Presumably there is no such thing as a perfect daffodil season. Some are just better than others. This year has to be one of the most unusual in years, however, as Spring began in my garden on March 1 when a species crocus opened. Daffodil season began on March 4 with asturiensis. By St. Patrick's Day when we fortunately (or unfortunately depending on the amount of cold damage in your garden) returned to cold weather, most of my miniatures had opened.

Bagatelle, la, was delightful. There were over 20 blooms from 10 bulbs down two years. I plan to order more of this! Tete a Tete, which has never done well for me, had 5 bloom stems from one new bulb! Now I understand why it is so highly regarded! Quince, though not new, had 6 bloom stalks. Mustard Seed, which usually has very short stems, had stems long enough and strong enough to support the bloom.

The first standard daffodil to bloom was 2b Woodgreen. This is a pleasing bi-color which fades to almost white. Trousseau is another early one; it's a favorite of mine, perhaps because I won my first "Best of Show" with it. It has been blooming for over two weeks and still looks presentable. The things that have opened look very good - firm and smooth. I guess all the rain last year really was good for them.

Now that the season is upon us, I would like for each of you to make note of the flower that impressed you more than any other this year. I don't care if it's new or old, just write a short paragraph about it, and we'll use them in a future issue.

As long as you're making notes and writing short paragraphs, please also write a short note about any non-predominant (or as our show schedule says - cup rimmed or banded) flower. We wrote the schedul this way hoping that it would not be necessary to divide classes the day of the show. So if we get some comments about the rimmed ones, we'll know better where to exhibit them another year. It would be educational for all of us, and besides--wouldn't you all rather read something written by someone else for a change?

I have kept blooms for three weeks in the refrigerator before; sometimes it works well, other times not as well. But if you don't TRY to save it, you won't have it for sure. Blooms can be either placed in a plastic bag without water and stored on the refrigerator shelf, or put in a glass with water. But DO save those blooms! We will be calling you soon to remind you which committee you're on.
