 6YW-W. E. (Nazareth x cyclamineus) G78/2. Another exquisite reverse bicolor Division 6, this one is a sibling to Swallow. Beautifully smooth nicely reflexed perianth, narrow enough to have the classical cyclamineus grace, maintains its color and develops a white halo. LEMON TARTS (Mitsch) 1985 7YW-W. L. 48 cm. (Quick Step x Daydream) D80/11. The deep lemon coloring of the perianth contrasted to the white halo and cup at maturity, make this a very striking flower. The somewhat flared bowl shaped crown is slightly ruffled. Many flowers are borne doubly and some triply, a very profuse bloomer. One of the most contrasted of all reverse bicolors raised here. 07-231 \$4.00 each.

LEMON TREE (Mitsch) 1980 3W-YYO. L. 14". (Cushendall, open pollinated) V03/3. An exquisitely formed flower blooming with the poets, this sister to Delightful is a lovely addition to the late season cultivars. The glistening white perianth is foil to a very small bright yellow cup. However, in wet seasons, the cup is enhanced with a narrow rim of orange. It is a strong increaser with good health but supply is very limited. Produces a small bulb for us. A good show flower. 03-458 \$8.00 net.

LIME CHIFFON (Havens) 1Y-GWW. 1975 LM. 20" (Daydream x Emp. of Ireland) E64-6/1. Ivory with a greenish lemon cast in the perianth, and the trumpet is slightly paler. A nicely formed flower with much flanged, ruffled, and frilled crown. In our field it has been referred to as "the green Daffodil." 01-404 \$4.00 each.

LIMEQUILLA (Havens) 1990 7W-W. L. 18" (Lime Chiffon x N. jonquilla) QEJ55/1. A most unique jonquil with a limey ivory color, reminiscent of its seed parent Lime Chiffon. The cup is considerably longer than is found in most jonquils and is in pleasing balance with the well formed flat perianth. Generally two to three florets per stem. In making this cross, our goal was to produce a jonquil hybrid with the color of Lime Chiffon and this one definitely deserves the name Limequilla. LIMEY CIRCLE (Robertson) 1980 3W-WWY. (Carnmoon x Green Island) 192A. Much admired for its beautiful form, similar to its seed parent, the perianth is very rounded and broadly overlapping, with segments sometimes slightly incurved. It is certainly not all that the exhibitor could desire in smoothness and balance, but is so striking that some flaws can be overlooked. When Rubythroat first flowered, the color could hardly be accepted as real, but it now looks pale by comparison with this flower. The perianth is large with lots of substance. MARQUE (Throckmorton) 1974 3Y-ORR. LM. 40 cm. (Old Satin x Russet) T66/17/1. Upon opening, the perianth is nearly white with the yellow color deepening with maturity. MEDITATION (Mitsch) 1979 2W-YWP. LM. 19" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/2. A perfect bright clean intensive white perianth with intensely frilled ruffled crown with a broad margin of bright pink. The heavy substance and very flat perianth with broad segments augment the value for show and hybridizing very white perianths. Pictured page 15. 02-240 \$5.00 each.

MEMENTO withdrawn for increase.

MINNOW (Alec Gray) 8W-Y. M. 6" A small tazetta hybrid with several creamy flowers on each stem with contrasting yellow cups. Does well and increases rapidly. A good garden plant. 08-698 \$1.50 each net.

MINUET WALTZ (Mitsch) 1992 6YW-Y. M. 13" (Killdeer open pollinated) MO11/2. An unusual addition to its class, this could probably equally well have been classed as a reverse bicolor, depending upon climatic conditions. Either way, it is a beautiful classically formed division six with long tubular corona and reflexing perianth of luminous lemon with a white halo, the corona, maturing to nearly white, except for a lemon rim, in sunny conditions. MISSION BELLS (Mitsch) 1984 5W-W. LM. 15" (Silver Bells, open pollinated) GO27/1. An open pollinated seedling from Silver Bells, this is very similar in appearance, but much superior in health and propagation ability. MISTIQUE (Mitsch) 1982 2W-W. L. 18" (Pigeon x Wings of Song) HH80/3. The graceful, well reflexed perianth and fluted funnel-shaped crown make this a very attractive decorative flower. Good stems and a good grower but sometimes produces a rough appearing bulb. Pictured page 8. 02-246 \$4.00 each.

MODULATION (Mitsch) 2Y-P. LM. 17" (Accent x Daydream) A smooth, well balanced flower of clean color. Spade shaped perianth segments are broad and lemon colored, with a soft pink mid length corona. Good keeping ability and strong stems. 02-641 \$4.00 each.

MOLTEN LAVA (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 3Y-YYR. L. 20" (Merlin open pollinated) MO13/1. Fiery red cup rim of such intensity suggesting its name, combines with the perianth preciseness derived from Merlin. A yellow scalloped cup with deep red rim and a rounded very smooth clear yellow perianth make a welcome entrance at the end of the season. 03-248 \$7.00 each. Picture on page 8.

MONAL (Mitsch) 1977 2Y-R. E. 16" (A4/1 (Armada x Paricutin) x Falstaff) G65/3. Rich golden yellow, broadly overlapping, flat perianth, with a solid deep orange red bowl-shaped crown. Rather like Falstaff but much larger. An excellent early Red-cup for cutting. 02-249 \$3.00 each net.

MONITOR (Mitsch) 2W-WWP. M. 48 cm. (Precedent x Audubon) G10/1. Immediate attention is drawn to this flower by the brilliant red thread-like rim on the cup, accentuated by a perianth of glistening white. The cup opens pale yellow with the red frilled margin, the yellow soon fading to white, making the flower even more spectacular as it matures. 02-250 \$7.00 each.

MOONFLIGHT (Mitsch) 1979 4Y-Y. L. 20" (Gay Time x Daydream) G69/6. A large bloom with pale soft lemon outer segments, with the center of similar shade, interspersed with lemon gold petaloids. A very lovely flower for the garden and great for arrangements. Fewer petals than many of the doubles, but because of their width and form, they make an appealing bloom. MOTMOT (Mitsch) 1979 8Y-R. LM. 18" (Matador x N. jonquilla) G82/1. Like its sibling, Hoopoe, this is a distinctive addition to the Daffodil family. Smaller flowered than Hoopoe, this has more flowers to a stem. The rich yellow flat and rounded perianths provide a foil for the ruffled bright orange red crowns. Those who prefer fragrant flowers will find something to their liking in these tazetta-jonquil hybrids. 08-253 \$4.00 each.

MUSIC (Mitsch) 1988 2W-PPY. LM. 18" (Romance x Cool Flame) LL14/5. By far the most refined flower raised here, with a perianth displaying a definite pink cast. It has been relatively easy to obtain pink coloration in perianths of very informal flowers, but much more challenging to produce show flowers with this characteristic. Music has been consistent for several years in producing the distinctive pink cast in the perianth along with impeccable show form and heavy substance reminiscent of Refrain. The flat broad perianth resists nicks and tears; the salmon rose corona is rather straight, somewhat flared and fluted near the narrow amber margin. A very prolific breeder, both seed and pollen parent, passing its form as well as perianth color to its progeny. 02-424 \$17.00 each.

NILE (Mitsch/Havens) 1W-W. M. 46 cm. ((Vigil x Empress of Ireland) x Panache) JJ57/10. Very large white flower with a greenish cast at the throat, the trumpet is of classical style with narrow base and a slightly rolled flange. The broad spade shaped perianth segments of equal length to the trumpet make a nicely balanced flower. The perianth may tend to slightly campanulate, but can easily be groomed. ORCHARD PLACE (Throckmorton) 3Y-YYO. L. 15" (Air-castle x Irish Coffee) T66/12/5. Later in the season, many of the division 3 flowers show prominence and this one in particular. The beautifully rounded perianth of light yellow is complemented by a deeper yellow cup with a cinnamon edge. A well rounded flower suited for showing with the added advantage of vigorous healthy plants. 03-455 \$5.00 each.

OREGON BEAUTY (Mitsch/Havens) 4Y-R. EM. 21" ((Playboy x Paricutin) x Enterprise) F133/6. Yellow and red double resembling Grebe, but a bit smaller and slightly earlier. 04-464 \$4.00 each.

OREGON BELLS (Mitsch) 7W-W. LL. 12" (Quick Step x N. juncifolius) II134/4. Lovely little flower about the size of Sun Dial, opening all yellow and quickly fading to white. OREGON GOLD (Morrill) 1974 7Y-Y. LM. 22" (red cup x jonquilla) 55-2-1. A tall golden yellow flower with somewhat deeper colored crowns, rather like Trevithian but with a larger cup, and usually more flowers to a stem. It is floriferous and prolific, and is imbued with fragrance. 07-264 \$3.00 each net.

OREGON SNOW (Mitsch) 2W-W. M. 18" (Z40/5 x Queenscourt) JJ56/2. Well formed long cup white with strong growth habit and good increase. As is typical with whites, the entire flower opens cream colored becoming white at maturity. Long tailored cup with spade shaped slightly campanulate perianth segments which are easily flattened. ORYX (Mitsch) 1969 7Y-W. LM. 19" (Aircastle x jonquilla) Z2/15. A host of interesting flowers came from this combination, including several unexpected reverse bicolors. OUTER SPACE (Mitsch) 4W-O. LM. 22". (Falaise x Roimond) A13/2. Resembles Centerpiece but has larger bloom and taller stem. The trumpet base is a bit larger than we would like for perfect balance, but does reflect the seed parent in that respect. PERIPHERAL PINK (Mitsch/Havens) 1986 2W-GWP. LM. 17" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/18. Another exquisite flower from this cross and one of the best, Peripheral Pink meets the primary goal, namely intense coloration of Eclat with impeccable show form of Precedent. It combines the attributes of an intense red pink rim, white mid section and green eye in the flared crown with clean white neatly formed round perianth segments. 02-278 \$6.00 each.

PHALAROPE (Mitsch) 1985 6W-Y. E. 33 cm. (Titania x N. cyclamineus) JJ81/5. PHANTOM (Mitsch) 1975 11W-P. 16" (Accent x Q97/2 (Wild Rose x Hillbilly)) D7/2. White perianth with a soft, light, clear pink corona which splits and lays back tight against the perianth segments. PHILOMATH (Fowlds) 1970 7Y-Y. M. 12" (small cyclamineus hybrid x N. jonquilla) F332/1. Another interesting hybrid that has evidence of both species plainly visible in its form, but being closer to its jonquil parent, it is classified in the "7" division. A suitable cultivar for the rockery, this is a bright yellow little flower with long crowns and quite flat, rather narrow perianths. One or two blooms on a stem. PINK FROST (Mitsch/Havens) 1985 2W-P. M. 44 cm. (Lough Maree x Radiation) Q52/1. The long narrow crown of nearly trumpet proportions is a pleasing color of pastel pink with a suggestion of lavender. The lovely color makes a bouquet of this one very attractive and has brought many favorable comments locally. A good grower and excellent increaser. PINK ICE (Havens) 1980 2W-P. LM. 19" (Precedent x A5/12 (Caro Nome x Accent)) GEJ5/17. A lovely smooth flower of much substance resembling Coral Light in form, except it is smaller. The well rounded overlapping perianth segments accompany a deep pink slightly ruffled crown. PINK MIGRATION (Mitsch/Havens) 1988 4W-P. L. 17" (Precedent x Pink Cloud) G70/6. Some years ago Lawali, a slightly pink semi-double was used quite extensively to breed pink doubles. Pink Migration is a much more refined flower with broader petaloids and much deeper pink coloration. It is a semi-double with a broad perianth, backing broad petaloids with less in the corona, nearly every flower containing a stigma and most containing pollen. For this reason it has been most useful in hybridizing for us, setting copious quantities of seed. Many of the progeny are full doubles with deep color. The very broad rounded perianth with the petals nearly touching in back is excellent foil for the huge cup. PINK SWAN (Mitsch/Havens) 1985 2W-P. M. 45 cm. (Mrs. O'Ronalds x Debutante) F27/1. The stately bearing, heavy substance and lovely soft pink of this immense flower, make it very desirable for arranging. Large smooth broad perianth segments with a large bowl shaped crown constitutes a well balanced flower worthy for showing. PINK VALENTINE (Mitsch/Havens) 1986 2W-WPP. LM. 18" (Precedent x Eclat) G13/23. Pink Valentine combines the special beauty of deep pink coloration and a smooth white perianth with a very appealing style all its own. The somewhat flat cup is white with a wide ruffled border of bright pink. Tall strong stems combine the grace and elegance of the flower with ability in the garden and for arrangements. PINK VALLEY (Mitsch/Havens) 1985 2W-P. M. 46 cm. (Precedent x Carita) A34/22. A well formed flower endowed with heavy substance, this is a fine long lasting pink. RHEA (Mitsch) 1976 2W-P. M. 15" (Accent x Flamingo) X45/4. Many seedlings have been raised from these parents, and numbers of them have been good, but most not really distinct. This has just about the same shade of melting pink as its pollen parent, with a better-formed perianth, and seems to have inherited the vigorous growing habits of Accent. 02-317 \$2.00 net.

RINGING BELLS (Mitsch/Havens) 1984 5W-W. L. 16" (Quick Step x triandrus albus) C52/3. A sister to Petrel this is very similar, being a little less formal and slightly larger with a light pleasant fragrance.
