The best bloom in the Challenge Classes was Brian's 'Jake' 3Y-GOO.

A first-time attendee, Nial Watson of Northern Ireland won the ADS Gold Ribbon with 'Notre Dame' 2W-GYP. Nial will be taking over Ballydorn Bulb Farms in the future. Bill Pannill won the ADS White Ribbon with a vase of three 'Homestead' 2W-W, one of which I felt should have been Best in Show. Margaret Baird won the Historic Ribbon with 'Cheerfulness' 4W-Y, Fran & Clay Higgins won both the Fowlds with 'Elfin Gold' 6Y-Y and the Olive Lee with 'Ice Wings' 5W-W. The Higgins also were first-time winners of the Quinn.

As to the Miniature Ribbons, Steve Vinisky won the Miniature Gold with N. triandrus subsp. pallidullus, Olivia Wellbourn the Miniature White with 'Stafford' 7Y-O and Kathleen McAllister won the Lavender with 'Little Rusky' 7Y-GYO, 'April Tears' 5Y-Y, 'Pixie's Sister' 7Y-Y, N. wilkommii 13Y-Y and 'Clare' 7Y-Y. She also won the Watrous.

On Thursday evening the National Show Awards Banquet and Annual Meeting were held. Spud Brogden was our guest speaker and gave a very enjoyable talk entitled "Daffodils-My Life."

On Friday, I really wanted to attend the Sogetsu Flower Arranging program in that I was involved in Sogetsu classes here, but there's no way I could make a 7:00 a.m. meeting. Elise Havens was moderator for the Hybridizers Breakfast. As usual, when garden tours are on the agenda, guess what, it rains! It was raining so hard when we arrived at the Rowles Garden that I did not get off the bus. Diane Mrak had a very interesting and beautifully

laid-out garden. Lunch at the Allegheny Country Club was nice and again, due to rain, we sat on the porch and visited with friends instead of touring the gardens. The evening's entertainment was a Riverboat Cruise and Dinner aboard the "Gateway Clipper". Pittsburgh sits at the confluence of three rivers: Allegheny, the great Ohio and the Monongahela. Steve Vinisky gave us some exercises in sleight of hand and many danced to the music of a Dixieland Band.

The ADS Gold Medal for recognition of creative work of a pre-eminent nature in the understanding and advancement of daffodils was presented to our own, Mary Lou Gripshover. On Saturday, Ruth Pardue presided over the Judges Refresher and I understand cleared up a number of judging questions, especially the one on unopened buds. She stated "An additional bud is a positive, and not a negative in a jonquil hybrid, showing good cultivation. Some additional consideration should be given to this sort of stem, but since the flower cannot be seen, it does not score as high as it might have, because the petals are obscured. Richard Ezell presented a workshop "Competing with the Big Guys without Spending Big Bucks."

We then boarded the buses for Kridlers Gardens in Homeworth, Ohio. It was an unbelievably beautiful day and there is no way I can describe this fabulous garden and do it justice. Barry Kridler and Barrie Nichols had everything to perfection and we just didn't have enough time to cover it all.

The final banquet on Saturday night was a special one. Brian Duncan was the guest speaker and his talk was entitled "Reflections and Projections." Bulb Fly

From Daffnet by Dr. Ted Snazelle

Although not listed on the label in the United States, Dursban (chlorpyrifos) has been used in the United Kingdom and The Netherlands in the past for fly control. I'm not sure about today. Basically what is done is to apply a drenching foliar spray of Dursban directed at the base of the foliage (near ground level) where the fly lays it usual single egg on the basal plate (some peole say elsewhere as well). So, the strategy is to have the Dursban on the foliage and in the soil as the egg hatches to kill the fly larva; hence, control. The Dursban foliar spray is applied at least three times during the fly season. Basically, the recommended amount of Dursban is one teaspoom (5 milliliters) of liquid Dursban (22.4% chlorpyrifos)/three gallons of water/100 square feet of bed; this constitutes a drenching spray. Rain after spraying is said not to hurt as it gets the Dursban down into the soil around the bulb to kill the fly. Sometimes you will find liquid Dursban sold in a formulation containing 2.85% chlorpyrifos. With this formulation, you would use 35 milliliters or two tablespoons plus one teaspoon of the 2.85% formulation/three gallons water/100 square feet of daffodil bed.
