


All bulbs are offered on condition that the crop is satisfactory and subject unsold at time of receipt of order.

We will not be responsible for results of planting or forcing, but guarantee all varieties true to name.

Order cannot be cancelled except by mutual consent.

All prices are for net cash within one month from date of invoice, invoices including postage and packing will be included in all parcels.

Receipts for payment will not be sent unless specially requested.

Orders will be executed in strict rotation.

All bulbs travel at customer's risk and expense.

Please order before the middle of July to avoid disappointment, because some stocks are small and all unsold bulbs are replanted by beginning of September. Figures following the names of varieties denote approximately the relative time of flowering. No. 1 being the earliest, and No. 6 the latest.

REVISED CLASSIFICATION OF DAFFODILS 1977

1. The classification of a daffodil cultivar shall be based on the description and measurements submitted by the person registering the variety, or shall be the classification submitted by such person.
2. Colours applicable to the description of daffodil cultivars are abbreviated as follows:
W—white or whitish: G—green: Y—yellow: P—pink: O—orange: R—red.
3. For purposes of description, the daffodil flower shall be divided into perianth and corona.
4. The perianth shall be described by the letter or letters of the colour code most appropriate.
5. The corona shall be divided into three zones: an eye-zone, a mid-zone, and the edge or rim. Suitable coded colour descriptions shall describe these three zones, beginning with the eye-zone and extending to the rim.
6. The letter or letters of the colour code most accurately describing the perianth shall follow the division designation.
7. The letters of the colour code, most accurately describing the zones of the corona shall then follow, from the eye-zone to the rim separated from the perianth letters by a hyphen. In Division 4, the letters of the colour code most accurately describing the admixture of petals and petaloids replacing the corona shall follow in proper order, using 3, 2, or 1 colour codes as appropriate.
8. If the corona is substantially of a single colour, a single letter of the colour code shall describe it.

Using these basic requirements, daffodils may be classified as follows:

DIVISION 1: TRUMPET DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; trumpet or corona as long or longer than the perianth segments.

DIVISION 2: LONG CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 3: SHORT-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona not more than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 4: DOUBLE DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Double flowers.

DIVISION 5: TRIANDRUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus triandrus* predominant.

DIVISION 6: CYCLAMINEUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of *Narcissus cyclamineus* predominant.

DIVISION 7: JONQUILLA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus jonquilla* group predominant.

DIVISION 8: TAZETTA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus tazetta* group predominant.

DIVISION 9: POETICUS DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Characteristics of the *Narcissus poeticus* group predominant.

DIVISION 10: SPECIES AND WILD FORMS AND WILD HYBRIDS

All species and wild or reputedly wild forms and hybrids: Double forms of these varieties are included.

DIVISION 11: SPLIT-CORONA DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN

Distinguishing characters: Corona split for at least one-third of its length.

DIVISION 12: MISCELLANEOUS DAFFODILS

All daffodils not falling into any one of the foregoing Divisions.

- 2 w-w ARCTIC CIRCLE 3** (Carncairn). Wootton seedling 2/439 X Ardbane. Formerly seedling W 23/1. Very large flower with circular perianth segments and a flat circular cup. All white, a very strong grower. Described by one of our U.S.A. visitors as a "Superb white". First prize in a group in Omagh 1980.

- 2 w-y BARLEY COVE 3-4** (Carncairn) Bizerta X Aircastle. Formerly seedling 1/23/69. A distinctive flower with a glistening white perianth, well overlapping and of good texture. The corona is a deep chrome yellow crinkled at the edge. Some of the flowers come with red and white splashes at the edge of the corona, so we cannot guarantee all show flowers, but the good ones are very good.

- 2 w-w CAPE COOL 2-3** (Carncairn) Empress of Ireland X Arctic Doric. Formerly seedling W 6/4. A tall early flower with a straight cup and short neck. A lovely white with green tinges like Empress of Ireland. Best Bloom in open classes in Bangor 1979.

- 2 w-o DRUMADOON 3-4** (Carncairn) Home Fires X Armada. Formerly seedling 102/60. A brilliantly coloured flower with a clear orange cup, slightly expanded and serrated at the mouth. The perianth is shovel shaped and a very pure white.

- 2 o-o FIRERAISER 3-4** (Carncairn) Vulcan X Spelter. Formerly seedling 1/75 OR. Quite the most outstanding of our 1981 introductions. The corona is a bright orange-red, and the whole flower is the most incredible burning orange colour which intensifies as the flower ages. Sadly this is not a large flower, but it still managed to win it's class at the Daffodil Show at the R.H.S. in 1980, and as it seems to set seed easily it should be of great value for breeding.

- 3 w- IRISH NYMPH 4** (Carncairn) Wootton seedling 866 X Hamzali. Formerly seedling W 15/2. This flower must be cut young for showing. It has an emerald green eye, and the whole cup is a soft yellow-green, merging to yellow, edged with a wire rim of pale orange. The perianth is rounded and pure white. Scented. A rapid increaser.

FOR 1980

- 2 y-y BALLYTRIM 3.** (Richardson) Formerly seedling No. R 3509(2) An attractive flower with a neat cup which is completely circular with small indentations and a slight curl as the flower ages. A useful addition to the 2 yy class. Second at the R.H.S. show in the single bloom class in 1978.

- 4 y-r BEAUVALLET 3-4** (Carncairn) Falaise self-pollinated. Formerly seedling No. 19/67. Unfortunately not a full enough double to beat some of the older doubles in a show, but the petalloids are a marvellous solid orange red, interspersed with a smooth yellow. As it produces both pollen and a pistil on many flowers it should be of great value for breeding.

- 1 y-y CABRA 3** (Carncairn) Kingscourt X Prince Igor. Formerly seedling No. 159. A lovely smooth yellow trumpet coming very late in the season and useful for late shows. The flowers are consistently well formed, resembling Prince Igor.

- 2 w-oo CRAIGDUN 2-3** (Carncairn) Tryst X (Kilworth X Pirate King) seedling. Formerly seedling No. 2 3/5. A very tall flower, durable and strong growing. The cup is long and goblet shaped, with its sunproof colouring resembling that of Daviot. The perianth is pure white with good texture. A very striking flower, not yet shown.

- 2 w-p DESERT ROSE 3-4** (Richardson) Daybreak X Romance. Formerly seedling No. R 399. A very consistent flower with a pure white perianth and a small cup which is deep pink right to the base. First prize in the pink class at Omagh show in 1979, and first in the three bloom class at Ballymena show in 1980.

- 9 w-ggr FRANK'S FANCY 4** (Ballydorn) Cantabile X Unknown. This is an enchanting poeticus coming consistently with two heads, though in most cases the offsets produce only one. Both heads usually open at the same time which makes it very good for showing. It has all the characteristics of poeticus; 3 stamens up and 3 down, a strong poeticus scent and a pure white perianth resembling Cantabile. The cup has an orange red rim and a solid green eye. This flower was found amongst a batch of Cantabile seedlings kindly given to us by Sir Frank

Harrison. Catalogued for the benefit of the many people who admired it in 1979, but unfortunately it is a slow increaser and we have only one or two available this year. It has won First Prize in the seedling class at Omagh in 1979 and also was first in the Poeticus class at Ballymena in 1979.

1 w-y GLENAMOY 2-3 (Carncairn) Preamble X Seedling No. 1/59/59. Formerly seedling No. 1/11/67.

A deep yellow trumpet contrasting well with the white perianth which is broad and over-lapping. The trumpet has an attractive roll. A long lasting flower.

2 w-o HAPPY FACE 3-4 (Carncairn) Chinese White X Fermoy. Formerly seedling No. 1/63.

A big flower with an expanded buff-orange cup. Useful for showing in collections but probably not bright enough in colouring for single bloom classes. A very strong tall grower.

3 w-w IRISH LINEN 4 (Carncairn) Wootton seedling 866 X Hamzali. Formerly seedling No. W15/4.

This is a truly beautiful flower, being purest white throughout with a striking dark green eye. The stamens are tightly grouped around the pistil giving the eye a more compelling effect. Having a short neck there are no staging problems, its only fault being that it does not grow very big. The same pot-grown flower was first in Omagh and Ballymena in 1979, and as the shows were three days apart its durability is self-evident. It also won first prize the only time it was shown in 1980 at Omagh Show. None available in 1981, but we hope to have some in 1982.

2 w-g LEMON SHERBET 3-4 (Carncairn) Probably Aircastle X Green-island. Formerly seedling 151.

A very strong grower which always comes in good form with beautiful smooth texture in the perianth. The corona is large and expanded, pale yellow with a green eye and a darker edge of yellow around the slightly crinkled cup.

3 w-gg PIXIES POOL 4 (Carncairn) Cushendall X Sea Green. Formerly seedling No. 2/65.

An enchanting little flower rather like Grace Note with a deep green eye and small crinkled yellow cup. The perianth is rounded, overlapping, and very pure white. Scented. First prize in the 3 bloom class in Ballymena in 1979.

4 w-r ACROPOLIS 4-5 (J. L. Richardson) Falaise X Limerick. F.C.C. R.H.S. 1959 as a show flower.

A very fine red and white double. A full flower with pure white outer petals of great substance. The narrower inner petals are interspersed with small petals of intense bright red. A very strong grower with tall stiff stems.

3 w-y AIRCASTLE 4 (Mitsch) Green Island X Chinese White.

This flower is an almost certain winner at shows. The perianth is very rounded and in perfect balance with the shallow crown which is a pale apricot lemon with a narrow margin of a deeper shade. The petals after opening milk-white take on an unusual greenish tint. A beautiful flower of great substance and vigour.

2 w-p ALICE'S PINK (Carncairn Daffodils). 4. Breeding unknown. Pure white perianth with a neat smallish cup of deep salmon-pink slightly frilled at the edge, which holds its colour without fading for a considerable time.

1 y-y ARCTIC GOLD 2-3 (J. L. Richardson). F.C.C. R.H.S. 1960, as a Show Flower. A.M. Wisley 1963. Goldcourt X Kingscourt. Still one of the best yellow trumpets with a broad overlapping perianth of smooth waxy texture, and well proportioned trumpet, flanged and serrated at the mouth. The whole flower is very deep gold.

2 w-w ARDBANE 2-3 (G. L. Wilson) St. Brendan X Greenland.

This is a pure ice-white green-based flower of outstanding beauty and quality. Lovely clean-cut broad perianth and three-quarter length crown; short neck and stiff, not too heavy stem.

Good size blooms with deep yellow, overlapping perianths and a rather small crown of quite deep orange red.

1 y-y ARKLE 3 (J. L. Richardson). Yellow Idol X 298.
This is a large, well-balanced yellow trumpet with smooth, overlapping perianth segments and a long well balanced trumpet. It has won many times on the show bench. A free increaser.

1 y-y ARMAGH 3 (W. J. Dunlop).
A first-class large clear golden yellow trumpet of highest exhibition quality with splendid silken smooth perianth and nicely proportioned trumpet. A beautifully finished bloom with exceptionally good stem and neck. Strong vigorous plant and good doer.

2 w-r AVENGER 4 (J. L. Richardson) F.C.C. 1969 as a show flower. One of the first but still one of the best of the Kilworth X Arbar series. Not as large as some, but scores well for whiteness of petal, cup colour and consistency in producing show quality blooms.

A large flower with a broad, smooth, beautifully clear yellow perianth. The crown is a very intense orange red, finely frilled at the edge. A flower of great quality and substance, standing short-necked on strong stems.

A nicely-proportioned late flower with a golden yellow perianth, and a rich deep red crown. Of value for late shows.

1 y-y BALLYARNETT 1 (Carncairn). Goldcourt X Moonstruck.
This is a large soft yellow trumpet which was full in bloom on 6th March, 1976, in the open. The long, slender trumpet is very serrated and curled back at the mouth. The perianth segments are shovel shaped and pointed, the eye is green, and there is a faint greenish tinge in the perianth. This is the earliest large 1 y-y we have grown.

A charming flower with a broad white perianth and shallow white crown lit by a dainty pinkish orange rim.

1 y-y BANBRIDGE 2 (Richardson).
A very deep yellow. A most successful yellow trumpet for early shows. Strong grower.

3 w- BARLEY SUGAR 4 (Carncairn) Bravura X Bushmills.
Formerly seedling No. 3/11/64.
This flower has a flat, very rounded perianth of strikingly good form with a circular cup of soft yellow rimmed with orange. Due to its almost perfect form this flower should prove a winner in shows in spite of its unobtrusive colouring.

1 y-y BARONSCOURT 3-4 (Carncairn) Kingscourt X. Prince Igor. This is a brilliant yellow trumpet, a strong plant and a good laster, one of the few varieties that did not lie down when we had an exceptionally heavy frost on April 28th, 1976. The corona takes on a slightly deeper yellow than the perianth as the flower ages. This flower could be of value for breeding.

2 y-w BINKIE 4 (Wolfhagen Tasmania). A.M. Wisley 1952. A curious most distinct and attractive variety, with flowers of excellent form, balance and fine substance, having broad, flat perianth and a well-proportioned crown. When it opens, the whole flower is a clear, greeny sulphur-lemon, but the crown gradually fades to almost pure white.

A beautiful well-poised flower with a pure white perianth and flat yellow cup banded with a brilliant orange red. It has proved to be an excellent show flower and has won three first prizes in Bangor, N. Ireland, and two in Ballymena in 1978. It also won best bloom in show in Gilnahirk in 1979.

This is one of the best red and yellow flowers, a large flower with bright, golden-yellow perianth of grand quality and a large, expanded bowl-shaped crown of intense deep orange red.

2 w-yyo BOVAGH 3-4 (Carncairn).

This is an interesting flower, being of unusual colouring, having a greenish-white perianth and goblet-shaped cup of chrome yellow, crinkled at the edge and rimmed with deep orange. It has won prizes in the non-predominant classes, though not as striking as some of the brilliant red-rimmed varieties. Its main assets are speed of increase and tall stems.

A most attractive garden plant and very good for decorative arrangements. Good firm bulbs and rapid increase. A prize-winner in London in 1980.

One of the best self yellows introduced since Galway. The flower is deep clear yellow throughout, with a very circular perianth of exemplary flatness, and very broad petals of exceptional quality and thickness. The well-proportioned cup is shorter than the petals, evenly and neatly serrated at the brim. Very strong and robust plant.

2 y-w CHARTER 2-3 (Grant Mitsch). A.M. 1964. Sister seedling to Daydream.

This flower has been one of my favourites for several years, but it is definitely not for the show bench unless fashions change. It has a huge crinoline like cup of a deep pink which opens very wide, backed by a pure white perianth which does not overlap enough. A magnificent plant in pots and in clumps in the garden. Has been much admired. Good lasting qualities, and, tall strong stems. A good breeder.

CULTURAL NOTES

For best results, choose a well-drained, sunny plot of ground.

Deep digging to aerate the soil is very important, but too much organic manure is not recommended except in very dry areas, as this is liable to start fungus diseases. Bone meal helps bulb and flower production and sulphate of potash is a great help for producing intensity of colour. Bone meal not more than three ounces per square yard, potash a light sprinkling over the beds.

If it is desired to plant in beds, these should be made up some weeks before planting which, ideally, should be completed in September.

We plant the bulbs in about twice their own depth, i.e. a bulb that measures two inches from crown to base is planted in a hole four inches deep. We plant our bulbs eight per row in four foot beds, with a path about 18 inches between the beds. If the bulbs are a very small variety, nine may be planted. The rows are planted far enough apart to allow hoeing between them during the growing season to keep the weeds down. If the bulbs are not being grown commercially they can be left down for several seasons without being lifted and will flower extremely well. If desired they can be planted in clumps for garden decoration, but if Show specimens are aimed at the raised bed method is the best.

Many people like to grow bulbs in pots, and this method, certainly gives one great pleasure and a chance to study the flowers in comfort without the cold winds, rain, hail and even snow conditions which we have come to expect during the daffodil season.

It is not usually successful to try and force the bulbs, the best rule is to leave them sunk in the ground outside until the flower buds show above the ground. Then they may be brought into a cool greenhouse or a cool light window.

When the buds are starting to open they need a great deal of water and must never be allowed to dry out.

Five bulbs can be planted in a nine-inch pot or more if the bulbs are small. Potting does not improve the condition of the bulbs, but we have found that by replanting them in the lump as they come out of the pot immediately after flower they do not suffer much.
