

All bulbs are offered on condition that the crop is satisfactory and subject unsold at time of receipt of order.

We will not be responsible for results of planting or forcing, but guarantee all varieties true to name.

Order cannot be cancelled except by mutual consent.

All prices are for net cash within one month from date of invoice, invoices including postage and packing will be included in all parcels.

Receipts for payment will not be sent unless specially requested.

Orders will be executed in strict rotation.

All bulbs travel at customer's risk and expense.

Please order before the middle of July to avoid disappointment, because some stocks are small and all unsold bulbs are replanted by beginning of September. Figures following the names of varieties denote approximately the relative time of flowering. No. 1 being the earliest, and No. 6 the latest.

REVISED CLASSIFICATION OF DAFFODILS 1977

1. The classification of a daffodil cultivar shall be based on the description and measurements submitted by the person registering the variety, or shall be the classification submitted by such person.
2. Colours applicable to the description of daffodil cultivars are abbreviated as follows:
W—white or whitish: G—green: Y—yellow: P—pink: O—orange; R—red.
3. For purposes of description, the daffodil flower shall be divided into perianth and corona.
4. The perianth shall be described by the letter or letters of the colour code most appropriate.
5. The corona shall be divided into three zones: an eye-zone, a mid-zone, and the edge or rim. Suitable coded colour descriptions shall describe these three zones, beginning with the eye-zone and extending to the rim.
6. The letter or letters of the colour code most accurately describing the perianth shall follow the division designation.
7. The letters of the colour code most accurately describing the zones of the corona shall then follow, from the eye-zone to the rim separated from the perianth letters by a hyphen. In Division 4, the letters of the colour code most accurately describing the admixture of petals and petaloids replacing the corona shall follow in proper order, using 3, 2, or 1 colour codes as appropriate.
8. If the corona is substantially of a single colour, a single letter of the colour code shall describe it.

Using these basic requirements, daffodils may be classified as follows:

DIVISION 1: TRUMPET DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; trumpet or corona as long or longer than the perianth segments.

DIVISION 2: LONG-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 3: SHORT-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona not more than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 4: DOUBLE DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Double flowers.

DIVISION 5: TRIANDRUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus triandrus* predominant.

DIVISION 6: CYCLAMINEUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus cyclamineus* predominant.

DIVISION 7: JONQUILLA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus jonquilla* group predominant.

DIVISION 8: TAZETTA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus tazetta* group predominant.

DIVISION 9: POETICUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus poeticus* group predominant.

DIVISION 10: SPECIES AND WILD FORMS AND WILD HYBRIDS

All species and wild or reputedly wild forms and hybrids. Double forms of these varieties are included.

DIVISION 11: SPLIT-CORONA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Corona split for at least one-third of its length.

DIVISION 12: MISCELLANEOUS DAFFODILS

All daffodils not falling into any one of the foregoing Divisions.

For easy calculation the exchange rate of 2 American dollars to the pound will be used.

CULTURAL NOTES DAFFODILS

For best results, choose a well-drained, sunny plot of ground.

Deep digging to aerate the soil is very important, but too much organic manure is not recommended except in very dry areas, as this is liable to start fungus diseases. Bone meal helps bulb and flower production and sulphate of potash is a great help for producing intensity of colour. Bone meal not more than three ounces per square yard, potash a light sprinkling over the beds.

If it is desired to plant in beds, these should be made up some weeks before planting which, ideally, should be completed in September.

We plant the bulbs in about twice their own depth, i.e. a bulb that measures two inches from crown to base is planted in a hole four inches deep. We plant our bulbs eight per row in four foot beds, with a path about 18 inches between the beds. If the bulbs are a very small variety, nine may be planted. The rows are planted far enough apart to allow hoeing between them during the growing season to keep the weeds down. If the bulbs are not being grown commercially they can be left down for several seasons without being lifted and will flower extremely well. If desired they can be planted in clumps for garden decoration, but if Show specimens are aimed at the raised bed method is the best.

Many people like to grow bulbs in pots, and this method, certainly gives one great pleasure and a chance to study the flowers in comfort without the cold winds, rain, hail and even snow conditions which we have come to expect during the daffodil season.

It is not usually successful to try and force the bulbs, the best rule is to leave them sunk in the ground outside until the flower buds show above the ground. Then they may be brought into a cool greenhouse or a cool light window.

When the buds are starting to open they need a great deal of water and must never be allowed to dry out.

Five bulbs can be planted in a nine-inch pot or more if the bulbs are small. Potting does not improve the condition of the bulbs, but we have found that by replanting them in the lump as they come out of the pot immediately after flower they do not suffer much.

An attractive flower with a neat cup which is completely circular with small indentations and a slight curl as the flower ages. A useful addition to the 2 yy class. Second at the R.H.S. show in the single bloom class in 1978.

Formerly seedling No. 19/67.
Unfortunately not a full enough double to beat some of the older doubles in a show, but the petalloids are a marvellous solid orange red, interspersed with a smooth yellow. As it produces both pollen and a pistil on many flowers it should be of great value for breeding.

A lovely smooth yellow trumpet coming very late in the season and useful for late shows. The flowers are consistently well formed, resembling Prince Igor.

A very tall flower, durable and strong growing. The cup is long and goblet shaped, with its sunproof colouring resembling that of Daviot. The perianth is pure white with good texture. A very striking flower, not yet shown.

A very consistent flower with a pure white perianth and a small cup which is deep pink right to the base. First prize in the pink class at Omagh show in 1979.

9 w-ggr **FRANK'S FANCY 4** (Ballydorn) Cantabile X Unknown.
This is an enchanting poeticus coming consistently with two heads, though in most cases the offsets produce only one. Both heads usually open at the same time which makes it very good for showing. It has all the characteristics of poeticus; 3 stamens up and 3 down, a strong poeticus scent and a pure white perianth resembling Cantabile. The cup has an orange red rim and a solid green eye. This flower was found amongst a batch of Cantabile seedlings kindly given to us by Sir Frank Harrison. Catalogued for the benefit of the many people who admired it last year, but unfortunately it is a slow increaser and we have none available this year. It has won First prize in the seedling class at Omagh in 1979 and also was first in the Poeticus class at Ballymena in 1979. It has only been shown twice.

1 w-y **GLENAMOY 2-3** (Carncairn) Preamble X Seedling No. 1/59/59. Formerly seedling No. 1/11/67.
A deep yellow trumpet contrasting well with the white perianth which is broad and over-lapping. The trumpet has an attractive roll. A long lasting flower.

2 w-o **HAPPY FACE 3-4** (Carncairn) Chinese White X Fermoy. Formerly seedling No. 1/63.
A big flower with an expanded buff-orange cup. Useful for showing in collections but probably not bright enough in colouring for single bloom classes. A very strong tall grower.

3 w-w **IRISH LINEN 4** (Carncairn) Wootton seeding 866 X Hamzali. Formerly seedling No. W15/4.
This is a truly beautiful flower, being purest white throughout with a striking dark green eye. The stamens are tightly grouped around the pistil giving the eye a more compelling effect. Having a short neck there are no staging problems, its only fault being that it does not grow very big. The same pot-grown flower was first in Omagh and Ballymena in 1979, and as the shows were three days apart its durability is self-evident. Unless there is a very great increase we will not have any bulbs to spare in 1980 as some are already booked.

- 3 w- yyo** **BARLEY SUGAR 4.** (Carncairn) Bravura X Bushmills. Formerly seedling No. 3/11/64.
This flower has a flat, very rounded perianth of strikingly good form with a circular cup of soft yellow rimmed with orange. Due to its almost perfect form this flower should prove a winner in shows in spite of its unobtrusive colouring.

- 3 w- yyr** **BIRDSONG 4.** (Carncairn) Corofin X Tulyar. Formerly seedling No. 126.
A beautiful well-poised flower with a pure white perianth and flat yellow cup banded with a brilliant orange red. It has proved to be an excellent show flower and has won three first prizes in Bangor, N. Ireland, and two in Ballymena in 1978. It also won best bloom in show in Gilnahirk in 1979.

A very large flower with the shortest possible neck and pointed deep lemon perianth of good substance and texture and slightly reflexing. The corona reverses quickly leaving the crinkled edge a deep lemon yellow. This flower has not yet been shown but it should make a contender for Daydream.

A sculptured flower with tremendous substance. The deep orange-red cup is completely circular and the perianth which is consistently well formed is a pale lemon yellow flushing red. It has already won on the show bench. A striking flower.

A large, very white flower with a slightly expanded cup which has a greenish yellow eye, deepening to orange with a yellow rim. A striking flower with unusual colouring which draws the eye.

This is an interesting flower, being of unusual colouring, having a greenish-white perianth and goblet-shaped cup of chrome yellow, crinkled at the edge and rimmed with deep orange. It has won prizes in the non-predominant classes, though not as striking as some of the brilliant red-rimmed varieties. Its main assets are speed of increase and tall stems.

Has been much admired. Good lasting qualities, and, tall strong stems. A good breeder.
