

GENERAL TERMS OF BUSINESS

This catalogue cancels all previous issues. All bulbs are offered subject to crop, and being unsold on receipt of order. Orders for bulbs amounting to less than £5 in value or U.S. \$30 in value for overseas orders may be declined.

No complaint as regards quality of bulbs, size, health or numbers will be entertained unless made immediately after receipt of bulbs.

Orders cannot be cancelled except by mutual consent.

No acknowledgement of an order will be sent unless specially requested.

All bulbs travel at the purchaser's risk, and orders will be despatched in rotation and as far as possible before the 15th September each year.

Payment: New customers are asked to make payment with order and to add the estimated cost of postage, see page 2 inside cover.

INVOICES ARE INCLUDED IN ALL PARCELS SENT OUT, AND PAYMENT ON RECEIPT IS A CONDITION OF SALE WHEN PAYMENT IN ADVANCE HAS NOT BEEN MADE.

Receipts for payment are not sent unless specially requested.

Carriage or Postage is charged on all orders except Special Offers but packing is free.

ADDITIONAL FREE BULBS WILL BE INCLUDED TO MAKE GOOD CARRIAGE OR POSTAGE CHARGED, AND AS FAR AS POSSIBLE ANY VARIETY PARTICULARLY REQUIRED WILL BE INCLUDED IN SUCH FREE BULBS.

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS FOR DAFFODILS

To obtain best results, a sunny well drained plot of ground should be selected. Previous deep digging to aerate the soil is an advantage, but on no account should farm or stable manure be incorporated or used as a mulch. The use of inorganic fertilisers is not recommended, but a light dusting of bone meal before planting and during each successive winter will help bulb and flower production. The rate of application need not exceed 2 ozs. per square yard. Wood ashes or a sprinkling of sulphate of potash will help to produce intensity of colour.

The site should be made up some weeks before planting, which should be carried out in September. The bulbs should be covered with about twice their own depth of soil in average land, and rather less if the ground is heavy.

Smaller quantities of bulbs can be planted in blocks or groups in herbaceous borders, but cannot be expected to produce their best blooms if planted close to hedges, or shrubs whose roots rob the soil of its productive qualities. Nor can bulbs planted in dry, parched conditions be expected to increase well, or produce large flowers after the first year.

The daffodil requires a damp retentive soil during the period when it is making the bulb which will flower in the following season. Bulbs may be left down for several seasons without being lifted and we have good clumps which have been down for six years or more.

The large round bulb with a single nose, or a large offset will produce a finer flower than a mother bulb with several noses. After flowering seed pods may develop, and the flower heads must be removed or the development of the bulbs may be prejudiced.

Not all daffodils will produce their best flowers if grown in pots, but most white trumpets, or white and red flowers do well. On the other hand many yellow and red highly coloured flowers do not come well in pots, unless the temperature can be kept below 60°F after the buds emerge. The secret of successful pot cultivation is ample watering, good ventilation and a moist atmosphere being maintained by overhead spraying, or floor watering as the buds come into flower.

We do not recommend forcing daffodils in pots, and the best practice is to plunge the pots in cool ground (under 48°F), for eight weeks at least, and to bring the pots into the greenhouse or house using no heat except to keep away frost. Bring the pots into room temperature only when flower buds are showing. Copious watering is essential once the buds are coming clear of the bulbs and on no account should the pots be allowed to get dry.

The best way to select varieties is to see them growing and flowering. We will be glad to permit visitors to see the bulbs in flower during the Spring on Wednesday or Saturday afternoons or on other days by arrangement.

INTRODUCTION

In 1984 and 1985 many of our Ballydorn raised cultivars featured in the Quinn Awards throughout the U.S.A. and we were particularly pleased to note that most of the cultivars shown in the winning groups had originally been sent out for trial as seedlings under number and subsequently named as a result of the favourable reports received from growers. The value to us of such reports from different climatic zones cannot be over estimated, especially as regards flower substance, colour coding, and the degree to which the flower colour is sun and weather proof.

The following named Ballydorn cultivars were mentioned in the A.D.S. Journals of 1984/5 as having been constituents of a Quinn award, or having gained a Gold or White Ribbon as the best standard daffodil exhibited at an A.D.S. show either as a single bloom or as a group of three stems:-

Castlehill, Churchman, Faro, Firestorm, Golden Amber, Golden Wings, Hilford, Ireland's Eye, Mexico City, Moon Rhythm, Moonspell, Northern Sceptre, Topkapi, Tullycore, and many other cultivars gained Blue Ribbons or were in different winning groups.

Overseas customers should remit to Ballydorn Bulb Farm, Killinichy, Newtownards, Northern Ireland in £ sterling, or U.S.\$ by cheque **payable on demand in London**, so as to avoid bank negotiation charges for collection which reduces the amount paid.

We have forecast an exchange rate of U.S. \$1.50 to the £ sterling in preparing this catalogue for publication in February 1986, and as always, shall add extra bulbs for prepaid orders which include the postage charge or to compensate for any unfavourable movement in the exchange rate.

We are again offering special parcels of selected bulbs at reduced rates to meet popular demand.

Early orders for bulbs are requested as bulb lifting is completed by 1st July.

CHOICE NEW DAFFODILS

ARRANGEMENT OF LIST, AND CODING SYSTEM

The list has been arranged in alphabetical order with the Division and Classification of each cultivar shown in the margin. The classification is in accordance with the Revised System recently adopted by the R.H.S. Colours are abbreviated as follows:

w—white or whitish; g—green; y—yellow; p—pink; o—orange; r—red.

For the purpose of description, the daffodil flower is divided into perianth, and corona. The perianth is described by the first letter following the number of the Division to which the cultivar belongs.

The corona is treated as having three zones: An eye zone, a mid-zone and an edge or rim. The description of the corona is separated from the description of the perianth by a hyphen and the letter then following the hyphen describes the corona colour starting with the eye zone. If however the corona is of a single colour, only a single letter of the colour code is used to describe it.
