Photography Basics & Techniques

The Greater St Louis Daffodil Society is very pleased that John Wilding, from Wilding Photo Studio of Hermann, MO, has agreed to talk with us at our first 2011 meeting of the New Year, about the basics of photography and some of the techniques we can use to enhance the beauty of our photos.

John Wilding first developed an interest in photography while attending the University of Missouri at Rolla in the 1960s. He setup Wilding Photos in 1964 photographing babies and weddings. After a tour of duty in the Army, John returned to the St Louis area and eventually was in charge of Quality Assurance at the Technicolor Lab in St. Louis. In 1970 John, and his wife Mae, purchased an 1878 era home in Hermann, MO, and opened Red Barn Craft Shop and Wilding Photo Studio during 1972.

From the start John enjoyed photographing nature in mid-Missouri. He especially enjoys capturing photos of scenic sunrises, sunsets, weather-related clouds, rivers and waterfalls. His nature photos also include the flora and fauna that thrive on the unique ecosystem in and around mid-Missouri. John embraced digital photography about 6 years ago when he realized that their professional labs were less interested in processing

film. They didn't expect the transformation to happen so quickly but within a year they made the complete switch. Many of their assignments were in light conditions that required experimentation and digital photography rendered visual results on a timely basis. Also, with the power of the computer they can enhance the image, change the brightness and contrast and even marry multiple images.

During the presentation we will be touching on some of the basics of photography, so we do encourage our members to bring their cameras and extra lens they may have. Learning to use your camera features, instead of leaving it set to automatic, can be the first step towards rendering extraordinary photos. Capturing the essence of a flower with a photograph contributes greatly to our ability to appreciate and admire its beauty.

"Dig Daffodil Day - 2011" By Jason Delaney



Our annual "Dig Daffodil Day" event is hosted by the Greater Saint Louis Daffodil Society (GSLDS), in conjunction with the Shaw Nature Reserve (SNR) of the Missouri Botanical Garden. This year "Dig Daffodil Day" is scheduled for **Saturday**, **March 26**, **2011 from 9:00 AM - 4:00 PM** at the Shaw Nature Reserve in Gray Summit, MO. We plan to embark on the epic dig from the Entrance parking lot at 9:00 a.m. sharp. *Collectors of historic daffodils shouldn't miss this!*

"Dig Daffodils Day" is open by invitation only to daffodil society members and other interested plant conservation and preservation groups. The rules are quite simple:

- SNR will allocate a sector of the prairie where they wish for us to remove the daffodils, and we will have the day to dig as many as we can.
- Participants shall only dig within the allotted sector.
- Participants shall dig on this day only.
- The dug bulbs are ours to keep; members of the Greater Saint Louis Daffodil Society will be expected to dig for the annual bulb sale in addition to their own loot.
- The GSLDS will cover the admission into the SNR and provide drinks, but participants will be required to bring their own lunch.
- Participants are required to bring their own tools, bags, markers, and any supplies one feels are necessary to digging daffodils.
- Dress for the part--briars, burrs, poison ivy, mud, bugs, and rain are all likely to be encountered.

Recycled Mesh Bags Needed!!!!!!!!!

Please turn in the extra mesh bags lying about in your garage or closets!!!! They may be mesh bags from last year's exchange, or recycled onion bags, we don't care! We will wash and sanitize them, and re-use them for the Bulb Exchange and SNR Dig!!!! So bring them to the many upcoming GSLDS functions, and turn them in!!!!

Sunday, November 14, 2010 Missouri Room, Ridgeway Center at MOBOT

The last meeting of 2010 was called to order at 1:00 PM by President Lynn Slackman. President Slackman asked members to review copies of the Minutes of the last meeting that were provided at each table. Dave Niswonger moved that the minutes be approved, seconded by Pam Hardy. Minutes were approved as presented.

The Treasurer's Report was summarized by Treasurer Peter Adams and copies of the club's up to date financial position were provided. Pam Hardy moved that the Treasurer's Report be approved, subject to audit. Seconded by Gary Knehans, motion passed.

Program Chair Cindy Haeffner introduced the panel of Hybridizers featured on the program as follows: Dave Niswonger, Larry Force, Gary Knehans and Jason Delaney. Each presented power point programs of their daffodil seedlings and told of their goals and methods used in achieving them. We all very much appreciate the efforts and the genius of our hybridizers and thank them for taking the time to dazzle us with the results as we anxiously await seeing them in our own gardens.

Following a short break for refreshments, the business meeting resumed when President Slackman called for OLD BUSINESS:

Jean Morris reported on the progress on acquiring new table coverings to be used for our Daffodil Show. She has discussed the matter with the Orchid Club who uses black fabric. Jean states that she would prefer forest green for our show. She has been checking fabrics, deciding we need a good quality, affordably priced and enough to cover our 6 foot tables.

In the absence of Editor Beth Holbrooke, President Slackman reminded everyone what was needed for the first issue of The Daffodil Rave and the date to submit articles. The publish date will be late January or early February of 2011.

NEW BUSINESS

Jason Delaney discussed whether our club should continue paying the ADS Youth dues. Some of the youth are no longer interested; we really don't have any events that include them. We should contact the parents before dropping them but not just continue paying if they aren't interested anymore. It was suggested that we should have ways to include them in our shows and encourage them to grow daffodils at home or schools. Encourage them to participate at some level with our club activities. Peter McAdams moved that a committee headed by Jason be named to formulate guidelines for qualifying as youth members. Seconded by Jim Morris, motion passed.

Co-chairs Jean Morris and Suzanne Raymond reported on the progress made on the 2011 Daffodil Show. The name decided on is "Say It with Daffodils". It was suggested that we have a ONE day show...the set-up would be on Saturday and the show on Sunday. Since we don't have enough space in the Beaumont Room, possibly we could use a nearby room for setup. The plan is to request the show to be held on the first weekend in April. We just have to wait to see what MOBOT can give us.

President Slackman discussed difficulties ahead for events that can be held at MOBOT. From January 27th through May 27th due to extensive construction they will be closed in the evenings but will be open on week-ends. This could affect the dates for our show

Jim Morris stated that a trophy has been donated to our club to be awarded this year for the first time. It is to be named the Shaw Nature Reserve "Club Challenge" Trophy. It was on display at the meeting. Dave Niswonger moved that we purchase a base to present it on and have it engraved, "Single Stem Dug at Shaw Nature Reserve Club Challenge Trophy". Seconded by Pam Hardy, motion passed.

President Slackman named the following Nominating Committee: Debra Pratt, Pam Hardy and Suzanne Raymond. The committee is to find nominees for Vice President, Treasurer and one Board Member and submit their report at the first meeting in 2011.

Cindy Haeffner stated that the bulbs were at the meeting and requested members to take several home and pot them up for the Spring Potted Daffodil Sale at the close of the meeting. Peter McAdams request that he be notified about the new label order. Jim and Jean Morris will let him know when they are going to pick them up.

Several announcements were made and a drawing for door prizes was held, with the \$25.00 door prize going to Suzanne Raymond.

There being no further or other business, the meeting was adjourned. The balance of the evening was spent playing the game, "Rob Your Neighbor".


