


THE TUSCARORA TRUMPET SPRING 2022

The first daffodils called "Rjnveld's Early Sensation" have started blooming. shown here with winter aconite.

Pronounced (Rye-nolds) we tend to call it RES as it is much easier to say. They are

sometimes taken out by late winter storms being the first to bloom often in early January, but this year they are just opening now in late February which might be a good sign

<u>Directions to Nancy Redington's House:</u> 347 Leedy Way, Chambersburg, PA 17201 Phone: 717 264 6488

From West, South and North Chambersburg, From the crossroads of I-81 and Route 30 (Lincoln Way-Exit 16) Proceed East towards Gettysburg, approximately 2.5 miles. After passing the

Sheetz (on the left) and Franklin Shopping Center (on the right) you will go through three more traffic lights. The third light being Wal-Mart (on the right). Get into the left lane in order to turn left (north) at the next traffic light at St. John's Drive and Garman Drive. There is a U-Haul on the left at this light.

**Proceed around the s curve on St. John's Drive and at the stop sign the street name will change to Leedy Way East. Her house, on the right is a 2 story white colonial set back 120 feet from the street.

Driving from the East: Proceed West on Route 30 through Fayetteville. After passing the Lincoln Lanes Bowling Alley and Snavely's Garden Corner area, the 2nd traffic light is the St. John's and Garman Drive turn. At this light turn right (north) and follow directions from ** above.

Mitch noted that special daffodil bulbs that were late bloomers were being offered for sale by the group. They are Sir Winston Churchill, Tripartite and N. poeticus recurvus.

Mitch reported that for the Convention, he would be bringing 100 pots of late blooming daffodils. The profit from these pots would go to the TDG.

Mitch noted that to encourage late bloom, plant your bulbs later in the season up to mid or late Dec. After that date considering putting bulbs in pots.

Here's the reason: our Tuscarora Group has been honored by the American Daffodil Society with hosting the Society's 2022 National Convention. First time ever, and unlikely to happen again during the lifetimes of many of us. For those of you who are ADS members there is still time to sign up for the whole event, April 28th through May 1st. Yes, it is expensive, but you won't have to pay the airfare to Atlanta, Georgia, where next year's Convention will be held. (And besides ours'll be better.)

At any rate the two-day show Friday and Saturday is free to all, both to enter your flowers or just to admire those from all over. And you may freely enter your photographs and even artistic designs that you assemble. Contact Nancy Redington well in advance of late April to reserve a spot for your design, and Robert Darling is planning a huge array of photos, but there'll be room for yours. Just let him know ahead of time. (At least an early Spring should give you time to take lots of shots of the beauty around you.)


Chris will be at the convention as a vendor.

With the Convention honoring our own group founder Dr. Bill Bender, fellow member **Anne Wood** used her Covid down time to write a book on his life!

Anne Wood on Dr Bender:

Dr. William A. Bender, a descendant of Conrad Weiser (1696-1760), was a general practice physician in the town of Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, where he was born. As he was growing up, his job at home was to care for the yard and flowers on his parent's farm under his mother's tutelage. As an adult he became interested in daffodils at the



encouragement of his sister-in-law, Alma Bender, who was a member of the Chambersburg Garden Club.

She was a daffodil grower and shower who won many awards. Once he started growing and showing daffodils, he too won many awards. When he started hybridizing daffodils, he began to only show daffodils that he had grown from seed. The book tells his story starting at birth, as a student, as a husband, as a father, as an Army captain in WWII, then as a member of the American Daffodil Society (ADS), as president of the society for two terms, as a researcher for articles he published in the ADS Journal, as a daffodil hybridizer of note, and as a friend to many other daffodil lovers all around the world whom he met through the ADS—all while answering the call as a general practitioner.

GOLDEN ERA


