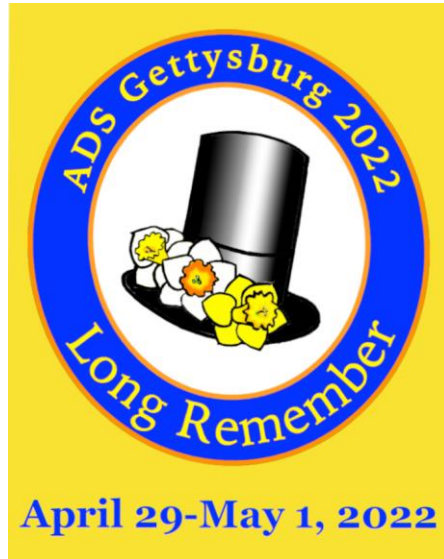

## HORTICULTURAL DIVISION GENERAL RULES

1. Entries may be made between Thursday April 29th at 2 PM and Friday April 30<sup>th</sup> 9AM. All exhibitors must be off the floor by 9:30 AM. **This rule will be strictly enforced.** Judging will start at 10AM April 30<sup>th</sup>.
2. Entry cards for exhibits will be available at the show. Only the top half of the entry card needs to be filled in.
3. Entries, awards, and ribbons may not be removed until 7 PM Saturday April 30th.

### RULES FOR HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITS

#### ENTRIES

4. All classes are open to anyone who grows daffodils except where specified otherwise.
5. An exhibitor may make as many entries as desired in any class provided each entry is a different cultivar or species or an entirely different collection of cultivars and/or species.
6. All blooms in the Horticultural Division, except the ADS Challenge classes, must have been grown in the open by the exhibitor. Miniatures, and daffodils grown and shown in their containers, may be grown in protected areas.
7. Wedging material and containers for cut flower exhibits will be furnished by the show committee. Except for daffodils grown and shown in their containers, no daffodil foliage is permitted.
8. All collections of five or more stems must be exhibited with each cultivar or species in a separate container.

#### LABELING

9. Each cultivar or species must be correctly labeled with its name (or number) and division. The originator's name must appear on the label in American bred classes except seedlings shown by the originator. The originator is the person who first flowered the bulb regardless of who made the cross and/or planted the seed. Other than entries in the Throckmorton class, providing color codes for blooms in exhibits is not required, but is encouraged.
10. Exhibits that are not named or are incorrectly named will not be judged. Correct classification and labeling shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
11. No label may be changed, specimen added, removed, altered, or substituted after judging has begun or after an award has been placed.

#### INTERMEDIATES, MINIATURES, AND SEEDLINGS

12. An intermediate daffodil is a standard daffodil cultivar in divisions 1, 2, 3, 4, or 11 having a single floret whose diameter is typically greater than 50 mm through 80 mm. Intermediate cultivars may be entered in classes for standard daffodils as well as classes reserved for intermediate daffodils.
13. Miniature daffodils may be shown only in classes for miniatures. A miniature daffodil is any cultivar on the current ADS Approved List of Miniature Cultivars. Any named, numbered, or species daffodil which appears graceful, with all parts proportionally small, may be exhibited in the Miniature Classes, and is eligible for all ADS Miniature awards, except that only numbered seedlings shown by the originator shall be eligible for the ADS Miniature Rose Ribbon. A guideline when judging miniatures is that a single floreted cultivar normally possesses a flower less than 50 mm (1.97") in natural spread. For a multi-floreted miniature daffodil, the guideline measurement for the floral mass is 72 mm (2.83") in natural spread. The Judges may decline to judge any exhibit exceeding these measurements at the time of judging or penalize as they find appropriate.
14. Blooms of seedlings may be exhibited in all classes for named cultivars. **ALL SEEDLINGS MUST BE IDENTIFIED BY A NUMBER DESIGNATION ASSIGNED BY THE ORIGINATOR.** If the exhibitor is not the originator, the name of the originator must be included as part of the identification.

#### AWARDS

15. Each stem in an exhibit of cut flowers receiving an ADS Award must score 90 or more on the appropriate ADS Scale of Points.

16. Only one first, one second, and one third award may be given in each class. Honorable mention awards may also be given if merited but only if first, second, and third have been awarded. First, second, third, and honorable mention awards may be withheld by the judges if in their opinion the exhibit is not worthy. If a blue ribbon (first place) has been awarded in a class eligible for an ADS ribbon, the ADS Award must also be awarded.
17. The decision of the judges is final. If an error is discovered in an exhibit after completion of judging, any award placed thereon (ADS, Special, or Ribbon) shall be forfeited by the exhibitor. If an error is discovered before the judging is completed, the class must be rejudget.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

18. The Show Committee reserves the right to subdivide classes by cultivar or color code when there are three or more worthy exhibits of the same cultivar or color code and if a sufficient number of worthy exhibits is left in the class. Species may be subdivided by their botanical sections.
19. The Royal Horticultural Society System of Classification will be used. The labeling authority is the current version of *Daffseek* (Daffseek.org) or *Daffodils to Show and Grow* as amended each year in the ADS *Daffodil Journal* December issue.
20. In the class descriptions, the words “pink cup,” etc. define classes where that color is solid, 2W-P, or present in two adjacent zones, *e.g.* 2W-GPP. The words “pink in cup,” etc. are used for classes that include both solid and rimmed cups of the same color. “Colored” is any color but white. A Reverse Bicolor has a perianth predominantly yellow, cup predominantly white, and where “predominantly” means at least two adjacent zones must be coded the designated color.
21. Blooms in the ADS Challenge section will not be considered for awards other than for their respective class and for the ADS William A. Bender Ribbon.

### Three of a Kind Exhibits

In exhibits of 3 of a kind, the judges may deduct up to 5 points for lack of uniformity.

Daffodils in this section will be judged using the cultivar scale.

This section is open to all cultivars, *i.e.* not species, introduced or in gardens before 1940. All cultivars shall be labeled with name, division number, and year of registration (or introduction). The earliest date shown in the American Daffodil Society’s online database DaffSeek.org shall be the authority

The Classification Committee may subdivide each class by year of registration and/or division, regardless of the number or quality of exhibits in each subdivision prior to judging. Daffodils in this section will be judged using the ADS Historic Scale of Points. Winners of the Historic single stem, 3-stem, and collection of 5 are eligible for consideration for their respective Gold, Mini-Gold, White, Mini-White, Purple, and Lavender Ribbons, in which case they are to be judged on the Cultivar scale.

## SECTION K– CONTAINER GROWN DAFFODILS

Blooms are to be grown in and exhibited in a container or pot. All bulbs in any one container shall be of the same cultivar or species. Container-grown daffodils may be grown in protected areas. No bloom or exhibit in this section shall be eligible for any ADS award other than the ADS awards for container-grown daffodils. Rule No. 18 is extended to permit subdividing classes by daffodil division.

# PHOTOGRAPHY DIVISION

---

The Spring 2022 ADS *In Person* Convention celebrates daffodils with the theme “**Long Remember**” and real physical photographs. Several special classes focus on daffodils to long remember, including a short statement explaining the name. Our 2022 Photography Show also remembers and celebrates the 50th Anniversary of Dr. William Bender becoming the ADS President from 1972 - 1974 with photos of blooms he introduced over his lifetime and photos of daffodils introduced during the years he was ADS President. We encourage members and the public to contribute-images broadening our understanding of the daffodil, enhancing our knowledge of the flower and the people who grow them, using the rapidly evolving art and technology of photography and accepted principles of two-dimensional design.

Judging will be conducted by a panel of Photography and ADS Judges selected by the Photography Chair. Photos will be judged by the panel on originality, composition, technical excellence, overall impact, and artistic merit using the 4Cs — Creativity, Craft, Composition, Content. All judging decisions are final.

## Photography General Rules

1. Entries retain the copyright of the photographer and may be used at the discretion of the American Daffodil Society (ADS) and sponsoring local societies in future displays, websites, and publications. Exhibitors need not be members of the ADS. There is no photographer entrance fee. Photographs may not have been awarded a first place, or blue ribbon, in a previous ADS National show. Placement in the show is guaranteed for all registered participants of the Convention. Others may enter and will be displayed as space allows at the discretion of the Committee.
2. All entries must be the work of the exhibitor and celebrate the daffodil with images of one or more daffodils as required by the class. Changes to the original image must be the work of the exhibitor: this includes manipulation, cropping and enhancing for color/clarity. All classes are open to color or black and white photographs and may be subdivided as needed. We encourage you to register in advance beginning April 15th to reserve space. Deadline for entering photo entries at the Wyndham Hotel in Gettysburg is Thursday Evening, April 28, 2022, at 6 PM EDT. Entries may be mailed to Robert Darling with the associated registration information as per Rule 5. Entries must be received by Monday, April 25, to be entered in the show. Mail to: ADS Photography Show, % Robert Darling, PO Box 238, Fayetteville, PA 17222, USA.
3. Photographs should be mounted on lightweight, stiff card stock or black foam board so that no mounting surface is exposed. No matting, glass, or framing is allowed. Minimum print size is 5 x 5 inches, and maximum perimeter is 52 inches. Non-standard sizes are acceptable. The photographer's name and address should be on the back of the mounting at the middle of the bottom edge. Photographers may enter no more than 2 photographs in each class.



4. Entries must be retrieved by the exhibitor or a designated alternate at the close of the show on Sunday, May 1, 2022. Exhibitors not attending the show should make prior arrangements for the return of their photographs. Entries not picked up become the property of the ADS and may be disposed of or used in future displays and publications.
5. An official entry card is to be filled out and attached to each photograph on the back right side 2” from the top edge. Titles on the entry cards are strongly encouraged. Entry cards will be available at the show or can be downloaded from the American Daffodil Society web site [daffodilusa.org](http://daffodilusa.org). Navigate to “References” then “National Show Guide, Templates, and Forms” and scroll down to “2022 Photography Entry Cards.” Photographer’s name is folded under to not show
  - For Class P1: identify the general area where the flowers were photographed.
  - For Class P2a, b, c,: Photographers must provide the following: class number, title of photo, and the name of the daffodil(s).
6. Only one 1st, one 2nd, and one 3rd may be given in each class if merited. Honorable Mentions may be awarded only in classes where the top three awards are given. Classes may be subdivided at the discretion of the Photography Chair. Photographs may be chosen by the editor for inclusion in *The Daffodil Journal*, or for publication in an ADS Regional Newsletters, digital copies as .jpgs to be provided. Judges’ Choice Ribbons may be awarded, The ADS Youth Photography Award will be given for the best photograph in Class P-6. The *Wells Knierim Ribbon* may be presented to the best photograph in the Photography Show on Friday April 29 at the Wyndham Hotel in Gettysburg.
7. The American Daffodil Society will exercise caution safeguarding exhibits but cannot assume responsibility for lost or damaged photographs.

### DESIGN CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

#### Long Remember...

##### **Class 1. Long Remember ... walking into the Grand Ballroom.**

###### **Daffodils, beautiful daffodils wherever you turn.**

A **Standard Traditional Arrangement**, to be staged on a black fabric covered Bar style round table, with a 24-inch top. No other back board or base required. To be viewed on all sides and to be emblematic of the opulence of the Convention Show. Height greater than 24 inches.

##### **Class 2. Long Remember ... The Bride with a crown of daffodils.**

A **headpiece**, [Tiara or circlet) suitable for a bride to wear with or under a veil for the wedding day. To be staged on a foam head form placed on a standard height table. An underlay of 18 inches is required.

##### **Class 3. Long Remember ... Whispering sweet nothings (tete a tete)**

A **parallel arrangement** using one container, not more than 12 inches in height, width or depth, to be staged on a 12 inch base and having a 12 inch backboard. The arrangement will be elevated to 15 inches above table to provide better staging for judging and viewing.

##### **Class 4. Long Remember ... Baby Kisses**

A **traditional arrangement using daffodils classified as miniature.**

The arrangement is to be not more than 12 inches in height, width, or depth, to be staged on a 12-inch base and having a 12-inch backboard.

The arrangement will be elevated to 15 inches above table to provide better staging for judging and viewing.

##### **Class 5. Long Remember ... A time gone by**

A **Dried Arrangement**, of either modern or traditional style type, that evokes a memory of yours. The memory should be noted on the required comment card. The arrangement is to be not more than 12 inches in height, width or depth, to be staged on a 12-inch base and having a 12-inch backboard.

The arrangement will be elevated to 15 inches above table to provide better staging for judging and viewing.

**Class 6. Long Remember . . . Playing children's games**

**A modern arrangement** that represents the children's games of old. . . Peekaboo, Hide and seek, hopscotch, or maybe Ring around the Rosey. Backboard (24 inches high and 18 inches wide) and a baseboard 18 inches square are required. To be staged on a standard height table.

**Class 7. Long Remember . . . Himself, Doctor B**

**A modern stretch arrangement** honoring the dual role he had at home in Chambersburg and to the daffodil world. A great family Doctor and a great Hybridizer of Daffodils for the world.

Backboard (30 inches high and 18 inches wide) and a baseboard 18 inches square are required.

To be staged on a standard height table.

**Class 8. Long Remember . . . Relaxing at the water's edge.**

**An Asian influenced, water showing arrangement in a low bowl.**

(Moribana style) Backboard (24 inches high and 18 inches wide) and a baseboard 18 inches square are required.

To be staged on a standard height table.

**Class 9. Long Remember . . . The golden rainbow of the sky**

**An Asian influenced upright arrangement naturalistic or free style arrangement with emphasis on color.**

Backboard (30 inches high and 18 inches wide) and a baseboard 18 inches square are required.

To be staged on a standard height table

**Class 10. Long Remember . . . those crazy judges.**

**An arrangement entered by an individual judging in any division in the Show. The title from the class is to be taken from one of the other 9 previous classes and entered on either a comment card or entry ticket. BUT the arrangement and the required back board and baseboard may be no larger than 12 inches in height, width, or depth. To be staged on a standard height table. The arrangement may not exceed 12 inches in height, width or depth.**

**DESIGN DIVISION**

**Exhibitor information for Design Division**

*Regarding the materials used in the entry:*

1. Fresh Daffodils are to be featured as the dominant floral interest in all arrangements.

2. All other plant material must be fresh or naturally dried
3. No artificial plant material may be used.
4. The daffodil may not be abstracted other than being dried in the dried class.
5. Daffodils must be outdoor grown. They need not be grown by the exhibitor.
6. Items on the conservation list, identifiers of any political or religious group or flags of any nation are not permitted in any entry.

*Regarding the entry:*

1. The exhibitor need not be registered for the convention but **must** reserve space for an entry by contacting Nancy Redington. 347 Leedy Way East, Chambersburg, Pa. 17202, Email: rosered1@ Comcast.net and land line 717 264-6488 or cell 717 404- 6169
2. Exhibitors may request space in any(classess) but also accepts the responsibility of securing a replacement if unable to enter the class.
3. At least one daffodil with exhibition form is required in all entries.
4. Exhibitors are able to place entries from Thursday afternoon through 0930 Friday morning.
5. No entry may be removed from show until show closing on Saturday evening at the show closing.
6. All entries will be staged on standard height tables, covered with black material unless otherwise stated in the class requirements. Backboards and bases are required in all classes unless otherwise stated in the schedule. No wings on the backboards will be permitted as they can diminish the light on a neighboring arrangement.
7. Arrangements in classes 2 and 3 may be no larger than 12 inches in height width and depth. Space allotment for these classes is 12 inches square. Because of their smaller size, they will be staged on an elevated platform, 15 inches above the 30-inch-high standard table. They will be effectively judged at eye level.
8. Arrangers are encouraged to leave a 3X5 comment card with the entry tag to further inform the judges and public on any unusual interpretation.
- 9.. Neither the convention nor the Wyndham accepts responsibility for the entry.

*Regarding the judging:*

1. The schedule is the final authority for judging.
2. The show will be judged by accredited judges.
3. The Tuscarora Daffodil Group Arrangement Score Card will be used.

**DESIGN AWARDS**

All exhibits are eligible for ribbons depending on the score of the arrangement.

First place (90 points or greater)

Second (85 points or greater)

Third (80 points or greater)

Honorable mention (75 points or greater).

There may be only one first, second and third place ribbon awarded in any class, but multiple honorable mention ribbons may be awarded if merited.

Certificates for the Best Entity in a Section may be awarded if the winning entry scores at least 92 points or more.

## **Sections**

*There are Five Section Awards.*

### **Best traditional Design**

#### **Classes 1 and 4**

This design style is recognized by the exterior outline of the floral material having a geometric form. Usual forms seen are Oval, Round, Circle, Triangle, Crescent, Hogarth or S curve. All the stems of the plant material should appear to be emanating from a singular point from the container. The container is usually unassuming so as to not detract from the floral design.

At least one bloom must have exhibition form and is usually placed in the focal area of the design.

### **Best Modern Design**

#### **Classes 3, 6, and 7**

This design style is recognized by an importance of space and restraint in the use of plant material. These two concepts are important to emphasize the floral material. There is usually more than one point of emergence of floral material in the design. Other than the daffodil, plant material may be abstracted to add interest to the design. The design often may use stark lines and bold colors to better interpret the theme.

### **Best Asian influenced Design**

#### **Classes 8 and 9**

This design is recognized as resembling the floral designs, often referred to as Ikebana, which are the major floral art form in East Asian nations.

The design(s) created for this show should represent the simplistic, naturalistic feeling of the title. These entries usually follow one of two main themes. One of a low bowl with water showing and the other a tall container with longer lines, reflecting the growth of the material in nature. Again, as with modern designs, simplicity and use of space and well-trimmed foliage material is prevalent. A third type is called Free style and it follows the same ideas, but this type encourages more freedom in interpretation from the traditional Ikebana schools,

### **Best of the Special Classes**

#### **Classes 2 and 5**

These two classes do not fit into the above classifications.

The dried class, Class 2, because the floral material is not fresh, and the drying technique is evaluated instead.

The other is the Tiara Head Piece, Class 5, is not an arrangement per se.

### **Judges Class**

#### **Class 10**

This class is a judge's choice of design style and is limited to judges who are judging in any of the divisions in the show.

**Gold Ribbon:** Best standard cultivar or species in the Horticulture Division, excluding Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

**White Ribbon:** Best set of three stems of one cultivar or species of standard daffodils, excluding Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

**Rose Ribbon:** Best standard seedling exhibited by its originator, excluding the Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

**Purple Ribbon:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars or species in the Horticulture Division.

**Maroon Ribbon:** Best collection of five different standard Reverse Bicolor cultivars, one stem each, with perianth predominantly yellow, cup predominantly white, and where “predominantly” means at least two adjacent zones must be coded the designated color (Class G28).

**Red-White-Blue Ribbon:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars, one stem each, of American breeding or origin, any division or divisions (Class G30).

**Stars and Stripes Ribbon:** Best collection of twelve different standard cultivars, one stem each from at least four divisions, of American breeding or origin (Class G37).

**Marie Bozievich Award:** Gold Medal or Ribbon for best collection of twelve different cultivars and/or species of standard daffodils from at least four RHS divisions (Class G40). This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Bozievich Ribbon.

**Elise Havens Award:** Gold Medal or Ribbon for best collection of twelve different standard cultivars from at least three divisions of RHS divisions 5 through 10 (Class G41). This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Havens Ribbon.

**Tom D. Throckmorton Award:** Silver Medal or Ribbon for best collection of fifteen cultivars and/or species of standard daffodils from fifteen different RHS classifications (Class G42). This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Throckmorton Ribbon.

**Carey E. Quinn Award:** Gold Medal or Ribbon for best collection of twenty-four different cultivars and/or species of standard daffodils from at least five divisions. The medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Quinn Ribbon. Open only to ADS members (Class G43).



**Robert Spotts Ribbon:** Best collection of five different standard or five different miniature daffodils, one stem each, where green is the predominant color in either the perianth and/or the corona (Classes G29 and O6).

**Miniature Gold Ribbon:** Best miniature daffodil in the Horticulture Division, excluding Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

**Miniature White Ribbon:** Best set of three stems of one miniature cultivar or species daffodils, excluding Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

**Miniature Rose Ribbon:** Best miniature seedling exhibited by its originator, excluding the Container-Grown and Challenge Sections.

**Lavender Ribbon:** Best collection of five different miniature daffodils (Classes O1 through O6).

**Miniature Red-White-Blue Ribbon:** Best collection of five different miniature daffodils, one stem each of American breeding (Class O5).

**Delia Bankhead Ribbon:** Best collection of nine miniature cultivars and/or species, one stem each from at least three different RHS divisions. (Class O7)

**Roberta C. Watrous Award:** Gold Medal or Ribbon for best collection of twelve different cultivars and/or species of miniature daffodils from at least three divisions. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Watrous Ribbon. Open only to ADS members (Class O8).

**Miniature Bronze Ribbon:** Best collection of three stems each of five different cultivars and/or species of miniature daffodils from at least three divisions (Class O9).

**Harold Koopowitz Ribbon:** Best collection of twenty-four different miniature cultivars and/or species from at least five divisions. Open only to ADS members (Class O10).

**Three Miniatures by Hybridizer Ribbon:** Best exhibit of three different miniature daffodils, any divisions, hybridized and originated by the exhibitor. Open only to ADS members (Class O21).

**Six Miniatures by Hybridizer Ribbon:** Best exhibit of six different miniature daffodils, any divisions, hybridized and originated by the exhibitor. Open only to ADS members (Class O22).

**Twelve Miniatures by Hybridizer Ribbon:** Best exhibit of twelve different miniature daffodils, any divisions, hybridized and originated by the exhibitor. Open only to ADS members (Class O23).

**Youth Best Bloom Ribbon:** Best daffodil exhibited in the Youth Sections.

**Youth Best Set of Three Ribbon:** Best set of three daffodils in the Youth Section (Classes Z1 through Z7).

**Youth Best Collection of Five Ribbon:** Best collection of five daffodils in the Youth Section (Classes G23 and O4).

**Brooke Ager Youth Challenge Ribbon:** Best single stem of annual cultivar selected by ADS Youth Committee (Class Y8).

**Small Growers Ribbon:** Best daffodil exhibited in the Small Growers Section.

**John Van Beck Award:** Bronze Medal or Historic Ribbon for best pre-1940 cultivar in the Historic Sections. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where it is offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Best Historic Ribbon.

**Historic Best Set of Three Ribbon:** Best set of three stems of one pre-1940 cultivar in the Historic Section (Classes I01 through I08).

**Historic Best Collection of Five Ribbon:** Best collection of five pre-1940 cultivars in the Historic Section (Class G22).

**Classic Best Bloom Ribbon:** Best standard cultivar in the Classic Sections.

**Classic Best Single-Stem Ribbon:** Best cultivar from a class of single stems in the Classic Section (Classes C10 through C50).

**Classic Best Set of Three Ribbon:** Best set of three stems of one cultivar in the Classic Section (Classes D1 through D5).

**Classic Best Collection of Five Ribbon:** Best collection of five classic cultivars in the Classic Section (Class G21).

**Intermediate Best Bloom Ribbon:** Best intermediate-size cultivar from the Intermediate Sections, any standard collection, or from any standard entry in the Youth or Small Growers Sections.

**Intermediate Best Set of Three Ribbon:** Best set of three stems of one intermediate cultivar in the Intermediate Section or in standard collection classes of sets of three. (Section F and Classes G44 and G45)

**Intermediate Best Collection of Five Ribbon:** Best collection of five intermediate cultivars in the Intermediate Section (G20).

**Standard Container-Grown Ribbon:** Best standard container-grown named or seedling daffodil exhibit in the Container-Grown Section (Class K1)

**Miniature Container-Grown Ribbon:** Best miniature container-grown named or seedling daffodil exhibit in the Container-Grown Section (Class K2).

**Species/Species Hybrid Container-Grown Ribbon:** Best species/species hybrid container-grown daffodil exhibit in Container-Grown Section (Class K3).

**Silver Ribbon:** Awarded to the exhibitor winning the most first place (blue) ribbons in the Horticulture Division.

**Harry I. Tuggle, Jr. Award:** Gold Medal or Ribbon for best exhibit of three stems each of twelve different cultivars and/or species from at least three RHS divisions. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where it is offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Tuggle Ribbon. Open only to ADS members (Class G44).

**Matthew Fowlds Award:** Silver medal or ribbon for best NAMED standard cyclamineus HYBRID in the show. This medal may be won only one time in all ADS National Shows. A former winner may receive only the Fowlds Ribbon.

**Olive W. Lee Trophy:** Best standard daffodil from Divisions 5, 6, 7, or 8.

**John and Betty Larus Trophy:** Best set of three stems of one miniature daffodil seedling exhibited by the originator (Class R1).

**Grant and Amy Mitsch Trophy:** Best set of three stems of one standard daffodil seedling exhibited by the originator (Class R2).

**David Jackson Award:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars bred in Australia (Class G31).

**Carncairn Trophy:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars bred in Ireland (includes both Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland) (Class G32).

**Dutch Trophy:** Best collection of five different registered, standard daffodils of any origin from five different decades beginning with a zero and ending with a nine (*e.g.* 1960-1969) (Class G33).

**English Award:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars bred in England (Class G34).

**New Zealand Award:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars bred in New Zealand (Class G35).

**Northern Ireland Trophy:** Best collection of five different standard cultivars bred in Northern Ireland (Class G36).

**Larry P. Mains Trophy – Little England Award:** Best collection of three stems each of nine different standard cultivars from Division 3 (Class G45).

**William G. Pannill Cup:** Best collection of twelve different cultivars or seedlings, one stem each, exhibited by the raiser (Class Q1).

**Murray Evans Trophy:** Best collection of six different cultivars or seedlings, one stem each, exhibited by the raiser (Class Q2).

**Helen K. Link Award:** Bronze Medal or Ribbon for best exhibit of three different cultivars or seedlings, one stem each, exhibited by the raiser. This medal may be won only once by any exhibitor in all ADS shows where it is offered. A former winner may exhibit in this class but may receive only the Link Ribbon (Class Q3).

**William A. Bender Ribbon:** Best bloom in the ADS Challenge Section Q.

**Wells Knierim Ribbon:** Best photograph in the Photography Division.

**Youth Photography Ribbon:** Best photograph by Youth exhibitor in Youth Photography class (Class P8).

## ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY SYSTEM OF CLASSIFICATION

For garden purposes, daffodils are classified in 13 divisions where the division number specifies the form and the letters (color code) specify the colors. For example: 1 W-Y = a trumpet daffodil with white perianth segments (“petals”) and yellow corona (“trumpet”). 2 Y-YYO = a large-cupped daffodil, all yellow except for a band of orange at corona (“cup”) rim. 11b W-O/Y/W = a papillon daffodil with white perianth segments and longitudinal bands of orange, yellow and white in the corona, with orange predominant. Whether of wild or cultivated origin, once a selection has been distinguished by a cultivar name, it should be assigned to Divisions 1–12. Daffodils distinguished solely by botanical name should be assigned to Division 13. The characteristics for Divisions 5 to 10 are given for guidance only; they are not all necessarily expected to be present in every cultivar assigned to those divisions.

### **DIVISION 1 — TRUMPET DAFFODIL CULTIVARS.**

One flower to a stem; corona (“trumpet”) as long as or longer than the perianth segments (“petals”).

### **DIVISION 2 — LARGE-CUPPED DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

One flower to a stem; corona (“cup”) more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments (“petals”).

### **DIVISION 3 — SMALL-CUPPED DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

One flower to a stem; corona (“cup”) not more than one-third the length of the perianth segments (“petals”).

### **DIVISION 4 — DOUBLE DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

One or more flowers to a stem, with doubling of the perianth segments or the corona or both.

### **DIVISION 5 — TRIANDRUS DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

Characteristics of *N. triandrus* clearly evident; usually two or more pendent flowers to a stem; perianth segments reflexed.

### **DIVISION 6 — CYCLAMINEUS DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

Characteristics of *N. cyclamineus* clearly evident: one flower to a stem; perianth segments significantly reflexed; flower at an acute angle to the stem, with a very short pedicel (“neck”).

### **DIVISION 7 — JONQUILLA AND APODANTHUS CULTIVARS**

Characteristics of Sections Jonquilla or Apodanthi clearly evident: one to five (rarely eight) flowers to a stem; perianth segments spreading or reflexed; corona cup-shaped, funnel-shaped, or flared, usually wider than long; flowers usually fragrant.

### **DIVISION 8 — TAZETTA DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

Characteristics of Section Tazettae clearly evident: usually three to twenty flowers to a stout stem; perianth segments spreading, not reflexed; flowers usually fragrant.

### **DIVISION 9 — POETICUS DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

Characteristics of *N. poeticus* and related species clearly evident; perianth segments pure white; corona very short or disc-shaped, not more than one-fifth the length of the perianth segments; corona usually with a green and/or yellow center and red rim, but sometimes wholly or partly of other colors; anthers usually set at two distinct levels; flowers fragrant.

### **DIVISION 10 — BULBOCODIUM DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

Characteristics of Section Bulbocodium clearly evident: usually one flower to a stem; perianth segments insignificant compared with the dominant corona; anthers dorsifixed (i.e., attached more or less centrally to the filament); filament and style usually curved.

### **DIVISION 11 — SPLIT-CORONA DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

Corona split – usually for more than half its length.

- a) Collar Daffodils. Split-corona daffodils with the corona segments opposite the perianth segments; the corona segments usually in two whorls of three.
- b) Papillon Daffodils. Split-corona daffodils with the corona segments alternate to the perianth segments; the corona segments usually in a single whorl of six.

### **DIVISION 12 — OTHER DAFFODIL CULTIVARS**

Daffodil cultivars which do not fit the definition of any other division.

## **DIVISION 13 — DAFFODILS DISTINGUISHED SOLELY BY BOTANICAL NAME**

### **SECTION TAPEINANTHUS**

Autumn flowering; one to four flowers to a rounded stem; leaves very narrow, glaucous, not always present on flowering bulbs; flower ascending, yellow; corona absent or rudimentary; anthers widely exserted from the tube, much shorter than the filaments, dorsifixed.

### **SECTION SEROTINI**

Autumn flowering; usually one to two flowers to a rounded stem; leaves very narrow, glaucous, not always present on flowering bulbs; perianth segments pure white, usually twisted; corona very short, yellow, orange, or green; anthers included in or slightly exserted from the tube, longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant.

**SECTION AURELIA** Autumn flowering; three to twelve flowers to a compressed stem; leaves flat, not channeled, glaucous; flowers white; corona rudimentary or absent; filaments unequal in length; anthers exserted from the tube, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant.

**SECTION TAZETTAE** Autumn to spring flowering; three (rarely two) to twenty flowers to a usually compressed stem; leaves flat or channeled, usually glaucous; flowers white, yellow, or bicolored; anthers included in or slightly exserted from the tube, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant. The rounded stem and green leaves of *N. aureus* atypical, also the orange corona of *N. elegans*.

**SECTION NARCISSUS** Spring flowering; usually one flower (exceptionally two to four) to a compressed stem; leaves flat, not channeled, glaucous; perianth segments pure white; corona disc-shaped or very shallow, sometimes of a single color, but usually with base green, mid-zone yellow, and rim red or orange and often scarious; anthers partly exserted from the tube, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant. This section covers *N. poeticus*.

### **SECTION JONQUILLA**

Spring flowering; one to five (rarely eight) flowers to a rounded stem; leaves narrow or semi-cylindrical, green; flowers yellow, never white; perianth segments spreading or reflexed; corona usually cup-shaped, usually wider than long; anthers included in or partly exserted from the tube, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant. The autumn flowering, green-flowered *N. viridiflorus* is atypical.

### **SECTION APODANTHI**

Spring flowering; one flower or two to five to a somewhat compressed stem; leaves narrow, channeled, glaucous; flowers white or yellow, never bicolored; perianth segments spreading or slightly reflexed; corona cup-shaped, funnel-shaped, or flared, usually wider than long; anthers included in the tube, or three included and three exserted, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed.

### **SECTION GANYMEDES**

Spring flowering; one flower or two to six to an elliptical or cylindrical stem; flowers pendent, white, yellow, or somewhat bicolored; leaves flat or semicylindrical; perianth segments reflexed; corona cup-shaped (rarely campanulate); anthers three included in the tube, three exserted (often beyond the corona), equal to or much shorter than the filaments, dorsifixed. This section covers *N. triandrus*.

### **SECTION BULBOCODIUM**

Autumn to spring flowering; one flower to a rounded stem; leaves narrow, semi-cylindrical; flowers white or yellow; perianth segments insignificant compared with the dominant corona; anthers widely exserted from the tube (often beyond the corona), much shorter than the filaments (which are usually curved), dorsifixed.

**SECTION PSEUDONARCISSUS** Spring flowering; usually one flower to a more or less compressed or sometimes rounded stem; leaves flat or channeled, usually glaucous; flowers white, yellow, or bicolored; perianth segments usually spreading or inflexed; corona more or less cylindrical, often flared at mouth, yellow or white (never orange or red); anthers exserted from the tube, equal to or shorter than the filaments, sub-basifixed. The green leaves, rounded stem, and strongly reflexed perianth segments of *N.*
