PORTLAND 2000

The 2000 American Daffodil Society and World Convention was held March 31, April 1, 2 in Portland Oregon. This is the first time the United States has hosted a World Convention and a very successful one it was. Over 300 persons attended, the largest gathering that I am aware of at an ADS Convention. Approximately 65 were from overseas: Australia, England, Holland, Japan, New Zealand and Northern Ireland. It was great to meet old acquaintances from overseas as well as meet many new ones. One noticeable difference about this meeting, besides size, was the number of younger members in attendance. Let's hope this trend continues.

Entries to the National Show closed on Friday Morning with 1780 entries and 3141 blooms. With a more favorable season this show should have been the largest ever but CODS still holds the record. This year the season in Oregon is just the opposite of Ohio, later than normal. The Gold Ribbon was awarded to Len Forster, OR with a bloom of 'Dynasty' 2Y-R. (When this was announced, Spud was seen dancing a jig!) The runner-up to 'Dynasty' was a beautiful bloom of 'Pacific Fire' 2Y-YOO. 'Hummingbird' 6Y-Y won both the Miniature White Ribbon and the Miniature Gold Ribbon. 'Rapture' 6Y-Y was the winner of the White Ribbon for Steve Vinisky. One unusual thing about this show was there were no entries in the Quinn Collection Class. Also, no entries were made in the Reverse Bicolor Color, Mains and Carncairn Collections. The winners were from all parts of the United States, England and Australia.

Jackson Daffodils swept the Hybridizer's Section winning the ADS Challenge Cup, Evans Award and best bloom in the Section with 'Boltar' 3Y-R. The Evans Award included 'Sea Legend' 2W-W, 'Di Hard' 1W-P, 'Boltar', 'Shockwave' 2Y-R, 'Allez' 1W-Y and 'Wysiwyg' 1W-W. 'Sea Legend', 'Shockwave' and 'Boltar' were also in the ADS Challenge Cup Class along with 'Oops' -2W-Y, 'Twerp' 1W-P, 'Rekuna' 3W-O, 'Zillion' 1Y-Y, 'Banker' 2Y-O, 'Quark' 1W-W, 'Tao' 3Y-R, 'Misquote' 1Y-Y and 'Clubman' 1W-Y. Elise Havens took the Link Award with blooms of 'Arrowhead' 6Y-R, 'Lemon Silk' 6YYW-W and a seedling #TEH 51/2 2Y-O.

John Goddard from England appropriately captured the English Award. Broadway Village 2Y-YRR, Dunkery 4Y-O, Cape Cornwall 2Y-R, Badanloch 3W-YYO and Loch Lundie 2Y-R were in his winning collection. The best Northern Ireland collection, shown by Patty & George Bragdon, contained all Duncan flowers -- 'Gold Bond' 2Y-Y, 'Mt. Angel' 3W-YYR, 'Goldfinger' 1Y-Y, 'June Lake' 2W-GYP and 'Dr Hugh' 3W-GOO. Kathy Andersen, DE took the New Zealand and the Australian awards. For the 2000 World Convention plaques were awarded to the best foreign collection and for the best white trumpet and yellow trumpet red or orange cupped in the Hybridizers Section. Elise Havens won both the trumpet classes with 'Magic Lantern' 1Y-O and Havens Seedling #VHA/1 1W-O. The other plaque was awarded to Kathy's Australian collection which contained 'Muster' 4W-O, 'Nynja' 2Y-Y, 'Goforit' 2Y-O, 'Misquote' 1Y-Y and 'Symptom' 3W-O. Her New Zealand collection included: 'Classic Touch' 2Y-R, 'Florence Joy' 2W-W, 'Guiding Light' 2W-W (all Brogden cultivars), 'Backchat' 6Y-Y and Hamilton Seedling #92/26 1Y-Y.

There was an unusually large number of Junior entries in fact 10% of the total show entries. A busload of students from Amity, OR arrived Friday morning so they could place their entries. After which they were treated to ice cream sundaes. Hannah Wert, IN won the Junior Ribbon with Homestead 2W-W. Beryl 6W-YYO won the Junior Vase of Three and Autumn Stewart, AL won the Junior Collection.

The Rose Ribbon was given to a Havens seedling #2Y 14/5 2W-P and the Miniature Rose Ribbon went to Leone Low with a 6Y-Y seedling, MP-2 ('Mite' x 'Pequenita'). The latter bloom came from Leone's winning Miniature Red, White, Blue Collection, which included 'Hummingbird' 6Y-Y and three other Low seedlings.

The first Havens Medal was awarded to Dr. Jack Hollister, MS. Division 7's included in it were: 'Bunting' 7Y-O, 'Oryx' 7Y-W, 'Stratosphere' 7Y-O, 'An-Gof' 7W-GWO, 'Oregon Gold' 7Y-Y, 'New Day' 7Y-W and 'Gazelle' 7Y-Y. 'Charity May' 6Y-Y, 'Petrel' 5W-W, 'Sunday Chimes' 5W-W, 'Pink Chimes' 5W-P and 'Polly Anderson' 8Y-Y completed the collection. You can tell jonquil hybrids do well in the South.

Stan Baird won the first Bozievich Medal with 'Berceuse' 2W-P, 'Molten Lava' 3Y-YYR, 'Rainbow' 2W-WWP, 'Lurig' 2Y-R, 'Tudor Love' 2W-Y, 'Dunkery' 4Y-O, 'Springston Charm' 2W-W, 'Silver Convention' 1W-W, 'New Penny' 3Y-Y 'Audubon' 2W-WWP, 'Pacific Rim' 2Y-YYR and 'Highpoint' 2Y-Y.

Awards were presented at a special ceremony before dinner. Following dinner Ruth Pardue presented the Pannill Award for an outstanding American show flower. This year's winner was 'Pacific Rim' 2Y-YYR hybridized by the late Grant Mitsch.

Saturday began with a choice of breakfasts, Hybridizer or Historic Daffodils. Dr. Harold Koopowitz acted as moderator at the Hybridizer's. Then it was off to visit Havens Daffodils. The weather was perfect the whole trip, NOT ONE DROP OF RAIN although it had been predicted. It was said that the free yellow umbrellas with convention logo warded off the rain. This is the second Oregon convention in the past ten years without rain. Lots of daffodils had popped out due to the warming temperatures and there were many to see at Havens. I enjoyed the display of miniature daffodils in a raised bed on a retaining wall behind the house. I also admired a planting of 'Dingle Dell' 6W-W a Phillips miniature. I will not be around long enough for this to be on the market.

Our next stop was Rex Hill Winery's picnic grounds where we ate our box lunches. It was warm and we were comfortable sitting outside, no wine though. The bus then continued on to Cherry Creek Daffodils, home of Steve Vinisky. There were still many daffodils yet to bloom here. Steve has added three greenhouses, where he grows other plants, since our last trip.

At 5:30 a stern wheeler, Columbia Gorge, was at the hotel pier waiting to take us on a cruise of the Columbia River. Beautiful tables of hors d'oeurves were set up courtesy of Kit Pannill along with a hosted bar. The ADS Bulb Auction was held during the cruise with Steve as auctioneer. Over \$6300.00 was realized from this bulb auction with the help of a great auctioneer and the free alcohol. Not to mention the generosity of the individuals who donated the bulbs. I cannot tell you about the cruise as I was busy keeping track of bids.

After the cruise it was back to the hotel for dinner and a speech by John Pearson -- What's In a Name. This was accompanied by slides and occasionally jazz music. Are you tried yet?

Sunday was not a day of rest but another whirlwind of activity. A Miniature Breakfast moderated by Delia Bankhead was held. Her panel included: John Blanchard, England; Dr. Harold Koopowitz, USA; David Adams, NZ and Mike Temple-Smith, Tasmania. The discussion centered on how to get more color in miniatures and more cultivars in certain divisions.

After breakfast a Judging Refresher was scheduled. Three classes of six blooms each had been staged and panels of three from four countries were assigned times to judge the three classes. The classes were then photographed with digital camera and entered in a laptop computer under the direction of Nancy Tackett. This enabled the audience to view the three classes as the panel members discussed the judging. Not surprisingly, all four panels placed the three collections in the same order. After lunch, John Blanchard gave a slide presentation entitled *Wild Wonderings*. John has made numerous trips to the mountains of Spain, France and North Africa searching for and identifying wild daffodils. The slides were some of the species he has found on his trips.

At the this Luncheon, Brian Duncan announced that William G. Pannill had been selected to receive the prestigious Peter Barr Memorial Trophy. This award first given in 1912 is awarded annually by recommendation of the Narcissus & Tulip Committee of The Royal Horticutural Society. It is given to an individual who "has done good work of some kind in connection with daffodils". What more deserving person than Bill Pannill to receive this award. Some of his well-known introductions read like the winners list at an ADS Show: 'Intrique' 7Y-W, 'Homestead' 2W-W, 'River Queen' 2W-W, 'Ashland' 2W-Y, 'New Penny' 3Y-Y, 'Peggy White' 2W-W, miniature 'Junior Miss' 12W-Y and many many more! The sad part of this announcement was that Bill was not at the convention to receive it in person. Congratulations to Bill and get well soon!

Next, it was onto the buses for the trip to the Corbett area to visit Bonnie Brae and Oregon Trail Daffodil plantings. Unfortunately, due to the late spring there were not many daffodils in bloom at either location.

After the final dinner, Leslie Ramsay gave a delightful talk on *Daffodil Friendships*. Peter is not the only one in that family with a great sense of humor! Then it was farewell to all our friends as well as many new ones. Parting is such sweet sorrow. It will be a long time before there are this many international visitors at an ADS Convention. It was a great convention my only complaint being there was not enough time! The only part of the National Show I had time to see was the classes I judged and a few of the collection classes.

Last but certainly not the least, CODS member, Peg Newill was installed as the new president of ADS. Congratulations, Peg.
