



Division 1: Trumpet Daffodils



The cup measures as long as, or longer than the petals.


Division 2: Large-Cupped Daffodils



The cup length measures more than 1/3 of, but less than equal to the length of the petals.

Each stem has only one flower.

Division 3: Small-Cupped Daffodils



The cup length measures not more than one third of the length of the petals.

Division 4: Double Daffodils



A double daffodil has doubling of the petals, or cup or both.


Sometimes there can be more than one flower on each stem.



The flowers hang down like bells.

Sometimes there can be more than one flower on each stem.


Division 6: Cyclamineus Daffodils



The petals appear wind-swept.


Each stem has only one flower.

Division 7: Jonquilla Daffodils



From their narrow reed-like leaves, one or more fragrant flowers bloom on each stem.


Division 8: Tazetta Daffodils



Three or more fragrant flowers bloom on each stem.


The leaves and stem are very broad.

Division 9: Poeticus Daffodils




Extremely white petals surround the cup, a small, crinkled disc, commonly yellow with a green center and a red rim.

Division 10: Bulbocodium Daffodils



Daffodils in the "hoop petticoat" form display large cups and tiny petals.

Each stem usually has only one flower.



A split-corona daffodil has a cup split usually for more than half of its length.

Division 12: Other Daffodils



These unique daffodils don't fit in the first 1 1 divisions.



Species daffodils are wild daffodils.

They are identified or called only by their botanical, or scientific name.
