. Welcome (at last!) to Oakwood Daffodils 29th annual listing of Midwestern grown, bred and acclimatized daffodil bulbs. It is appropriate that my new 2W-R **AT LAST** is in this list. Contributing to the lateness of this list is a total left knee replacement done late this winter. It was very successful but recuperation time was long. We have a new puppy, Rusty, a Goldendoodle, replacing our wonderful Cocker Spaniel and Scottish Terrier that finally lost their battles with cancer.

The annual Oakwood Bulb Dig was very successful with 20 rows now open for new seedling selections. I have tried to include more useful show flowers that have not been listed for some time now. These include scarce varieties from American breeders: Roese, Wheatly, Dietsch and Bender. Of special note this year is my first selection from LaPaloma x My Sweetheart, appropriately named for Oakwood's new sweetheart, Macilynn, Chrissy Wagoner's baby daughter.

TO HELP MAKE UP for my lateness, I will offer all purchases before July 15th at 10% off. We will continue to take orders up to shipping time but may not be able to supply all bulbs ordered after August 1st.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ORDERING

1. All orders must be received by **August 1, 2013** to be assured that bulbs will be available. **AFTER THAT DATE**, up until shipping has started, orders will be accepted and filled according to availability. You will receive an acknowledgment of your order as they are processed this year, either by e-mail or phone call, if we have your e-mail address or phone number.
2. Please make checks payable to: **OAKWOOD DAFFODILS**. If you sent money for your catalog, it will be credited to your account when you place an order. We are sorry that we had to do this, but due to rising costs of using them, we are unable to take any credit cards.
3. Bulbs will be shipped via USPS, unless otherwise specified, so please include your COMPLETE shipping address. We are basing our shipping charges on the cost of the USPS medium flat rate box. This has been our most common box size over the last few years. As usual, we always give gratis bulbs with your orders. For those smaller orders, we will give additional free bulbs to compensate for the additional shipping charge. If you have any concerns or problems with this please let us know. This is being done to simplify the shipping expenses to you. Overseas shipping will be billed at cost, plus the phytosanitary certificate and inspection costs.
4. Bulb shipments will hopefully be finished by the third week of September, sooner, if possible. Please specify if you require a particular shipping date.
5. Visitors are welcome, but please make arrangements ahead of time to avoid disappointment due to variation in bloom time or unfavorable weather.

6. You will receive information about planting and care for your bulbs with your order. Please note that they should be in a location that receives natural rainfall and that does not puddle up!
7. The format used in this catalog lists the Registered Daffodil name first. This is followed by the classification and color code, then the hybridizer and country of origin. After the description, the seed parent and the pollen parent are listed, then it's flowering time, and then the price for each bulb.

NEW INTRODUCTIONS for OAKWOOD DAFFODILS 2013

AT LAST 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This was the best selection from the crosses made from Fragrant Rose x Culmination. It was also the latest flowering and the slowest to increase here, hence the name. Bright red open cups show well against very white, wide, smooth, overlapping petals and the flowers face upwards. Fertile. A must for late shows. Was Reed 90-95-2.

CAPTAIN AMERICA 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Appropriately named for a super hero. Tall stems and wide petals are a foil for an amazing large deep red cup. It can be shown. Striking in the garden. Pollen is fertile and occasionally sets seed, too. See DaffSeek photos. Wind protection gives smoother, taller blooms the red color fades with time, especially in the sun. Was Reed 95-5-1.

CHICAGO GOLD COAST 1Y-Y

Named for the ritzy area of Lakeshore Drive in Chicago with very high priced apartments and homes. This flower is similar to Chicago Gold but slightly deeper in color and the petals are not as wide. Stock has increased enough to finally offer it. An excellent show flower of medium size. Was Reed 93-1-7.,

COPPER MINE 2O-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

When initially seen I was hard-pressed to code the petal color. Not a yellow but not a true red either. The flower has become bigger, stronger and brighter as the stock has grown. Still scarce but very desirable for show and breeding. Tall stems and Large flowers guide your eyes to it! Was Reed 97-104-1. Very few to go.

EDIE 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named for our wonderful daffodil helper, Edie Godfrey. She has been there to help, especially with sending out orders. Edie actually was at my bedside to help when I had a pulmonary embolism. This is my first very pure pink cup named from Lavender Hope. The stems are long, supporting pure pink cups against white overlapping petals. It is showable and fertile. This is the flower you want if you desire REAL, in this climate, pink color. Stock is still small. Was Reed 97-76-1.

HELEN'S MEMORY 3W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A beautiful flower with intense colors. It is hard to believe this came from Grace Note! Smooth flat, overlapping perianth segments display the brilliant yellow crinkled cup. Blooms can be quite large and all have strong stems with good necks. Was Reed 90-69-11.

HEAVEN'S GATE 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This daffodil is all about color. Flamboyant looking rose-red, narrow corona with an expanding circular edge giving it the appearance of a trumpet. See picture on DaffSeek. The petals are well formed and overlapping with strong stems supporting large blooms with good poise. Was Reed 95-115-1. Stock still small. Unique.

KOOP 1Y-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This small orange trumpet had a flag next to it after the 2008 ADS National Show bus trip visited after the 2008 Show. The flag said Koop because Dr. Koopowitz liked it and put his abbreviated name to it! The name stayed with it and was registered "Koop" in his honor. The flower is apparently an intermediate and vigorous. Quite smooth with over-lapping petals. May be a useful breeder? Stock is small yet. Was Reed 97-47-1.

LAKE SUPERIOR 1W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is the most consistent show quality flower 1W-Y that I have named so far. Shown twice, it has been a Rose Ribbon winner and a Best in Show. Lake Superior is the largest of the Great Lakes and this daffodil is so named! Alas, it has been a slow increaser but always smooth. Great colors, substance, smoothness, poise. See Tom Stettner's photo on DaffSeek. Fertile both ways. Price is high, reflecting its scarceness and desirability. Only 3 to go this year. Was Reed 98-26-16.

LEMON DREAM 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA) Name pending registration.

A beautifully smooth show bloom. Medium sized. Healthy. Increase slower than the average, overlapping petals with lovely form. Its color is a "Lemon Dream". 1993 cross.

MACILYNN 3W-YYR (Dr. John Reed, USA)

It seemed logical to cross the vigorous and colorful My Sweetheart with LaPaloma. This is possibly the best all-around show flower of the seven selections kept. It is named for Oakwood's own sweetheart Chrissy Wagoner's little baby. This is a vigorous grower and increaser! Was Reed 95-34-2.

MEMORIAL DAY 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named in honor of the Memorial Day daffodil dig that has become a tradition here, sharing our unwanted bulbs with the daffodil clubs in exchange for digging them. A late smooth, large, pink with excellent vigor increase and show quality. Blooms held on strong stems. Was Reed 90-75-3.

MIGHTY MITE 1YYG-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Many hundreds of seedlings were raised from this cross giving standard sized blooms and smaller intermediate ones. This has been the best show intermediate yellow trumpet I have raised, albeit increase has been slow. The plants have been healthy and fertile both ways. See the photo on DaffSeek. Very limited stock, only 3 to go. Was Reed 2010 selection #5.

PEACEFUL HOLLOW 6Y-O (Dr. John Reed, USA) Name pending registration.

A sibling to Wayne's World. It has drawn praise from several ADS judges. Smooth and well-formed but slightly larger than Wayne's World. Also slow growing! Well swept-back petals sport an orange, medium length corona. Stock is small. Was Reed 84-49-2.

Monal x N. cyclamineus **Early Season** **\$ 24.00**

PINK SUN 2Y-P (Charles, Wheatly, USA)

Rarely seen, I now have enough of this distinctive show flower to offer it. The best yellow-pink from Charles. It has excellent petals, smooth, overlapping and almost touching showing off a deep pink trumpet shaped, large cup. Stems are strong and poise is excellent. Colors vary with the prevailing weather, especially moisture. An excellent breeder for me. Was Wheatly 87-150-2.

Troupial x Dailmanich ?? **Midseason** **\$ 24.00**

RAMALLAH 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Every bloom is fit to show. The blooms show just above the leaf tips with lasting power on the stem. Chosen to honor a fellow physician, Dr. Salous from Palestine. This is the name of his home town. Well balanced, pleasant show blooms. See photo on Daffnet from the Chicago 2013 show. Was Reed 93-1-23.

Celtic Gold x Dream Prince **Early Midseason** **\$ 24.00**

SMOOTH TRUMPET 1W-Y (Charles, Wheatly, USA)

Its name says it all. The wide, white, overlapping petals are very smooth. The light-yellow trumpet is long and elegantly shaped. Poise, stem and neck are excellent. It is still very rare. I have been building up my stock for over 10 years. A show flower of the highest caliber. Small stock.

Dave Sheppard and I formed a close friendship when we met at my first ADS Convention in 1977. After visiting Oakwood he offered me a Bill Pannill seedling that he felt would be of value in my breeding program. I was shocked to see the intense red color in its trumpet-shaped corona. I wondered if I could stretch that red corona to a full trumpet with breeding and I did. The color of the first seedlings were amazing including one with a copper-tone perianth and a deep red trumpet. This Pannill seedling started an American Revolution in my breeding of orange trumpets. From the cross that gave American Hero, this daffodil is not formal enough for show but it beckons you with its intense color and tall stems, attracting people like a candy man does. Breeding intense color! Was Reed 89-50-2. Stock is still small.

I could not take my eyes off this when it first flowered. While smaller than average its petals were a uniform shade of light orange. I could see no yellow in the petals with my eyes. This is not a suffusion or a sheen. While this is not a top show flower, it is showable at its best. It is a real color break and its color is being passed on to its seedlings which are of a higher quality, too! Was seedling 96-18-1.

CARROT TOP 2W-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This zany name was chosen by Gerard Kneehans who was impressed with it in his Missouri garden. The long corona has a moderate orange color that intensifies as it ages hence the name. The petals overlap well but are a bit rough and the stems arch as it ages. Healthy and a good grower/seeder. Breeding 1W-Os. Smaller blooms will measure division one. Was Reed 80-129-1.

CASSOPOLIS 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Probably my best 2Y-R, this is a well-engineered daffodil with an exemplary smooth very flat wide perianth supported by a strong stem and neck. A row of blooms is almost military-like in their bearing. Alas, the deep colored cylinder-like cup burns easily and needs protection for show. It can flush the petals with red at times. Named for a local Michigan town where I have purchased my Ford trucks. Was Reed seedling 82-200-3.

CEDAR HILLS 3W-GYY (Mitsch & Havens, USA)

This sets the standard for beauty and quality in the late division threes. A show and garden flower of the highest caliber. Tall stems support the large flowers with excellent poise.

CELESTIAL FLAME 2W-GRR (Dr. John Reed, USA)

When this first flowered it looked like a gift from heaven with its smooth, pure, white, overlapping, perianth segments, in a perfect plane, and a cup of intense, bright red that develops its color over a day or two. Its form and vigor are inherited from Quasar and the refinement from Refrain. This was my best show quality 2W-R until I flowered seedlings from it. It is now producing most of my best show 2W-Rs, including Red Passion.

This smaller 1Y-Y, possibly an intermediate has consistently given superb well-formed yellow flowers while being down for 8 years. It has freely open pollinated every year! Perhaps because the bees like it so well, too? This is from the reciprocal cross of Millennium Perfection. Stock is still small. Was Seedling 87-40-2.

CHANGING DAY 1Y-R Dr. John Reed, USA

An outstanding advance in yellow-red show quality trumpets. When it first flowered I knew it was a "Changing Day" in my breeding of red trumpets. Its perianth form is always superb and the colors are usually excellent. Bred from 2 seedlings chosen for color and form. See photo on DaffSeek. Was seedling 98-105-1. Few to go this year.

The flowers are smaller than average. I find myself staring at it when I walk by it, even when the flowers are gone! Named in honor of the helpful members of the Chicago Daffodil Society. Stock is still small. Was Reed 93-1-2.

CHICAGO HOPE 1Y-GYY (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The name says it all. Besides using the famous TV show's title, I had hoped that it would win the Rose Ribbon when shown some years ago in Chicago. But that honor went to a sibling of Haunting. It is a well-balanced, medium sized, smooth yellow trumpet capable of giving superb blooms. The smooth overlapping wide petals were inherited from Dream Prince and the vigor imparted from Golden Jewel. Proving to be a very good breeder, too. Was Reed 85-7-2. Few available.

COLOMA 1Y-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Dave Karnstedt made this cross for me while visiting in 1993 using my entire stock of Memento. I was stuck working in the emergency room that weekend. By using Memento as the seed parent, its stem stayed longer. This is the most consistent of all the clones saved. It has large flowers with tall stems, excellent poise, and smooth overlapping petals. The colors are medium in most season, but can be intense occasionally. It is taller and earlier here than American Dream. Was seedling 93-9-4. Named for the small Michigan town north of us where our tax accountant lives.

COMMODORE PERRY 1W-GPP (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Such a perfect flower had to be near the highest level in the chain-of-command. An American hero with a great American daffodil named for him. While of smaller size it is almost perfect, with a flat smooth overlapping perianth and a light pink evenly expanded trumpet. One of the down under breeders, after seeing the photo (shown in our ADS ad) said that it must be the most perfect 1W-P in the world. Bred from a flower John Lea was using in his pink trumpet program, crossed with the best of Jackson's pinks at the time. A marriage made in daffodil heaven and a flower either breeder would be proud to claim. Thank you John and David! Was Reed 87-70-1.

ENERGIZER 2O-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Early in my breeding I was determined to improve the all orange-red daffodils by breeding and selecting for more color intensity and color "fastness" as they flower here. My early seedlings and those of Brian Duncan's from Altruist would only show a deep perianth color in the best of seasons and none ever showed the intensity that Gypsy or Fiery Flame did in Oregon. Only two selections were kept from this intensely "hot" cross and this one has demonstrated the best combination of form and color resistance here. Hopefully its name says it all. Like the little pink bunny with its beating drums it will energize your spring garden, show table and breeding program. Increase has been slow. Was Reed Seedling 87-6-2.

EVESHAM 3W-GYY (John Lea, England)

A sibling to Dunley Hall, its stem is taller and the cup a lighter yellow. Many times it has won Best in Show , but seldom seen nor offered now. See photos on DaffSeek. Makes small bulbs. Excellent breeder, too.

A fine show flower and breeder from New Zealand. Limited stock.

My first 6W-Q. Short cupped and color variable but good in recent years. Was seedling 81-23-1.

FLAMING JEWEL 3W-R (David Bell NZ)

Very consistent with lovely blooms. Healthy. One of David's best grown here. Very limited stock.

Masquerade x Arbar Late Midseason \$ 9.00

FLAMING SILK 1W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

It seemed logical to cross Pink Silk and Magician to get a 1W-R. This is the only one in two cross attempts that measured division 1. The cross was made both ways, too. Magician gave the best flowers as a seed parent. Its color is not the ultimate nor is it consistent, but it is a very good starting point. Strong tall stems support large flowers of show quality with an excellent poise. The bulbs are healthy and it is fertile both ways. ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY'S SYSTEM OF DAFFODIL CLASSIFICATION

The classification of daffodils has changed many times over the years. The present system combines the RHS classification of thirteen divisions based on form and species heritage with Dr. Throckmorton's color coding from the American Daffodil Society. This combined system gives us a very useful tool for describing daffodils quickly. A single letter denotes a color and its appropriate location as found in the flower, first in the perianth and then in the corona. W=White Y=Yellow G=Green O=Orange R=Red P=Pink For example: Arctic Gold is classified as a 1Y-Y. It is a trumpet daffodil with yellow petals and a yellow corona. Misty Glen is classified as a 2W-GWW. It is a large-cupped daffodil with white petals and a green-eyed white cup. First Born is a cyclamineus hybrid with swept-back, yellow petals and the corona has a greenish eye with a small transition of light yellow going to a deep pink color extending to the edge of the cup. In otherwords, it is a 6Y-GYP.

| Division 1 | Trumpet Daffodils: The trumpet (corona) is equal to, or longer than, the petal (perianth) segments. |
| Division 2 | Large Cup: The cup (corona) is less than the length of the petals (perianth) but more than a third. |
| Division 3 | Small Cup: The cup (corona) is equal to, or less than a third, of the petal (perianth) length. |
| Division 4 | Double Daffodils: This division is for all forms of double flowers. |
| Division 5 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. triandrus</i> characteristics. |
| Division 6 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. cyclamineus</i> characteristics. |
| Division 7 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. jonquilla</i> characteristics. |
| Division 8 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. tazetta</i> characteristics. The stems usually will have multiple flowers. |
| Division 9 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. poeticus</i> characteristics. |
| Division 10 | All Species and Wild forms. |
| Division 11 | Daffodils with the cup (corona) that is split for more than a half of its length. This division has two subdivisions: |
| Division 11a | Collar Daffodils have the corona segments parallel to the perianth segments. |
| Division 11b | Papillion Daffodils have the corona segments project outwards from the perianth segments, usually in a whorl-shaped arrangement. |
| Division 12 | Daffodils that cannot be classified within the preceding divisions. |
| Division 13 | Daffodils distinguished solely by botanical name. |

ANIMAL CRACKERS 2YYW-WWY (Larry Wier, USA)

This name was chosen from the Marx Brothers as only they would mix sweets and liquor, the parents of this beautiful bloom. The perianth segments are very round and large. The medium sized cup expands slightly to the mouth where it is flanged. As with most reverses, it opens all yellow and takes time to mature with the small yellow rim. A show flower. Was seedling 88-2. Resists rot well so far.
