I wish we could get better attendance at our meetings. With so few coming it is difficult to schedule any kind of program. This is the beginning of CODS' forty-first year. It was organized on June 18, 1968. First members were garden club ladies who had been involved with the NorWest Flower Show and decided to become more involved with growing and showing daffodils. Of the thirteen charter members three are still members - Mary Lou Gripshover, Ruth Pardue, Naomi Liggett.

Here are some highlights of the last forty years:	
1971 1978	CODS CORNER was started by Mary Lou Gripshover who acted as Editor until moving to Tennessee in
1971-1973	ADS Judging School I, II, III held with five people becoming ADS Accredited Judges.
1972	Our first daffodil show held at Mountview Baptist Church with 456 entries and 897 blooms.
1974 chairman for s	Whetstone Display Garden started with the planting of approximately 125 cultivars. Ruth Pardue was everal years.
1978 School 1 held	Hosted ADS Convention and had largest National show until 1983. (889 entries, 2263 blooms) Judging at convention.
1979	Citation from Garden Club of Ohio, Inc for Whetstone Display Garden.
1983 receive	Garden Club of Ohio, Inc and National Garden Clubs awards were ed for 1982 Regional Daffodil Show and Whetstone Display Garden.

Hosted ADS Convention at Hyatt at Capital Square. Again set record for number of entries. (1248 1987 entries, 3163 blooms)

Hosted ADS Convention at Hyatt at Capital Square in conjunction with the Ameriflora 92 Festival held at Franklin Park. Planted a bed of daffodils at Ameriflora. Dug them immediately after blooming and gave them to Columbus Zoo where they potted up over 2000 bulbs. (895 entries, 2005 blooms)

1993 Received awards from Garden Club of Ohio, Inc. and National Garden Clubs for the 1992 National Show.

2005 Hosted ADS Fall Board Meeting

Final beds at Whetstone dug and display garden shut down. The weeds were a serious problem along with aging members. We hope that the garden gave the public 35 years of beauty and enlightenment of the diversity of daffodils.

2008 Phyllis Hess became the fourth member of CODS to receive the American Daffodil Society Silver Medal (Mary Lou Gripshover, Tag Bourne and Naomi Liggett)

Time is fast approaching for lifting bulbs. Because it has been dry in recent weeks it seems the foliage is dying down faster then usual. I have already dug my strays (way too many left last year) and hopefully have them all identified correctly. It is so important to have good maps. Burying markers when planting helps when digging but not with the strays that are left.

The Executive Committee will be meeting soon to set the schedule for next year.

LATEST NEWS FROM CHRISTOPHER MASLON

Yes, it has taken a long time to tell what I am doing. I was DREAMING of being in New Zealand with Spud and Joy Brogden last night and daffodil bulbs and 'odd' daffs that's when I awoke. I had nothing in my hands-just dreams,

OK, some great news:

I have now been in Korea for 8 years (I missed 8 ADS shows!! arghh); I was selected, as second level professor in our college. I have worked for 4 years at Daejeon Health and Sciences College (DHSC) That is one step to tenure. I am now staff. Along with this blessing came a promotion of a very shocking amount and very welcomed especially in this bad economy.

My daughter Elizabeth is going to be age 3, on August 31st, 2009. She is speaking both languages. She loves Poroyo, a Korean cartoon about a penguin in the North Pole. My wife wants another one as soon as possible. If a boy, we will name him Andrew. We are waiting for the right day to come...hopefully this year.

While in Korea, I was offered three beautiful used/new cars, for free. I turned them all down and we still use taxi to commute. WHY? You crazy guy? Simple- Have you ever seen Asians drive??- Enough said. Leave the driving to them..

Myself, I can now translate a lot Korean and speak with ease. Learning Chinese symbols now and forgetting my English at astonishing rates- I suffered for 3 days when a student asked me question teacher "This dah elevat-or, it up and dow-n, now wha-t is stairs that does like-a-dis??" The answer was escalator. I struggled and had a mental breakdown- "What is it? What is it called", I said ,over and over again.. Finally, it came to me.

While in Australia, I helped a non English speaking Korean grandfather place an order. He wanted to buy a \$10 calling card at a discount mart and didn't know a word of English- he was amazed I could speak to him, and I was amazed that I knew what he wanted!!. Regardless, I got 10% off my order because I helped the owner of the store. Then the owner asked me if I wanted a job.

In February 2009, I went to my 35th country. The Island of Yap. Which in fact is secretly protected by the US. I had no problem entering the country. It took two days to get there. One day from Korea to Guam, and a whole day waiting- because of infrequent planes. There is only one plane twice a week(Tues and Thurs) that goes in, and if you miss it- you must wait another week to get the next one,

So primitive is this country, it has no T.V., no radio and the quote unquote airport had no baggage claim, I waited in line for 40 mins, hope the next bag unpacked and carted was mine.

The highlight of my arrival in Yap was the topless, well formed, giant breasted women waiting for us, and handing out tropical flowers in a hand braided rope that was placed over my shoulders as I exited customs. I saved it, and it dried so well. A keepsake.

This island uses US dollars- but is home to the strangest currency in the world- stone money- some "coins" weighing a ton and a half. To prove this entire visit: www.visityap.com

And see for yourself. The coins can be traded for a house, land or a wife.

On my next around the world visit- Saipan and Rota are now in my sites.

A dear Indian friend of mine who lives in Casmir, brought me a gift, a religious object that the men use to flange (beat) themselves, this object has knives and 9 chains. Each chain has its own knife. The sinner or repenter uses the flange to inflict pain on his or her back- so that the person loses blood, gets dizzy and falls down. This is repentance in this part in his part of the world-two things, what a lovely gift, and thank God I was raised Catholic.



Last year, I had traveled to Cambodia. That same week an airplane was reported on Korean TV, had gone down, killing 44 Koreans and a few foreigners. My wife who was home in Korea- held her breath as she waited to find out 24 hours later, I was not on that plane but another one. Somehow, a Korean told me the story while in Cambodia and freely gave me his cell phone and said call her let her know I was OK. "It a good thing", thank you Martha Stewart.

In Cambodia, I was confronted with hellish filth, children with river blindness, 109F temps, sweats, a lizard that ate malaria mosquitoes in my room as I slept and came home with a parasites in my stomach. I was hospitalized for a week at home drinking heavy pink syrups to kill the parasitic worms. I lost 7 pounds that week. When I came back to Korea and got healthy again, I went the Mr. Korea Bodybuilding Show in Suwon. I met the world famous fashion designer Andre Kim. He was there looking for some "hot bods" for his new show in Paris. For those who do not know I took up bodybuilding 5 years ago- and went from 120 lbs to a unique 170 pounds.

My stories are real and wild at times; I follow the great Mr. Robert Ripley who coined the phrase "Believe it or not"..of Christopher in Korea, It will make one hell of a book someday.
