

TERMS

All bulbs are offered on condition that the crop is satisfactory and subject unsold at time of receipt of order.

We will not be responsible for results of planting or forcing, but guarantee all varieties true to name.

Orders cannot be cancelled except by mutual consent.

All prices are for net cash within one month from date of invoice, invoices including postage and packing will be included in all parcels.

Orders will be executed in strict rotation.

All bulbs travel at customer's risk and expense.

Postage and packing charged at cost on all orders.

Please order before the middle of July to avoid disappointment, because some stocks are small and all unsold bulbs are replanted by beginning of September. Figures following the names of varieties denote approximately the relative times of flowering. No. 1 being the earliest, and No. 6 the latest.

COLOUR CODE

In order to classify further the colour of the cup and trumpet in daffodils a colour code as below has been introduced. In each flower the cup has three zones, the inner or eye zone, the middle zone, and the rim. The eye zone is given first, so that yyr denotes a yellow cup with a rim of red. Colours — w (white), y (yellow), o (orange), g (green), p (pink), r (red).

CULTURAL NOTES

For best results, choose a well-drained, sunny plot of ground.

Deep digging to aerate the soil is very important, but too much organic manure is not recommended except in very dry areas, as this is liable to start fungus diseases. Bone meal helps bulb and flower of production and sulphate of potash is a great help for producing intensity of colour. Bone meal not more than three ounces per square yard, potash a light sprinkling over the beds.

If it is desired to plant in beds, these should be made up some weeks before planting which, ideally, should be completed in September.

We plant the bulbs in about 1½ times their own depth, ie, a bulb that measures two inches from crown to base is planted in a hole three inches deep. We plant our bulbs eight per row in four foot beds, with a path about 18 inches between the beds. If the bulbs are a very small variety, nine may be planted. The rows are planted far enough apart to allow hoeing between them during the growing season to keep the weeds down. If the bulbs are not being grown commercially they can be left down for several seasons without being lifted, and will flower extremely well. If desired they can be planted in clumps for garden decoration, but if Show specimens are aimed at the raised bed method is the best.

Many people like to grow bulbs in pots, and this method certainly gives one great pleasure and a chance to study the flowers in comfort without the cold winds, rain, hail and even snow conditions which we have come to expect during the daffodil season.

It is not usually successful to try and force the bulbs, the best rule is to leave them sunk in the ground outside until the flower buds show above the ground. Then they may be brought into a cool greenhouse or a cool light window.

When the buds are starting to open they need a great deal of water and must never be allowed to dry out.

Five bulbs can be planted in a nine-inch pot or more if the bulbs are small. Potting does not improve the condition of the bulbs, but we have found that by replanting them in the lump as they come out of the pot immediately after flowering they do not suffer much.

New Introductions for 1977

- 1a BALLYARNETT** (Carncairn) 1. Goldcourt X Moonstruck. This is a large soft yellow trumpet which was full in bloom on 6th March 1976, in the open. The long, slender trumpet is very serrated and curled back at the mouth. The perianth segments are shovel shaped and pointed, the eye is green, and there is a faint greenish tinge in the perianth. This is the earliest large 1a we have grown.

- 2b BELTRIM** (Carncairn) 4. Rosario X Irish Rose. A pink of good deep colour, and coming in consistently good form, with a very rounded perianth and round cup with a green eye. An extremely good increaser.

- 2b CLARE PARK** (Carncairn) 3-4. Rosario X Debutante. This flower has been one of my favourites for several years, but it is definitely not for the show bench unless fashions change. It has a huge crinoline like cup of a deep pink which opens very wide, backed by a pure white perianth which does not overlap enough. A magnificent plant in pots and in clumps in the garden. Has been much admired. Good lasting qualities, and tall strong stems. A good breeder.

- 2c COLUMBUS** (Cairncairn) 3-4. Easter Moon X Guy Wilson seedling 45/115. This is a sister seedling of Churchfield. A flower of the most wonderful substance and texture, standing proudly on a tall stem. In some seasons it opens with a tiny yellow rim which quickly fades, leaving the whole flower a very pure white with a greenish-grey eye.

- 2c CREME DE MENTHE** (Cairncairn) 4. Chinese White X Seedling 11/39/59 which came from a Guy Wilson seedling X Cotterton. This is a very tall flower, unfortunately too late for most shows. We have only tried it in a pot once, in 1975, when it was in our winning group of twelve in Omagh. It has an eye like an emerald, and an expanded, crinkled cup of pure white, and a pure white perianth of very smooth texture. The snags are:- not enough overlap in the perianth segments, and a slightly long neck, but it does hold its head quite well up in spite of this, and is definitely an outstanding flower.

Division

2a FUEGO (Richardson) 2-3. Cathay X Patagonia Firecracker Seedling.

We were lucky to find this in the mixed Seedling beds at Waterford, and, although it was a very small flower, we marked it, and Mrs Richardson very kindly gave the bulb to us. In the last two years it has developed into a very healthy plant although the flowers will never be large. It won the 2a single bloom class against strong competition at the Daffodil Show in London 1976. It has an expanding cup slightly frilled at the edge, which opens yellow, and gradually turns a rich orange-red which is sunproof.

The Perianth is of a very smooth texture, a beautiful deep yellow flushing slightly with red. One of the brightest flowers in our collection, and of great lasting qualities.

2c INNIS BEG (Carncairn) 3-4. A very clear cut 2c of good texture and consistency, and a green eye. Very short necked, and with strong, tall stems. Has not been shown.

2a MARCH MADNESS (Carncairn) 1. Armada X Fury. A very early red and yellow. In 1976 it was in full flower in Mid March. The flowers stand on very tall stems high above the leaves. The perianth is a good yellow, and the corona is circular and expanded, of a solid red which will stand a good deal of sun so early in the season.

A very brilliantly coloured flower, but the perianth does need flattening for the show bench.

2b MOYOLA (Carncairn) 4-5. Templemore X Rose Caprice. This is a very beautiful flower, coming in consistently good form with wonderful smooth texture. The cup is of an unusual peach colour with a greenish-grey eye. Unfortunately the rather pale colouring makes it little unobtrusive on the show bench, but it has won prizes in the 2b class.

4a SNOWFIRE (Richardson) 3-4. Falaise X Rockall. One of the outstanding red and white doubles raised at Prospect House. Very like Acropolis, but not quite as well doubled, though the colours are even more striking and it is a taller, stronger plant. Has won prizes in single bloom classes. Scented.

2c TULLYGIRVAN (Carncairn) 3-4. Blarney X Irish Rose. An unusual flower, opening with a buff cup, which changes daily till the flower, is all white, lasting for weeks. Quite a large flower with a straight edged cup and no nicked petals. A good increaser and a strong grower.

New Introductions for 1976

2b BOVAGH (Carncairn) 3-4. This is an interesting flower, being of unusual colouring, having a greenish-white perianth and goblet-shaped cup of chrome yellow, crinkled at the edge and rimmed with deep orange. It has won prizes in the non-predominant classes, though not as striking as some of the brilliant red-rimmed varieties. Its main assets are speed of increase and tall stems.

2b CAIRNDHU. 4 (Carncairn). This small, very dainty flower comes consistently in good form. It has a dark olive-green eye and deep pink frilled cup, contrasting well with the sparkling white perianth. A little too small for showing, but a most attractive garden plant and very good for decorative arrangements. Good firm bulbs and rapid increase.

3b IRISH RANGER (Carncairn). 3-4. An outstanding 3b with a brilliant glowing red cup, not sunproof, but of good form and texture. Unfortunately, in some seasons the perianth does not whiten enough, but the cup is the most brilliant of anything we have raised. Named on request of the Royal Irish Rangers.

2b JOHN'S PINK (Carncairn). 4. A small flower of perfect form. I have never seen a nick or a misshapen perianth. The size and pale pink colouring do not make it a great show winner, and it is seen best in classes for groups of three, where uniformity is important. The perianth segments are very smooth and circular, and the corona has a beautiful roll and is of a soft, dusty pink. A flower of great charm.

1c LYNWOOD (Carncairn). 3-4. This is a nice late 1c with a short neck and elegant curl to the trumpet, increases well and is useful for late shows. 1st prize in the 1c class in Ballymena, 1974. Does not grow very large.

1b MARY SUMNER (Carncairn). 2-3. We hesitate to name this flower because it is very hard to classify, being a soft cream colour throughout, but as it opens with a yellow trumpet and pale cream perianth we have registered it as 1b. Definitely not a show flower as there is no real class for it. Nevertheless it is a magnificent garden plant and looks quite beautiful in large arrangements for weddings, etc. As the flower ages the trumpet fades to a greenish cream with a beautiful roll to the mouth, very tall, strong growing, excellent bulbs. Especially chosen by members of the Mothers' Union for their centenary year and named after the Mothers' Union founder. Only a few single bulbs available.

- 2b MARY'S PINK.** 3-4 (Carncairn). This is a good pink, having a uniform colour right to the base of the cup, which is long and fairly straight. The eye is a beautiful clear green. Not a large flower, but remarkable for its clear pink cup and glistening white slightly pointed perianth.

- 1c WHITE PHANTOM** (Carncairn). 2-3. A good size flower, early and very pure white, with an attractive roll to the edge of the trumpet. Unfortunately the inner perianth segments are not quite wide enough to make a perfect show flower in the 1c class, but has proved successful in groups when a very pure white contrast is needed. A strong grower and free of bloom and increase.

The flower has a good, short neck, and the stem is strong but rather short; foliage is broad and the bulb immense. A very effective front row flower in an exhibition group of trumpets.
