PRESERVING BLOOMS FOR SHOWING

I have a frost-free refrigerator, and at daffodil time have tried various methods of prolonging the freshness of some "blue ribbon" blooms for our show, but have not succeeded until the end of our blooming season was upon us. Thoroughly groom the flower, put it in a plastic bag, blow the bag full of air, and seal tightly with a "twist 'em." Reverly Campbell, one of our CODS members, has been using this method for several years. She doesn't have much garden space and must preserve every good daffodil that she has.

I experimented with the above method and the flower kept very well for over a week. In another bag I put a wet cotton pad near the ovary. I made sure the cotton didn't touch the bloom and the flower kept surprisingly well for over a week. When preparing for the show, cut the stem a quarter of an inch and put in tepid water and they revive beautifully. Before the 1983 shows begin, I will experiment with my minis to see how well they hold up. Thanks, Beverly!

DAFFODIL RESOURCES AVAILABLE AT FRANKLIN PARK CONSERVATORY

PREVENT POISON IVY PROBLEMS --- PERMANENTLY

Until about four years ago, poison ivy was the bane of my existence. Over the years I had had several severe cases and seemed to become more sensitive all the time. I have been relatively untroubled since following the advice of a woman who said her children literally "sat in poison ivy."

She said to purchase a liquid soap, tincture of green soap at a pharmacy, wash immediately after gardening with it, and then use alcohol. I located the soap at the Wyandotte Pharmacy which stocked it in bulk, so I could purchase a small bottle at a reasonable price from the pharmacist.

Now immediately upon coming into the house after pardening, I change clothes and put them in the hamper handling as little as possible. Then I shower with tincture of green soap, followed by alcohol. I also avoid the use of hand cream on susceptible areas for a flew days until sure that no itching occurs. Special care should be taken in spring or in autumn after frost, as infection can occur when leaves are absent. One of my worst cases occurred in early spring after ripping out a lot of roots around our apartment house foundation.
