

A GREETING from OAKWOOD:**MARCH 2014**

Welcome to Oakwood's 30th Annual Listing of Midwestern grown, bred and acclimatized daffodil bulbs. We have 20 acres of daffodils containing the largest collection of named and seedling daffodils in the United States, possibly the world. Bulbs have been imported from almost every breeder of note and I have 6 years of seedlings yet to bloom from my own breeding.

You will find some scarce cultivars returning, such as WOW! and Windy City. New second generation cultivars such as Easy Lover, Halogen and Shipshewana are being offered for the first time. They represent specific improvements that I have been breeding and selecting for this climate! Green and brownish cups are being offered for the first time this year. Not only are they beautiful and unique, they are passing these traits on to their offspring.

After the longest winter and second coldest winter on record (you should see our heating oil bills!), we are ready for spring! Even our puppy Rusty is getting doggie "cabin fever". My second total knee operation and my wife's courageous battle with a crippling neuromuscular disease since September has left us ready for spring and the daffodils blooming. While I write this the National ADS Daffodil Show is on in Arkansas and the last of our snow is about ready to melt.

Besides this catalog there is a shorter listing of Oakwood Daffodils now available on E-commerce, offered by the Botanical Trading Company through Juergen Steiniger. This is an attempt to continue the availability of American bred daffodils and others that might be lost if not made available as I wind down the volume of the bulbs grown and attempt to continue breeding on my existing cultivars, and areas I have not attempted before. If you go to Bloom-It.com you will find a small listing offered this year. As more stocks find their way to their East Coast growing fields. Please try the Bloom-It.com and help make this American Venture successful as Juergen has already done with the Hollingsworth Peonies that he had taken over.

While no new registrations were made in 2013, this will be rectified this year. Look for our advertisements in the June ADS Journal and we will make available a paper listing for those needing it. In the mean time you can request this list at

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ORDERING

1. All orders must be received by **July1, 2014** to be assured that bulbs will be available. **AFTER THAT DATE**, up until shipping has started, orders will be accepted and filled according to availability. You will receive an acknowledgment of your order as they are processed this year, either by e-mail or phone call, if we have your e-mail address or phone number.
 2. Please make checks payable to: **OAKWOOD DAFFODILS**. We are sorry that we had to do this, but due to rising costs of using them, we are unable to take any credit cards.
 3. Bulbs will be shipped via USPS, unless otherwise specified, so please include your COMPLETE shipping address. We are basing our shipping charges on the cost of the USPS medium flat rate box. This has been our most common box size over the last few years. As usual, we always give gratis bulbs with your orders. For those smaller orders, we will give additional free bulbs to compensate for the additional shipping charge. If you have any concerns or problems with this please let us know. This is being done to simplify the shipping expenses to you. Overseas shipping will be billed at cost, plus the phytosanitary certificate and inspection costs.
 4. Bulb shipments will hopefully be finished by the third week of September, sooner, if possible. Please specify if you require a particular shipping date.
 5. Visitors are welcome, but please make arrangements ahead of time to avoid disappointment due to variation in bloom time or unfavorable weather.

6. You will receive information about planting and care for your bulbs with your order. Please note that they should be in a location that receives natural rainfall and that does not puddle up!
 7. The format used in this catalog lists the Registered Daffodil name first. This is followed by the classification and color code, then the hybridizer and country of origin. After the description, the seed parent and the pollen parent are listed, then it's flowering time, and then the price for each bulb.

AMERICAN COWBOY 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Peter Ramsay and I made this cross at about the same time. This is probably the best early well-formed and colored show flower that I selected from the cross. It can be seen on DaffSeek. Was seedling 98-1-1.

Cowboy x Loch Lundie **Early season** **\$ 50.00**

DENNIS DAILY 2O-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named for our Oakwood guest, a major figure in the Minnesota Daffodil Society until his untimely death in 2012. Bred to put a color-fastness gene into Sabine Hay. A large round flower that needs protection for its best color. Potential breeder. Was seedling number 87-9-1. NAME PENDING.

Spelter x Sabine Hay **Midseason** **\$ 18.00**

EASY LOVER 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The best Pink that I have raised so far for my tastes. Large very overlapping petals and strong stems. The name says it all as it is easy to fall in love with it. Very smooth. An outstanding show flower. Stock is small. Was seedling 2000-135-1.

Millennium Pink x 95-255-1 [(Artic Char x Dear Me) x Obsession]
Midseason **\$ 50.00**

GREEN HEART 2W-GWW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A beautiful green-eyed flower that has given me the best of my green-eyed daffodils. Was Reed Seedling 85-26-4. NAME PENDING.

Angel x Misty Glen **Late Midseason** **\$ 18.00**

GREEN SPICE 3W-G (Dr. John Reed, USA)

While not a pure green (It has some orange tinges, it has faithfully flowered every year with it clearly chartreuse colored cup. Fertile both ways. It is now giving me my second generation seedlings with different variations of green colored cups. Very good show quality and strong, tall stems. Was seedling 98-125-1.

Irish Mint x Green Heart **Late season** **\$ 50.00.**

HALOGEN 2Y-W (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is the best, brightly contrasted, large cup reverse bicolor that I have raised. It takes several days to develop its intense, luminous color. The DaffSeek photos speak loudly for themselves. Fertile both ways. Was Reed Seedling 98-180-1.

Impressive Dream x Altuna Ha **Midseason** **\$ 50.00**

ICED TEA 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A rare color break, I consider this the first of my honey-brown cups from pink breeding. Tall vigorous with smooth blooms of great show quality. Late. Nothing else like it yet. Fertile both ways. Slower growing. Was Reed seedling 95-19-1.

Valinor x Verran Rose **Late Midseason** **\$ 60.00**

JOHN EMMETT 2Y-O (Clive Postles, ENG)

This sibling to Cutting Edge has never been listed to my knowledge. It is bigger, more vigorous and a far superior flower., alas, just short of a trumpet. See DaffSeek. It has suffered with some rot here but far less than its parent and sibling. Recommend for the highest level of showing and breeding. Only a few to go for now. Was Postles Seedling 1-27-89.

Lea 1-14-76 x Hampton Court **Midseason** **\$ 70.00**

LIKE IT 3W-YYR (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is the second cultivar to be named from this cross. All are distinctive, strong growers and show flowers. More intense color than Macilynn and wider petals. The name was given by Mike Berrigan on observing it. Was Reed Seedling 95-34-3. NAME PENDING.

LaPaloma x My Sweetheart **Midseason** **\$ 30.00**

MY COLLEEN 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named for my wife Sandy, using her middle name. It is tall, vigorous and well colored in this climate. The flowers are on strong stems, very smooth and of trumpet character. The perianth is not as wide as I want it. Very fertile and healthy. Was Reed Seedling 98-101-1.

89-28-4 (Dear Me x Pink Wax) x 84-137-10 (Dear me x Magician)
Early Midseason **\$ 35.00**

NEW KID 3W-YJR (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The third selection from this good cross to be named. Again given by Mike Berrigan who seems to really like these siblings. Distinctive from the others but well colored and strong grower. Was Reed Seedling 95-34-2. NAME PENDING.

LaPaloma x My Sweetheart **Midseason** **\$ 30.00**

SHIPSHEWANA 3Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

One of the next generation from Haunting to be named. It is a very strong growing quality show flower. Very smooth. Every bloom is fit to show and also grows well in the garden. Named for a local Amish community in Indiana. Was Reed Seedling 99-24-2.

Getaway x Haunting **Late Midseason** **\$ 40.00**

SITTING BULL 1Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

When I first saw this in flower, I could hardly believe its parentage. It was the best well-colored red show trumpet I had seen here. It makes a smaller bulb but increases well. Named for an American Indian that stayed on the yard of my grandmother Rough's sod hut when she was a little girl after the Oklahoma Land Rush. Stock is small. See DaffSeek for photo. Was Reed Seedling 2001-54-1.

Uncle Duncan x American Revolution **Midseason** **\$ 70.00**

OAKWOOD's GENERAL LISTING**AL LAUREYS 3Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)**

This is the finest deeply colored small cupped 3Y-R I have flowered. Of smaller size, the smooth flat perianth segments are positioned in the same plane with excellent poise. Named for Al Laurey's a friend that helped me so much with the daffodils for 10 years. Al was always there when I needed him. Though of slight build his heart was huge and the best! Was Reed 92-106-1. Stock is still small but growing well.

Sabine Silk x ? **Late Midseason** **\$ 25.00**

AMAZING GRACE 2W-P (B S Duncan, N IRE)

One of Brian's better large pinks. A consistent show flower.

Naivasha x Tyrian Rose **Midseason** **\$ 6.00**

AMERICAN GOLD 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A tall, robust, smooth yellow trumpet that shouts out that it is the best. Named for the Gold Medals won by American athletes in the last Olympics. Outstanding poise, overlap, smoothness, color and size make it easy to identify in the field. Was Reed 93-1-23.

Celtic Gold x Dream Prince **Early Season** **\$ 18.00**

AMERICAN HERO 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

9-11 and since has shown us the patriotism that our fire, police, medics and military give to our country and us on a daily basis. This flower is a bold statement of appreciation for their sacrifices. A truly unique daffodil with tall stems, large flowers with a long corona of dramatic coloring and poise. It is marvelous to view in a well-grown clump. For show and Garden. (I wish it could flower on the Fourth of July, too). Simply breath-taking! Was Reed 89-50-1.

Culmination x Ruby Red **Late Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

AMERICAN IDOL 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is that most vigorous selection from the cross of Quasar and Culmination. It is very healthy, free flowering with large flowers are displayed on tall strong stems. With its wide smooth flat perianth, it can be shown and is marvelous in the garden too. Was Reed 93-10-4.

Quasar x Culmination **Early Midseason** **\$ 13.00**

AMERICAN POSSUM 3W-WPP (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is the breeder for my best division 3W-Ps and 3W-Rs. It is from the same cross as Harold Cross's "Possum". It has a bigger flower and more rounded form in its perianth and cup. It transmits that form and the cups are always a true division three. It has generated deep pinks and intense carmine-red cups. Alas, it is a slow grower but healthy. Few to go yet. It was Reed Seedling 86-10-1.

Kerstin x Cascade **Late Midseason** **\$ 18.00**

AMERICAN REVOLUTION 2Y-R (Bill Pannill, USA)

Dave Sheppard and I formed a close friendship when we met at my first ADS Convention in 1977. After visiting Oakwood he offered me a Bill Pannill seedling that he felt would be of value in my breeding program. I was shocked to see the intense red color in its trumpet-shaped corona. I wondered if I could stretch that red corona to a full trumpet with breeding and I did. The color of the first seedlings were amazing including one with a copper-tone perianth and a deep red trumpet. This Pannill seedling started an American Revolution in my breeding of orange trumpets. A striking flower for garden and breeding. Named with the permission of Bill Pannill. Was Pannill XX351

Uncle Remis x Javelin **Midseason** **\$ 5.00**

AMERICAN SHOWGIRL 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A well-poised, tall, very smooth show flower. Considered my best show pink by many ADS Judges. Very healthy and a strong grower. Was Reed seedling 90-95-1.

Fragrant Rose x Culmination **Late Midseason** **\$ 10.00**

ARLEY KINGS 2W-GWW (J S B Lea, UK)

An excellent tall white show flower with smooth, chalky white petals and corona. It is vigorous and dependable here.

Misty Glen x Croila **Midseason** **\$ 4.00**

ASHTON WOLD 2W-W (John Pearson, ENG)

Many show awards in the UK. Beautiful flowers.

Stoke Charity x Panache **Midseason** **\$ 6.00**

AT LAST 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This was the best selection from the crosses made from Fragrant Rose x Culmination. It was also the latest flowering and the slowest to increase here, hence the name. Bright red open cups show well against very white, wide, smooth, overlapping petals and the flowers face upwards. Fertile. A must for late shows. Was Reed 90-95-2.

Fragrant Rose x Culmination **Late Season** **\$ 48.00**

BACK FLASH 2W-YYO (Dr. John Reed, USA)

An excellent flower for show and garden. Vigorous. It may exhibit an orange rim at times. Was Reed 81-21-1.

Green Island x Flash Affair **Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

BANKER 2Y-O (David Jackson, TAS)

Consistently one of the most outstanding daffodils with many Best in Show awards. The corona is usually more often a deep golden color than orange as it grows here. The petals are very smooth and overlapping with the entire flower being held upright with a strong stem.

Scipio x Seedling **Midseason** **\$ 11.00**

BARNESGOLD 1Y-Y (B S Duncan, N IRE)

I prefer this of all of Brian's yellow trumpets. It is the parent of my best dark gold trumpet to date. Tall stems support rounded flowers with excellent poise.

Golden Jewel x Midas Touch **Late Midseason** **\$ 7.00**

BERCEUSE 2W-P (G. Mitsch, USA)

For show and a fine garden plant. A strong grower and floriferous.

Melody Lane x Rose Caprice) x (Carita x Accent)
Midseason **\$ 5.00**

BERTRAND GOLD 2Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Three selections from this cross were kept and the others given away. The first selection was Pacific Gold and the slowest increaser. This one is the best increaser and was admired by several judges when visiting Oakwood. "Gorgeous" was written on its flag by one of them. Tall, strong stems with flowers of great show form that are very smooth and looks up at you. Was Reed 84-5-5. It is interesting to note that Peter Ramsey's best 2Y-Y to date is from the reciprocal cross! And Eddy Jarmon's RHS award winner Happy Valley 2Y-Y is from the same cross, too.

Golden Jewel x Gold Convention **Early Midseason** **\$ 6.00**

BIG MO 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The finest flower from a prolific small cross. Very smooth, large blooms verging on a subtle shade of orange as the flowers age. It has had good reviews from Ohio and New Zealand, too. Named for my father, M.O. Reed (Mo) and the greatest United States battleship, The USS Missouri. A top quality show bloom. A slower increaser than its sibling Dr. David Hough. Stock is still small. Was Reed 83-40-1.

Gold Bullion x Gold Convention **Midseason** **\$ 10.00**

BRIER GLASS 2W-GWW (John Lea, UK)

A very white round early show flower. Parent of David Adams for Charles Wheatley.

Ashmore x Croila **Early Midseason** **\$ 4.00**

BROOMHILL 2W-W (FE Board, ENG)

Rarely offered this smooth, early, large cup is an outstanding show flower and breeder.

Easter Moon x Knowhead **Early** **\$ 4.00**

BUCHANAN 6W-GWW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A lovely early all-white for show and garden. While it changes colors, it usually can be shown as an all-white. Named for the Michigan town that I first practiced in. Stock is still small, a slow increaser, but healthy. Was Reed 84-101-2

Broomhill x N. cyclamineus **Early Season** **\$ 10.00**

BURNING BUSH 3Y-R (Brian Duncan, No IRE)

A truly outstanding daffodil for the garden and show. Intense colors and long stems make it a standout. Proving to be a good parent and an excellent show flower. Makes smaller bulbs. My favorite Brian Duncan daffodil.

(Rockhill x Bunclody) x (Altruist x Ulster Bank) **Late Midseason** **\$ 5.00**

BUTLER UNIVERSITY 3Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Considered one of my best 3Y-Rs. It has **tall, strong** stems with excellent large show flowers. They are smooth with heavy substance and excellent poise. Was Reed 92-80-2.

Kinsman x Suntory **Midseason** **\$ 14.00**

BUTTER SILK 2Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

I was taken by this flower's bright yellow color and extreme petal smoothness when I first saw it, hence the name. It has excellent petal overlap and a strong medium length stem. Admired by Larry Weir last year at his place. It is giving excellent seedlings including my best ever pale 1Y-Y for show. Was seedling 92-22-1.

Camelot x Dream Prince **Early Midseason** **\$ 13.00**

CABERNET 2W-GPP (Brian S Duncan, No IRE)

A seldom seen show flower with an unusual deeper shade of pink. It is breeding orange-pinks for me.

Fragrant Rose x Pol Dornie **Late Midseason** **\$ 5.00**

CAMEO GOSSIP 2Y-R (ME [Spud] Brogden, NZ)

Tall vigorous colorful. Can be shown at times. Limited Stock.

Red Cameo x Kiwi Gossip **Midseason** **\$ 5.00**

CAMEO KING 2W-W (Peter Ramsey, New Zealand)

One of Peter's finest whites for show with great vigor and tall stems. See DaffSeek photo. Small stock.

Cool Crystal x Immaculate **Late Season** **\$ 6.00**

CANTICLE 9W-GYR (Ballydorn Bulb Farm, No IRE)

Excellent poet for show and garden. Very smooth and consistent.

Cantabile x ? **Late Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

CANDY BAR 2W-YOO (Colin Crotty, NZ)

One of Colin Crotty's most vigorous seedlings growing here. I love it! The stems are strong and support very smooth, outfacing blooms with bowl-shaped corona.

?? **Very Late Midseason Here** **\$ 5.00**

CANDY MAN 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From the cross that gave American Hero, this daffodil is not formal enough for show but it beckons you with its intense color and tall stems, attracting people like a candy man does. Breeding intense color! Was Reed 89-50-2. Stock is still small.

Culmination x Ruby Red **Late Season** **\$ 10.00**

CAPTAIN AMERICA 2W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Appropriately named for a super hero. Tall stems and wide petals are a foil for an amazing large deep red cup. It can be shown. Striking in the garden. Pollen is fertile and occasionally sets seed, too. See DaffSeek photos. Wind protection gives smoother, taller blooms the red color fades with time, especially in the sun. Was Reed 95-5-1.

Cordial x Magician **Midseason** **\$ 50.00**

CARROT JUICE 1O-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

I could not take my eyes off this when it first flowered. While smaller than average its petals were a uniform shade of light orange. I could see no yellow in the petals with my eyes. This is not a suffusion or a sheen. While this is not a top show flower, it is showable at its best. It is a real color break and its color is being passed on to its seedlings which are of a higher quality, too! Was seedling 96-18-1.

78-17-3N (Trumpet Call x Orange Way) x 82-108-4 (Zuni x Glenfarclas)

Early Midseason

CARROT TOP 2W-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This zany name was chosen by Gerard Knehans who was impressed with it in his Missouri garden. The long corona has a moderate orange color that intensifies as it ages hence the name. The petals overlap well but are a bit rough and the stems arch as it ages. Healthy and a good grower/seeder. Breeding 1W-Os. Smaller blooms will measure division one. Was Reed 80-129-1.

CASSOPOLIS 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Probably my best 2Y-R, this is a well-engineered daffodil with an exemplary smooth very flat wide perianth supported by a strong stem and neck. A row of blooms is almost military-like in their bearing. Alas, the deep colored cylinder-like cup burns easily and needs protection for show. It can flush the petals with red at times. Named for a local Michigan town where I have purchased my Ford trucks. Was Reed seedling 82-200-3.

(Air Marshall x Caracas) x Creagh Dubh

Early Midseason

CEDAR HILLS 3W-GYY (Mitsch & Havens, USA)

This sets the standard for beauty and quality in the late division threes. A show and garden flower of the highest caliber. Tall stems support the large flowers with excellent poise.

Impala x Green Hills

Very Late Season

CELTIC PRINCE 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This smaller 1Y-Y, possibly an intermediate has consistently given superb well-formed yellow flowers while being down for 8 years. It has freely open pollinated every year! Perhaps because the bees like it so well, too? This is from the reciprocal cross of Millennium Perfection. Stock is still small. Was Seedling 87-40-2.

Dream Prince x Celtic Gold

CHANGING DAY 1Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

An outstanding advance in yellow-red show quality trumpets. When it first flowered I knew it was a "Changing Day" in my breeding of red trumpets. Its perianth form is always superb and the colors are usually excellent. Bred from 2 seedlings chosen for color and form. See photo on DaffSeek. Was seedling 98-105-1. Few to go this year.

Turk x 89-122-5 [Glenfarclas x 81-7-1 (Vulcan x Sutton Court)]

Early Midseason

CHARLIE CONNOR 1Y-O (John Pearson, ENG)

A very smooth show bloom. Its color has been variable here but great in the UK! Scarce. Fertile both ways.

Glenfarclas x Uncle Duncan

CHICAGO GOLD 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The original label states Ultra Smooth and Deep Gold. It has consistently done this since its first flowering here. Of the highest quality for exhibition, and also for the garden and breeding. The flowers are smaller than average. I find myself staring at it when I walk by it, even when the flowers are gone! Named in honor of the helpful members of the Chicago Daffodil Society. Stock is still small. Was Reed 93-1-2.

Celtic Gold x Dream Prince

CHICAGO GOLD COAST 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named for the ritzy area of Lakeshore Drive in Chicago with very high priced apartments and homes. This flower is similar to Chicago Gold but slightly deeper in color and the petals are not as wide. Stock has increased enough to finally offer it. An excellent show flower of medium size. Was Reed 93-1-7.,

Celtic Gold x Dream Prince

CHICAGO HOPE 1Y-GYY (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The name says it all. Besides using the famous TV show's title, I had hoped that it would win the Rose Ribbon when shown some years ago in Chicago. But that honor went to a sibling of Haunting. It is a well-balanced, medium sized, smooth yellow trumpet capable of giving superb blooms. The smooth overlapping wide petals were inherited from Dream Prince and the vigor imparted from Golden Jewel. Proving to be a very good breeder, too. Was Reed 85-7-2.

Golden Jewel x Dream Prince **Early Midseason** **\$ 9.00**

CHILOQUIN 1Y-W (Grant Mitsch, USA)

A vigorous show bloom that does well in the garden. Floriferous.

Bethany or Limeade o.p. **Midseason** **\$ 4.00**

CHIQUITA 2W-GPP (Murray Evans, USA)

Almost a division 3. This has given me many fine flowers and interesting colors. A great breeder for color. DaffSeek. ADS Classic.

(Interim x Green Island) x Caro Nome **Late Season** **\$ 4.00**

CINNAMON RING 3W-WWO (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A more refined sibling of my sweetheart with more subtle coloring. Tall strong stems support the smooth show flower well. Protect the flower's rim for show. Was Reed 81-197-8.

Hampstead op **Midseason** **\$ 7.00**

CLOUDED YELLOW 2YYW-Y (John Pearson, ENG)

This amazing flower has won many best in show awards for its form and draws attention because of its unusual shadings. Nice. Very Scarce. Was John Pearson's Seedling 81-14-F1.

[(Camelot x Daydream) x Cool Shade] **Midseason** **\$ 9.00**

COCKATIEL 2W-WPW (Grant Mitsch, USA)

A most startling flower when first seen in Grant's flower garage. Nothing else like it. Can be shown. Scarce.

Precedent x (Caro Nome x Carita) **Midseason** **\$ 5.00**

COLOMA 1Y-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Dave Karnstedt made this cross for me while visiting in 1993 using my entire stock of Memento. I was stuck working in the emergency room that weekend. By using Memento as the seed parent, its stem stayed longer. This is the most consistent of all the clones saved. It has large flowers with tall stems, excellent poise, and smooth overlapping petals. The colors are medium in most season, but can be intense occasionally. It is taller and earlier here than American Dream. Was seedling 93-9-4. Named for the small Michigan town north of us where our tax accountant lives.

Memento x Magician **Early Midseason** **\$18.00**

COMMODORE PERRY 1W-GPP (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Such a perfect flower had to be near the highest level in the chain-of-command. An American hero with a great American daffodil named for him. While of smaller size it is almost perfect, with a flat smooth overlapping perianth and a light pink evenly expanded trumpet. One of the down under breeders, after seeing the photo (shown in our ADS ad) said that it must be the most perfect 1W-P in the world. Bred from a flower John Lea was using in his pink trumpet program, crossed with the best of Jackson's pinks at the time. A marriage made in daffodil heaven and a flower either breeder would be proud to claim. Thank you John and David! Was Reed 87-70-1.

Lea 1-19-66 x Obsession **Early Midseason** **\$ 18.00**

CONQUEST 2W-O (GWE Brogdon, NZ)

An excellent strong growing bloom for show, garden and breeding. Scarce.

Parentage ?? **Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

COPPER MINE 2O-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

When initially seen I was hard-pressed to code the petal color. Not a yellow but not a true red either. The flower has become bigger, stronger and brighter as the stock as grown. Still scarce but very desirable for show and breeding. Tall stems and large flowers guide your eyes to it! Was Reed 97-104-1. Very few to go.

Cowboy x Burning Bush **Midseason** **\$ 75.00**

COPPERFIELD 2Y-Y (R & E Havens, USA)

The colors are variable but it can have an orange hue to the corona and buffy colored petals.

Paracutin x Daydream **Midseason** **\$ 4.00**

CREATION 1W-W (G E Mitsch, USA)

This is the most vigorous non-rotting early show quality white trumpet here. The trumpet is flanged and the flower is fertile.
(Trousseau x Paradise) x (Seedling A39/1 x Panache)

Early Season \$ 6.00

CROWN GOLD 2W-O (R & E Havens, USA)

Sun proof for garden, show and breeding. It has given me white-orange and white-yellow trumpets.

Gold Crown x Paricutin Midseason \$ 4.00

DAILMYSTIC 2W-P (Brian Duncan, N IRE)

Smooth show flower with a pale lavender cup color.

Dailmanach x Cryptic Midseason \$ 8.00

DAVE'S FAVORITE 2Y-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Dave Karnstedt was very fussy about the daffodils that he liked. They needed to point high and be aesthetically beautiful. In other words, approaching perfection! This late 2Y-O is one such flower that Dave seemed to really admire during one of his visits to Oakwood, hence the name. I wish it was more highly colored and have bred it with Burning Bush in hopes of that end. A very high quality show flower. Was Reed 84-142-1.

Safari x Bunclody Late Midseason \$ 5.00

DAYTON LAKE 2W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From an early cross to improve Festivity, this selection was kept. Almost every bloom can go to show. The strong stem has a short neck with upward poise that displays a white perianth, which is very flat and smooth with no incurving. The pleasing mid-yellow cup does not stain the perianth. Fertile both ways. Can be unbelievably good in some years. Was Reed 79-165-1.

Festivity x Easter Moon Midseason \$ 4.00

DIK DIK 2Y-R (Grant Mitsch, USA)

Originally classified as a division 6 but changed to division 2 owing to its flat, smooth perianth (No reflex). It is a scarce outstanding intermediate daffodil for show.

Seedling x N. cyc. Early Season \$ 10.00

DINGUS DAY 2W-P (Red) (Dr. John Reed, USA)

After flowering the original cross made in 1988, it was repeated with even better results in 1994. This flower has better form and is more consistent in its intense cup color, ranging from deep pink to red-pink. A most imposing flower supported with tall stems here. It has been in bloom on Dingus Day (the Monday after Easter Sunday), a Polish holiday celebrated in South Bend, Indiana annually by politicians with beer, Polish sausage, and speeches. Was 94-14-1.

DOWNLANDS 3W-Y (Graham Phillips, NZ)

Good show flower. Clean stock. Very limited amount of bulbs. DaffSeek.

Modulox x Flash Affair Late Midseason \$ 8.00

DYNASTY 2Y-R (GWE Brogden, NZ)

One of Spuds best show flowers. Outstanding color and form.

T42 (Air Marshall x Orator) x Loch Hope Midseason \$ 7.00

EDIE 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named for our wonderful daffodil helper, Edie Godfrey. She has been there to help, especially with sending out orders. Edie actually was at my bedside to help when I had a pulmonary embolism. This is my first very pure pink cup named from Lavender Hope. The stems are long, supporting pure pink cups against white overlapping petals. It is showable and fertile. This is the flower you want if you desire REAL, in this climate, pink color. Stock is still small. Was Reed 97-76-1.

Lawless x Lavender Hope Midseason \$ 40.00

ENERGIZER 2O-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Early in my breeding I was determined to improve the all orange-red daffodils by breeding and selecting for more color intensity and color "fastness" as they flower here. My early seedlings and those of Brian Duncan's from Altruist would only show a deep perianth color in the best of seasons and none ever showed the intensity that Gypsy or Fiery Flame did in Oregon. Only two selections were kept from this intensely "hot" cross and this one has demonstrated the best combination of form and color resistance here. Hopefully its name says it all. Like the little pink bunny with its beating drums it will energize your spring garden, show table and breeding program. Increase has been slow. Was Reed Seedling 87-6-2.

Sabine Hay x Stylish Early Midseason \$ 22.00

EVESHAM 3W-GYY (John Lea, England)

A sibling to Dunley Hall, its stem is taller and the cup a lighter yellow. Many times it has won Best in Show, but seldom seen nor offered now. See photos on DaffSeek. Makes small bulbs. Excellent breeder, too.

Loch Assynt x Seedling **Late Midseason** **\$ 4.00**

EXCALIBUR 2Y-O (John Hunter, NZ)

A fine show flower and breeder from New Zealand. Limited stock.

Swordsman x Air Marshall **Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

FIRST STEP 6W-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

My first 6W-O. Short cupped and color variable but good in recent years. Was seedling 81-23-1.

Kilworth x Ballydorn 6W-Y seedling **Late Season** **\$ 4.00**

FLAMING JEWEL 3W-R (David Bell, NZ)

Very consistent with lovely blooms. Healthy. One of David's best grown here. Very limited stock.

Masquarade x Arbar **Late Midseason** **\$ 9.00**

FLAMING SILK 1W-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

It seemed logical to cross Pink Silk and Magician to get a 1W-R. This is the only one in two cross attempts that measured division 1. The cross was made both ways, too. Magician gave the best flowers as a seed parent. Its color is not the ultimate nor is it consistent, but it is a very good starting point. Strong tall stems support large flowers of show quality with an excellent poise. The bulbs are healthy and it is fertile both ways. Only a few bulbs to go this year because of using it in my breeding program. Was seedling 94-8-1.

Magician x Pink Silk **Midseason** **\$ 55.00**

FLINTLOCK 2W-Y (David Jackson, TAS, AU)

Jackson's best bicolor here. Variable. Capable of Best in Show. Limited Stock.

Seedling x Seedling **Midseason** **\$ 16.00**

FLUSHER 2O-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From my first cross to get an orange-petaled orange trumpet. Two of 120 flowers showed some color in the petals. Alas, the slowest growing one was the best colored one! Of trumpet character and form, it usually has some degree of petal flush. The stems are tall but not as strong as I would like. The corona measures 30 mm and petals 36 mm (Note: most of my daffodils will grow bigger in a protected watered area. All the flowers measured here are grown in the fields). The petals have good overlap and excellent poise. I did not breed with it until I actually flowered a 1O-O. Was Reed 84-79-2.

Glenfarclas x Creag Dubh **Early Midseason** **\$14.00**

FORT MITCHELL 1W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named in honor of the site of the 2002 ADS National Show where it beat many well-known flowers in its single bloom class. Its perfection and smoothness cried out for being exhibited so it was removed from our trade stand to win the single bloom award. It was cut from the open windswept field of 10 acres. It was beautiful with its chaste smooth flat perianth and its mid-yellow trumpet. Every bloom was identical. Very consistent! Was Reed 81-107-1.

Cool Contrast x ? (possibly Flash Affair) **Early Midseason** **\$ 6.00**

FRANZ JACKSON 2W-O Dr. John Reed, USA

Sibling to Tangerine Delight. It is slightly earlier and a couple millimeters short of a trumpet measurement. Excellent carriage and reasonable form. Named for a Jazz Musician, the father of one of Sandy's friends. Was Reed 98-32-1. Very small stock. Only 3 to go.

Orange Tint x Lutana **Early Midseason** **\$ 60.00**

GALIEN 2W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

When this cross flowered I was hard pressed to decide which ones to keep. This is the only one of about 200 seedlings that was retained. Its perianth is very smooth with perfectly flat petals in the same plane. The tall flowers support a deep-yellow cup with strong stems and excellent poise, but petals are not wide. Much admired by Mike Berrigan. Growth was slow initially but seems to be improving now. Just cut for show or admire it in the garden. Named for the small local Michigan town near Dayton Lake. Was Reed 79-21-1. Very few to go yet. Being used in breeding now.

Easter Moon x Chapeau **Midseason** **\$ 10.00**

GARBO 11aY-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The second of my yellow-pink split coronas "painted ladies" to be named. Similar to Bacall but smoother with better color. For show and garden. Very attractive. Was Reed 87-63-6.

Dear Love x Kabonova **Midseason** **\$ 12.00**

GARDEN GATE 3W-YYP (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Excellent, smooth show flower. Yellow fades with time. Was Seedling 86-62-1.

Fragrant Rose x Kerstin **Midseason** **\$ 10.00**

GEOMETRICS 2W-Y (Sid DuBose, USA)

A beautifully formed show flower. Perhaps Sid's best. Before passing away Sid stated that it had given his best ever 2W-W! Scarce.

Precedent x Camelot **Midseason** **\$ 9.00**

GEORGE GERSHWIN 2W-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

In my quest for a 1W-O, this cross was made. One selection actually was a division one but it was terribly weak and discarded. This flower has the best traits and actually did produce a well-formed 1W-O in its offspring. While the perianth is of average quality, the stem, neck, poise, and color are very good. The cup is about 30 mm long and the perianth 35 mm. In the tradition of its pollen parent, a composer's name was chose. This time an American. Formerly Reed 80-129-5.

Preamble x Johann Strauss **Midseason** **\$ 4.00**

GOLD CONVENTION 2Y-Y (John Lea, UK)

An imposing larger show flower. Still good for show, breeding and garden.

Seedling x Seedling **Midseason** **\$ 4.00**

GOLDEN BIRTHDAY 2Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A lovely, well balanced smooth yellow medium-sized trumpet of the highest show quality. Wide overlapping petals greet the eyes and help to focus on the rest of its outstanding features. Named in honor of the American Daffodil Society's fiftieth anniversary in 2004. See DaffSeek photo. Was Reed 85-7-7.

Golden Jewel x Dream Prince **Midseason** **\$ 12.00**

GOLDEN RICHES 1Y-Y (David S Bell, NZ)

Almost a self-orange in favorable seasons. For garden and breeding but can be shown.

(Red Conquest x Golden Fortune) x Salome **Early Season** **3 for \$ 10.00**

GREAT JOY 2W-P Dr. John Reed, USA (Name pending registration)

This flower resulted from my first efforts to bred a 1W-R. Even though it is not a full trumpet, nor red, the plant is vigorous and smooth with tall stems. Cup color can almost be red in some seasons. Very good. Named for Joy Haeffner who has been a great help and Joy for Oakwood. Was Reed 96-3-1. Shown in Kirby Fong's winning collection in 2013. See DaffSeek for a well colored picture.

Pink Silk x Magician **Early Midseason** **\$ 28.00**

GREEN ENVY 3W-GWW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Combining the better qualities of its parents, we have a tall, well-formed late white that consistently has a deep, green eye to the small spreading slightly frilled cup. A strong plant that multiplies very well and is later than the much smaller Jade. The really deep, mossy green center when seen can make one green with envy. Was Reed 91-73-2.

Limey Circle x Dunley Hall **Very Late Season** **\$10.00**

GULL 2W-GWW (Grant Mitsch, USA)

This is the most sought after American bred division 2W-W for show. Very smooth blooms and tall stems. I finally have enough to offer it again. Pannill Award 1997.

Easter Moon x (Broughshane x seedling) **Late Midseason** **\$ 5.00**

GUY WILSON 2W-W (AJR Pearson, ENG)

This is the best formed 2W-W of John's breeding. A beautiful show flower of the best caliber. I do wish the stems were taller. Scarce.

Stoke Charity x Panache **Midseason** **\$ 20.00**

HANBURY 2W-W (Clive Postles, ENG)

At its best this is the most beautiful 2W-W I grow. Of trumpet character, it is healthy and fertile with tall strong stems and excellent poise.

Ben Avon x Panache **Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

HANKY PANKY 11aY-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named for a rock 'n roll song by Tommy James originally from Niles. A great improvement over King Size. Has won its class in the National Show. Good breeder. Was seedling 90-29-1

King Size x Dream Prince **Midseason** **\$ 10.00**

HAROLD'S CROSS 3W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This sets my standard for size. Roundness and stem height in division 3 W-Ps. Named to honor Harold Cross of Tasmania, Australia who pioneered much of the initial breeding efforts in 3W-Ps. His "Possum 3 W-P" is the reciprocal breeding of my American Possum. The pollen parent of this 3W-P. Vigorous but slower growing. Excellent overlapping petals, poise with light pink cup color. Requires wind protection and water to give the best blooms. Was Reed 95-125-1.

Strawberry Shortcake x American Possum **Midseason** **\$ 38.00**

HAUNTING 3Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The name says it all! I marked Haunting on the plastic label I staked it with when I first saw it in bloom that warm breezy late spring day. It appeared hauntingly beautiful then and it continues to be the best 3Y-Y that I have grown for show. Pictured in the March 2003 ADS advertisement for Oakwood Daffodils. Perfect balance, form, stem, neck, poise and petals. Almost a perfect uniform shade of yellow. Was Reed 84-41-2.

Emily x Minster Lodge **Late Season** **\$10.00**

HAWLEY GIFT 2Y-R (J M Radcliff, TAS, AUS / Registered by Dr. John Reed, USA)

Sent here under seedling number from the Radcliff's, this is a very special high quality addition to Oakwood. Highly admired by many ADS members here, it is now demonstrating its value as a breeder. It looks like a red trumpet. The blooms are well colored and have a well overlapping, very smooth perianth. Poise and stems are excellent. Was Radcliff 9/84.

HEAVEN'S GATE 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This daffodil is all about color. Flamboyant looking rose-red, narrow corona with an expanding circular edge giving it the appearance of a trumpet. See picture on DaffSeek. The petals are well formed and overlapping with strong stems supporting large blooms with good poise. Was Reed 95-115-1. Stock still small. Unique.

Magician x Rosewood **Midseason** **\$ 50.00**

HELEN'S MEMORY 3W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A beautiful flower with intense colors. It is hard to believe this came from Grace Note! Smooth flat, overlapping perianth segments display the brilliant yellow crinkled cup. Blooms can be quite large and all have strong stems with good necks. Was Reed 90-69-11.

HOLME FEN 2W-Y (AJR Pearson, ENG)

HOLY COW! 2W-O Dr. John Reed, USA

This flower's cup is hard to believe with its pleats and crinkles. Colors are more orange than yellow in most years. The perianth is well formed with excellent poise and strong straight stems. As it was bred from Great Scott, this exclamation of the Chicago Cubs sports announcer, Harry Cary, seemed an appropriate name. Photo is in DaffSeek. A unique flower for garden and breeding. IRISH AFFAIR 2W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is by far the best 2W-Y I have raised and **named and released** so far. After opening the petals and cup expand and take on a more notable appearance. Heavy substance, bright crisp colors, large size with an excellent stem and neck characterize this flower. Fertile, but seed shy. Named for the romance between my stepdaughter, Michele and her boyfriend, John, when she spent a year in Belfast going to the University of Ulster. (Irish Wedding celebrated their marriage in Northern Ireland). Also, a combining of the names of both daffodils. This is a great flower that needs to be seen to be appreciated. Was Reed 84-34-1. Great in the garden and shows, too.

Irish Mist x Flash Affair **Midseason** **\$ 6.00**

IRISH MINT 3W-GGW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A smaller show flower of great smoothness and roundness. Fertile and transmitting that smoothness to its offspring. The green eye will be smaller in dryer seasons. Was seedling 85-99-1.

Angel x Achnasheen **Midseason** **\$ 10.00**

IROQUOIS 2YYW-O Richard & Elise Havens, USA)

A very unique show flower. Beautiful.

(Paricutin x Daydream) x (Redmarly x Brier Fox)
Midseason **\$ 5.00**

IVORY GOLD 1W-O (gold) (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The cross that gave Kamms and Aunt Betty also gave this beauty with a golden-orange tinted trumpet against an ivory colored perianth. It reminded me of the photo of a similar Backhouse seedling that Eric Longford had sent me years before. I kept it to cross for better formed 1W-Os. Using my first generation seedling crosses for 1W-Os, that were 2W-Os, it has proved itself. Freddie Silcock suggested that these ivory petalled flowers were a backdoor or a short cut to 1W-Os. He was right! Was Reed Seedling 78-19-8.

Trumpet Call x Lea 1-6-60 **Early Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

IVORY ORANGE 1W-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This came from a cross that gave me more intensely colored 1Y-Rs, This ivory petalled selection has a trumpet that is more deeply colored than Ivory Gold. Sent out for trials around the Midwest, it has given reports of better corona color intensity than demonstrated here. Not only excellent in the garden, it is producing show quality 1W-Os with solid orange coronas. Was Reed Seedling 87-19-8.

KIMMERIDGE 3W-YYO (D & J Blanchard, UK)

Many times winning show flower, including Best in Show. Needs shading for better color.

Port Rush x Pretty Polly **Midseason** **\$ 3.00**

KIWI AFFAIR 2W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Rarely offered, this sibling to Irish Affair is blessed with wider, overlapping petals. Strong stems display it well in the garden and on the show bench. It is fertile both ways. A bloom shown in New Zealand won Best in Show at one late North Island show. Was Reed Seedling 84-34-2.

She even helped in the snowy November weather when she was in her 80s. This is the most consistent early midseason white for show that I have named so far. It is also great in the garden. VERNAL PRINCE 3W-GYY (Tom Bloomer, N IRE)

Brilliantly colored with tall stems and excellent poise. Great for show and garden.

Shantallow x Woodland Prince **Late Midseason** **\$ 3.00**

WARM DAY 2O-O (Carncairn Daffodils, N IRE)

An intensely colored intermediate with strong, tall stems.

Stylish x Rory's Glen **Midseason** **\$ 6.00**

WAYNE'S WORLD 6Y-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

In 1984 some of the *N. cyclamineus* pollen was applied to Monal. Only a few seeds were collected and 3 seedlings germinated. They have been very slow growing but healthy. And worth the wait. Its wide, overlapping, smooth reflexing perianth is the perfect foil for the symmetrical glowing medium sized cup. It has won a number of awards under seedling number. The blooms are of medium size. The late Wayne Steel of California liked Monal (Its seed parent) enough that I had to dig a lot of bulbs of it for him to pot up and pre-cool to give to potential new ADS members. When the bulb of 84-49-1 first flowered for him, he was excited enough to send an e-mail photo to us. In the same e-mail files downloaded that day we learned we were going to be grandparents. As Monal and this offspring were a small but exciting part of his world, it seemed appropriate to register it as Wayne's World. Also with the thought of the recent pop movie by the same name. Was Reed 84-49-1. Few to go.

Monal x N. cyclamineus **Early Season** **\$16.00**

WEBER'S ELECTRIC 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This electrifying bloom really stands out in the garden. The trumpet-shaped corona usually is a blazing red-orange that shouts out even at a distance. The stem is strong and holds the bloom up-facing with the overlapping perianth serving as an excellent foil for the corona. It seemed appropriate to name it for the business of our friendly electrician Mike Weber who has contributed so much to Oakwood. Was Reed 84-144-2. For show and garden. DaffSeek photos do not do it justice.

Bunclody x Wildfire **Midseason** **\$ 8.00**

WESTMINSTER PINK 2W-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This flower was in bloom in April when the royal wedding took place in Westminster Abbey. It was named to honor that event. Grown for many seasons, it consistently has a good-sized blooms on tall strong stems with excellent smooth, overlapping petals of pure white and a trumpet shaped cup of a pure light pink. The bulbs have been down 9 years. Only the largest bulbs will be sent out. Was Reed seedling 93-20-1.

WINDY CITY 1W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

At the 2009 National ADS Show at the Chicago Botanical Garden, this daffodil under seedling number received five awards including The White Ribbon and the Rose Ribbon for Best Seedling in the show. The White Ribbon "set of three" graced the cover of the June 2009 ADS Journal. Tall strong stems support very wide smooth white petals and a gently flared bright yellow trumpet. The neck is short and poise is excellent. Combining the best features of both parents, it is the logical progression in breeding my ideal 1W-Y. It is very pleasing, consistent, health show flower. To honor the Chicago National ADS Show, Bob Spotts suggested the name "Windy City" Was Reed 97-163-1. Limited Stock.

Irish Affair Sibling x Three Oaks **Early Midseason** **\$ 60.00**

WOW! 2Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The name says it all! That is exactly what I said when I first saw it in bloom and the name has stuck (all the letters are capitalized!) Though of trumpet character, it measures division 2. Its overlapping petals are very wide, smooth and very flat in the same plane and very consistent. A slow increaser. Its offspring are showing its best characteristics, especially those crossed with Millennium Perfection. Only one bulb has ever left Oakwood. You can see it on Tom Stettner's Daffodil Photos on DaffSeek 2011 Indiana Show. Was Reed seedling 93-18-1.

ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY'S SYSTEM OF DAFFODIL CLASSIFICATION

The classification of daffodils has changed many times over the years. The present system combines the RHS classification of thirteen divisions based on form and species heritage with Dr. Throckmorton's color coding from the American Daffodil Society. This combined system gives us a very useful tool for describing daffodils quickly. A single letter denotes a color and its appropriate location as found in the flower, first in the perianth and then in the corona. W=White Y=Yellow G=Green O=Orange R=Red P=Pink For example: Arctic Gold is classified as a 1Y-Y. It is a trumpet daffodil with yellow petals and a yellow corona. Misty Glen is classified as a 2W-GWW. It is a large-cupped daffodil with white petals and a green-eyed white cup. First Born is a cyclamineus hybrid with swept-back, yellow petals and the corona has a greenish eye with a small transition of light yellow going to a deep pink color extending to the edge of the cup. In other words, it is a 6Y-GYP.

| Division 1 | Trumpet Daffodils: The trumpet (corona) is equal to, or longer than, the petal (perianth) segments. |
| Division 2 | Large Cup: The cup (corona) is less than the length of the petals (perianth) but more than a third. |
| Division 3 | Small Cup: The cup (corona) is equal to, or less than a third, of the petal (perianth) length. |
| Division 4 | Double Daffodils: This division is for all forms of double flowers. |
| Division 5 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. triandrus</i> characteristics. |
| Division 6 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. cyclamineus</i> characteristics. |
| Division 7 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. jonquilla</i> characteristics. |
| Division 8 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. tazetta</i> characteristics. The stems usually will have multiple flowers. |
| Division 9 | Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with <i>N. poeticus</i> characteristics. |
| Division 10 | All Species and Wild forms. |
| Division 11 | Daffodils with the cup (corona) that is split for more than a half of its length. This division has two subdivisions: |
| Division 11a | Collar Daffodils have the corona segments parallel to the perianth segments. |
| Division 11b | Papillion Daffodils have the corona segments project outwards from the perianth segments, usually in a whorl-shaped arrangement. |
| Division 12 | Daffodils that cannot be classified within the preceding divisions. |
| Division 13 | Daffodils distinguished solely by botanical name. |
