### **ADS 1997 Convention**

It never pays to assume anything...assumptions were that we would have a small convention in Jackson and there would not be that many flowers. The ADS Convention was held at the Edison Walthall Hotel in Jackson, Mississippi on March 13-16, 1997. There were over 190 people present and over 2000 blooms in the show. Ohio had more people attending (31) than the host state.

Betty Kealiher, Phyllis Hess, Irene Moseley, Donna Dietsch, Naomi Liggett and I were all on the same plane. Upon arrival at the hotel we found many ADS members from the Pacific Region and warmer areas staging fantastic blooms. A group got together for dinner at the Mayflower Restaurant in Jackson that evening and it was great reminiscing with daffodil friends. Also on the scene were overseas friends: Brian and Betty Duncan, Maureen and Tom Handley, Pat and Tony James, Wim Lemmers, Mary and Sandy McCabe, Reg Nicholl, John and Rosemary Pearson and Kate Reade.

Naomi and I were privileged to judge the national show, therefore, we did not get the opportunity to go on the Vicksburg National Military Park tour. The comments received back at the hotel were very positive about the tours. Some of us had to attend a board meeting and it was my last after being on the board many years. We had dinner across the street from the hotel at the Jackson University Club that was quite elegant. It was raining prior to dinner and we had tuxedoed escorts to hold umbrellas over the ladies and a traffic cop to stop all traffic as we crossed the street. I have always wanted to do that...walk out and stop and start traffic.

On Friday, there were a series of seminars along with the Hybridizers Breakfast with Elise Havens, presiding. The seminars covered Passalong Plants, Daffodil Photography, Not Just a Jonquil, that's an Alloploid and Daffodils in the Southern Perennial Border. Naomi and I had a meeting with the Miniature Committee of ADS and I think Delia Bankhead will make a good chairman and move this committee forward. The bulb auction with loads of items to tempt convention-goers was so well attended that I could not get into the room. I understand that the society made a great deal of money on this project.

Again our dinner was held at the University Club and ADS president, Jaydee Ager presided over the annual meeting. The ADS Gold and Silver Medals were given during this meeting. The Gold for excellence in hybridizing went to Elise Havens and the Silver for service to the society went to Ted Snazelle, Chairman of the convention and former ADS president. It was announced at this meeting that the Executive Committee had approved Naomi Liggett to replace Mary Lou Gripshover as Executive Director on July 1. Elise Havens accepted the first William G. Pannill Award for the cultivar 'Gull' 2W-GWW hybridized by her late father, Grant Mitsch.

On Saturday, there was a Judges Refresher Breakfast and Kathy Andersen, former President of ADS who travels to Spain and Portugal almost every year looking for species spoke on *Judging Container- Grown Daffodils and Species*.

After breakfast we boarded buses for a day of touring. Our first stop was at the Mississippi College Daffodil Garden at Hendrick House and we were greeted by the President of the college and had coffee and muffins. This garden was started a number of years ago at the college by Ted Snazelle who teaches there. We saw many good flowers from hybridizers around the world. From there we went to the Mississippi Agriculture and Forestry Museum for a tour and lunch. Besides the museum there were many historically furnished buildings: doctor's office, church, school, working cotton gin, barn, etc. Behind the doctor's office was a garden for Tough Plants that included daffodils.

After a lunch of fried catfish, potatoes and hushpuppies (a real Southern treat) we headed for the home and garden of Loyce and Herman McKenzie. Loyce was Show reporter for ADS for many years and wrote wonderful articles for the Journal. Some members returned for a board meeting and the remainder had time to rest or visit with friends before our dinner at the Edison Walthall Hotel. Our speaker for the evening was John Pearson of Hoffland Daffodils who presented a slide program that was enjoyed by all.

On Sunday, Betty Kealiher, Irene Moseley, Naomi and I went on the Historic Natchez Tour, which was a spring pilgrimage of old ante-bellum homes. It was very interesting and we had the opportunity to visit a private garden owned by Betty Barnes' son. She was the ADS Judges Chairman for many years. Betty is 91 years of age and looked just great. It was wonderful to see her again. Upon return to the hotel we had dinner and a slide program of the 1997 ADS National Show winners taken by Ted Snazelle.

It was another enjoyable convention, renewing old friendships and making new ones. We look forward to next year in Richmond, VA and hope Bill Pannill's cultivars will be at peak bloom for all to see and enjoy.

### 1997 ADS National Show

The big winner in Jackson was Kirby Fong of California. He received the Gold Ribbon for a beautiful bloom of 'Hambledon' 2YW-WYY, Historic Daffodil Ribbon with N. j. 'Minor Plenus' 4Y-Y, Australian Award, English Award, Carncairn Trophy and the Throckmorton Medal. Not a bad day!

Ruth Pardue won the Purple Ribbon with a beautiful collection of five white daffodils. Included were: 'Ice House' 2W-W, 'Homestead' 2W-W, 'Florence Joy' 2W-W, 'April Love' 1W-W, and 'Crenelet' 2W-W. 'Ice House' and 'Homestead' were in consideration for the Gold Ribbon. 'Ice House' was in a tie with 'Hambledon' necessitating another vote.

Helen Link was awarded the Miniature White Ribbon with seedling #225 1W-W ('Tiny Tot' x 'Divine') x (N. cyclamineus x 'Candlepower') One of these three was the winner of the Miniature Rose Ribbon and was in contention for the Miniature Gold Ribbon. Helen also won the John & Betty Larus Award with three blooms of #2 ('Mite' x N. cyclamineus) 6Y-Y

Mary Lou Gripshover received the Miniature Red, White, Blue Ribbon for 75-3-5 6W-Y ('Candlepower' x 'Kibitizer'), 'Trivial' 1Y-Y Link, 'Norwester' 6Y-Y Gripshover, 73-13-1 2Y-Y ('Bagatelle' x 'Mustard Seed'), 73-1-4 6Y-Y ('Bagatelle' x N. cyclamineus)

Australian Award - 'Pieman' 2W-Y Jackson, 'Bonus Bond' 2W-W Glover, 'Theorum' 1W-Y Jackson, 'Pink Delight' 1W-P Fairbairn, Radcliff Sdlg 42/84 2W-O

Bob Spotts won the Olive Lee Memorial Trophy with a stunning seedling, 97-357 ('New Penny' x 'Rufus' 6Y-YOO, from his winning Quinn entry. This same bloom received the Rose Ribbon for the best standard seedling. The Carey E. Quinn Ribbon was won by Bob with all his own seedlings. Quite a feat! He also won the Red, White, Blue Ribbon with 'Miss Primm' 2Y-Y Dorwin, 'Nob Hill' 2YYW-W DuBose, 'Bryce Canyon' 2W-P DuBose, 'Williamsburg' 2W-W Pannill, 'Pops Legacy' 1W-Y Bender.

The coveted Fowlds Medal went to 'Trena' 6W-Y that was shown by Gertie Butler of Arkansas. Frank Galyon of TN won the Mitsch Trophy for three 2W-R seedlings, DR-2-P ('Dewy Rose' x 'Pipestone')

Rodney Armstrong, TX was awarded the Maroon Ribbon with 'Avalon' 2Y-W, 'Young American' 1YW-WWY, 'Pastorale' 2Y-WWY, 'Lavalier' 5Y-W, 'Inca' 6YYW-WWY. He also won the Harry I. Tuggle Jr. Trophy for three stems each of twelve standard and/or species daffodils from three divisions. Included in his collection were: 'Sportsman' 2Y-R, 'Bulbarrow' 2Y-Y, 'Lyles' 2Y-Y, 'Rapture' 6Y-Y, 'Pretty Miss' 7W-Y, 'Falstaff' 2Y-R, 'Surrey' 2Y-R, 'Pastorale', 'Tinkerbell' 6W-Y, 'Wendover' 7W-Y, 'Bushtit' 6Y-Y.

Martha Anderson, MS received the Lavender Ribbon for 'Tete a Tete' 12Y-Y, 'Pango' 8Y-Y, 'Minnow' 8Y-Y, 'Angel's Whisper' 5Y-Y, N. bulbocodium Atlas form 1-Y-Y

The **New Zealand Award** was awarded to Stan Baird, CA for 'Fairy Charm' 2W-WWP Brogden, 'Red Mantle' 2Y-R Bell, 'Trelay' 3Y-O Phillips, 'Springston Charm' 2W-W Chambers, Phillips Sdlg 77-21-1 4W-Y.

The White Ribbon went to 'Delta Queen' 2W-P shown by Mr. & Mrs. Dick Frank, TN. 'Moncorvo' 7Y-Y gave Nancy Wilson, CA the Miniature Gold Ribbon. The Junior Ribbon was given to 'Lavalier' 5W-Y and 'Pink Valley' 2W-P won the Small Growers Award. Seventeen blues were received by the Small Grower winner, Elaine Shaw, AL which was quite an accomplishment at a National show.

Another Alabamian, Sandy Stewart, won the Northern Ireland Award with 'Foxhunter' 2Y-R Wilson, 'Fly Half 2Y-R, Bloomer, 'Edge Grove' 2W-Y Carncairn, 'Menucha' 2W-GWW Carncairn, 'Thackeray' 9W-GYR Duncan.

All awards in the Hybridizer section were won by John Pearson of England. The best daffodil in the section was 'Clouded Yellow' 2YYW-Y.

Did you notice that all of John's flowers were named but one? Sothis means that you will not have to wait several years for them to be on the market.

Sixty-seven exhibitors made 1009 entries for a total of 2019 blooms. There were no entries in the Container-Grown Classes and the Mains. The Green Ribbon and the Watrous were not awarded.

# Glenbrook Daffodils

In the 1996 ADS shows last year Glenbrook miniature daffodils garnered 24 ADS Ribbons for members in Mississippi (5), California (7), New Jersey (1), and Ohio (7). 'Angel's Whisper' 5Y-Y was included in six winning exhibits; two Lavender and four White Ribbons. With three awards each was 'Minnie' 6Y-Y and 'Mickey' 6Y-Y. 'Minnie' took three White Ribbons and 'Mickey' one Gold and two Lavender. Another from the same cross 'Ferdie' 6Y-Y, won two White Ribbons. Others awarded two ADS Ribbons each were: 'Sassy' 12Y-Y (two White), 'Angel's Breath' 5Y-Y (two White) and 'Spoirot' 12W-W (one White and one Lavender). 'Orclus' 12W-W (White), "Coo' 12Y-Y (White) and 'Swagger' 5W-W (White) each received one award. It is interesting that 12 of these awards were for the White Ribbon that requires three blooms of each cultivar.

'Angel's Whisper' once acclimatized is a good increaser and a welcome addition to the Division 5 miniatures. It usually has four lemon colored florets per scape. A sister 'Angel's Breath' 5Y-Y does not increase as rapidly for me and usually has three lemon florets and blooms a little later. The cross, N. rupicola x N. cyclamineus, which produced 'Mickey' 6Y-Y, 'Minnie' 6Y-Y, 'Mortie' 6Y-Y and 'Ferdie' 6Y-Y have very, very small flowers. So far they have not done well in central Ohio.

Of the four Division 12 bulbocodium hybrids 'Spoirot' 12W-W in my opinion is the one of choice. It does better in cold climites, has thick substance and a beautiful green eye. It also blooms later making if of use for Midwest shows. 'Fyno' 12W-W is the most

tender, blooming in the winter and barely survives here in an unheated garage.

'Sassy' 12Y-Y, one of the newer introductions of Rod Barwick, is one to look for on the awards tables in the near future. Bred from J. stellaris x N. cyclaminueus it looks like a typical cyclamineus but since it can come with two florets it is registered as a Division 12. So far it has been increasing well.

Three standard Glenbrook daffodils were included in three winning Purple Ribbon Collections: 'Shadrack' 3W-YYO, 'Ah Gee' 1Y-Y and 'Chattlin' 6W-W.

At the first show of 1997 in California the Lavender Ribbon consisted of all Glenbrook originations: 'Minnie' 6Y-Y, 'Sassy' 12Y-Y, 'Angel O'Music' 5Y-Y, 'Mickey' 6Y-Y, 'Ferdie' 6Y-Y. The Watrous Ribbon included these same five plus 'Little Missus' 7Y-Y.

The show will be open to the public on Saturday from 1:30 PM to 5:00 PM and on Sunday from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM at which time we will start to tear down. During the show the Conservatory will again feature a Butterfly Exhibit and the Watercolor Society will have paintings of nature and flower scenes. The Spring Flower Exhibit will be a southern garden featuring crepe myrtles, magnolias, etc. A display of hanging baskets will showcase flowers from other countries, labeled with the country of origin.

Silver Celebration will be the 25th anniversary of the first show sponsored by the Central Ohio Daffodil Society that was held at the Mountview Baptist Church. The chairpersons were Ruth Pardue and Naomi Liggett. There were 17 adult and 8 junior exhibitors with 456 entries and 897 blooms. Mary Lou Gripshover won the Gold Ribbon with 'Easter Moon' 2W-GWW.

At the first 'Flickering Light' of 'Dawn', 'Fox Trot' your way to the 'Top of The Hill' and catch a 'Flying Cloud' to Franklin Park and 'Swagger' in to a 'Sweet Victory' with 'Top Notch' daffodils.

### Philatelic Foundling

'Foundling'! It's 'Foundling'! Kate Reade could not have been more excited when she discovered this exquisite 6W-P in her fields than I was when I found it this winter on a postage stamp. Although flowers are popular subjects for stamps, our favorite seldom appears and then only under the general label Daffodil (Remember the U.S. booklet pane single issued in May 1993?) or Narcissus. This time Eire (Ireland/Irish Free State labeled it Narcissus Foundling. As far as I know, this is the first philatelic labeling of a narcissus cultivar.

At the Jackson, MS ADS Convention, Kate Reade shared that the gentleman responsible for influencing Eire to issue this stamp is Charles Nelson, Doctor of Botany, who for years was in charge of Glasnevin, a botanical garden and cemetery in Dublin. "He used to come and walk a lot through our fields." (For those of you who attended the 1997 convention, you may remember 'Glasnevin' as the lovely 2W-W in Kirby Fong's blue ribbon Carncairn collection and in his Throckmorton. Kate thought that Wendy Walsh, who "painted Foundling a lot" may have been the artist for the stamp.

If you, like me, are both a daffoholic and a philateholic, the Eire issue is Scott No. 810, the 26p single in a set of four (810-813) of August 30,1990. And, yes, Eire did give Kate Reade a presentation pack!

### Pannill Award

This was the first year the Pannill Medal was awarded and as Tag mentioned it was won by 'Gull'. The Pannill Award is awarded to an American hybridizer in recogization of a named standard daffodil that has displayed winning qualities for a period of five years following registration. It must receive at least one ADS Gold and one ADS White Ribbon. The cultivars must be generally healthy and be good for show and grow well in a majority of the ADS Regions. This award will be given each year at the Annual Meeting. The Wister/Pannill Awards Committee will present candidates to the ADS Board each fall to be voted on by secret ballot. Last fall the two candidates were 'Gull' and Homestead'.

The 1977 Wister Award was won by 'Rapture' 6Y-Y Grant Mitsch. To win the Wister Award the daffodil should be a good garden plant. In the case of 'Rapture' it is also an excellent show flower.
