

 What a joy to behold.





AFFODIL LIST

Daffodils are very easy to grow, doing well in any reasonable soil. They like an open, sunny position, a dry Summer rest period, and plenty of moisture while in growth. Plant bulbs from January till mid April.

The bulbs need to be planted reasonably deep (about 15cm (6 inches) in light soil, a bit less in heavy soil). Do **not** plant bulbs on a very hot day (hot, moist soils could cause the bulb to rot) and **don't** plant back in the same spot you last had Daffodils growing. We lift and divide our garden planted bulbs each three years. If fertilizing your bulbs, potash is all that is required.

Never, never ever cut the foliage off your Daffodils while it is still in growth. This year's foliage is next year's plant and flowers!

If you wish to grow Daffodils in pots please read our notes "Growing Bulbs in Pots" on Page

In this Catalogue Daffodils are listed in their twelve basic groups (Divisions), as per the Classification System of The Royal Horticultural Society, with Divisions 1 to 4 further separated into colour groupings:

The Divisions are as follows:

1 Trumpets	5 Triandrus	9 Poeticus
2 Large Cups	6 Cyclamineus	10 Species
3 Small Cups	7 Jonquilla	11 Split Cups
4 Doubles	8 Tazetta	12 Miscellaneous

The Name and Country listed in brackets, after the name of the Daffodil, indicates the breeder and place of origin.

To complete our Daffodil List there is a large section of Hybrid and Species Miniature Daffodils which will, we expect, prove to be of great interest. There is also a listing of Glenbrook hybrids which we hope will prove top class garden and show plants.

Throughout our Daffodil Listing this year we are confident that we are offering you many of the finest bulbs available anywhere in the world. For the finest Show flowers possible some cultivars that we strongly suggest you consider are: REDLANDS TOO (2 Y-R), and LADY DIANA (2 W-W), from Tasmania, POL VOULIN (2 W-P) and ICE WINGS (5 W-W) from England, CAPREE ELIZABETH (2 Y-P) from New Zealand and PINK SILK (1 W-P) and COOL CRYSTAL (3 W-W) both from the U.S.A. For us these are superbly reliable, fine growing plants, but there are many other brilliant Daffodils in our List too!

Division 1 Trumpet, All Yellow (1 Y-Y)

AH GEE - (Glenbrook, Tas.) Seedling 17/85, bred from two superb Australian parents (GOLDEN x RISTIN) with lovely, smooth yellow petals and narrow trumpet. Just medium size and exceptionally consistent. Mid to mid-late season. 1st Prize Westbury and winning Bulman Cup team, 1985 and regularly in winning teams since. \$8.00

BIOGRAPH - (Jackson, Tas.) superb quality Daffodil. Beautiful, even form and very, very smooth petals. One of the finest yellow trumpets in cultivation. Early-mid season. Many awards. \$15.00

GARGLEBLASTER - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred GOLDEN x HEART OF GOLD. An early, large flowered, all yellow trumpet. Very robust and a fine garden plant. Champion Yellow Trumpet, Hobart 1984 and in winning Duncan Cup, 1987, also in winning 3 Trumpets, Canberra '90. \$7.00

HITCHHIKER - (Jackson, Tas.) superb, huge yellow trumpet with great size, form and smoothness. Early flowering. A striking variety, strong grower and Show Champion winner. \$15.00

KARMA - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred from AKKAD x KOROMO. An exceptionally smooth and consistent yellow trumpet. Broad petals and neatly formed trumpet, even yellow throughout. Particularly consistent show flower; First Prize Westbury 1986, Hobart 1987, Glover Trophy Launceston 1987, winning Radcliff team Hobart 1989 and winning Class 1 Claremont '91. Early to mid season. \$15.00

MADRUGA - (Jackson, Tas.) beautifully smooth yellow trumpet of medium size. 1st Prize Open Class 1 Y-Y at Claremont and Hobart, 1987. \$6.00

MIDAS TOUCH - (Bloomer, N.Ire.) a magnificent mid to mid-late season golden trumpet. Great substance and size and outstanding show form. Also an excellent garden plant. \$20.00

RISTIN - (Jackson, Tas.) our favourite early flowering Yellow Trumpet. Exceptional quality. Excellent show flower and breeder. Has won an Australian Championship. \$5.00

SOL - (Jackson, Tas.) a smooth refined show flower of only medium size. In 1986 it won Grand Champion at Claremont and Hobart Shows. Early. \$8.00

WILD WOMEN - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred ANSEIT x RISTIN. Only just medium size this flower has a wonderful, golden, overlapping perianth of thick texture and great smoothness. The trumpet is narrow, straight and tubular. This is a classy all yellow with tall stem and early-season flowering. Grand Champion Launceston 1984, Grand Champion Claremont 1985, Glover Trophy Westbury 1986, Webster Cup Team Tasvention 1988, Radcliff Trophy Team Hobart 1989, Fairbairn Trophy Team Kyneton 1990, also a Best Bloom Award, Canberra '90 and Hobart '92. Producing superb seedlings with outstanding show results. \$15.00

Division 1 Trumpet, White Perianth, Yellow Trumpet (1 W-Y)

COMPUTE - (Jackson, Tas.) gigantic flower with very large white perianth and long yellow trumpet. Beaut show form and great garden vigour. Champion winner. Mid season. \$15.00

DABSTER - (Jackson, Tas.) considered by many to be the best of all the Jackson raised bicouours. Medium-large size. Smooth white petals and neat yellow trumpet. Numerous show awards. Mid season. \$12.00

PREDATOR - (Jackson, Tas.) well-formed, thick-textured white perianth and elegant lemon-yellow trumpet. A good, medium-sized, mid-season variety. Easy grower. \$5.00

QUENCH - (Jackson, Tas.) splendid early-mid season variety with large, flat, smooth white perianth and bold yellow trumpet. A top show flower with many awards to its credit. \$12.00

Division 1 Trumpet, White Perianth, Pink Trumpet (1 W-P)

KALIMNA - (Cross, Tas.) bred from DEAR ME this is an exceptionally lovely flower of only just medium size. Smoothest, rounded white petals and elegant, clear pink trumpet. Fine show record. Mid to late season. Few only. \$20.00

PINK SILK - (Havens, U.S.A.) a truly magnificent flower. Large, smooth white perianth. Long, elegant brightly-coloured pink trumpet. Imported at U.S. \$70.00. A very fine early-mid season cultivar. Few only. \$80.00

ZETA - (Jackson, Tas.) a big flower with broad white petals and large, rich pink trumpet. Strong growing. Very good mid-late season. \$5.00

Division 1 Trumpet, All White (1 W-W)

BEN ALIGIN - (Lea, Eng.) classy mid to mid-late season variety. Fine white perianth with trumpet opening lemon and turning milky white. Very good, strong-growing show flower. Bred from pink cups BEN ALIGIN should prove very valuable for further breeding. Sets seed easily. \$15.00

RAGAMUFFIN - (Jackson, Tas.) mid season variety with large, broad-petalled flowers and bold trumpet, all white throughout. \$6.00

SILENT VALLEY - (Bloomer, N.Ire.) exceptionally lovely flower. Large, flat, smooth white perianth and very elegant slender white trumpet. A beautiful show and garden variety. Mid to mid-late season. \$30.00

WHITE STAR - (Bloomer, N.Ire.) a giant white trumpet with great, broad perianth and large, roll-mouthed, bell-trumpet. Superb show flower but rather slow to increase here. Mid-late season. \$40.00

Division 1 Trumpet, Yellow Perianth, Coloured Trumpet (1 Y-O/R)

RED ARROW - (Backhouse, Eng.) neat yellow perianth and bright orange trumpet. Mid season. Valuable for breeding as well as a good garden plant. \$7.00

FIDELITY - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) quite a lovely flower blooming mid-late season. Soft, sulphur-yellow perianth and rich apricot-pink trumpet. Good form and quite choice. High class and strongly recommended. Imported at U.S. \$37.00. Few to go. \$25.00

MEMENTO - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) delicate, pale lemon perianth with soft apricot-pink trumpet. Luminous colouring. Mid-late season. \$12.00

Division 2 Large Cup, All Yellow (2 Y-Y)

ACCUAL - (Jackson, Tas.) a really top class plant with large, smooth, flat perianth and elegant, tubular, trumpet-style cup. The whole bloom is bright yellow throughout. Early-mid season. Strongly recommended. \$8.00

GOLDEN JEWEL - (Bloomer, N.Ire.) even form with silky-smooth golden yellow petals and mid length crown. Superb show record in U.K. Mid-late season. Outstanding breeder. \$10.00

Division 2 Yellow Perianth, Orange/Red Large Cup (2 Y-O/R)

ATRO - (Jackson, Tas.) a real favourite of ours. Large, smooth yellow perianth and fiery orange-red goblet cup. Tall stems. Early-mid season. Fine show flower. \$10.00

GLENFARCLAS - (Lea, Eng.) robust grower with substantial yellow perianth and long trumpet-style cup of bright orange. Splendid show and garden plant and excellent breeder. Mid season. \$10.00

SANSUI - (Jackson, Tas.) thick, strong golden perianth and orange crown deepening in colour at the rim. Tall stems, hardy growth and early flowering. Good! \$5.00

SUNGAZER - (Glover, Tas.) a very good quality early season flower. Strong grower with wide, smooth yellow petals and bright red cup. Fine grower. \$5.00

Division 2 Large Cup, Orange Perianth, Red Cup (2 O-R)

AUSPICIOUS - (Jackson, Tas.) very good flower of medium-large size. Smooth yellow petals developing a nice orange flush and shortish cup of red. Mid season. Good grower. \$6.00

LIMBO - (Duncan, N.Ire.) eye-catching Daffodil with flashy orange petals and orange-red bowl-shaped crown. Highly priced overseas and a big reputation. Should prove valuable for showing and breeding. Mid season flowering. \$20.00

RED HOT - (O'More, N.Z.) splendid early season flower. Broad yellow petals brightly flushed orange and vibrant orange-red cup. Greatly admired here. \$10.00

Division 2 Large Cup, White Perianth, Yellow Cup (2 W-Y)


BANDOO - (Jackson, Tas.) a splendid, large flower with smooth white perianth and long yellow trumpet-cup. Early-mid season. \$6.00

BRANO - (Jackson, Tas.) very nice early-mid season show flower with a cup of chrome-yellow to apricot. \$3.00

COOL AUTUMN - (Noton, Eng.) beautiful quality Daffodil flowering very late in the season. Fine show form. Rounded white perianth and neat yellow cup. \$6.00

LEMON SHERBET - (Carncairn, N.Ire.) another lovely late season flower. Rounded white perianth and shortish yellow cup with a green eye. \$4.00



MOUNTPLEASANT - (Ballydorn, N.Ire.) rounded, smooth, snowy white perianth. Yellow crown flushed orange when opening. Lovely quality. Very late flowering. \$4.00

Division 2 Large Cup, White Perianth, Orange/Red Cup (2 W-O/R)

BRAHMS - (deNavarro, U.K.) beautiful quality mid to late season flower. Fine white perianth and flashy bowl-crown of bright orange. Show and garden. \$7.00

KENTUCKY CARDINAL - (deNavarro, U.K.) very fine mid to late season Daffodil. Well formed white perianth and bright orange-red crown. Classy show bloom. \$8.00

SHOWBIZ - (Throckmorton, U.S.A.) a splendid, decorative, mid-late season cultivar. Good quality white perianth and vivid orange bowl-crown rimmed paler. Quite striking. \$8.00

CARO NOME - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) rounded white perianth with decorative, wide open crown of white broadly banded in pink. Very fancy. Latish. \$4.00

CORAL LIGHT - (Kanouse, U.S.A.) quite lovely mid-late season variety. Smooth white perianth and shortish white cup brightly rimmed in a rich pink. \$4.00

DECOY - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) superb American Daffodil with beautifully formed white perianth and medium size cup of really striking, vivid pink. Imported at U.S. \$40.00. Eyecatching mid-season flower. \$25.00

EVERPINK - (Evans, U.S.A.) very neat, medium size flower in mid-late season. Well formed, smooth white perianth and shortish cup of strikingly bright pink. Lovely! \$8.00

FRAGRANT ROSE - (Duncan, N.Ire.) great reputation in the U.K. with numerous recent top show awards there. Rounded white petals and rather short, straightish cup of rich (almost red-salmon) pink. Should prove very valuable for breeding. Mid-late season. \$30.00

G13-44 - (Mitsch/Havens, U.S.A.) a splendid decorative variety with neatly formed white petals and a striking crown widely bowl-shaped and

toning from a white centre to quite a striking margin of pink. Mid-late season. \$4.00

KIRKLINGTON - (Abel-Smith, Eng.) very early flowering with large white perianth of good form and medium length cup of lovely pastel pink. An excellent early-season flower. \$15.00

LEONAINA - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) broad, rounded white petals and dished crown of rather opalescent pink. Quite decorative. Late season. \$4.00

LILAC DELIGHT - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) another fancy variety with clean white petals and bright pink crown with a hint of lilac. Mid-late season. \$6.00

MELBURY - (Blanchard, Eng.) quite beautiful mid to mid-late season flower. Large, smooth, rounded white perianth and medium length cup of really rich pink. An exceptionally good plant. \$30.00

MUSIC - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) late season flowering. Strong pink cup and well formed white perianth which flushes distinctly pale pink as the flower matures. Should be great for breeding. \$12.00

NITE GAMES - (Glenbrook, Tas.) Seedling No. 37/87 bred from KERSTIN x GOSSAMER. Very rounded, smooth white perianth of medium size. Flat white crown beautifully banded in pink. Div. 2 W-WWP. Mid-late season. 1st Prize Whitmore 1987. (This has given us some very promising 3 W-P seedlings.) \$7.00

OBSESSION - (Jackson, Tas.) famous show flower. Rounded white petals and well proportioned, longish pink cup. Many awards. Mid-late season. \$5.00

PETER - (Broadfield, Tas.) bred from DEAR ME, a beautiful medium size flower. Beaut white perianth and rich pink cup. Lovely form but very slow increaser. Mid season. \$8.00

PINK BOMB - (Mitsch/Havens, U.S.A.) superb decorative with giant white perianth and very large, wide-open crown toning from bright pink at the rim to a lemon centre. Mid-late season. \$8.00

PINK DECLARATION - (Mitsch/Havens, U.S.A.) robust large decorative with broad, smooth white perianth and great bowl-crown with rich melon-pink band around a cream centre. Mid-late season. \$8.00

PINK SILHOUETTE - (Jackson, Tas.) very fine show flower in mid-late season. Well-formed, smooth white perianth and longish pink crown. \$7.00

PINK SPARKLER - (Mitsch/Havens, U.S.A.) a sibling to PINK BOMB. Refined white perianth and wide-open crown with scalloped edge of pink. Mid-late season. Fine quality. \$9.00

PINK SPECIAL - (Glover, Tas.) exquisite mid-season show flower with glistening white perianth and bright pink cup. Lovely quality, probably the second-best Tasmanian Pink Daffodil we grow. Few only. \$25.00

PLOVER - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) a classy American flower. Wide, smooth white petals. Bowl shaped crown of medium pink. A very good mid-season variety for garden and show. \$7.00

POL VOULIN - (Lea, Eng.) magnificent large flower with superbly formed white perianth, which is satiny-smooth, and elegant pink crown. Fine record overseas and growing brilliantly here. We showed this for Champion Pink at Whitemore '91. Latish flowering. Top of the range. \$50.00

PRECOCIOUS - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) easily the best decorative Daffodil we've ever seen. Show quality, broad, smooth white perianth and stunning, heavily ruffled and frilled crown of striking, rich, bright pink, paling at the centre. We showed this for Champion Decorative at the Australian Daffodil Championships in Canberra '92 where it drew much comment. Mid season. Few only. \$60.00

PREMIERE - (Duncan, N.Ire.) good quality, early-mid season flower. Medium-large size. Smooth white petals and long cup of clean pink. Show and garden. \$6.00

QUASAR - (Evans, U.S.A.) widely regarded as one of the world's finest Daffodils. Immaculate, broad white perianth and fantastic bowl-shaped crown of reddish-pink. Mid-late season. (The first time we imported this, at \$90.00 per bulb, it was lost in Quarantine, but the "second try" is growing beautifully.) A top favourite. \$70.00

RUBYTHROAT - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) imported in 1985 at U.S. \$37.00 this Daffodil is absolutely stunning. Huge white perianth with medium-large cup of the most intense, vibrant red-pink. Magnificent colour. Flowers are not always smooth but it is performing brilliantly here. Exhibited in winning Maddock Cup team, Hobart, 1989 when it drew much comment. Open Reserve Champion Award, and winning National Bank Trophy team and Maddock Cup team, Hobart 1990. \$60.00

R44-92 - (Abel-Smith, Eng.) very good quality garden and breeding flower. Mid-late season. Flat, smooth white perianth and quite shortish crown richly coloured pink. \$4.00

SARN - (Cross, Tas.) we regard this as the **best** Tasmanian Pink. Pure white, smooth perianth of beautiful, overlapping form and lovely long cup of rich rose-pink. Outstanding show record here. Mid-late season. Limited stock. \$40.00

DAFFODIL COLOUR DESCRIPTIONS

Our description of colours for Daffodils, listed in this Catalogue, are fairly accurate for the flowers as grown here. Some plants are rather variable e.g. RAGBAG which has egg-yolk yellow petaloids just as often as orange. In warmer climates we would not expect either the pink or red cups to be so bright in colour as when grown in cold-climate gardens. The same comment **may** apply to those varieties with distinct green eyes. Because of their Poeticus background they probably prefer cooler climate gardens.

All our miniatures are in fairly limited stocks so please order as soon as possible. Many will sell out well before the season is over.



IMPORTANT CULTIVATION NOTES FOR HOOP-PETTICOAT DAFFODILS:

In our garden we flower our hoop-petticoats (the species *N. bulbocodium*, *N. cantabricus*, *N. romieuxii* and their hybrids) prolifically every year. We believe this success is due to planting the bulbs in a situation where they get **no** water from November through until March. The easiest way to achieve this is by planting in pots and tipping these on their side for the Summer. This long, hot, dry spell certainly seems to be the key to prolific flowering.
