Section A—Challenge Collections (Open to ADS members only)

Class 1—Carey E. Quinn Gold Medal Award

A collection of 24 varieties from at least 5 different divisions of the daffodil classification, individually labeled and exhibited in separate containers.

Class 2—Harry I. Tuggle Memorial Trophy (to be held one year)

A collection of 12 varieties, 3 stems each, from at least 3 different divisions of the daffodil classification, to be exhibited in 12 separate containers, individually labeled.

Class 3—Larry P. Mains Memorial Trophy (to be held one year)

A collection of 9 varieties, 3 stems each, from Division 3 to be exhibited in 9 separate containers, individually labeled.

Section B—Collection of 5 Varieties

Class 1—Trumpet Daffodils

Class 2—Large-cupped Daffodils

Class 3—Small-cupped Daffodils

Class 4—Double Daffodils

Class 5—Triandrus Daffodils

Class 6—Cyclamineus Daffodils

Class 7—Jonquilla Daffodils

Class 8—Tazetta Daffodils

Class 9—Poeticus Daffodils

Class 10—Species, Wild Forms and Wild Hybrids

Class 11—Split Corona Daffodils

Class 12—Miscellaneous—Division 12

Class 13—Pink-cupped Daffodils (in any division)

Class 14—White Daffodils (in any division)

ADS Purple Ribbon for the best entry in Section B, Classes 1 to 14

Class 15—American Bred Daffodils—

ADS Red, White and Blue Ribbon

Class 16—Reverse Bicolor Daffodils—ADS Maroon Ribbon

Section C—Standard Type Seedlings—One Specimen

Entries may be made in each division and subdivision of the RHS System of Classification plus additional subdivisions for pink daffodils in each division.

ADS Rose Ribbon for the best seedling in Section C.

Section D—Miniature Daffodils

Class 1—Single Stem—Divisions 1 to 9 and 12

Class 2—Single Stem—Division 10

Class 3—Three Stems of one variety—Divisions 1 to 9 and 12

Class 4—Three stems of one variety—Division 10

Class 5—Collection of 5 different varieties, individually labeled.

ADS Lavender Ribbon

Class 6—Roberta C. Watrous Gold Medal Award (open to ADS members only).

A collection of 12 miniatures from at least 3 different divisions of the daffodil classification, individually labeled and exhibited in separate containers.

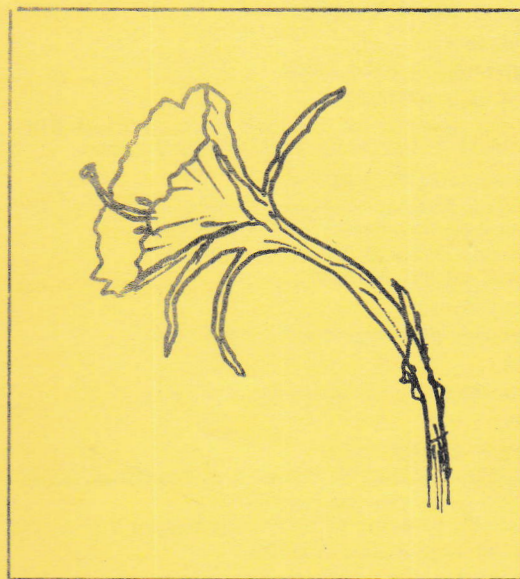
RULES FOR EXHIBITORS
