## SOUTHERN REFLECTIONS THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE AMERICAN DAFFODIL SOCIETY

As we journeyed down Route 27 toward the entrance to Callaway Gardens it was evident the azaleas were making us welcome in all their glory! The rest of the Convention was to make us feel just as welcome. From the smiling faces of everyone working at Callaway to the beautiful surroundings, Convention 1990 was a most pleasurable experience.

We were met at the registration desk on Wednesday by 2 lovely southern belles and given a huge "goodie bag". We received lovely note cards with an original daffodil design by Mary Takahashi, slices of Claxton Fruit Cake, Tom's peanuts, a Webster dictionary, Muscadine Sauce from Callaway and much more!

The Convention Hall was buzzing with activity as everyone greeted new and old friends. Exhibitors were busy staging their flowers and everyone was onling and ashing over the blooms brought from England and Northern Ireland. When everyone had entered their blooms there were to be 1273 in all.

In addition to the actual show the Trade stands were outstanding. There were exhibits from Holland, California, Oregon in addition to the ones from the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland.

On Thursday morning when we returned to the Show, we found Jim Webster from Victory Garden and his camera crew filming a segment for the program. There was an interview with Elise Havens and also with Bill Pannill, it is expected to air on your local PBS station around April 24th. This was arranged by Callaway and should prove to be of wonderful benefit for the Daffodil Society.

When the judging was completed we learned that a lovely young woman from South Carolina had won Best of Show with a bloom of Spud Brogden's Twilight Zone. This was all the more special since Spud was visiting with her and at the Convention. The young woman was none other than Eve Robertson. She tries to tell you she is 84 but don't believe it, she is younger than us all. By the way, Spud assures us he will attend our Convention in 1992.

After everyone had congratulated the winners, of which Bill Pannill was a major one, it was time for the Welcome Ceremony and the giving out of awards. Our own Tag Bourne did her usual fantastic job, with a few kisses thrown in, and looking particularly lovely. It was wonderful that the awards went to 7 of the 9 regions so all were well represented.

After the Awards Ceremony we boarded buses to go to Sibley Center for the Moonlight and Magnolias Reception. There could not be a more beautiful place, the flowers were magnificent, daffodils that had just been put in place on Monday abounded. Even a gorilla topiary held a bunch of daffodils and one of the fans Callaway had made for us. The strings of the Columbus (Georgia) Symphony mixed with the sound of the waterfall and played most delightfully on our ears. Our palates were whetted by the sight of the most beautiful food and dessert tables.

Our eyes gazed upon the awe inspiring surroundings, a truly wondrous place. We hated to leave but knew we would be returning for a closer view on Friday.

Unfortunately, Miss Scarlet O'Daffodil had lied to us in San Francisco and it does rain in Georgia, just as it does everywhere on ADS Tour Day. So rain gear in hand we converged on the Magnolia Room to view a movie about butterflies and the Day Butterfly Center before boarding buses for a complete tour of Callaway Gardens. The Gardens can only be described as 2500 acres of beauty, lakes, golf courses, beauty, beach, and more beauty.

Jaydee had warned there would be no time for Poker in the back of the buses, so we boarded Aunt Pitty Pat's bus and were off. We informed our guide that she had drawn the rowdy bunch. Season, our guides real name, decided she could put up with us and first took us to Victory Garden South, site of the ADS Hybridizers bed. There were not a lot of blooms left but the bed could not have had a more lovely setting. It was placed in the area where there was a replica of a Southern Plantation Veranda, which had blue pansies planted around the curved lawn area and lovely baskets filled with Martha Washington geraniums hanging from the trees.

Next we were off to see Sibley Center by daylight, the doors of the Center face South, it was built to utilize passive solar. Each door weighs 1600 pounds yet can be opened by hand with little effort. During times when the weather is right, the doors are left open. One can stand looking out over massive beds of tulips, earlier they would have contained daffodils, these beds are changed with the seasons and are always impressive. Sibley Center is filled with all manner of exotic plant material underplanted with annuals and as mentioned earlier Callaway had added massive plantings of daffodils just for us. There is a fern grotto at the top of the waterfall, a most peaceful place. It is really impossible to describe such a fabulous setting. Suffice to say we could not have had a lovelier setting for our Convention.

We next went to the Day Butterfly Center, there are 50 varieties of butterflies and nearly a thousand butterflies at all times flying around the Center. There are educational displays where one can actually watch a butterfly emerge from a chrysalis. Jaydee had tagged certain ones of us with a small yellow sticker, we learned they were not to attract butterflies. The butterflies are however attracted to yellow and red and many of us had up close and personal experiences with them. They use red and yellow kitchen scrubbers in a bowl of sugar water to supplement their diet along with overripe fruit. We also learned that the passion vine is one of their favorites. They lay their eggs on several host plants, and then the plants are removed and later the butterflies are once again placed in the Day Center. We also saw a beautiful pair of Mandarin Ducks, Crested Partridge and Doves. The people at the Center have hung the chrysalis of a 12 inch moth from the trees and several lucky people were able to see one emerge.

Instead of the "Dafnic" planned for Robin Lake Beach Pavilion, we were forced to have lunch back at the Inn. At the last minute there were torrential rains, heavy lightning and high winds predicted, which did

not materialize, thank goodness. The staff at Callaway did a wonderful job of moving everything indoors. Our lunch was courtesy of Deen Day Smith who was the primary contributor to the Butterfly Center. At lunch we learned what the yellow tags were for, those wearing one were chosen to join the young people who entertained us with their clogging. We were amazed to learn that Clive Postles was a natural, you would have thought he had been clogging forever! Some of our own CODS members did a pretty good job of it also.

At the banquet that night we were treated to some real Southern cooking, collard greens (very good), sweet potatoes and apples, roast pork, southern fried chicken and peanut butter pie to name some of the wonderful dishes prepared for us. Our speaker was August DeHertogh who spoke on Daffodil Forcing. After the banquet it was time to tear down the show, Jaydee said she thought a new record had been set as it only took 23 minutes!! I always say, many hands make light work!!

Saturday dawned a little brighter, tour day was over, time for the Hybridizers Breakfast and seminars on various aspects of our hobby. Michael Salmon spoke on Narcissus bulbocodium Species and their Distribution, he will have bulbs available to us in the future. Brent Heath explained why it is safe to buy Species Daffodils, backed up by Jim Wells who said we should all grow them and help preserve the species. Michael Salmon then spoke on Recently described Species and Natural Hybrids. After lunch Brian Duncan spoke on Twenty-five years of Hybridizing, followed by August DeHertegh's talk on Physiology of Narcissus.

After our Saturday night banquet, the food and table decorations were once again outstanding, our speaker was Fred Galle who spoke on Native Azaleas-The Early Years and told us how five years of research had been given up to a bear. The Auction was also held for the benefit of the ADS and the Georgia Daffodil Society. Bulbs donated by various hybridizers brought good prices as usual. The lovely quilt done by Thelma Qualls was purchased by the auctioneer who knew a bargain when he saw one. Jane Meyer took home the lovely wood carving of an Eastern Bluebird with Tete-a-tete daffodils done by Master decoy maker Ernie Mills. It was lovely!

Phyllis Vonnegut invited us all to Indianapolis for the 36th Annual Convention saying that unlike Miss Scarlet O'Daffodil she would not lie to us and that contrary to what the song says, it does rain in Indianapolis - so come prepared.

Our new President Jack Romine closed the Convention after we had all given Jaydee Ager a rousing standing ovation for a job particularly well done. For Miss Scarlet, rain or not how could anyone deny you anything! From the most fabulous boutique, to the most perfect setting for a Convention, to the wonderful smiles on everyone's faces, especially yours, we will all remember the 35th with special fondness. We will carry with us a distinct appreciation for all your dedication and effort to make Southern Reflections 1990 one to remember!!
