



**GREETINGS from OAKWOOD:**

**March 2003**

Welcome to Oakwood Daffodil's twentieth annual listing of Midwestern American grown and acclimatized daffodil bulbs. Oakwood is a small nursery, with lots of daffodils located in Southwestern Michigan where I live one mile north of the Indiana border, next to South Bend, IN. It is devoted entirely to my love of the genus *Narcissus* and its hybrids. Over the past 32 years I have grown thousands of named daffodils in our harsh climate. Temperatures have ranged from -26 degrees F to 103 degrees F. Conditions can be very dry or very wet. During the winter, lake effect snow from Lake Michigan sometimes gives us a large snow cover. Temperatures can change quickly and drastically. Before last year's National ADS Show, in early April, it reached 91 degrees F with three days of record heat in the 80s. By that weekend we were below freezing with a couple inches of snow.

To improve on existing cultivars and create new forms and color combinations I have been actively breeding daffodils since 1977 with 100s of thousands of seedlings raised. Emphasis has been on selecting those with show qualities, stronger colors and garden strength/appeal in this climate. About 170 daffodils have now been registered with the Royal Horticultural Society and many more are waiting in the wings. 2002 was a hallmark year with the registration of my first quality white-orange trumpet, Scott Joplin, raised from two of my own seedlings. Its long, elegant, well-colored trumpet holds promise for the next generation of 1W-Os.

Last years listing has been expanded with emphasis on newer show flowers, not available elsewhere in the USA. More species hybrids are offered plus the ever-expanding cultivars from the Oakwood Stables. I will try to continue increasing the offerings of bulbs that will please you and satisfy your needs for both show and garden including miniatures.

Thanks to the help of Mike Berrigan, Oakwood had a successful trade stand at the National Show in Fort Mitchell, Kentucky. Lastly, a mechanical bulb lifter and a diesel-powered trencher were purchased to improve the production of bulbs at Oakwood.

#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR ORDERING

1. All orders must be received by **July 7th**. ABSOLUTELY NO LATE ORDERS ACCEPTED, because bulb digging needs to be completed by then as most of the bulbs are dug on an order basis You will receive an acknowledgment of your order as they are processed.
2. MINIMUM CHECK ORDER: \$10.00. Please make checks payable to: **OAKWOOD DAFFODILS**. MINIMUM VISA/MC ORDER: \$25.00. If you sent money for your catalog, it will be credited to your account when you place an order.
3. Bulbs will be shipped via UPS, unless otherwise specified, so please include your COMPLETE shipping address. Minimum shipping and handling charge for up to 12 bulbs: \$7.30 for orders placed East of the Mississippi River and \$9.00 for orders placed West of the Mississippi River. For **EACH BULB** in excess of 12, please add 15 cents. Overseas shipping will be billed at cost. **NO SHIPPING FEE SHOULD BE ADDED FOR SEEDLINGS THAT ARE ORDERED!**
4. Bulb shipments will hopefully begin by the first week of September, or sooner and will continue in rotation. Please specify if you require a particular shipping date.
5. Visitors are welcome, but please make arrangements ahead of time to avoid disappointment due to variation in bloom time or unfavorable weather.

6. You will receive information about planting and care for your bulbs with your order. Please note that they should be in a location that receives natural rainfall and that does not puddle up!

The format used in this catalog lists the Registered Daffodil name first. This is followed by the classification and color code, then the hybridizer and country of origin. After the description, the seed parent and the pollen parent are listed, then its flowering time, the order number for that variety, and then the price for each bulb.

CHICAGO HOPE 1Y-GYY (Dr. John Reed, USA)

**GO HOPE TY-GY Y** (Dr. John Reed, USA)  
The name says it all. Besides using the famous TV show's title, I had hoped that it would win the Rose Ribbon when shown some years ago in Chicago. But that honor went to a sibling of Haunting. It is a well-balanced, medium sized, smooth yellow trumpet capable of giving superb blooms. The smooth overlapping wide petals were inherited from Dream Prince and the vigor imparted from Golden Jewel. Was Reed 85-7-2.

**FAVORITE 2Y-O** (Dr. Jim Reed, CCR) Dave Karnstedt is very fussy about the daffodils that he likes. They need to point high and be aesthetically beautiful. In other words, approaching perfection! This late 2Y-O is one such flower that Dave seemed to really admire during one of his visits to Oakwood, hence the name. I wish it was more highly colored and have bred it with Burning Bush in hopes of that end. A very high quality show flower. Was Reed 84-142-1.

DOCTOR DAVID HOUGH 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

**DR DAVID HOUGH** 11-1 (Dr. John Reed, USA)  
Selected from a small but potent cross that yielded outstanding deeply colored yellow trumpets. Three selections have been named for men that I admire. Tall, strong stems with excellent necks and poise support deeply colored blooms with great substance and excellent petal overlap. The foliage is a deep green and vigorous, even into the summer. A grand daffodil for the garden and show. Named for the best physician I have worked with who also is tall, strong and outstanding. Was Reed 83-40-2. Hough is pronounced "Huff". \$20.00

GARDEN GATE 3W-YYP (Dr. John Reed, USA)

**EN GATE 3W-111 (Dr. John Reed, USA)**  
My second small-cupped pink to be named and released is very show-worthy and unusual in its coloration, opening as a 3W-YYP it quickly changes to a 3W-P with the color being a shade of rust color to my eye. I prefer the 3W-YYP color and registered it that way, but if it consistently changes to the solid color quickly, I may have to change its color registration. It has inherited all of its good qualities from Fragrant Rose (alas, no rose scent), and the cup size from Kerstin. Named for a florist shop that was next to my old office in Buchanan, MI. Was Reed 86-62-1.

**MICHELLE TW-1** (Dr. John Reed, USA) Named in honor of the site of the 2002 ADS National Show where it beat many well-known flowers in its single bloom class. Its perfection and smoothness cried out for being exhibited so it was removed from our trade stand to win the single bloom award. It was cut from the open windswept field of 10 acres. It was beautiful with its chaste smooth flat perianth and its mid-yellow trumpet. Every bloom was identical. Very consistent! Was Reed 81-107-1

HAUNTING 3V-V (Dr. John Reed USA)

The name says it all! I marked Haunting on the plastic label I staked it with when I first saw it in bloom that warm breezy late spring day. It appeared hauntingly beautiful then and it continues to be the best 3Y-Y that I have grown for show. Pictured in the March 2003 ADS advertisement for Oakwood Daffodils. Perfect balance, form, stem, neck, poise and petals. Almost a perfect uniform shade of yellow. Was Reed 84-41-2.

Named for my alma mater owing to its brilliant colors of red and white. This is the best-colored and formed selection from this cross. While very capable of being shown, it is not the epitome of white red breeding yet. But its earliness and brilliant red color make it very unique and desirable. Very fertile both ways. Color develops quickly. Was Reed 83-69-1. \$35.00

**LITTLE RUBY 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)**

Picture a smaller improved Rubythroat with more of a deep garnet shade to its tubular cup. The petals are in a perfect plane and symmetrical with good overlap. It is held by a strong stem, appropriate for its size, with a short well-poised neck. Highly touted by Peter Ramsay (NZ) on first flowering it last year. And, Peter does not generally care for intermediates. Fertile both ways. Unique. Was Reed 85-12-1.

**MELROSE DELIGHT 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)**

About 7 selections from over 200 seedlings in this cross were kept. This one probably has the best balance as a show flower. Grown by Sid Dubose of Melrose Gardens for the last 2 years it has pointed 95 each year and its color actually intensified in a year poor for color. It has an excellent stem, neck, poise, petals, etc. As this bloom delighted Sid I thought the name appropriate. Was Reed 83-87-10.

**OAKWOOD TYKE 1W-W (Dr. John Reed, USA)**

Miniature daffodils are scarce, especially white trumpets. This one is vigorous and fertile. The over proportioned (wide) trumpet opens an intense yellow and quickly bleaches out in this climate. The stem and neck are strong and an appropriate length for a miniature. Different! Was Reed 95-1W-W.

**PICTURE PERFECT 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)**

Viewing the stock of this flower in bloom in 1999 prompted this name. Not only does this late midseason bloom have wide overlapping symmetrical petals that are very smooth, its stems have been the tallest of any yellow-red daffodil I have bred so far. Bunclody appears to have given the color and smoothness while Safari, the vigor, size and stem length. For show and garden. Was Reed 84-142-3.

Healthy, high quality small-cupped white daffodils are hard to breed. This one is the best that I have raised. The flower is almost circular and is supported a strong, tall stem. Consistent and spectacular in 2002. Admired by Steve Vinisky when grown in Oregon. Named for my mother-in-law who turned 76 today (February 12). Was Reed 85-100-2.

Named for the bank that came to our rescue at the 2000 World Daffodil Convention. Also for the gold carried by their stage coaches in the old American West. Admired by enthusiasts that have seen it in bloom here. A very tall, strong stem holds a well-poised bloom with a short neck. The deep yellow bloom is unbelievably smooth. If the inner petals would consistently flatten out instead of incurving the price would be much higher. The original seedling stake was marked "PERFECT". A beautiful daffodil that can be shown and holds promise as a breeder. Vigorous. Was Reed 84-7-1.

**AMERICAN ROBIN** 6Y-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

I was thrilled many years ago to get Cock Robin, a very scarce Cyril Coleman short cupped cyclamineus hybrid. While it was small, smooth and rather cute, its constitution was very weak. None the less, I bred with it a few times and collected open pollinated seed. I was very surprised and pleased to flower this from the open pollinated seed. Slightly bigger than Cock Robin, it is very vigorous and an outstanding flower for the garden and show bench. The stong medium short stems support the mid-orange cup with a swept back yellow perianth of ample overlap and substance. Formerly Reed-83-96-1. Listed as Robin Redbreast in its initial offering.

**CASSOPOLIS** 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is a well-engineered daffodil with an exemplary smooth very flat wide perianth supported by a strong stem and neck. A row of blooms is almost military like in their bearing. Alas the deep colored cylinder-like cup burns easily and needs protection for show. Named for a local Michigan town where I have purchased my Ford trucks. Was Reed seedling 82-200-3.

**CASTLE REGIMENT** 2W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From a cross designed to breed 1W-Os this outstanding and different looking flower was kept. Its size and perianth were inherited from its trumpet parent and smoothness, poise and color intensity (?) from the large cup parent. (Perianth segments 40mm and cup 25 mm) The shortened wide trumpet like cup is a dark golden yellow verging on orange. Registered now, was Reed 79-122-1.

This sets the standard for beauty and quality in the late division threes. A show and garden flower of the highest caliber. Tall stems support the large flowers with excellent poise.

**CELTIC WINGS** 5W-W (Dr. John Reed, USA)

After 15 years of breeding daffodils, this is my own first introduction. Two lovely smooth medium white blooms and occasionally three blooms make this triandrus a flower of the highest quality for both garden and show. I was shocked to have a superb exhibition flower on its first Spring here, not its second! And it was fertile, too. Strong, tall stems support a beautifully smooth flower. I have not had any rot problems so far. Stock is small and it is a moderately slow increaser. It is easily the best early large cup white grown here. Inadvertently listed as PRINCESS DIANA the first season I offered it.

## ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY'S SYSTEM OF DAFFODIL CLASSIFICATION

The classification of daffodils has changed many times over the years. The present system combines the RHS classification of thirteen divisions based on form and species heritage with Dr. Throckmorton's color coding from the American Daffodil Society. This combined system gives us a very useful tool for describing daffodils quickly. A single letter denotes a color and its appropriate location as found in the flower, first in the perianth and then in the corona. W=White Y=Yellow G=Green O=Orange R=Red P=Pink For example: Arctic Gold is classified as a 1Y-Y. It is a trumpet daffodil with yellow petals and a yellow corona. Misty Glen is classified as a 2W-GWW. It is a large-cupped daffodil with white petals and a green-eyed white cup. First Born is a cyclamineus hybrid with swept-back, yellow petals and the corona has a greenish eye with a small transition of light yellow going to a deep pink color extending to the edge of the cup. In otherwords, it is a 6Y-GYP.

- Division 1      Trumpet Daffodils: The trumpet (corona) is equal to, or longer than, the petal (perianth) segments.
- Division 2      Large Cup: The cup (corona) is less than the length of the petals (perianth) but more than a third.
- Division 3      Small Cup: The cup (corona) is equal to, or less than a third, of the petal (perianth) length.
- Division 4      Double Daffodils: This division is for all forms of double flowers.
- Division 5      Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with *N. triandrus* characteristics.
- Division 6      Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with *N. cyclamineus* characteristics.
- Division 7      Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with *N. jonquilla* characteristics.
- Division 8      Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with *N. tazetta* characteristics. The stems usually will have multiple flowers.
- Division 9      Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with *N. poeticus* characteristics.
- Division 10     All Species and Wild forms.
- Division 11     Daffodils with the cup (corona) that is split for more than a half of its length. This division has two subdivisions:
  - Division 11a    Collar Daffodils have the corona segments parallel to the perianth segments.
  - Division 11b    Papillon Daffodils have the corona segments project outwards from the perianth segments, usually in a whorl-shaped arrangement.
- Division 12     Daffodils that cannot be classified within the preceding divisions.
- Division 13     Daffodils distinguished solely by botanical name.
