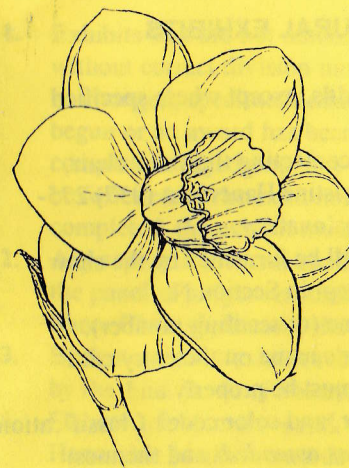

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITS

- E-1.** All classes are open to anyone who grows daffodils, except where specified otherwise.
- E-2.** Entry tags may be secured prior to the show by contacting the show chair, Harold McConnell (937) 426-9557 (Dayton), Cristine Hanenkrat (937) 275-9919 (Dayton), or Bill Lee (513) 752-8104 (Cincinnati).
- E-3.** Containers for specimens and support foliage will be furnished by the show committee. No daffodil foliage is permitted except in Section N.
- E-4.** Each single and 3-stem entry must have the name (or seedling number), division, color code, class number, and exhibitor's name on the entry card. Blooms in all collections of five or more stems must be properly and individually labeled with name, division number, and color code. Classification guide is the *1994 Daffodils to Show and Grow (as amended)* and the most recent edition of the *Daffodil Data Bank*. The Royal Horticultural Society System of Classification will be used. Correct classification and labeling shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- E-5.** The bottom portion of the entry tag must be filled out. Name stickers or rubber stamps are helpful.
- E-6.** An exhibitor may make as many entries as desired in any class, provided each entry is a different cultivar or species, or an entirely different collection of cultivars or species.
- E-7.** All blooms must have been grown in the open by exhibitors; EXCEPTION: Miniatures and container-grown exhibits may be grown in protected areas.
- E-8.** All collections of 5 or more stems must be exhibited with each cultivar or species in a separate container. Each cultivar or species must be correctly labeled (name, division number, and color code). Note additional labeling requirements in schedule.
- E-9.** Miniature daffodils named in the most recent ADS Approved List of Miniatures may be shown only in classes for miniatures. Any named or numbered diminutive daffodil flower that appears graceful, with all its parts in proportion, may be entered in classes for miniatures and is eligible for ADS Awards in the Miniature Section with the exception that only seedlings shown by the originator are eligible for the Miniature Rose Ribbon. Judges may decline to judge an unlisted miniature if in their opinion it is too large to be a miniature.
- E-10.** Blooms of seedlings may be exhibited in all classes for named cultivars. *All seedlings must be identified by number designation assigned by the originator.* If the exhibitor is not the originator, the name of the originator must be included as a part of the identification.

Copies of *Daffodils to Show and Grow* and the *ADS Data Bank* will be available at the show for the use of exhibitors. But it is suggested that all exhibitors own the most recent (1994) copy of *Daffodils to Show and Grow*. It is imperative that exhibitors check these sources when filling out entry tags.

- J-1.** Exhibits that are not named (except in Section P) or are incorrectly named or without correct division number and color code will not be judged. No label may be changed, specimens added, removed, altered, or substituted after judging has begun or an award has been placed. If an error is discovered in an exhibit after completion of judging, any award placed thereon (ADS, Special or Ribbon) shall be forfeited by the exhibitor. If an error is discovered before the judging is completed, the exhibit must be rejudged.
- J-2.** Any report of an error shall be directed to the Show Chair, who will refer it to the panel of judges responsible for the award. If the judges are unavailable, the Show Chair shall make the final decision as to the validity of the reported error.
- J-3.** Each stem in an exhibit receiving an ADS Award must score 90 points or more by the ADS Scale of Points.
- J-4.** Only one first, one second, and one third award may be given in each class. Honorable Mention awards may also be given if merited but only if first, second, and third are also given.
- J-5.** Any and all awards may be withheld by the judges if, in their opinion, the exhibit is not worthy. The decisions of the judges shall be final except as stated in Rule J-2. However, if a blue ribbon is awarded in a class eligible for an ADS Award, that award may not be withheld.
- J-6.** The show committee reserves the right to sub-divide classes when there are three or more exhibits of the same cultivar, species, or color code. Species may be subdivided by their botanical sections. Historic pre-1940 and No-Name classes (Sections O and P) may be divided by other criteria. However, no class should be sub-divided if there is not sufficient number of worthy exhibits left in the class.

<b>140</b>	Collection of five miniature cultivars of American breeding. (Hybridizer's name must appear on label unless hybridizer is exhibitor.) (ADS Miniature Red-White-Blue Ribbon)
<b>141</b>	Three each of three cultivars, from three divisions. (No species)
<b>142</b>	ROBERTA C. WATROUS AWARD—Silver Medal or Ribbon: Collection of 12 cultivars and/or species of miniature daffodils, one stem each, from at least 3 divisions. This medal may be won only one time in all ADS shows by any exhibitor. A former winner may exhibit in this class, but may receive only the Watrous Ribbon. (Open to ADS members only.)
<b>Section G SPECIAL COLLECTIONS OF STANDARD CULTIVARS One stem each of standard cultivars from any division(s), individually labeled.</b>	
<b>143</b>	Pink cupped daffodils, 5 cultivars.
<b>144</b>	White daffodils, 5 cultivars.
<b>145</b>	White perianth, red and/or orange in the cup daffodils, 5 cultivars.
<b>146</b>	Yellow perianth, red and/or orange in the cup daffodils, 5 cultivars.
<b>147</b>	Daffodils of American breeding, 5 cultivars. (Hybridizer's name must appear on label except seedlings shown by originator.)(ADS Red-White-Blue Ribbon)
<b>148</b>	Daffodils of UK and/or Irish breeding, 5 cultivars. (Hybridizer's name must appear on label.)
<b>149</b>	Daffodils of Australian and/or New Zealand breeding, 5 cultivars. (Hybridizer's name must appear on label.)
<b>150</b>	Daffodils introduced prior to 1973, 5 cultivars. (Date of introduction must appear on label.)
<b>151</b>	Colored perianth, corona paler than perianth, 5 cultivars.(ADS Maroon Ribbon)
<b>152</b>	Twelve cultivars and/or species from not less than 4 divisions.(ADS Green Ribbon)

<b>153</b>	Fifteen cultivars from divisions 5, 6, 7, 8, 9.
<b>154</b>	Fifteen cultivars from 15 different RHS classifications. (Each labeled with name and complete classification, including color code.) (ADS Throckmorton Ribbon)
<b>155</b>	CAREY E. QUINN AWARD—Silver Medal or Ribbon: Collection of 24 standard cultivars and/or species of daffodils, one stem each, from at least 5 divisions. This medal may be won only one time in all ADS shows by any exhibitor. A former winner may exhibit in this class, but may receive only the Quinn Ribbon. (Open to ADS members only.)
<b>Section H SEEDLINGS Seedlings grown and exhibited by the originator only, with his or her designated number, classification, and parentage (if known). The originator of a daffodil seedling is the person who first flowers the bulb regardless of who made the cross and/or planted the seed.</b>	
<b>156</b>	One stem, standard cultivar—eligible for ADS ROSE RIBBON.
<b>157</b>	One stem, miniature cultivar—eligible for ADS MINIATURE ROSE RIBBON.
<b>Section I JUNIOR CLASSES Open to anyone under 18. Each exhibitor will receive a certificate good for three daffodil bulbs, given in the fall (ADS Junior Award)</b>	
<b>158</b>	One stem, Division 1.
<b>159</b>	One stem, Division 2.
<b>160</b>	One stem, Division 3.
<b>161</b>	One stem any other division.
<b>162</b>	One stem, any miniature cultivar and/or species
<b>Section J NEW COLLECTOR CLASSES Open to anyone who has never won a blue ribbon in an ADS show. (SWODS Green Rosette)</b>

**Section M SMALL GROWER'S CLASS** Open only to exhibitors who grow fewer than 100 cultivars. Section to be subdivided as entries permit. (ADS Small Grower's Ribbon—may not be won by an exhibitor more than three times.)

188	Three (3) stems, one cultivar

**Section N CONTAINER-GROWN DAFFODILS** Containers must contain daffodils only and be grown by the exhibitor. (ADS Container Grown Daffodils Ribbons)

**Section O HISTORIC PRE-1940 DAFFODILS** Open to all cultivars, but not species, introduced or in gardens before 1940. All entries in this section must show the year of introduction on the entry card. (ADS Historic pre-1940 Cultivars Ribbon—entries in this section are not eligible for any other ADS awards.)
