We had 468 exhibits and 912 blooms! Freshness and quality of bloom was tremendous. Second day bloom wilt was non-existent. There were 245 entries in Section A, single blooms; 186 blooms in vases of three and there was an increase in miniature stems. Leone Low had an extremely nice 2W-GPP seedling (Ken's Favorite x Dalcharn) which brought a lot of attention.

I want to thank all the members who helped set-up and tear down the show. Once again Zoo personnel made our job much easier and much quicker.

Even the dreadful weather in the weeks prior to the Show did not deter 67 members staging 1,275 vases of top quality blooms at the Group's Show. We were pleased to see the honours were as usual well shared - no society can thrive if they are a 'one man band'.

Frank Verge had a particularly good day, winning the Best Exhibit in the Show with his Championship 12, six blooms of which were of his own raising, namely: Fiona McKillop (a 2W-Y of particular interest, Laura Manser, J.41, Mereworth, two more flowers under number, staged with Rockall, Gold Convention, Gin and Lime, Unique, Sportsman and Torridon.

Mike Baxter's Division 2W-P seedling Coral Fair x Rainbow received three S.E.E.D.G. Rosettes -Reserve Best Bloom, Best Seedling and Best Division 2. This was an outstanding cultivar and well worth looking out for in the future.

The award for the Best Bloom in the Show went to an exceptional Moon Shadow, shown by Peer Wilkens and raised by Clive Postles.

1994 was the Group's 10th Show and to celebrate the event a Special Class calling for 10 Cultivars, any Division(s) in two vases of five was included. This popular Class was won by Geoff Ridley with a colourful exhibit containing Ashmore, Chickerell, Crackington, Achduart, and Ringleader, with Dr. Hugh, Purbeck Torridon, Stoke Charity and Loch Hope.

The two Classes asking for 3 Cultivars, 3 stems of each, at least two Divisions, and 3 Cultivars Division 4, were both won by David Mathews. David's fine exhibits composed Golden Vale, Chickerell and Golden Aura, and in the latter Class Sherbourne, Unique and Beauvallon.

The 6 Cultivars, 1 Stem of Each, at least 3 Divisions Class was won by John Goddard with a very well balanced exhibit of White Star, Dailmanach, S50, Royal Princess, Grand Prospect and an extremely smooth Torridon.

There were ten exhibitors in the Class of 3 Cultivars Division 5-9 but Jack Body took the honours with Ice Wings, Avalanche and a striking Foundling.

Winner of the President's Trophy for the Most Meritorious Trade Stand in the Show was, for the second year running, Peter Fenn with his beautiful Stand for Constable Daffodils. Peter certainly had some interesting flowers on show.

There were 38 Classes in the Single Bloom Section and these attracted 750 good vases, with some Classes having over 30 entries in them - quite a headache for the judges. This Section contained three flowers which each received a S.E.E.D.G. Rosette for Best Division: a very smooth example of the old favorite Viking shown by Peter Mills, a superb Gay Song exhibited by Norman Lincoln, and a splendid three-headed Ice Wings staged by John Goddard.

As usual the Novice Section was well supported, boding well for the Group's future. Derek Lewis won four out of the six Classes with some very good blooms and using some of the older varieties, with Rainbow, Verona and Rockall being of particular note.

The Group's 10th Show will be remembered as another great success. Each year the number of exhibits increase, a trend which it is hoped will continue, and I am sure that with all our keen members, it will.

RO-1DSIDE RolINBOW

Colour Columbus recently won a Hometown Pride Award of \$1000 from *Midwest Living* Magazine for its involvement in the Roadside Rainbow program. Prize money will be used to purchase flowers. This program will also receive international attention in July when ODOT reports on the program at the International Road Federation Conference in Calgary, Alberta, Canada. There has been great cooperation between the public and private sector in accomplishing these plantings. It started in 1992 when Colour Columbus raised \$20,000 to purchase bulbs but didn't have the personnel to plant them. ODOT crews planted then as there is a lull in maintenance at planting time.

750,000 more bulbs are planned for this fall at the interchanges of I-270 with I-70 and I-71. In 1995 plans are to add bulbs along the to be completed I-670

A story about the contest winners will appear in the October issue of *Midwest Living* that has a circulation of 800,000 in 12 Midwestern states. This should be great exposure for one of our favorite flowers!

This spring I hope many of you had the opportunity to see the daffodils already planted along the freeways around Columbus. Some stood out more than others. Ex: I-71 in vicinity of the Ohio State Fairgrounds, I-71 Frank Road exit, 315 Ackerman Road exit. My thoughts on these plantings are that the bulbs are planted too close together for future development of the bulbs being naturalized. Mixed colors and cultivars and some plantings on flat grades were not pleasing. Plantings on slopes had the most eye appeal. Some daffodils appeared short maybe because the grass was too long or maybe they were planted late. But the efforts of ODOT and Colour Columbus is greatly appreciated!


