Dear Friends,

1986 was a hallmark year at Oakwood. Many bulbs were planted at the new farm and will soon be blooming. A new trencher is making bulb planting easier and many new bulbs have been planted. A record 26 days of rainfall delayed replanting until the beginning of October. More bulbs are being offered this year including many never available in the U.S.A. before. As stocks increase more will be offered in the future. Minatures are again listed, but not as many as planned. The possible shutdown of bulbs coming from Broadleigh Gardens made me feel that minature stocks should be built up to help prevent depletion and lower prices.

To improve your order this year the following will be done:


1. A postcard will be sent to confirm an order. If you do not receive one within two weeks, please let me know.
2. A postcard will be sent out when each order is dispatched. If you receive a card and no bulbs please write or call at once.
3. All bulbs were dispatched in September last year. I plan to have them all out by September 15 or earlier this year.

Sometimes people may question the cost of a particular bulb. Scarcity is the primary reason for a higher price. This is particularly true of downunder varieties where only a few bulbs of the many ordered appear virus free, thus allowing the sale of them. Rogueing is done ruthlessly for the bulbs to be sold. Hence, there are many varieties that will NEVER be offered for sale.

Where possible bonus bulbs will be given this year. Please list bulbs of interest to you to aid in our selection. For new customers not familiar with the R.H.S. system of daffodil classification, a description of this is presented.

Have a nice season. See you at Columbus for the National Show.

1. All orders must be received by September 1st. Those listed with an asterisk must be ordered by June 20th as the entire stock will NOT be dug this year. Orders are filled in sequence as received.
2. MINIMUM CHECK ORDER: \$10.00 Please make checks payable to:

3. MINIMUM MASTER CHARGE/VISA ORDER: \$25.00
4. Bulbs will be shipped via UPS, so please include your COMPLETE shipping address. Minimum shipping and handling charge: \$2.50, for up to 15 bulbs. For EACH BULB in excess of 15, please add 10 cents.
5. Bulb shipments will begin by the first week of September, at the latest, and will continue in rotation, unless you specify a certain shipping date.
6. Visitors are welcome, but please make arrangements ahead of time to avoid disappointment due to variation in bloom time or unfavorable weather.

- ABBEY GOLD (J. O'More) 1Y-Y A true trumpet daffodil with broad overlapping petals. The long trumpet has a lovely roll. Golden yellow in color. Limited stock. From Reg Cull. (New Zealand)
Cromarty x Billal Midseason \$15.00
- DREWRY'S (J. Lea) 1Y-O Named for a local brewery in the tradition of Glenfarclas. Was Lea 1-4-73. A vast improvement over Glenfarclas except in color. The broad yellow petals display the pale golden orange trumpet nicely. Excellent poise, neck and a strong stem.

- *HICOL (D. Bell) 2Y-P Never offered in the Northern Hemisphere, this flower is primarily for breeding and the garden. It has the most intense yellow-pink color of any daffodil grown here. This is the parent of David Bell's best yellow pink daffodils. Medium strong stems. Limited stock.

- HONEY GEM (D. Bell) 1Y-GYP This massive, yet lovely trumpet has pink diffusing from the rim downward. Tall, strong stems and good poise make for a good garden flower too. Limited stock.
Barbara Allen (Selfed) Midseason \$15.00
- OBSESSION (Jackson) 2W-P The most recently released pink from the Cathlin x Verran crosses. Considered by David Jackson to be more consistent than Vahu in producing show blooms. A lovely smooth flower with wide overlapping petals. The cup is smaller and lighter pink than Vahu's. Stem is medium tall. Viable both ways. Very limited stock.

- ORANGE WAY (J. Lea) 1Y-Y With this deep golden almost orange daffodil John Lea found his way to an orange trumpet. Crossed with Vulcan, less than 20 seeds were set and one found the way. It is now called GLENFARCLAS. TALL stems, very deep colors and extreme earliness make this a welcomed daffodil. While not of the highest show standard, it is capable of being shown. Its breeding potential is obvious. Seed set is fair and the pollen quite fertile.

- *PRIMEUR (P. deJager) 1Y-Y From Holland comes this spectacular looking yellow trumpet. Good size, strong stems and deep golden color verging on orange made it stand out the first time I saw it. The Award of Merit of the R.H.S. for garden is understandable.

- *RED CONQUEST (D. Bell) 1Y-P David Bell's first yellow pink trumpet. Very similar to Lorikeet but not as smooth. A lovely flower with excellent color and very vigorous here.

- *RED HAZE (J. O'More) 2Y-R Considered an all red daffodil by Peter Ramsay because the petals show a bronzy red haze as the flower ages. The color has been rather weak here but a good smooth flower for show and breeding. Very limited stock.

- RHEINGOLD (Bell) 4Y-Y This scarce lovely double from New Zealand is one of the deepest colored all yellow doubles available for exhibition. Stock is very limited. One or two to go this year.
Paupa x Hicol Midseason \$60.00
- RICOM (D. Jackson) 1Y-Y In my opinion the best all around flower I have grown here from the Jacksons. It has the best qualities of both parents; tall stems, good poise, smooth golden yellow petals and vigorous growth. A great daffodil in the garden and on the show bench. Limited stock.
Comal x Risten Early Midseason \$25.00
- VIRLIE (W. Jackson) 2W-YPP One of the famous Jackson "V" series. A nice flower but has short stems here. Limited stock.
Remis x C.E. Radcliff Midseason \$ 5.00

WILD FIRE (L. Dettman) 2Y-R While introduced by Lindsay Dettman as a division six, this daffodil bears no cyclamineous look or heritage. When I first read Lindsay's description, I suggested the name Wild Fire and it was so named. This tall stemmed beauty has silken smooth petals of deep color with an intense red cup. While the petals are not massively circular they are of ample size and the flower is spectacular when seen for the first time. The cup needs protection from intense sun to be shown. A great favorite of Dan Bellanger. Raised from seed sent by Reg Wooton. I will petition to have the class changed from division 6 to division 2. Very limited stock.

ACCENT (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-P An excellent daffodil. The large cup opens yellow and quickly turns a strong salmony pink. The stems are very strong and of medium height. A good increaser and laster.
 Interim x Interlude Midseason \$ 1.00

AIRCATTLE (G.E. Mitsch) 3W-Y One of the best daffodils ever raised. Outstanding in the garden or on the showbench. Award of Merit and many best-in-shows. Petals turn pale yellow with age and the cup reverses slightly here.

*AIR MARSHALL (J.L. Richardson) 2Y-R) A tall large vigorous distinctive yellow-red. Wonderful for show and marvelous in the garden, this older daffodil is a great parent.

*ALTRUIST (F.E. Board) 3O-R A very beautiful show flower that has a good record in its division. The petals open waxen smooth with an attractive coppery-orange that fades to buff. Colors are not so intense in very hot weather and it should be cut early for show. Stems are medium tall with excellent poise. Good increaser.

APRIL LOVE (B. Abel Smith) 1W-W A tall imposing elegant looking white trumpet daffodil. Many show awards including Best-in-Show, London. Petals need some grooming for show.

APRIL TEARS (A. Gray) 5Y-Y A.D.S. miniature. A lovely little triandrus hybrid with multiple florets. Very smooth. Ideal for show.

ARCTIC CHAR (M. Evans) 2W-P A most exciting daffodil to me. Strong tall stems, with good poise and great color. The cup verges on trumpet shape and size. I have bred with it each year I have had it. Super in the garden and a passable exhibition flower. Limited Stock.

BINKIE (Wolfhagen) 2Y-W The first reversed bicolor. A lovely flower despite its age. The most vigorous increaser I have grown.

*BLARIS (G.L. Wilson) 2W-P A well formed tubular cup of coppery pink. Very tall stems show this off nicely and make cutting easier. Very nice.

*BLARNEY (J.L. Richardson) 3W-OOY Strong tall stems, a pure white perianth and a yellow rimmed orange cup mark this distinctive show bloom.
 Mitylene x Sunstar Late Midseason \$.90

- *BOBOLINK (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-OYO One of the earliest to flower here and very showy in favorable (cool and wet) weather. Quite distinctive and nice for cutting.
Galata x Tuskar Light Early \$ 1.50
- *BRAVOURE (C.A. VanDerWereld) 1W-Y This is the best bicolor trumpet ever grown at Oakwood. It is consistent in producing large, tall blooms that do not need grooming for shows. The petals could use more overlap to be perfect but they are very white and the nicely formed yellow trumpet provides a good contrast.

- *BUTTERSкотCH (Mitsch) 2Y-Y This is the best early yellow large cup for garden or show grown here. A bulb given to Handy Hatfield years ago won a Best in Show in its first season for him.
Golden Torch x Galway Early Midseason \$ 1.50
- *CAMELOT (J.L. Richardson) 2Y-Y A very large, well rounded all yellow daffodil suitable for the garden and show. Very strong medium-short stems and heavy substance characterize this famous daffodil.
Kingscourt x Ceylon Midseason \$ 2.00
- *CANTATRICE (G. Wilson) 1W-W This is probably the most graceful of the white trumpets old or new. Its smooth texture and slender trumpet make it easy to identify. The tall cool green stems are very distinctive. Still capable of winning its division here.
Beersheba x Eskimo Midseason \$ 1.00
- *CAPITOL HILL (J. Lea) 2Y-Y Capitol Hill resulted from John Lea's orange trumpet breeding. Excellent large flowers have wide flat dark golden petals and a orangish-yellow shortish trumpet shaped cup. The bulbs are the largest of any standard cultivar I know. For garden and show.
Bastion x Trendsetter Early Midseason \$ 3.00
- *CARIB (G. Mitsch) 6W-P Though registered 6W-P, this lovely cyclamineus hybrid has been a pale yellow-pink color here. Broad perianth with much substance and strong medium tall stems make this a lovely bloom for exhibition. The corona is long and the petals well reflexed. Limited stock.

- CARBINEER (A.M. Wilson) 2Y-O Many of the best modern daffodils are derived from this parent. Tall stems, medium sized flowers and vigor mark this flower. It is sun resistant here.
Gulliver x ? Midseason \$.90
- *CEYLON (J.L. Richardson) 2Y-O Of the older yellow-orange daffodils this is the BEST. It is not as deeply colored as the newest but it is sun resistant, has strong stems and excellent poise.
Marksman x Diolite Early Midseason \$ 1.00
- *CHARITY MAY (C.F. Coleman) 6Y-Y This cyclamineus hybrid is the best of all this division that I have grown here. It is very vigorous, producing many flowers and great increase. Regularly wins at shows.
Mitylene x N. cyclamineus

- CHELAN (M. Evans) 2Y-W Of medium size this is the smoothest, most dependable division two reversed bicolor for exhibition grown here, other than Daydream. Reverse occurs quickly. Limited stock.
Daydream x Bethany Midseason \$ 5.00
- *CHEMAWA (G.E. Mitsch) 2Y-OOY A beautifully smooth, rounded perianth with a distinctive yellow edge to the cup mark this flower. Immediately recognized and overlooked as a show flower of merit.
Narvik x California Gold

- CHIT CHAT (M. Fowlds) 7Y-Y A.D.S. miniature. Great in the garden and good for late shows. A fantastic grower and very floriferous. Two to three flowers per stem.

- CHURCHMAN (Ballydorn Bulb Farm) 2W-GWW Well grown specimens of this big trumpet-shaped large cup can be very impressive. It has been vigorous with large bulbs and tall stems that could be stronger.

- *CLOUD NINE (G.E. Mitsch) 2Y-W This is one of the most beautiful daffodils grown here and an outstanding doer. Intensely colored, with wonderful contrast, and strong stems. It frequently comes with two heads here.
Quickstep x Daydream Mid-late season \$ 3.00
- COOL FLAME (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-P The first of the red pinks. This daffodil has produced more color recently but has not had the depth of color seen in Oregon. Tall stems make it unrivaled in the garden.
Precedent x Accent Early Midseason \$12.00
- CORDIAL (M.W. Evans) 2W-P If I could grow only one pink daffodil in my garden it would be this one. While it opens yellow, it quickly turns a rosey pink. The flowers last a long time, with many flowers, taller stems and great increase.
Pink Lace x Interim Midseason \$ 1.50
- *CREAGH DUBH (J. Lea) 20-R Tall stems, good poise and large flowers characterize this daffodil. At its best the colors are intense and an orange flush spreads over the petals. Limited stock.
(Chung King x Spry) x Home Fires) x Vulcan
Early Midseason \$50.00
- *CUMBERLAND (B.S. Duncan) 1W-W Of all the white trumpets grown here this one is the most impressive. Large, well formed flowers, intermediate in form between its parents, with TALL strong stems that shows it off well in the garden. A much better flower than its parent White Star as it grows here. Shown on our trade stand at Valley Forge, this big flower drew nice comments. Was Duncan #511. Limited stock.
Knowehead x White Star Midseason \$20.00
- CYROS (D. Jackson) 2W-Y One of the nicest bicolors for exhibition. Very white wide smooth petals and a lemon-yellow expanded cup approaching trumpet measurement. Very consistent here. Limited stock.
Lod x Rowella Midseason \$ 5.00
- DAILMANACH (J.S.B. Lea) 2W-P The most outstanding large exhibition pink form the British Isles. At its best an impressive flower with many show awards,. In this climate large flowers tend to be a bit crepey and stems could be stronger for the garden but otherwise GREAT.

- DAYDREAM (G.E. Mitsch) 2Y-W This is the best all around reverse bicolor here. The flowers are very long lasting. A top show flower and a dazzler in the garden at its peak reverse. My stock has been rot free.
Binkie x (King of the North x Content)
Early Midseason \$ 1.50
- DECOY (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-P Of all the red-pinks grown here this has the most going for it. A good grower, excellent red pink color, good poise and stem. It seeds well too. Possibly the successor to Accent?
(Seedling x Caro Nome) x Cool Flame
Midseason \$32.00
- *DELNASHAUGH (J. Lea) 4W-P John Lea's best 4W-P grown here. A large flower with pure colors, strong stems and a good neck. Flowers last a long time. Viable both ways here. Limited stock.
Kinbrace x Romance Late Midseason \$20.00
- DEL RAY (W. Pannill) 1W-P One of the best formal pink trumpets I grow with nice wide smooth petals. Color is pale but stems are strong with good poise. An excellent exhibition flower and potential breeder.
(Interim x Rose of Tralee) x Alpine Glow
Midseason \$10.00

- *DESEMONA (G.L. Wilson) 2W-W A most tall, elegant white daffodil of vigor and rot free here. Usually not smooth enough for the top shows, but beautiful. Overlooked by most, it is an excellent daffodil.
(Courage x Broughshane) x Rashee
Early Midseason \$ 1.25
- *DREAM CASTLE (G.E. Mitsch) 3W-W Not as refined as the best show flowers in its class but its large size, tall stems and great vigor make it a sight in the garden. An excellent daffodil.
Green Island x Chinese White
Late season \$ 1.00
- *EASTER MOON (G.L. Wilson) 2W-GWW At its best an outstanding late white daffodil. A wonderful parent with tall stems and a prodigious seeder. Some seasons the cup and petals have green streaks in them.
Tryst x Greenland Late Midseason \$ 1.50
- *ECLAT (G. Mitsch) 2W-YPP A most decorative large flat cup of intense red pink color. Stems are strong and of medium height. A potent breeder (pollen only). Some blooms may be of show quality. The yellow fades quickly here.
Caro Nome x Accent Midseason \$ 2.75
- *EMPRESS OF IRELAND (G.L. Wilson) 1W-W What more can be said about the best all purpose white trumpet daffodil generally available? Large blooms, lasting longer than most on medium strong stems. Very little rot here.
Guardian x Kanchenjunga Early Midseason \$ 2.00
- ERLIROSE (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-P One of the earliest pinks to flower here. Strong stems with excellent poise. Colors are extraordinary with pure white petals and a large reddish pink cup. Viable. Limited stock.
Precedent x Accent Early Midseason \$ 7.00
- *EUPHONY (G.E. Mitsch) 2Y-Y This is one of Grant's loveliest flowers. A perfection of form with marvelous substance. A soft lemon color. It can reverse here in very hot weather. An excellent show flower.
Leonaine o.p. Late Midseason \$10.00
- EVERPINK (M. Evans) 2W-P At its best a lovely flower. Sometimes it has two heads per stem. An excellent breeder. I wish the petals were whiter.
Wild Rose x Interim Late Midseason \$10.00
- *FALSTAFF (J.L. Richardson) 2Y-R The earliest of the Richardson yellow reds here. Of deep COLOR in both the perianth and cup which is saucer shaped. Excellent for the garden and suitable for show. Medium size.
Ceylon x (Narvik x Marksman)
Early season \$ 3.00
- *FANCY FRILLS (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-P An older salmony pink with an intensely ruffled large cup. Stems are medium short. For garden and cutting. Limited stock.
Mabel Taylor x Caro Nome Midseason \$ 1.00
- *FESTIVITY (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-Y Producing HUGE blooms and great increase, this is the best bicolor in the garden here. Since it rarely nicks, many blooms can be shown. It could use better poise.
Bodilly x Brunswick Midseason \$ 1.50
- FIRE MAN (Carncairn) 20-0 Slightly larger and less colored than its sibling Fire Raiser but of good quality. Stems are medium short and strong. Limited stock.
Vulcan x Spelter Early Midseason \$10.00
- *FIRE RAISER (Carncairn) 20-0 Smooth rounded petals that intensify in color as they age, with complete sun-resistance, characterize this fantastic almost all orange daffodil. Strong medium stems hold it erect in all weather conditions. A wonderful show flower that really glows in the garden.
Vulcan x Spelter Midseason \$28.00

- *FLAMING METEOR (G.E. Mitsch) 2Y-R One of the largest and most impressive of the yellow reds. Color intensity is variable and stems are medium short. Limited stock.
 Armada x Ceylon Early Midseason \$ 1.50
- FLYER (J. Gerritsen and Son) 11Y-Y This has been one of the most sought after division 11 daffodils. Called a "CURL" daffodil, it is unique. When I first viewed it I thought it was a double because of its full, curvy-split form. Large specimens show this here. Stems are of medium height and strong. Pollen has been fertile. Very few available.
 Moonbird x seedling Midseason \$60.00
- FOUNDLING (Carncairn) 6W-P The first pink cyclamineus hybrid with a short very pink cup and lovely swept back petals. Tops for show and a bunch looks lovely. A must for serious breeders or showers.
 Irish Rose x Jenny Midseason \$12.00
- *FOXFIRE (M.W. Evans) 2W-GWO A very beautiful medium sized daffodil. The petals are exceedingly white and the stems are tall. A most rapid increaser. Best in show at the Minnesota show in 1982.
 Limerick x (Shirley Neale x Chinese White) Late Midseason \$ 2.50
- *FROSTKIST (G.E. Mitsch) 6W-W A graceful white version of Charity May but the trumpet is longer and more waisted. Tall, strong stems and quite fertile here.
 Charity May o.p. Early \$ 1.75
- GLENFARCLAS (J.S.B. Lea) 1Y-O This is the first and best colored of John Lea's orange trumpets grown here. The trumpet deepens in color, like its parent Vulcan, as the flower develops. Strong stems and fertile both ways. Capable of being shown.
 Lea 1-6-60 x Vulcan Early Midseason \$10.00
- *GOLDEN AURA (J.L. Richardson) 2Y-Y Perhaps the best daffodil raised by the Richardsons. A vigorous grower with tall stems and perfect flowers for all purposes. A true large cup that should be grown and shown by all.
 Halo o.p. Late Midseason \$ 2.50
- *GOLDEN JEWEL (T. Bloomer) 2Y-GYY Deep golden-yellow with a green eye. The broad smooth petals make this an excellent show bloom and the strong tall stems display it well in the garden.
 Camelot x Arctic Gold Midseason \$ 8.00
- *GOSSAMER (G.E. Mitsch) 3W-YYP One of Grant's loveliest creations. Tall stems, wonderful form and pastel shadings make this flower outstanding. EVERY flower had a pale yellow perianth last year making it simply fantastic!
 Rubra x Foggy Dew Late Midseason \$ 2.50
- *GULL (G.E. Mitsch) 2W-GWW A large smooth white flower distinctive with its long cup and petals. It takes time for the cup to whiten. It has won best in show in the Midwest. Most impressive looking. Limited stock.
 Easter Moon x Broughshane seedling Late Midseason \$15.00
- *GYPSY (J.L. Richardson) 2Y-R This is the most intensely colored vigorous yellow-red for early garden display and lasts a long time too. In Oregon the petals flushed an intense orange gold; making a heat wave of color never seen here. Scarce.
 Breeding Unknown Early \$ 3.50
- *GOLDEN RAPTURE (J.L. Richardson) 1Y-Y Without a doubt the best available yellow trumpet for the garden that grows here. Big, tall vigorous with long lasting blooms that are just a shade too crepey for show. Great!
 Pretoria x Goldcourt Early Midseason \$ 1.50
- *HIGHFIELD BEAUTY (H.R. Mott) 8Y-GYO The best exhibition tazetta. Very useful for Quinn Collections. Strong grower, very hardy and makes huge round bulbs.
 Breeding Unknown Early Midseason \$ 4.00

- *HONEYBIRD (G.E. Mitsch) 1Y-W The most vigorous dual purpose reverse bicolor trumpet grown here. Rot free, tall stems and good form with excellent reverse. Sometimes the petals become wingy.
King of the North x Content
Early Midseason \$ 1.00
- *INCA GOLD (A.N. Kanouse) 1Y-Y Though strictly for the garden the form of this trumpet is good. As the flower ages it deepens to a deep bronzy gold, held high on tall stems. Hard to beat in the garden.
Breeding Unknown Early Midseason \$ 1.25
- *INFATUATION (J.L. Richardson) 2W-GYP Parent of many of the best of the Richardson pinks. A nice late flower with good stems. The yellow is not seen here leaving a rimmed cup.
Glenshane x Waterville Late Midseason \$.90
- *INISHKEEN (G.L. Wilson) 1W-Y A different bicolor strictly for the garden. The trumpet is very wide, flaring open. The medium short stem holds the large flowers erect with a good poise. Recommended.
Guardian x Kanchenjunga Early season \$ 1.25
- INISHMORE (Mrs. J.L. Richardson) 2W-GWW The most outstanding large cupped white from the Richardsons. Its whiteness is of great intensity and the flowers of the highest caliber. Stems are tall and strong. Few available.
Verona x Stainless Midseason \$25.00
- INTERIM (G.L. Wilson) 2W-YYP A very tall and graceful older pink. Its petals tend to be swept back. Parent of many modern whites and pinks. Very vigorous and recommended highly for the garden. The yellow color is very transitory here.

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THE NEW REVISED SYSTEM OF CLASSIFICATION OF THE
ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY, 1977

1. The classification of a daffodil cultivar shall be based on the description and measurements submitted by the person registering the variety, or shall be the classification submitted by such person.
2. Colours applicable to the description of daffodil cultivars are abbreviated as follows:

W	white or whitish	G	green	Y	yellow
P	pink	O	orange	R	red
3. For the purpose of description, the daffodil flower shall be divided into perianth and corona.
4. The perianth shall be described by the letter or letters of the colour code most appropriate.
5. The corona shall be divided into three zones: an eye-zone, a mid-zone, and the edge or rim. Suitable coded colour descriptions shall describe these three zones, beginning with the eye-zone and extending to the rim.
6. The letter or letters of the colour code most accurately describing the perianth shall follow the division designation.
7. The letters of the colour code most accurately describing the zones of the corona shall then follow, from the eye-zone to the rim separated from the perianth letters by a hyphen. In Division 4, the letters of the colour code most accurately describing the admixture of petals and petaloids replacing the corona shall follow in proper order, using 3, 2, or 1 colour codes as appropriate.
8. If the corona is substantially of a single colour, a single letter of the colour code shall describe it. Using these basic requirements, daffodils may be classified as follows:

DIVISION 1: TRUMPET DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; trumpet or corona as long or longer than the perianth segments.

DIVISION 2: LONG-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 3: SHORT-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona not more than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 4: DOUBLE DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: Double flowers.

DIVISION 5: TRIANDRUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus triandrus* predominant.

DIVISION 6: CYCLAMINEUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus cyclamineus* predominant.

DIVISION 7: JONQUILLA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus jonquilla* group predominant.

DIVISION 8: TAZETTA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus tazetta* group predominant.

DIVISION 9: POETICUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus poeticus* group predominant.

DIVISION 10: SPECIES AND WILD FORMS AND WILD HYBRIDS All species and wild or reputedly wild forms and hybrids. Double forms of the varieties are included.

DIVISION 11: SPLIT-CORONA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN Distinguishing characters: Corona split for at least one-third of its length.

DIVISION 12: MISCELLANEOUS DAFFODILS All daffodils not falling into any one of the foregoing Divisions.
