One comment which I would like to share with our members was made by Bob Spotts of California. He was amazed by the competition in the collections. It seems the Pacific Region's emphasis in on the seedling awards. We also had some beautiful seedlings exhibited by Helen Link and Mary Lou Gripshover. We had three lovely entries in the Quinn Collection Class. There were seven entries each in the American Bred and the All-White classes. This is what competition is all about and makes for the outstanding reputation our show has across the country.

TROPHIES OF THE CENTRAL OHIO DAFFODIL SOCIETY

At the Awards banquet following the show, the trophies were passed to the winners with a brief explanation of the origination of the trophy. I have been asked to chronicle this collection of trophies for the record.

For the best standard daffodil, the Mary Elizabeth Blue Founder's Cup was established by the society. Mary Elizabeth Blue, an ADS judge and National Council judge, was the guiding light in the establishment of CODS. She came from Chillicothe to rally seven unsuspecting novices to learn more about daffodils and put on an exhibit. She had us visit Adena to see their exhibit. She was a gracious and extremely talented woman. She was the one that planted the seed that quickly grew to become our Society.

Another person very instrumental in the establishment of our group was Leonora C. Wilkie of the Dayton area. Leonora taught our first judges schools. Her knowledge and keen sense of perfection is reflected today in the high quality of exhibition at the CODS shows. The society chose to honor her by presenting the Leonora C. Wilkie Award for the best miniature in our show. Leonora was an expert on miniatures.

The award for the best collection of 12 Standard Daffodils (ADS Green Ribbon) was established in memory of Cynthia Bell, who served as the first president of CODS. My recollections of wine and cheese parties at Cynthia's lovely home in Grandview are pleasant and bring back memories of a daffodil devotee, who travelled to Texas to attend a judges school so we could get a school started here. Her favorite daffodil was Tudor Minstrel. I always think of her when I see it exhibited.

An award for the best standard daffodil in the Junior Section is called the Christopher David Lang Award. This silver child's drinking cup was given by Cynthia Bell in honor of her first grandchild.

The Mary and Wells Knierim Award for the best vase of 3 standard daffodils was established to honor a very special couple. Wells has always exhibited vases of three with an adept hand, many times entering the Bronze Ribbon Class with multiple entries. Wells has served the American Daffodil Society since its inception and was instrumental in the formation of CODS. He taught our first judges school and enticed us to enter his Western Reserve Show. He sent bulbs to exhibitors as thank yous. Many of us got our first good bulbs from Wells. Those of us who were fortunate to know the late Mary Knierim remember a true lady in every sense of the word. She was beautiful and had a demeanor of grace. She was a fair judge and always looked for the best in flowers and also people.

A tremendous contribution to CODS was made by a gentleman I never had the pleasure to meet. All of the first black blocks for staging exhibits were cut, drilled and glued by Walter T. Poppenger. At our recent show, Margaret and Grace Baird were helping place the awards after judging and Margaret said to her mother, "It's nice to see Grandfather's name." Yes, it was Grace's father who made all those first blocks that really give our show a style. Grace presented the trophy as a lasting thank-you to her father.

The Jean Wright Award is a memorial trophy to one of our early members. It is for the best in the Small Growers Section, open to anyone growing less than 100 cultivars or species. Jean was always active in CODS and you could count on her to show up for staging and show time. Jean grew relatively few cultivars, but she had magnificent, large clumps of good daffodils, especially Richardson hybrids. It's fitting that the Small Growers Award honors the memory of Jean Wright.

American breeders of daffodils are being honored with special awards throughout the United States. One of CODS original members is honored by having our trophy named for her. It is most appropriate that Mary Lou Gripshover's name graces this CODS award. Mary Lou has been hybridizing since the early 70's. She won the coveted Larus Award at

the 1990 ADS National Show in Atlanta with one of her miniature candidates.

There are three other pieces of silver given as trophies. These are not in honor or memory of anyone special but are awarded for: the class of 12 white daffodils; the Novice Award open to anyone who has never won a blue ribbon in an ADS Show; and the Silver Ribbon winner which is awarded to the recipient of the most blue ribbons.

All new awards must be presented to the Awards Committee for review, who in turn present their recommendations to the society for approval.

We have beautiful awards all of which are perpetual. To be awarded one of these trophies is an honor and knowing these histories make them even more special.
