Fall Sale A Big Success

For the first time in memory we did not have a crew digging at Oakwood Daffodils last summer. This left us with too few bulbs for our sale, and we had to scramble to make up the difference. We usually have purchased some bulbs from commercial vendors, but we decided to expand this year.

We sent an open order with a very modest check to a number of dealers with the request to send us their remainder stock for sale bulbs or send only a few from their catalog which we would use in our bulb exchange. We didn't have a clue as to the potential of this approach, but the results were incredibly gratifying. We received bulbs from Mitsch Daffodils, Cherry Creek Daffodils, Oakwood Daffodils, Daffodils and More (David Burdick), and John Scheepers, Inc. In each case we received a wonderful mix with value far beyond the catalog value. Many of the fine and normally expensive bulbs were grabbed up at the sale, not just by our members.



In recognition of their support we displayed a small poster for each dealer showing a little history and something about their specialties and reputations among serious daffodil growers. Lots of sale visitors were seen studying the posters, which, we hope, will lead to more sales for them.

Starters all sold out, one by noon Saturday, the others by noon Sunday.

'Lake Zurich 3 W-Y' BULB DONATED TO GARDEN CLUB OF LAKE ZURICH

Among the wonderful bulbs provided by Oakwood Daffodils for our sale was a single bulb of "Lake Zurich 3 W-Y (Evesham x Dayton Lake) Reed 2011." This bulb is not yet offered by Dr. John Reed. In the past, John, whose cultivars have often been given local or regional names, has asked for suggestions with a Chicago theme from our members. John went to medical school in Chicago and his father, who passed away only recently, lived just north of Chicago before moving to live with John and his wife, Sandy, near Niles, Michigan.

At our Annual Meeting we voted to give the bulb to the Garden Club of Lake Zurich, located in the northwest suburb. There are several mutual members of GCLZ and MDS.

The bulb was planted by the President of that Club and by George Dorner in the garden area at Ela Township Library which is tended by the Club. It would be ideal if we get the first photo of this cultivar for Daffseek from this bulb.

DAFFODILS AT THE BIG BOX STORES AND GARDEN CENTERS IN CHICAGO

Folks interested in daffodils can't avoid looking at whatever may be offered from their local bulb vendors. The selection seems to be getting more narrow and the prices higher, but there still are bargains if you are just looking for color in the yard. Occasionally, one finds show quality bulbs. Often the Pink Charm, or Cassata at \$5.88, wholesalers are the same for several outlets. I do a walk around each fall, both for my own interest and to assure that we are pricing bulbs for our sale correctly.

Walmart and Home Depot were similar this year. A dozen

Tahiti, Cheerfulness, Replete, or Red Devon were \$5 at Walmart and \$6 at Home Depot, where the bulbs carried Martha Stewart's name. (Last year they had Katie Heath at a great price, but this was not seen this year.) Walmart also had 14 Tete a Tete, Fortissimo, but one of the better garden centers had 25 Tete a Tete for \$9. The same center had 5 Flower Record, Sir Winston Churchill, Minnow, Jack Snipe, or Actaea, all great yard flowers which often take ribbons, for \$5.

Everyone had Dutch Masters and "King Alfred type" at pretty good prices for those looking at the lowest denominator yellow in their yard, but there weren't so many Ice Follies, the favorite of landscapers around here.

A growing trend was the offering of collections such as Hawera/Tete a Tete/Jack Snipe or Actaea/orange Cassini tulips. Finally, you could get 60 Mixed Unnamed for \$17 at Home Depot, but few to enter in our show in hopes of getting an ADS blue ribbon.
