

Muscari argei album - a delightful and very long lasting white Grape Hyacinth. \$1.00

Muscari armeniacum BLUE SPIKE - marvellous, fully double heads of blue, like a miniature conifer. May not flower fully double first season after a move. Easy. 2 for \$1.00

Muscari armeniacum EARLY GIANT - a robust Grape Hyacinth with good spikes of little rich blue bells. Early Spring. Few only. 2 for \$1.50

Muscari armeniacum HEAVENLY BLUE - profuse, easy growing blue Grape Hyacinth with masses of early Spring flowers. 3 for \$1.00

Muscari armenicum SAPHIR - a very good doer. Unusual flowers of bronze-slate-grey-blue. 2 for \$1.00

Muscari azureum - (*Hyacinthus azureus*) very early Spring flowers. Really attractive spikes of azure blue. Highly recommended. \$2.00

Muscari azureum album - the choice white form of this beautiful dwarf bulb. \$2.00

Muscari chalusicum - a very beautiful little species. Spires of clear china-blue flowers. Rare offering and few only. \$3.50

Muscari comosum album - the unusual white form of the Tassel Hyacinth. Curious rather than handsome. \$2.50

Muscari latifolium - a very handsome species with a quite broad leaf and lovely spire of blackish-blue flowers. Few only. \$3.00

Muscari macrocarpum - quite a rarity. Choice yellow flowers, purplish in bud. Early Spring. Needs a hot dry Summer to flower well. \$3.00

Muscari neglectum - easy grower with neat spires of sweet scented blue-black flowers in early Spring. 2 for \$1.00

Muscari pallens - rare and beautiful china-blue. Very few. \$3.00

Muscari steupii - raised from seed from bulbs sent to us by John Wagner. In the *Muscari armeniacum* group. A good, easy grower. Tubular bells of blue-black, paler at the top of the spike. \$1.00

Muscari tubergenianum - a top class Grape Hyacinth. Fine spikes of solid blue. \$1.50

DAFFODIL LIST

Daffodils are very easy to grow, doing well in any reasonable soil. They like an open, sunny position, a dry Summer rest period, and plenty of moisture while in growth. Plant bulbs from January till mid April.

The bulbs need to be planted reasonably deep (about 15cm (6 inches) in light soil, a bit less in heavy soil). Do not plant bulbs on a very hot day (hot, moist soils could cause the bulb to rot) and don't plant back in the same spot you last had Daffodils growing. We lift and divide our garden planted bulbs each three years. If fertilizing your bulbs, potash should be all that is required.

Never, never ever cut your Daffodil foliage while it is still in growth. This year's foliage is next year's plant and flowers!

If you wish to grow Daffodils in pots please read our notes "Growing Bulbs in Pots" elsewhere in the catalogue.

In this Catalogue Daffodils are grouped according to their classification as per the Royal Horticultural Society. The classification system has just been updated and we are now listing our Daffodils under the new divisions.

The name and country listed in brackets, after the name of the Daffodil, indicates the breeder and the place of origin.

Division 1 Trumpet, All Yellow (1Y-Y)

AH GEE - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred GOLDEN x RISTIN. Superbly smooth golden yellow trumpet. Mid-season flowering. Exceptionally consistent. One of our very finest. Australasian Champion at 1995 Launceston Show, also Champion Yellow Trumpet (exhibited by Ian Norman) Hobart 96. Champion 1Y-Y Claremont 96 and Hobart 97. \$45.00

BALLYARNETT - (Carncairn, N. Ire.) strong, bold yellow trumpet which flowers early. A fine garden plant. \$4.00

GARGLEBLASTER - (Glenbrook, Tas.) a really lovely, smooth yellow trumpet. Early-mid season. Large size and fine show flower. \$7.00

JUGHEAD - (Glenbrook, Tas.) a good quality garden and show flower from the same cross as AH GEE. Medium-large size and rich yellow colouring. Mid season. \$8.00

KARMA - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred from AKKAD x KOROMO. Exceptionally reliable and quite lovely large flower. Broad, smooth petals and slightly flanged trumpet, well frilled. We have won many show prizes with this. Early-mid season. \$12.00

MIDAS TOUCH - (Bloomer, N.Ire.) outstanding show flower, large and smooth. Rich gold throughout. Mid-late season. \$12.00

MISQUOTE - (Jackson, Tas.) this is perhaps the finest yellow trumpet available anywhere. Great size and rich yellow colouring combined with exceptionally thick substance and smooth texture. Flat perianth and straight trumpet. Many recent Tasmanian Champion Awards. Just a few bulbs to offer this year. \$30.00

SQUABBLE - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred from ODIN x WILD WOMEN. Like our other successful yellow trumpets bred here this bloom is not a giant. The flower opens medium size but it does grow considerably on the plant. Exceptionally smooth, flat perianth and beautifully formed tubular trumpet, just lightly ruffled at the end. The flower is bright, even yellow throughout. Tall stem. Early-mid season flowering and exceptionally consistent. Show awards include Australian Champion Trumpet, Kyneton, 1990 and TDC Jackson Trophy, Claremont 1996. \$25.00

WILD WOMEN - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred ANSETT x RISTIN. Only just medium size this flower has a wonderful, golden, overlapping perianth of thick texture and great smoothness. The trumpet is narrow, straight and tubular. This is a classy all-yellow with tall stem and early season flowering. Grand Champion Launceston 1984, Grand Champion Claremont 1985, Glover Trophy Westbury 1986, Webster Cup Team Tasvention 1988, Radcliff Trophy Team Hobart 1989, Fairbairn Trophy Team Kyneton 1990, also a Best Bloom Award, Canberra 90 and Hobart 92. Producing superb seedlings with outstanding show results. \$10.00

***CRAIG x WILD WOMEN - wonderfully robust selected seedlings with broad yellow perianth and bright yellow trumpets. Great garden plants and useful for show. Early to mid-season. \$3.50 or 3 for \$10.00

Division 1 Trumpet, Yellow Perianth, Coloured Trumpet (1Y-O)

CORBIERE - (Lea, Eng.) just a few bulbs to offer of this excellent recent introduction. Rounded golden petals of great substance and neat trumpet which starts golden-orange and colours up brightly. Flowers open medium size and grow to be large blooms. Mid season. An outstanding prospect for show and breeding. \$25.00

JUMP-UP - (Dr M. Temple-Smith, Tas.) an outstanding flower in this section. Large, smooth, rounded yellow perianth and elegant trumpet of rich orange. Mid season. We exhibited this for a Champion Award at Launceston Show '99. Few only. \$30.00

RUDDYNOSEY - (M. Temple-Smith, Tas.) a splendid addition to the scarce group of orange-red trumpets. Vigorous growth and good exhibition form. Smooth, flat yellow perianth and trumpet of solid orange for its full length. Mid-Season. Numerous class wins at Tasmanian Shows. \$15.00

UNCLE DUNCAN - (Pearson, Eng.) our first offering of this outstanding large show flower. Broad, smooth yellow petals and bold orange trumpet-cut. Mid season. We exhibited this for Champion 1Y-O at the Australasian Championships, Launceston 1995. Few only \$35.00

YORK MINSTER - (Lea, Eng.) another first offering. Rich yellow, smooth, wide perianth segments and orange funnel-shaped corona. Mid season. Excellent show and breeding prospects. Few only. \$30.00

Division 1 Trumpet, White Perianth, Yellow Trumpet (1W-Y)

COMIC - (Glenbrook, Tas.) good quality flower in mid-late season. Great substance and has won Champion awards. White petals, lemon-yellow trumpet. \$9.00

COMPUTE - (Jackson, Tas.) gigantic flower with very large white perianth and long yellow trumpet. Beauteous show form and great garden vigour. Many champion awards. Grows well everywhere. Mid-season. \$10.00

MOPOKE - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred HERALDING x CHAOS. This sibling to SHINDIG comes from the most successful cross we have ever made. MOPOKE is a really large flower with smooth, broad white perianth segments tapering to pointed tips and long, slender, bright lemon-yellow trumpet. Mid season flowering and consistent. Champion 1W-Y Hobart 1989, and very prominent in our winning Radcliff Cup entry, Launceston 1995. \$30.00

POPS LEGACY - (Bender, U.S.A.) raised in U.S.A. from seed sent from P. Phillips in New Zealand. Strong grower and brilliant show flower. Broad white petals and elegant yellow trumpet. Countless show awards in New Zealand and U.S.A. We exhibited this for Champion 1W-Y at Hobart 96. Mid-season. Few only. \$20.00

THEORUM - (Jackson, Tas.) a beautiful, large bicolour trumpet of excellent show form. Mid season. \$12.00

Division 1 Trumpet, White Perianth, Orange Trumpet (1W-O)

CRUCIAL POINT - (Radcliff, Tas.) bred by the family regarded as world-leaders in this rare colour combination. Very neat, medium-size flowers. Broad white perianth and long, straightish corona of rich orange. Mid-late season. Just a few to go. \$50.00

Division 1 Trumpet, White Perianth, Pink Trumpet (1W-P)

PINK SILK - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) large and superbly beautiful. Great white perianth and elegant, long pink trumpet. Vibrant colour. Early-mid season and wonderful quality. \$25.00

Division 1 Trumpet, All White (1W-W)

BEN ALIGIN - (Lea, Eng.) a refined, mid season white trumpet of lovely form and good size. Few only. \$12.00

EARLYBIRD - (Radcliff, Tas.) exceptionally valuable as a very early season daffodil, flowering here from late May through till mid August. Seems to need a first year to settle in before flowering well. Medium size flower with white petals and cream coloured trumpet cup. Sometimes puts up flower stem before the leaves emerge. \$4.00

KEMBLA - (Jackson, Tas.) a superb quality white trumpet of great size and substance. Strong growing, flowers mid season. Brilliant show flower. Just a few to sell. \$18.00

SHYSTER - (Glenbrook, Tas.) Seedling No. 64/89 bred from PANACHE x SALACIA. A really beautiful large flower of sparkling white throughout. Smooth perianth and elegant trumpet-cup which usually measures Div. 1. Early-mid season. \$20.00

SILENT VALLEY - (Bloomer, N. Ire.) exceptionally lovely flower. Large, flat, smooth white perianth and very elegant slender white trumpet. A beautiful show and garden variety. Regular show winner overseas. Mid to mid-late season. \$15.00

SILVER CONVENTION - (Lea, Eng.) another typical Lea-bred show flower. Smooth, rounded white petals and elegant white corona. Mid season. Few only. \$15.00

WHITE STAR - (Bloomer, N. Ire.) a giant white trumpet with great, broad perianth and large, roll-mouthed, bell trumpet. Superb show flower but rather slow to increase here. Magnificent show record in the U.K. Mid-late season. \$25.00

*****HERALDING x CHAOS** - magnificent big flowers from this superb cross. Huge perianth and bold trumpet-cups. Some measure Div. 1, others Div. 2. Opening white petals and lemon corona and maturing creamy-white. Early-mid season. Limited stock. \$5.50 each or 3 for \$15.00

Division 1 Trumpet, Yellow Perianth, Pink Trumpet (1Y-P)

AMERICAN SHORES - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) a beautifully formed flower of large size and with satiny-smooth petals. Perianth is soft lemon-yellow and trumpet is clear pink. Mid season exhibition flower. \$30.00

Division 1 Trumpet, Yellow Perianth, White Trumpet (1Y-W)

GAMUT - (Jackson, Tas.) a robust plant with broad yellow petals and a white halo at the base of the white trumpet lightly rimmed yellow. Good show and garden plant. Mid-late season. \$8.00

GIN AND LIME - (Carncairn, N.Ire.) considered one of the world-leading flowers in this division. Large flowers with smooth lime-yellow petals and white trumpet palely rimmed lime-yellow. A top show and garden plant. Early-mid season. \$12.00

Division 2 Large Cup, All Yellow (2Y-Y)

ACCOMMODATE - (Jackson, Tas.) a large flower with broad, thick-textured overlapping petals and trumpet-cup of even richer yellow. Early-mid season. \$6.00

DODGIE - (Glenbrook, Tas.) bred VIXI x GOLDEN VINTAGE. Wonderful, very early garden flower of great durability on very tall stems. Neat, broad yellow perianth and mid-length ruffled yellow cup. \$4.00

EUPHONY - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) very lovely flower late in the season. Soft lemon throughout. \$4.00

FORGOTTEN - (Radcliff, Tas.) fine, bold, golden-yellow flowers on a strong bulb. Early-mid season. \$4.00

HAMBLEDON - (Blanchard, Eng.) superb quality mid season show flower. Lemon-yellow, developing honey tones and a halo at the base of the corona. \$10.00

IMPECCABLE - (Jackson, Tas.) a magnificent show flower of great size and superb smoothness. Many recent top Championship awards. Early-mid season. \$35.00

MELODIOS - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) only medium size but this clear yellow flower is a gem early in the season. Smooth petals and elegant trumpet-cup. \$5.00

NYNJA - (Jackson, Tas.) an outstanding show and garden flower. Medium-large size. Wide, flat yellow perianth and long golden trumpet-cup. Mid-late season. Very consistent. Recent champion awards. Few only. \$15.00

REFERENCE POINT - (Lea, Eng.) a beautiful mid season flower of exceptional colouring. Superbly formed perianth is mid yellow with a white halo and very pale petal tips. Straight sided cup of rich yellow. A very fine show, garden and breeder's plant. \$12.00

STRINES - (Board, Eng.) a first rate garden and show flower. Large size, early flowering and rich yellow. \$6.00

VIXI - (Jackson, Tas.) very good all yellow of large size and great substance. Early-mid season. \$4.00

Division 2 Yellow Perianth, Orange/Red Large Cup (2Y-O/R)

AUSPICIOUS - (Jackson, Tas.) good size flower. Neat red cup and very rounded perianth of rich yellow which sometimes flushes soft orange. Mid season. \$4.00

BANDA - (Phillips, N.Z.) outstanding show flower with beautiful form and lovely colouring. Smooth golden petals and golden corona broadly rimmed red. Mid season. \$15.00

CARYEM - (Jackson, Tas.) a robust growing variety with large show quality flowers. Broad yellow petals and bright orange corona. Mid season. \$4.00

COLORFUL - (Jackson, Tas.) a marvellous show flower with circular golden perianth and bright orange-red corona. Mid season and very reliable. \$5.00

COWBOY - (Jackson, Tas.) high class mid-late season show flower. Large size, rounded yellow perianth and rich orange-red corona. \$8.00

ENFIELD - (Richardson, N. Ire) a quality yellow/red late in the season. Good form and colour. \$5.00

GOGO DANCER - (Glenbrook, Tas.) Seedling No. 96/90 bred from TAMBORA GOLD x GOFORIT. Parentage represents two of the finest flowers in Div. 2Y-R. This plant has an immaculate yellow perianth and lovely corona of rich orange-red. Fairly large size. Early-mid season flowering. Grand Champion and Champion 2Y-R, Ulverstone, 2000, shown by Des Tongs. \$30.00

LEA 2-7-75 - (Lea, Eng.) a giant flower in mid season. Broad yellow perianth and trumpet-like cup of orange. Wonderful in the garden, for showing and breeding. \$10.00

NO PEER - (Radcliff, Tas.) brilliant large flowers with smooth, thick golden petals and bright orange-red bowl-shaped crown. Top class exhibition flower, extremely consistent, and a great garden plant. Early-mid season. \$10.00

ODULATION - (Jackson, Tas.) fine form and great smoothness. Large yellow perianth and bright orange-red cup. Mid season. \$5.00

RED ALERT - (Brogden, N.Z.) large size, beautiful golden petals and rich red corona. Fine show flower. Mid season. \$15.00

SOMEDAY - (Brogden, N.Z.) imported from N.Z. at \$100.00 per bulb. Smooth golden perianth and vibrant red corona. Medium-large size. Mid season. Grand Champion at Tasvention 1988. \$20.00

SPORTSMAN - (Duncan, N.Ire.) very attractive mid-late season variety. Smooth yellow petals and dished crown of yellow-red. Nice for showing. \$5.00

TORRIDON - (Lea, Eng.) only medium size but exceptional quality. Smoothest yellow perianth and vibrant orange-red crown. Mid season. Excellent for garden, show and breeding. \$7.00

ALTUN HA - (Pearson, Eng.) an absolute standout show flower of tremendous size. Broad smooth perianth of rich citrus-yellow and strikingly contrasted corona of white. Mid season. Our first offering of this variety which has many recent top awards overseas. \$45.00

CENTURY - (Pannill, U.S.A.) one of the very finest reverse bi-colours. Large size. Rounded and smooth lemon yellow perianth and corona which quickly turns white with a lovely fine gold rim. Mid season. \$10.00

PASTICHE - (Richardson/Postles) a lovely reverse bicolour. Smooth lemon petals and creamy-white corona. Good garden and show flower. Mid-late season. \$7.00

SWEDISH FJORD - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) a wonderful garden and show flower of tremendous quality. Bright lemon-yellow perianth of considerable size and beautifully contrasted white corona. Early-mid season. \$18.00

IMPORTANT CULTIVATION NOTES FOR HOOP-PETTICOAT DAFFODILS

In our garden we flower our hoop-petticoats (the species N. bulbocodium, N. cantabricus and N. romieuxii and their hybrids) prolifically every year. We believe this success is due to planting the bulbs in a situation where they get no water from November through until March. The easiest way to achieve this is by planting in pots and tipping these on their side for the Summer. This long, hot, dry spell certainly seems to be the key to prolific flowering.





NOTES on GROWING BULBS in POTS

We are asked many questions about growing bulbs in pots. The following is our basic method for growing potted Autumn, Winter and Spring flowering bulbs.

1. Make sure the pot has good drainage holes
2. Use good potting soil – be wary of commercial potting mixes. An ideal mix is $\frac{1}{2}$ loam, $\frac{1}{4}$ peat, $\frac{1}{4}$ sharp sand.
3. Plant bulbs $\frac{1}{2}$ way down in the pot.
4. Make sure you label your pots, and top with mulch.
5. Only water occasionally until bulbs show growth above ground, then a good watering twice a week while in full growth. Withhold all water once foliage dries off in early Summer.
6. Use large enough pots to let bulbs make full growth. Larger growing bulbs must have a large pot!
7. Bulbs require very little fertilizer – perhaps a little potash (we use wood-ash).

COO - (Div 12Y-Y) Seedling No. 15/89 bred from *N. bulbocodium tenuifolius* x *N. cyclamineus*. An enchanting novelty. Slow increaser. \$30.00

FENBEN - (Div. 7Y-Y) Seedling No. 13/90 bred from *N. fernandesii* x a *N. jonquilla* form. (Pollen parent supplied from U.K. as *N. j. henquesii* but is more likely *N. cordubensis*.) An exquisite little golden yellow flower. Usually three, but occasionally more, flowers per stem. Early blooming and produces secondary stems to lengthen the season. Choice and perfumed. Champion Miniature, Sheffield 1994, Champion award, Hobart 1998. \$30.00

FERDIE - (Div. 6Y-Y) Seedling No. 46/88 bred from *N. rupicola* x *N. cyclamineus*. This is a tiny plant. Reflexing petals and tubular trumpet-cup, yellow throughout. Blooms from early-mid season to mid-late season. Always draws attention here. Champion Miniature, Westbury '92, Champion, Claremont '98. Very reliable. \$12.00

FYNO - Seedling No. 2/87 bred from NYLON x *cantabricus foliosus*. A nice little all-white Hoop Petticoat which flowers from late Autumn right through Winter. SHEBEEN - not available this season.

SMARPLE - (Div. 10W-W) Seedling No. 6/85 bred from N. bulbocodium conspicuus x N. cantabricus foliosus. This is a robust, medium-large Hoop Petticoat opening soft lemon and turning creamy-white. Strong grower and fast increaser. Lovely in pots and neat enough for showing. Flowers very early till early-mid season. Outstanding show successes in 2000 including Show Committee's Prize, Claremont, Champion Div. 10 and Miniature Hobart, also Champion Div. 10 Launceston shown by John and June Gibson. \$6.00

? SNOOK - (Div. 6Y-Y) Seedling No. 4/87 bred from N. nevadensis x N. cyclamineus. An excellent little garden and show flower. Smooth, swept-back petals and long, slender trumpet. Medium yellow throughout. Flowers early-mid season. Increases steadily. this should prove to be a favourite miniature cyclamineus hybrid. \$25.00

SPOIROT - (Div. 10W-W) Seedling No. 3/87 bred from N. bulbocodium conspicuus x N. cantabricus foliosus. SPOIROT completes our four introductions from this cross. A large, robust, rounded Hoop Petticoat with medium-large flowers of smooth cream. First Prize, Claremont Show 1991, Miniature Gold Ribbon at U.S. National Show '95, Champion Div. 10, Hobart '98. Early Spring flowering. \$8.00

? SWAGGER - (Div. 6W-W, VARIABLE) Seedling No. 82/89 bred from GIPSY QUEEN x N. cyclamineus. A superb little plant. Early-mid to mid-late season flowering. Slender white petals with perfect Turks-cap reflex. The narrow, straight trumpet opens greenish-lemon and matures white. Produces several flower stems from each bulb. Like GIPSY QUEEN the stems arch outwards at maturity. A very fertile breeder. Gold Ribbon, California 2000 shown by Nancy Wilson. Very few available. \$60.00

THE DANSANT - not available this season.

*** GLENBROOK PETTICOATS - marvellous little Hoop Petticoats raised from selected crosses here at Glenbrook. Easy and prolific - but keep dry in Summer to promote flowering. \$1.50 each or 3 for \$4.00

*** LITTLE BEAUTY x CYCLAMINEUS - delightful little daffodils with swept-back yellow petals and slender yellow trumpets. Early season flowering and very good. \$4.00 each or 3 for \$11.00

*** N. BULBOCODIUM TENUIFOLIUS x N. FERNANDESI - on garden walks we have referred to these seedlings as our 'failures'. Stems of one, two or three small flowers, sunny yellow throughout. Narrow petals and semi-inflated coronas - as you would expect from one parent being a Hoop Petticoat and the other a jonquil. Not exhibition form, these are funny little garden flowers. NEW INTRODUCTIONS FOR 2001

We have considerable pleasure in offering a small selection of new Glenbrook-Raised Daffodils this season. We believe all will be valuable additions to the garden and have good show prospects too.

This past year has been remarkable for the many, many show successes of other growers with Glenbrook-raised bulbs. A report of just some of these successes is included in our 'Notes from Glenbrook'. We certainly expect this year's offerings to maintain our multipurpose G.B.F. Garden>Show standards!

EYE SPY – Seedling no. 8/90 bred from FYNO x JULIA JANE. A wonderful sparkling white Hoop petticoat (Div. 10W-W) with flattish, petunoid form. Flowers from early-mid winter through to late Winter, and like FYNO it increases well. Bulbs down 2 or 3 years produce many flower stems. Keep dry in Summer, so probably best grown in pots. \$15.00

FAR CROONIN – Seedling no. 19/93 bred from SEA DREAM x MUTO. An outstanding all-white small cup (Div 3W-W). Large size and tall stems. Early-mid season flowering. Brilliant show record including Champion Seedling and Grand Champion, Hobart 1993, Champion 3W-W Australasian Championships, Launceston 1995 and Champion 3W-W Claremont 1996. Just a few to offer. \$45.00

GENTLEMAN JACK – Seedling no 1/97 bred from TITANIA x N. cyclamineus. A very good small bicolor (Div. 2W-Y) ideal for the 'Intermediate class'. Flower is just 65mm diameter. Neat white perianth is flat and straight, at right angles to the elegant yellow corona. Early flowering. Very much like a bicolor replica of THE LITTLE GENTLEMAN. \$20.00

GLENBROOK BELLE – Seedling no. 32/90 bred from BERYL x LITTLE BEAUTY. A high quality garden and show flower (Div. 6Y-Y) with well reflexed, smooth perianth segments and a bell-shaped corona. Clear yellow throughout. Early to mid season. In the new 7 bloom championship class at Claremont, 2000, this small flower was placed 1st of 18 outstanding entries. \$25.00

HY-BRASIL – Seedling no. 12/90 bred from N. fernandesii x N. cyclamineus. A charming, miniature multiheaded cultivar with neatly formed golden yellow flowers and attractive longish coronas (Div. 7Y-Y). Early to mid season. In 1995 Naomi Liggett commented that she thought this better than its sibling LITTLE MISSUS. Strong growth but slow to increase. \$30.00

WEARY DEARIE – Seedling no. 61/93 bred from DEAR ME x N. fernandesii. This is our final introduction from this cross. A sibling to ENDEAR it is possibly an even better Show flower. Usually three beautiful flowers per stem. White perianth and good pink corona. Early-mid season. Champion Div. 7 at Launceston 1998, Claremont 1999 and Wynyard and Hobart 2000. \$45.00

NEWS FROM MERRY GLENBROOK

To close this year's Grogologue – oops, Catalogue – we must give you a brief report of an extraordinary year here at G.B.F., but sober readers beware! To be in touch with the spirit of your scribe you really need to approach these tail-end writings with at least one decent bottle of red.

Read boldly onwards and disregard Samuel Johnson's quirky notion that "One of the disadvantages of wine is that it makes a man mistake words for thoughts" We all know it's really "IN VINO VERITAS".

Early in January 2000, the Southern Tasmanian Lily Show started the year's flower shows in good style. Illustrious New South Welshman, Mr John Mathews, was in charge of judging at the Show and Glenbrook was awarded, for the second year running, Grand Champion Lily in Show. This was with a rich golden-orange trumpet lily, with a towering spire of flowers, raised originally from seed sent here from the North American Lily Society – by way of the kindness of Kathy Andersen of Delaware.

AMERICAN CONNECTIONS

Kathy Andersen last visited Tasmania in 1988, but subsequent GBF importations of Trumpet Lily seed from the always remind us of one of the great ladies of the US Daffodil and Lily Societies. Each December and January there are reminders of Kathy scattered all about our summer garden here.

Directly after the Lily Show we worked flat-out for eight weeks trying to complete most of our Summer Bulb orders, for in mid-March Rod had the great honour of being invited to fly to the U.S.A. as the guest of "Kautz Ironstone Vineyard", in California, for their annual daffodil and wine festival on St Patrick's Day. Rod's commitments for the event included a morning TV program out of Sacramento and a presentation on the following day titled "Daffodils, Wine and Angels". Bob Spotts, President of the American Daffodil Society, had helped co-ordinate events and his hospitality along with the kindness of Kirby Fong and the Kautz family was exceptional. The presentation/address on "Daffodils, Wine and Angels" was in front of a huge crowd – about 200 people – and seemed to be well received. What the Americans thought of a very short lad with an Aussie drawl and an old leather slouch hat made from road-kill is hard to say. The general comment seemed to be "you are soooo professional". (Which does make us wonder Bob, just what, in advance, you had told them to expect???)

FULL BOTTLES AND THE ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Probably not everyone in California was totally enamoured of young Rod, however. Among international visitors at the show was the famous Dutch bulb grower Wim Lemmers. Wim had visited Glenbrook a couple of years previously and while in California provided a favourite quote from the trip.

Wim to Rod: "I showed slides of your bulbs-place to the Daffodil Committee (of the RHS). They don't think much of what you are doing"

Such invaluable comments relayed by Wim, from the heavy thinkers of the RHS, remind one of a famous Grafitto once quoted on BBC radio:

"I'd rather have a full-bottle-in-front-of-me than a full-frontal-lobotomy"

Back home, in March-April, we were extremely busy completing the main summer bulb jobs. On top of this we had preparations for a major change in the Australian Tax System. Running a small business requires an enormous range of abilities and we can't say official GST training seminars provided much help. Who was that anonymous author who wrote "Some recent laws would indicate the lawmakers not only passed the bar but also stopped there?"

THREE DRINKS

By July it was time for our Winter Catalogue and the on the afternoon of Sunday, 9 July, we held a "Catalogue Launch Party". Many visitors were delighted with the large array of miniature Daffodils we had on display at this event – literally hundreds and hundreds of them – mainly flared hoop petticoats in white, cream and lemon. All quite inspiring in the middle of winter. Rod, unlike the bulk of the daffodil fraternity, is intoxicated by Hoop Petticoats and our approach to these at G.B.F. could perhaps be succinctly summarized by a Humphrey Bogart quote: "The rest of the world is three drinks behind".

SPRING SHOWS AND REALITY

The first Daffodil Show of the Spring was at Claremont, 2 & 3 September. As it was very early season, we were able to enter a record number of miniatures, mostly our own hybrids, including 70 stems of Hoop Petticoats (Div 10) and just over 100 stems of miniatures from other divisions. Where were Naomi Liggett and Delia Bankhead to appreciate such enthusiastic G.B.F. endeavours? Not to be seen anywhere! Just typical - women, the world over. As well as miniatures we benched some 130 or so standards and given the fierce competition we were very fortunate to win Champion Pink, Champion Double (ACHUCKLE), The Show Committee Trophy (SMARPLE, Div 10), The American Daffodil Society Red-White-Blue Ribbon, The UK Raised Trophy, The Stonemans (Magnificent 7) Trophy (GLENBROOK BELLE) and the W. Jackson JR. Trophy (Yellow Trumpet).

Directly after Claremont Show the wind began to blow – and hardly stopped for the next 6 weeks. But we continued to support as many shows as possible.

Our flowers, sent on the bus to Wynyard Show, won the Dixon Memorial Trophy, and six other Champion Awards for Seedling, Double (ENGHUS x AKORA), Div5, ANGEL'S BREATH, Div 7, WEARY DEARIE, Div 12 (bulbocodium x fernandesii) and Div 13, N. cordubensis. Our sincere thanks to Sam and Elaine Biggins and their Wynyard team for benching these flowers.

Hobart Show, on the same weekend as Wynyard, opened their schedule with 5 Special Award Classes. The Richardson Trophy for miniatures, the Radcliff Trophy (6 x 3), The American Daffodil Society Red-White-Blue Ribbon (5 American raised), the UK raised Daffodil Prize (3 UK raised) and the Oscar Ronalds Perpetual Trophy (yellow trumpets). Glenbrook was very honoured to achieve 1st prize in all 5 of these Special Classes. We also won Champion Div 4 (with a seedling Richard Ezell nick-named PORKY PYG in 1999), Champion 1W-W (CHAOS x PANACHE), Champion Div 7 (WEARY DEARIE), Champion Div 10, Champion Miniature (SMARPLE) and Champion Div 13 (N. triandrus pallidulus).

Then, almost 2 weeks later, Anne and Mandy bolted off to Sheffield Show (at the opposite end of the State) and benched enough winners to gain for Glenbrook the Sheffield Show Aggregate points Prize also Champion Bloom awards for MITIMOTO (Div 10), JUNIOR MISS (Div 12) and Narcissus triandrus (Div 13).

In Tasmania our frantic Show Season is condensed into just 4 unreal, jam-packed weeks of action and by the end of September it is hard to say just which of the Show successes can actually be remembered as "Reality". But, then of course, there is that splendid anonymous quote which goes: "Reality is a delusion created by an alcohol deficiency".

SCOTTISH PRIZE GIVING

Just as thrilling for us as the personal Glenbrook Show successes are the superb achievements of others exhibiting Glenbrook-raised flowers. In 2000, at the Claremont Show Peter Ryan won Champion Div 5 with ANGEL'S WHISPER, at Wynyard Show Ian Norman won GRAND CHAMPION and Open Champion with SHADRACH. At Hobart Show new exhibitor Mr Hedley Becchey won his first Champion Award with ANGEL O' MUSIC and Ian Norman had Champion Poeticus with IKA JIKA. Ulverstone Show produced tremendous results with Des Tongs winning GRAND CHAMPION and Champion 2Y-R with GOGO DANCER, Broadfields had Champion Div 7 with ENDEAR and Ann Scarfe showed a ton of skill to win Champion Div 9, IKA JIKA, Champion Div 10, MITIMOTO and Champion Miniature ANGEL'S BREATH.

At Launceston Show Broadfields had Champion Div 5, TILLY TITUS and Champion Div 7, ENDEAR, Ann Scarfe Champion Div 9, IKA JIKA, John & June Gibson Champion Div 10, SMARPLE, and Sue and Bob McFarlane Champion Miniature with ANGEL O' MUSIC.

And at Sheffield Show Broadfields had Champion Div 5 with TILLY TITUS and David

Pyke Champion Div 9 with RINGER.

CONGRATULATIONS TO EVERYONE OF YOU ON YOUR BRILLIANT EFFORTS!

We suppose we OUGHT to offer some sort of bulb prize or reward for those promoting Glenbrook-raised flowers so well. But no, a wee bit of Scottish ancestry has just reminded us: "Virtue is its own reward!"

FULL GLASSES

Overseas our flowers evidently continue to do okay in a wide range of climates. Recent mails from the US include 2000 Show advices that Diane Mrak, in Pennsylvania, won Miniature Gold with ANGEL'S WHISPER, Nancy Wilson, of Northern California, Miniature Gold with SWAGGER and Olivia Welbourne, of Maryland won the prestigious Watrous (12 miniatures) at the World Convention Show in Oregon, using 5 Glenbrook originated bulbs in her team.
