


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Dear Customers and Friends,

Our Trial Gardens and Seedling beds have not been open to the public since 1975, still every year we get calls from people who want to come and 'see the flowers'. We have thought and prayed over this for so long to try to come up with the right decision. We have so much work to do in the Spring, we have very limited parking, we can't afford the luxury of people 'dropping in' and touring unattended, and this is also our home, so the plans had to be very specific.
