OFF THE BEATEN PATH

The State of Ohio offers a wealth of opportunities for recreation, museums for appreciating history that shaped it and pleasurable excursions to suit any tastes or interests such as daffodils. I would like to start a column in CODS CORNER where members could suggest places located away from interstate highways --- Off The Beaten Path---to enjoy plantings of daffodils.

One suggestion would be Landoll's Mohican Castle, 561 Twp. Road 3352, Loudonville, OH 44842, Tele. #1-800-291-5001, Ext. 6353. It's situated in the hills of Mohican Forest and offers lunch, high tea, entertainment and a tour of the kingdom. The royal grounds are cascading with fragrant flowers and greenery, plus they have planted over 5,000 daffodils. They are also set up for groups like members of plant societies for guided tours.

Kingwood Center is a place that is always changing, keeping pace with the seasons, one being the daffodil season. Thousands of daffodils naturalized and well identified.

It is Richland County's top tourist attraction. A 47-acre estate built in 1926 by Charles Kelly King, Chairman of Ohio Brass. The King home is used today to house a horticulture library and offices. The address is 900 Park Avenue West, Mansfield, OH 44906, telephone 4l9-522-0211. I truly enjoy going there and viewing the magnificent gardens.

This is a great facility to visit in combination with a stop at one of my all-time favorite nurseries, Wade & Gatton, between Bellville and Butler, OH, just off Route 97 at 1288 Gatton Rocks Road, Bellville, OH 44813, telephone 419,883-3191. Van Wade's grandfather, on the land that their home was on, started Wade & Gatton Nursery. Wade & Gatton is famous today for their Hosta collection (2,000 varieties and cultivars) and each plant is labeled. Naomi and I usually visit during Day Lily blooming time. Whenever you have a chance to visit Wade & Gatton Nursery, you should. You always come away with a little

something, pictures, new ideas for landscaping or a new plant.

Lakeview Cemetery, 12316 Euclid Ave Cleveland, OH 44106-4313, telephone 216 421 2665. The 135 year-old cemetery observes annually a Daffodil Sunday. Over 100,000 blossoms cover a large hill --- yellow daffodils, forsythia and pink weeping cherry trees among the gray monuments. Wells Knierim donated many of these daffodils and he and Mary are buried at the top of this hill.

Last, but not least, don't forget CODS Daffodil Garden in Whetstone Park.

In your travels you will need an Ohio highway map and the Ohio Division of Travel and Tourism will mail you a map at no charge if you call 1-800-BUCKEYE.
