CHIHULY, BUTTERFLIES AND DAFFODILS APRIL 24-25, 2004 CODS OHIO STATE SHOW

Naomi and I returned home from Convention the evening of April 19th to find our flowers had "popped" while we were gone! 6's were blooming with 9's and the whole patch seemed to bloom at once. Of course, the rains came, at our house we had 2 ¼ inches, and managed to melt most of the blooms.

Hmmmmm, now where have I heard that before? Oh yes, last year and the one before that as well. Such is life for the daffodil grower. At least next year we will be back to our "regular" weekend as the National Convention will be earlier.

Fortunately, once again our judges and guests managed to salvage our show.

17 exhibitors staged 201 exhibits with 419 blooms. This is probably the smallest show we have ever staged, but, we had blooms to show the public, and they came in large numbers to see them. Franklin Park has been experiencing record numbers of visitors the past few weeks with around 20,000 visitors each weekend. They also did a superb job of telling visitors the "daffodil show is downstairs".

Leone Low won the Gold with 'Sargeant's Caye' 1 yyw-wwy a John Pearson cultivar. It was lovely. She also won the White with 'Spindletop' 3 w-y from Bill Pannill.

The Mini Gold, 'Stafford' 7 y-yyo was won by Naomi Liggett, it was perfection. She also garnered the Silver Ribbon with 15 blues. The Mini White was won by Tag Bourne for 'Hawera' 5 y-y, which were most prolific.

Dan Bellinger's 'Carnage' 2 y-yyo caught my eye. It is his own introduction and while the name might be unusual, the flower is great. Naomi's winning Watrous was as usual, darling. Oregon Pioneer was another flower that caught my eye this year. Betty Kealiher and Nancy Kolson helped fill in the show and won lots of blues.

Mary Hedges won Best in Show in the design section for her beautiful pedestal arrangement. It was most striking and the public loved it! The design section of the Show was, as usual, marvelous! The public loved the miniature designs and the breakfast trays! The pedestal designs added this year were very striking.

The Central Ohio Daffodil Society held their show, "Chihuly, Butterflies, and Daffodils" at the Franklin Park Conservatory on April 24-25. While it was the smallest show ever, bloom-wise, the crowds of people who came through the show did not seem to mind. The Park is experiencing record crowds since they are having the butterflies and Chihuly exhibit all at once. I was told approximately 20,000 visitors toured each of the last 3 weekends, this one was no exception.

The Gold and White Ribbons were won by Leone Low, a lovely bloom of Sargeant's Caye 1 yywwwy for the Gold and Spindletop 3 w-y the White.

Naomi Liggett won the mini Gold with Stafford 7 y-yyo and Tag Bourne won the mini White with a very prolific vase of Hawera 5 y-y.

The best American bred bloom was Lemon Supreme 7 yww-wwy also won by Tag. Betty Keahiler garnered the best New Zealand bred with a Brogden Sdlg. 264/25 2 w-w. The best Standard Pink was won by Leone with another of her sdlg's, VO-4, 2 w-p. Naomi won the Historic with Grey Lady, 3 w-wwp.

Once again the males ruled supreme as Kyle Sparks beat his sisters for the Youth Award with Flower Record, 2 w-yyo. (Sister Nikki says it won't happen again next year!) Mom, Tina Sparks won the Small Growers with Pipit 7 y-yww.

Tag also won the standard R/W/B with: All American 2 w-p, Lemon Lyric 2 yyw-y, Excitement 3 w-yyo, Emerald Empire 2 w-gww, and Oregon Pioneer 2 y-p all from Mitch/Havens. Oregon Pioneer was superb this year!

Leone Low continued her winning ways with the mini R/W/B: Sewanee 2 w-y, Little Rusky 7 y-gyo, Odile 7 y-o all from Watrous and 2 of her own seedlings, 3-5-M2 7 y-yoo and 6-4-K2, 3 w-gor which was also the mini Rose winner.

Naomi Liggett's winning Watrous included: Yellow Xit 3 w-y, Little Sentry 7 y-y, Rikki 7 w-y, Xit 3 w-w, N. henriquessii 13 y-y, Sewanee 2 w-y, Clare 7 y-y, Fairy Chimes 5 y-y,
Stafford 7 y-yyo, odoratus 8 w-y, Spoiret 10 w-w

Stafford 7 y-yyo, odoratus 8 w-y, Spoirot 10 w-w and Segovia 3 w-y. Her winning Lavender included: Yellow Xit, 3 w-y, Xit, 3 w-w, Stafford 7 y-yyo, Clare, 7 y-y, and Segovia 3 w-y. She also won the Silver Ribbon with 15 blues.

Donna Dietsch won the Purple Ribbon with her collection of Div 2's: Easter Moon 2 w-gww, Conestoga, 2 w-gyo, Oregon Pioneer, 2 y-p, Springwood, 2 w-gww, and Red Mission, 2 y-r.

The Standard Rose ribbon winner came from Dan Bellinger's winning Bozie. #95-1-34 2 y-gyo (Altruist x Golden Strand). The other Bozie blooms were: Carnage 2 y-yyo, Vienna Woods 9 w-r, Whiskey Mac 2 yyw-y, Elizabeth Ann 6 w-gwp, #96-3-1, N. p. Hellenicus sdlg, 9 w-gyr, Silver Monarch 2 w-w, Unknown Poet 9 w-gyr, Clouded Yellow 2 yyw-y, 95-1-3, 2 y-goo another Altruist x Golden Strand sdlg, Dainty Miss, 7 w-gww, and Sabrewing 5w-gww.

The Throckmorton and Quinn were not awarded.

As usual, the design classes elicited lots of comments, Mary Hedges was the Grand Champion with her pedestal design.

It would take more than a broken arm to keep me from going to an ADS Convention! This year the convention was held in Washinton, DC, the perfect place for the 50th anniversary convention. I was overwhelmed the minute I walked in the door of the staging room and saw thousands of daffodils—mor4e than I had ever seen ine one place before! Huge pots of forced blooms were everywhere. The bulbs were provided by Brent Heath and forced by Mitsch Carney. Mitch was also Show Co-Chairman. And what a show it was! It was the largest ever with a total of 3,193 blooms. Truly impresssive. And many of the visitors thought so, too.

WDS provided us with many things to do: the workshops were very informative, as always. (A piece of advice I took to heart was when Brent Heath advised us to fertilize in the Fall only.) Best of all were the garden tours (Cla7 & Fran Higgins" and Kathy Welsh's), where we could see over a thousand cultivars in each one and how they were grown. Clay's were grown in raised beds and watered regularly. (I think that man cornered the market on soaker hoses.) Kathy;s were grown with other plants and trees in a border. Both were extraordinary! On Saturday night, before sinner, we all got to tour the gardens at the British Embassy. They looked wonderful. The head-gardener remarked that he had to live up to the reputation the Brits have as super-gardeners.

One of the most impressive events occurred in the Founders' Lounge. Not only did we get to mingle as we looked through scrapbooks, and have our copies of The American Daffodil Society: The First Fifty Years autographed, but also we got to participate in a wine-tasting party—Obsession, a white wine from Ironstone Vineyards, named for our obsession with daffodils and decorated with a picture of a daffodil on the label. What a treat!

This was an extended Convention, with many staying Monday to participate in the optional tours, or Judges School. Some of us went home. Whichever it was, everyone left happy and with the promise to "see you next year in St. Louis."
