REFLECTIONS OF THE PAST

Happy 10th Anniversary On June 18, 1968, CODS was born. Our founder, Mary Elizabeth Blue of Chillicothe served as our first President. Wells Knierim came willingly at our first cry for help in setting up a clinic in 1969. We moved on to participation in the Horiculture Division of Norwest Show, educational exhibits in many shows and libraries and our own shows 1972 through 1977. Cods Corner was born in 1971 and it marked the beginning of our bulb sales. We've hosted Judges Schools I, II and III and can now provide accredited ADS judges for daffodil and other shows. In 1974 we started our planting at the Whetstone Park of Roses. In 1975 we participated in the Dispatch Home and Garden Show and ADS accepted our invitation to come to Columbus in 1978. 1976 gave us an unusual Leap Year with an unusual show due to weather conditions, but gave us a beautiful exhibition by the Ohio Branch of Sogetsu School. In 1977 we had a successful Daffodil Clinic for the public. another show with Sogetsu and our annual after show dinner at the Jai-Lai. 1978 our crowning glory ... the ADS convention came to town. Accolades such as "best ever", our education garden "better than Wisley", our CODS members "best organized, congenial, friendly, great hosts!" Judges School at Convention with a number of CODS members now bearing the title "Student Judge."

Ten years of camaraderie, hard work and excellent results. Over these ten years, we've grown from 13 charter members to 39 members, we've entertained "daffodil royalty" from around the world, our members have served and are continuing to serve ADS admirably, such as Mary Lou Gripshover becoming Editor of the ADS Journal in 1978. We were able to pay tribute to Mary Elizabeth Blue, our founder, at Convention this year and Wells and Mary Knierim today still heed our cries for help and come through so willingly. How we value their expertise and friendship. Of the 13 charter members, Mary Elizabeth Blue, Naomi Liggett, Ruth Pardue, Jennie Belle Adler, Katie Rollins, Mary Lou Gripshover and Grace Baird are still among us. We did lose one charter member and past president, Cynthia Bell, and our lives were enriched by knowing her and we are fortunate to have her daughter, Gretchen, now with us.

Now on to the next decade with warm regard for one another and additional hard work to make our society as successful as possible. As your president I will do my best to carry on the excellent tradition of the Central Ohio Daffodil Society.

The judges luncheon was aptly handled by Jennie Belle Adler and Katie Rollins. Thanks to those of you who donated the lovely trophies and to Naomi Liggett for purchasing them. There were so many people who helped that it is impossible to list each of you, but I hope you each know we needed you and you came through magnificently.

The staging of the show was greatly facilitated by the use of Carolyn Marsh's truck and two of her employees. We owe Carolyn a great big thank you as she donated this service, free of charge.

I would like to make a few comments about the show. First, it was the finest show, quality-wise, I have ever seen and one of the largest that ADS has ever had. We had 889 Daffedil exhibits with 2263 blooms and 25 Artistic Designs.

There were 5 entries in the Quinn Class. Golden Aura and Rainbow appeared in three, artic Gold and Churchtown in two. Mrs. Anderson used Figi in the winning Quinn as well as her winning Carcairn Cup entry. There were some excellent doubles throughout the show, such as the Tonga used by Mrs. Bozievich in her winning Tuggle Trophy class.

A variety which showed very well was Vigil. In the vase of 3, it scored 1st and 2nd. Three of the 4 entries in the collection of 5, Division 1 used Vigil and it beat Panache in the single stem class. Oddly though, it was not used in any of the Challenge Classes.

Artic Gold and Olympic Gold appeared in 2 of the 4 collections of 5, but both lost to Carrickbeg in the single stem class.

Silken Sails was quite lovely as a winner in the single stem, 3's and used in collections also.

Broomhill was in 3 of the all white collections of 5, was the vase of 3 winner and used extensively in Challenge Collections.

Arish Mell won the single and three stem classes and appeared in the winning Lawler. Note was made that older varieties showed up in the Lawler class.

Aircastle was the big winner of the show for Mrs. Bozievich. As Best of Show it was taken from her collection of 12. She also won the best vase of 3 stems from her Tuggle collection. Aircastle was used in her red ribbon entry Mains entry. It has been said that this variety is a very consistent show flower. The color can vary from season to season, but this year it was just right for Bethesda, Maryland, and Marie Bozievich's garden.

In the miniature classes, Segovia was everywhere and won the Miniature Gold and White Ribbons. Stafford and Rikki appeared many times also.

Note should also be made of the outstanding seedlings exhibited by Dr. Bender. Not only did his beautiful 2W-0 (Orion x Anacapri) win the ADS Rose Ribbon, but he was awarded the Red, White and Blue Ribbon for five of his own seedlings.

Of all the classes in the shew the Tuggle Trophy was the most outstanding. The four entries that were staged were all excellent. Each of the exhibitors were praised by the judges and comment was made that they could all score 90 points. The winning entry included Tonga, Highland Wedding, Loch Hope, Gin & Lime, Bethany, Norval, Falstaff, Top Notch, Aircastle, Amber Light, Precedent, and Rushlight.

Again, it was a great show and CODS should be proud of their accomplishment of hosting one of the best shows ever staged.
