
## The American Daffodil Society

# Order Information

Please note two basic changes this year from previous catalogues:

1. Please include **Item Number** on order blank. (Number preceding Price . . . i.e. Adoration — **04-105** \$2.00 each.) Each of the collections will have an individual **Item Number** just preceding price as well.
2. **"A touch of the Past"** — Several well known Old Favorites have been listed separately on page 25. At this point, the separate listing is inconclusive with regard to the catalogue body.

1. **Retail Bulbs:** Nearly all bulbs sent out are double nose except in the case of miniatures, most of which are rounds. Some tazettas and species hybrids produce primarily rounds as well. If ordering for the first time, please note that bulbs will vary in size as to their variety and genetic makeup. All bulbs are hand cleaned, graded and selected. We personally grow and care for all of our retail bulbs from planting and harvest to order filling and shipping on our Oregon farm. The smallness of our business permits the preceding.

2. **Payment:** Please send payment with order and make check or money order payable to Richard Havens.

3. **Postage and Handling:** Prices quoted include prepaid postage on orders \$20.00 and over. Orders less than \$20.00 to one address, please add \$3.00 for postage. If total Gift Collection is less than \$20.00, per location, please include \$3.00 postage.

4. **Extra Copies of 1988 Order:** We encourage the writing of an extra copy of your 1988 order to be retained for personal reference upon receipt of bulb shipment. If there should be a question concerning your order, please do not hesitate to contact us immediately.

5. **Substitution:** It is not our policy to freely substitute; however, on occasion, a variety is sold out. In this case, a similar substitute of equal or greater value may be made. Please advise on order blank if we may substitute. If you should have any special instructions, please place on order blank as well. It is most important to us that we respect your wishes. All of our bulb offerings are **subject to crop**. On orders sent after August 1, alternate choices should be listed.

6. **Acknowledgement:** Orders \$20.00 and over and received before August 1 will be automatically acknowledged — Orders under \$20.00 will be acknowledged by request.

7. **Order Date:** The bulk of the orders are arriving during the spring and early summer, so we encourage early orders to avoid disappointment. Bulbs offered for sale are subject to crop.

8. **Shipping Rotation:** Bulbs are shipped by Parcel Post and United Parcel Service. We endeavor to send orders in rotation as received with the complete shipping process starting the first week of September. **Orders arriving during July through September will have a good chance of being shipped during the month of October**, for spring and early summer orders deserve our first attention.

9. **Bulb Care:** It is our goal to send out good quality bulbs and if upon receipt, they prove otherwise, please notify us immediately. If ordering for the first time or if one is a beginner, please read complete culture sheet when order first arrives for general advisement. Due to the value of the bulbs, every effort to avert disappointment is important.

10. **Extra Bulbs:** Orders over \$10.00 received by August 1, will include extra bulbs worth at least 10% of the order value.

## ORDERS OUTSIDE THE UNITED STATES

We wish to request payment with International Money Orders in U.S. dollars for they are well accepted by our local bank.

It is imperative that we receive all foreign orders by **July 1** to permit correct timing for inspection and the necessary preparation to avert delays.

**Overseas orders:** We advocate sending bulbs by airmail, cost of which is prohibitive on lower priced bulbs, but surface transportation is so slow that we can give no assurance of bulbs arriving in good order. Cost of air transport to be paid by purchaser.

## FOR THE NEW CUSTOMER

1. **Flower Color** — Our descriptions are based on observations of the blooms when they reach maturity as they bloom here. The preceding has involved several years. In many cases, pinks may open a yellow or greenish color. The intensity of the pink color develops with maturity of the bloom. Reverse bicolors will open all yellow with the corona reversing to a white as the bloom matures. Many of the red cups develop their brightness with maturity as well. It is not unusual for a double to require more than one year to adapt to its new habitat and climatic conditions.

2. **Culture Sheet** — We would like to give additional encouragement for the reading of entire Daffodil Culture Sheet of which will be enclosed with bulb parcel when it first arrives for general advisement. It is felt that the preceding is very essential because of bulb value. Thank you very much.

# 1988 Daffodil Introductions

**EMPEROR'S WALTZ** (Mitsch) 1987 6Y-YOO. EM. 14" (B45/14 x cyclamineus) NN42/1. A very lovely cyclamineus parting a bit with traditional standards of trumpet proportions, for the crown is 3 mm. shorter than the perianth. The very broad golden yellow perianth is nicely reflexed and of good substance. The crown of gold is heavily flushed deep orange and is widely flanged and flared. It is especially important to mention that this was one of my mother's favorites. Few people other than family members realize the tremendous influence and judgement that she has had on classical introductions over the years with my father. This flower has received favorable comment by many of our visitors. 06-177 \$45.00 each net.

**MOUNTAIN POET** (Mitsch/Havens) 1988 9W-GYR. L. 20" (Quetzal x Smyrna) D94/3A. Another from the Quetzal x Smyrna series that has given many well formed poets, ranging from green eyes (i.e. Angel Eyes) to all red cups (i.e. Tart). This one resembles Angel Eyes with its crisp clean color and sparkling white broad perianth. The cup of yellow band and bright red rim is a bit flatter with the net result of being a very striking flower. Much admired when displayed at the ADS convention in Memphis in 1986. 09-423 \$12.00 each net.

**MUSIC** (Mitsch) 1988 2W-PPY. LM. 18" (Romance x Cool Flame) LL14/5. By far the most refined flower raised here, with a perianth displaying a definite pink cast. It has been relatively easy to obtain pink coloration in perianths of very informal flowers, but much more challenging to produce show flowers with this characteristic. Music has been consistent for several years in producing the distinctive pink cast in the perianth along with impeccable show form and heavy substance reminiscent of Refrain. The flat broad perianth resists nicks and tears; the salmon rose corona is rather straight, somewhat flared and fluted near the narrow amber margin. A very prolific breeder, both seed and pollen parent, passing its form as well as perianth color to its progeny. 02-424 \$40.00 each net.

**NIGHT MUSIC** (Mitsch) 1988 4W-P. LM. 19" (Pink Chiffon x D29/2 (Carita x Z20/(Green Island x Accent))) MM33/5. A great many doubles from pink breeding have been raised with varying degrees of quality. Traits such as heavy substance, broad petaloids, broad perianth, depth and quantity of pink are all criteria for selection. Night Music is exemplary in all of these traits. The depth of color has been consistent as has been the form and durability. It would appear Green Island has imparted the very rounded form heavy with substance to its progeny once again, and Accent undoubtedly was instrumental in producing the depth of color as well as substance. Some pollen has been collected and about one third of the flowers have stigmas here. Picture on front cover. 04-425 \$50.00 each net.

**PINK MIGRATION** (Mitsch/Havens) 1988 2W-WPW. M. 17" (Precedent x Pink Cloud) G70/6. Some years ago Lawali, a slightly pink semi-double was used quite extensively to breed pink doubles. Pink Migration is a much more refined flower with broader petaloids and much deeper pink coloration. It is a semi-double with a broad perianth, backing broad petaloids with less in the corona, nearly every flower containing a stigma and most containing pollen. For this reason it has been most useful in hybridizing for us, setting copious quantities of seed. Many of the progeny are full doubles with deep color. Late in the season, it possesses a strong stem and short neck, thus creating a fine decorative flower as well. Good supply allows a moderate introductory price. 02-426 \$10.00 each net.

**SHOWBIZ** (Throckmorton) 1988 3W-OW. LM. 35 cm. (Green Island x Russet) T66/18/7. Unlike any flower we grow, Show Biz's unique flaring ruffled corona of deep yellow orange, with a white picotee border, make it a delightful flower with carrying power in the garden. It's rounded broad well formed white perianth make it suitable for the show bench, a welcome addition to division 3. A good supply allows the moderate introductory price. 03-427 \$12.00 each.

**STARFALL** (Mitsch) 1988 2W-P. LM. 19" (A49/1(Q36/4 x Carita) x Eclat). KK22/5. Of very unique form, Starfall may be categorized as a classification being discussed, which has a frilly flared cup, but not a split corona. The wide variety of color hues throughout the cup make an unusual flower with decorative potential. A reddish zone near the base, apricot pink mid zone with a very slight lemon frill make a startling bit of color, contrasted to the white flat overlapping perianth. 02-428 \$20.00 each net.

**SWEDISH FJORD** (Mitsch/Havens) 1988 2YW-W. M. 18" (B36/13 (Playboy x Daydream) x Chiloquin.) KK42/1. A very well contrasted reverse bicolor being larger than Chiloquin and very close, but not measuring trumpet. The entire flower opens luminous glowing yellow with the corona and halo turning to white. The frilled crown is slightly expanded at the mouth. A well formed show flower also possessing tremendous garden appeal. 02-429 \$25.00 each net.

**SWEET TREAT** (Frey) 1988 7Y-Y. L. 9½" (Bantam x juncofolius) LEE 1/2 an appealing small yellow daffodil that is a quite late bloomer in our fields. It has a soft yellow perianth with darker yellow and fairly flat corona. Nicely formed, it is delightful in small arrangements; however here it is possibly a little too large to classify as a miniature. Name pending RHS approval. 07-430 \$15.00 each net.

**WHETSTONE** (Mitsch/Havens) 1988 1W-W. LM. 17" (A39/1 (Vigil x Empress of Ireland) x Panache). JJ57/5. A lovely white trumpet with heavy substance, named in honor of Whetstone Park in Columbus, Ohio, where one of the finest collections of daffodils is planted by the Central Ohio Daffodil Society. Broad but pointed smooth perianth segments combine with a narrow waisted straight trumpet to make a beautiful classically formed flower of show quality. 01-431 \$17.00 each net.

**YOUNG AMERICAN** (Havens) 1988 1YW-WWY. LM. 17" (Daydream x Arctic Gold). JEJ2/6. A tailored reverse bicolor trumpet with intense contrast. The spade shaped perianth of deep lemon is foil to a very slightly flared and frilled trumpet turning white as it develops. As both of its parents, it is an excellent seeder with viable pollen. Possesses potential both as a show flower and for hybridizing. 01-432 \$15.00 each net.

**ICE CHIMES** (Mitsch/Havens) 5Y-Y. LM. 30 cm. (Silver Bells x T. aurantiacus) F153/1. Beautifully formed tiny bell shaped flowers of ivory yellow, the perianth a shade lighter than the corona. A typical representative of Class 5 with two or three florets per stem. The appeal of Ice Chimes is many faceted and first for showing and hybridizing, but is also a lovely rockery subject. To be offered in 1989.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR SCENT



# 1987 Daffodil Introductions

**ANGEL SILK** (Eve Robertson) 1987 2W-W. LM. 24" (Easter Moon x Glenmanus) #262. A most beautiful silken smooth flower befitting its name. The broad white perianth is flat with heavy substance and the straight white crown lends the perfect form necessary for the show table. Very limited stock with only 2-3 to be released this season. 02-110 \$30.00 each net.

**BEST REGARDS** (Mitsch) 1987 1YW-Y. M. 17" (Arctic Gold x Daydream) MM14/1. Perfectly formed luminous color sum up the first impression of this flower. The smooth spade shaped flat perianth segments of luscious lemon are complemented with the traditional Daydream halo. A straight trumpet with slight flare of matching color completes the luring picture. A division one which we feel will do very well in shows. 01-127 \$25.00 each net.

**CEDAR HILLS** (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 3W-GYY. L. 24" (Impala x Green Hills) KK87/3A. One of our favorites, the large green eye zone, which extends nearly half the cup, seems to dominate one's attention when first observing. The absolute perfection of form and clean coloration are tributes to both its parents. Beautifully rounded broad white perianth and deep clear yellow short cup complete the picture. A sister of similar form with smaller green eye was shown and admired in Memphis in 1986. 03-138 \$35.00 each net. Picture on page 12.

**CORTEZ** (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 2Y-O. L. 18" (Gay Time x Chiloquin) LL61/5. First inclination is to question the validity of this pedigree. However on closer examination, we believe it to be correct. The smoothness of the flat lemon gold perianth segments resembles the texture and color of Chiloquin. The very late bloom for a red cup is reminiscent of both parents as well. A straight mid-orange cup with frilled edge of deeper color provides an unusual bit of color at season's end. Admired by several visitors to the Portland ADS convention in 1984. 02-156 \$9.00 each net.

**GLISSANDO** (Mitsch) 1987 2Y-Y. LM. 18" (Scio x Camelot) JJ26/8. A perfectly formed flower of clear bright yellow, reminiscent of Constancy, blooming a little later and slightly larger. The flat spade shaped perianth and tailored cup with ruffled border make a beautiful flower for the show bench. 02-193 \$20.00 each net.

**LEMON SILK** (Mitsch) 1987 6YW-W. E. (Nazareth x cyclamineus) G78/2. Another exquisite reverse bicolor Division 6, this one is a sibling to Swallow. The entire flower opens soft lemon, the long taylored slightly flared cup turns very white at maturity. Beautifully smooth nicely reflexed perianth, narrow enough to have the classical cyclamineus grace, maintains its color and develops a white halo. Very graceful from opening to maturity. 06-229 \$40.00 each net.

**MOLTEN LAVA** (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 3Y-YYR. L. 20" (Merlin open pollinated) MO13/1. Fiery red cup rim of such intensity suggesting its name, combines with the perianth preciseness derived from Merlin. A yellow scalloped cup with deep red rim and a rounded very smooth clear yellow perianth make a welcome entrance at the end of the season. 03-248 \$20.00 each net. Picture on page 12.

**OUZEL** (Mitsch) 1987 6W-W. EM. 15" (Dipper open pollinated) 2NO1/1. A welcome addition to its class and color, as most whites it opens with a white perianth and pale lemon crown which becomes very white at maturity. Uniform flowers are especially beautiful in spite of being a little large for cyclamineus. Perianth segments are broad and well reflexed and in proportion to the long slightly flared crown. Entire flower possesses heavy substance. 06-268 \$30.00 each net.

**PLUMELETER** ..... withdrawn.

**PRISM** (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 2Y-Y. LM. 23" (Aircastle x Cool Flame) JJ3/1. A wide arrangement of genetic possibilities is contained in this flower with the form of Aircastle and the color background of Cool Flame. A flower of most interesting form and color inuendos, the rounded light yellow perianth is rather similar to its seed parent, the deep yellow cup with a rosey tinge at the margin is less than half the perianth length. A fine show flower itself with even greater hybridizing potential with regard to unusual coloration variation and form. 02-302 \$10.00 each net.

**SPARROW** (Mitsch) 1987 6W-Y. E. 14" (Trousseau x cyclamineus) JJ83/2. Another classically formed cyclamineus with strongly reflexed well formed perianth, a bit narrow perhaps, but conveying the characteristic grace of its class. The long lemon crown is slightly flared and fluted, considerably lighter in color than Phalarope. A delightful addition to its class. 06-333 \$25.00 each net.

**SUNDAY CHIMES** (Mitsch/Havens) 1987 5W-W. L. 16" (Pigeon x T. albus) HH85/2. Probably the pinnacle of perfection thus far attained in our efforts with white triandrus, this is of the highest quality. Sunday Chimes is beautifully formed with broad perianth segments strongly reflexed and a goblet shaped cup with green eye, generally two florets per stem. Heavy waxy substance characterizes the entire flower. The object of more comment than any other flower in our display in Memphis in 1986. 05-348 \$45.00 each net. Pictured on page 5.

**WARBLER** (Mitsch) 1987 6Y-Y. EM. 17" (B45/12 x cyclamineus) NN41/2. The culmination of a great many crosses toward the "perfect" cyclamineus form with deep yellow color. The broad but strongly reflexed smooth perianth of deep yellow and long flared crown of slightly deeper color with pale orange flush at the frilled margin, is yet another of the classically formed cyclamineus being offered in this year's introductions. A distinct green cast at the juncture of perianth and crown makes for a most striking flower. 06-364 \$35.00 each net.

## ADDITIONAL OFFERINGS FOR 1988

Some have been offered previously as seedlings.

**CORAL CLOUD** (Knouse) 4W-P. M. (Pink Chiffon x Mabel Taylor). A sibling to Coral Strand, this contains considerably deeper pink petaloids intermixed with white in a good full double having slightly shorter stems than foliage, it makes an appealing decorative flower with intense pink coloration. **04-433 \$5.00 each net.**

**EARLY ARRIVAL** (Frey) 1988 6Y-Y. E. 9½" (possible Goldette Seedling) Seedling B. The parentage was lost on this seedling; however, it is thought to be a Goldette seedling. While not perfect in form it is about the earliest flower to bloom for us, often in mid-February. A small golden yellow with slightly reflexed petals it makes lovely small arrangements early in the season. Name pending RHS approval. **06-434 \$4.00 each net.**

**GREEK KEY** (Mitsch/Havens) 1W-Y. LM. 45 cm. (Spitzbergen x Prologue) JJ42/1. In common with many bicolors, the perianth opens light lemon yellow becoming very white at maturity. The long narrow deep lemon trumpet is bordered with a definite roll on the flange making a very distinctive flower. There is no question as to whether this one is a trumpet, the corona being 42 mm and the perianth segments 39 mm! Good supply allows moderate price. **01-435 \$10.00 each net.**

**PLANET** (Mitsch) 3Y-YYO. LM. 23" (Kingbird x Moonfire) LL53/3. A very large flower with tall stems, the perianth is a soft smooth yellow, the short cup being deeper yellow with a narrow orange band. Very nicely formed with broad overlapping perianth of smooth texture. My father and I agree the neck is a bit long; its smoothness and unique form compensate. Good supply allows moderate price. **03-436 \$10.00 each net.**

**STATUESQUE** (Mitsch) 2Y-Y. M. 23" (Playboy x Daydream) B36/18. Another sibling to Top Notch and Symphonette, this one has a very smooth flat and rounded perianth of pale lemon with a white halo. The crown of deeper color is flared at the margin. A lovely flower with luminous coloring. **02-437 \$6.00 each net.**

**WHITE MAGNOLIA** (Culpepper) 2W-W. A flower my father received from Charles Culpepper some years back. We were unable to find registration on it, but is being listed under the name he gave. Among the first whites to bloom at our place, it opens lemon yellow, but soon becomes very white. Spade shaped perianth segments and large crown give trumpet appearance. Of medium stem length, it has made a fine cut flower being so early for white. One of the first to bloom here which is most unusual for whites. A good healthy doer for us and ideal garden flower. **02-438 \$3.00 each.**

### SAMPLE COLLECTIONS

# Novelty Daffodils for 1988

## EXPLANATION OF DESCRIPTIONS

In the descriptions of the varieties as listed below, the name of the variety is given first in capital letters, followed by the name of the originator in parentheses. Then there is the date of registration or introduction. Next there is the classification symbol, flowering season, E. for early, M. for mid-season, L. for late, etc. Approximate height in inches or centimeters follows. **Just preceding the price is an item number to be used on the order form.** Following are two definitions of terms:

**Corona:** The cup, or trumpet-shaped or disc-like outgrowth, arising from the inner surface of the perianth at the base of the segments. **Perianth:** The six floral leaves, comprised of three sepals and three petals.

**ACCENT** (Mitsch) 1961 2W-P. M. 18" (Interim x Interlude) Q40/1. For several years this has been the most popular Daffodil in our list based on the number of orders for it. The deep salmon rose color has enough concentration of pigment to give this more garden value than most of the pinks, and added to this are good poise, nice form, and much substance. Quite flat, clean white perianth that sometimes reflexes slightly. A strong, vigorous grower and fine increaser. Unable to supply large quantities. 02-100 \$1.00 each net.

**ACE** (Mitsch) 1980 2W-PPW. M. 15" (Accent x Luscious) F5/1. Quite similar in size and form to Credo, but with a light pink crown, bordered white. A lovely color, with vigorous plant, good poise and substance. Attractive and different. 02-101 \$7.00 each

**ADORATION** (Mitsch) 1973 4W-W. L. 18" (Cushendall open pollinated) VO3/1. Part of the flowers are single, while the others have a little tuft of petaloids in the center. Very attractive in either case. The single blooms are about the size of those in Cushendall but with a larger eye, most of which is white. The object of much comment in our displays. Produces a very small bulb for us. 04-102 \$2.00 each.

**AFFABLE** (Mitsch) 1978 4Y-O. L. 20" (Gay Time x Daydream) H102/1. Like Elixir, this has fewer perianth segments than most doubles, and like them, the width and form of the petaloids makes for a good full flower. A distinctive color in this class, being of pale buff apricot, with the shorter ruffled petaloids of pale orange. Very rounded flowers of good size, with nice stem and neck. Very attractive. 04-103 \$5.00 each.

**AFTERTHOT** (Mitsch) 1981 2Y-YYR. LM. 13" (Y56/1 x Leprechaun) HH73/2. An attractive rather small flower with soft, clear lemon yellow perianth of good form; and a medium sized crown of lemon bordered with an orange red band about one sixteenth inch wide. Good grower. 02-104 \$2.00 each.

**AKEPA** (Mitsch) 1980 5W-P. L. 14" (Accent x N. triandrus albus) HH4/2. The first outstanding pink triandrus hybrid we have seen. A goal long sought appears to have been achieved if this flower performs as well elsewhere as it has done here. Usually two blooms of small to medium size, with well formed milk white perianths, and goblet shaped soft pink coronas are borne on a good, medium small stem. 05-105 \$70.00 each net.

**ALAMO** (Mitsch) 1974 2Y-R. EM. 20" (P50/1 (Narvik x California Gold) x Flaming Meteor) B45/5. Having a rich gold yellow, flat, very smooth perianth of good substance, and a somewhat frilled, well-balanced crown of rich orange red, this is a good show flower and is striking in the garden. Good stems. 02-106 \$9.00 each.

**ALLAFRILL** 2W-P. M. 18". Offered exclusively as an unusual decorative flower. Possessing an intense bright pink crown of heavy substance with well-defined ruffles extending from the margin, deep into the crown, with a milk white perianth. A very fine garden flower with strong stems. 02-107 \$5.00 each net.

**ANGEL** (Wilson) 1960 3W-GWW. L. Very beautiful small cup white with a green eye. 03-109 \$8.00 each net.

**ANGKOR** (Mitsch) 1981 4Y-Y. LM. 20" (Gay Time x Daydream) H102/3. Ivory lemon perianth with slightly deeper central petals and petaloids having a greenish cast throughout the flower. Widely overlapping perianth that is sometimes reflexed. Good stem and neck. Should be a good show flower. 04-111 \$5.00 each.

**APRIL SNOW** (Guy Wilson) 2W-W. M. 9" Charming large cup variety and milk white throughout. 02-392 \$4.00 each net.

**APRIL TEARS** (Alec Gray) 1939 5Y-Y. LM. 9". A delightful little flower with two or three exquisitely formed pendant lemon blossoms on a stem. 05-112 \$1.50 each net.

**ARCTIC CHAR** (Murray Evans) 1974 2W-P. One of the best pinks. In appearance it resembles Accent, but is deeper in color, larger, and a better quality flower. 02-113 \$14.00 each.

**ASHMORE** (Blanchard) 1974 2W-W. LM. Perfectly formed smooth all white flower. 02-114 \$6.00 each net.

**ASTEROID** (Havens) 1978 2Y-Y. M. 23" (Ormeau x Butterscotch) FEJ7/2. The noticeable characteristic of this smooth, well-formed, golden yellow flower is the slightly rolled, much flared trumpet-like corona. Lacks just a little of being a trumpet by measurement. 02-115 \$3.00 each.

**ASTRODOME** (Mitsch) 1983 2W-PPW. LM. 17" (F34/3 (Precedent x Debutante) x Space Ship) LL39/3. A large flower with ivory white perianth of quite good form, with a much flared crown of soft apricot pink, having a narrow cream margin. Not a show flower but very showy! 02-116 \$14.00 each.

**AT DAWNING** (Mitsch) EM 1W-P. 16" (Radiation x Rima) C38/1. A medium sized flower with a nice, flat white perianth of very good substance. The trumpet is quite straight and neatly tailored, pale pink fading to white near the base. Considerably smaller and more formal than Rima. 01-117 \$3.00 each net.

**AUDUBON** (Mitsch) 1965 3W-WWP. M. 22" ((Interim x Mabel Taylor) x Caro Nome) R110/1A. A startling bit of color, the rosy pink to coral rimmed cup with good sized, flat, very white perianth make it an excellent flower for cutting or exhibiting. Tall strong stems. One of our better ones. 03-393 \$2.00 each net.

**AUTUMN GOLD** (Mitsch) 1985 2Y-Y. L. 49 cm. (Quick Step x Daydream) D80/13. A perfectly formed small flower, this is a profuse bloomer with obvious jonquil ancestry, but generally is borne one flower per stem. A slightly flared and ruffled cup is complement to a smooth flat perianth. 02-119 \$2.00 each.

**AVOCET** (Mitsch) 1983 7W-YYW. L. 20" (R33/32 (Green Island x Chinese White) x N. jonquilla) KK102/3. A tall stemmed, vigorous growing jonquil hybrid with nearly white flowers, usually borne three on a stem. Rounded white perianths of good substance with saucer shaped crowns. 07-120 \$15.00 each.

**BARBET** (Mitsch) 1977 2W-P. LM. 13" (A5/8 (Caro Nome x Accent) x A34/10 (Precedent x Carita) G36/1. Hand-capped with the fault of hanging its head when first open, this would not have been named excepting for its beautiful color. The crown is of a rich rose pink, deeper in color than our other introductions except for those leaning more to true red such as Rubythroat. It holds its color well. Quite a good-sized bowl-shaped crown, with a flat white perianth. 02-123 \$4.00 each.

**BEAUTIFUL DREAM** (Mitsch) 1985 3W-W. L. 50 cm. (Silken Sails x Audubon) JJ12/20A. A giant magnificent flower with a rounded and very broad perianth endowed with a great amount of substance. The small cream cup (fading to white at maturity) is ruffled and much flatter than that of Sacramento, but not flat to the perianth. Possessing robust foliage and excellent plant vigor as well as tall height, this one is a worthy contender for showing and may have potential for breeding small cup pinks. **BEAUTY TIP** (Mitsch) 1980 2W-W. LM. 20" (Easter Moon x 2/417) W65/2/3. A rather pointed but well overlapping, very smooth white perianth. The long, smooth, well balanced crown is slightly flared near the margin. Color is similar to the perianth when mature, but in the early stages it has a very soft clear pink overcast. A good grower and most attractive flower for showing or for arrangements. 02-125 \$4.00 each net.

**BELL SONG** (Mitsch) 1971 7W-P. LM. 15" (Wild Rose x Interim) x jonquilla Z46/3. Nicely formed flat perianths that open pale buffy lemon with a suggestion of pink near the base changing to ivory as the flower develops. The very nicely balanced crowns are quite pink on opening and retain this color reasonably well. Usually two to three blooms on a stem. A good, free-flowering plant, and an attractive addition to this group. 07-126 \$3.50 each net.

**BITTERN** (Mitsch) 1982 12Y-O. M. 12" (Matador x cyclamineus) JJ76/5. The appearance of this flower is enough unlike either tazettas or conventional cyclamineus hybrids to warrant at least a tentative listing in class 12. An attractive and unique flower with two or three blooms on a stem. The frilled crowns are rather long, and are of a bright orange red if weather is cool and damp when they flower. In dry weather the color may be paler. Nice clear yellow perianths of good form. A prolific bloomer. 12-129 \$35.00 each net.

**BOBWHITE** (Mitsch) 1980 7Y-Y. LM. 18" (Daydream x jonquilla) F72/8. Having a clear yellow perianth, and slightly deeper yellow corona, this is one of the most floriferous jonquil hybrids, producing many stems, with some bearing four or five blooms. Quite like Quail in general appearance, this is lighter, with a crown of different form, and more blooms to a stem. Prolific in growth and increase. 07-130 \$5.00 each net.

**BUFFAWN** (Morrill) 1977 7Y-Y. M. 20" (unknown x jonquilla). A tall flower on a strong stem with two or three florets. Light buff colored petals and a slightly darker cup. **BUTTERFLOWER** 1976 (Mitsch) 2Y-Y. EM. 21" (Alchemy x Butterscotch) A2/1. A deep, but soft butter yellow flower of very smooth texture, and good form. Quite a large bloom with broad, spade-shaped perianth segments, and a rather narrow crown, giving it the appearance of a trumpet. Tall, strong stems and a vigorous grower. 02-133 \$2.00 each.

**CARIB** (Mitsch) 1980 6W-P. M. 13" (Y36/2 ((Mabel Taylor x Interim) x Rima) x N. cyclamineus) KK105/3. A well formed, strongly reflexed ivory white perianth, and a long, nicely expanded trumpet crown of peach pink, being more highly colored on the inside of the corona. Compared with Cotinga, this has a broader, more formal perianth of much substance, and is quite different in color. 06-134 \$40.00 each net.

**CATBIRD** (Mitsch) 1981 6Y-Y. EM. 16" (Bushtit, open pollinated) D01/2. An interesting third generation seedling from cyclamineus, still carrying characteristics of the species. Uniform, slightly waved and reflexed perianths, and long trumpet crowns with the stigma usually projecting from the mouth of the corona, giving a unique but not freakish appearance. Soft yellow throughout. 06-136 \$7.00 each net.

**CAZIQUE** (Mitsch) 1982 6W-W. E. 12" (Y36/2 x cyclamineus) KK105/1. One of the most beautifully formed cyclamineus hybrids of any that we have raised. A moderately reflexed, pure white smooth perianth and a trumpet crown of excellent balance, being pale lemon on opening but soon fading to white. Prolific and with smooth texture and good substance. A sister of Carib. 06-137 \$19.00 each.

**CEDAR HILLS** See page 6 ..... \$35.00 each net.

**CENTERPIECE** (Mitsch) 4W-R. LM. 20" (Falaise x Roimond) A13/1. Quite broad white perianth with fully double center composed of white petals interspersed with bright orange red segments. A nicely-formed flower with good stems. 04-139 \$4.00 each net.

**CENTRE VILLE** (Throckmorton) 1976 3Y-R. LM. (Russet x Altruist) T67/14/. Fawn colored perianth with crystalline highlights of orange. Deep red, very small cup that may burn somewhat in the field. Featured as a colored cover for Mayo Alumnus magazine. 03-140 \$6.00 each net.

**CHAFFINCH** (Mitsch) 1981 6Y-Y. EM. 17" (Vulcan x cyclamineus) H37/4. A consistent performer, bearing quantities of very smooth, strongly reflexed, somewhat overlapping perianths, of rich deep yellow; and long somewhat flared trumpet crowns with a slight suggestion of orange. Prolific bloomer. Has capabilities of winning at shows. 06-394 \$10.00 each.

**CHAMPAGNE MAGNUM** (Throckmorton) 1975 50 cm. 2W-GYY. LM. (Easter Moon x Irish Coffee). At first glance, one might think the flower was a taller Green Island with a shorter, broader cup, but the wide reflexing perianth and the more honey-colored corona soon make the differentiation. The corona has a greenish eye, the rest of it being tinted rather greenish, sharp yellow. It is a long lasting flower, survives adverse weather and is identifiable at a considerable distance. 02-141 \$4.00 each.

**CHERISH** (Mitsch) 1983 2Y-WWY. LM. 19" (Aircastle x Rich. 3Y-W) JJ24/6. A rounded flower with broad flat perianth of sulphur yellow, and crown of similar color fading to white except for the deeper yellow rim. Just misses being a small cup. 02-142 \$7.00 each.

**CHERRY BOUNCE** (Throckmorton) 1975 3W-R. (Gossamer x Aircastle) T66/12/. Very smooth white perianth which changes slightly as it ages; the small corona of cherry red, about the shade of the juice of a sour cherry pie. 03-143 \$8.00 each.

**CHERRY SPOT** (Mitsch) 1978 3W-O. LM. 20" (Artillery x Avenger) F138/4. Quite white, rather pointed perianth with a most vivid orange red crown. Tall strong stems, and a good grower. Like many of its type, it tends to vary in quality from year to year. At its best it is a very striking flower. 03-144 \$4.00 each net.

**CHINA LAKE** (Havens) 1979 2W-YWW. LM. 19" (Empress of Ireland x Accent) E64-1/2. A sister to Graduation, this flower has better substance and very flat perianth. Milk white with the crown cream colored and having a pinkish cast, shading to gold at the throat. An interesting color combination, and a flower with good form and texture. 02-146 \$4.00 each.

**CHIPPER** (Fowlds) 1972 5Y-Y. LM. 12" (Polindra x Tunis) x N. triandrus albus) F180/1. A small flower with very strongly reflexed narrow perianth, reminiscent of that of the species parent. Ivory lemon with a greenish cast, and pale lemon crown. Usually three blooms on a stem. Considerably smaller than most triandrus hybrids involving large garden flowers as the other parents. Limited stock. 05-395 \$4.00 each net.

**CHUKAR** (Mitsch) 1982 4W-WO. L. 20" (Gay Time x Silken Sails) HH104/2. Beautifully formed, silken smooth broad white perianth, and center petaloids of white and orange. A large flower with heavy substance and good stems, which has done well in shows. 04-148 \$12.00 each.

**CITRON** (Mitsch) 1983 3Y-WWY. LM. 18" (Aircastle x Rich. 3Y-W) JJ24/3. Very pale yellow rounded flat perianth, with creamy yellow crown, fading to white excepting for the rim. A nice addition to the rather small class of small cupped reverse bicolors. 03-149 \$10.00 each.

**CLASSIC** (Mitsch) 2W-Y. EM. 18" (R6/1 x Empress of Ireland) B56/1. Large flat white perianth and narrow, long lemon yellow crown which appears to be full trumpet in dimensions. A very smooth, attractive flower. 02-150 \$4.00 each.

**CONFECTION** (Mitsch) 1974 2W-P. M. 18" (Precedent x Carita) A34/35. Rather a large flower with well-rounded, much overlapping perianth of white, and a large, nearly flat crown of apricot salmon, shading to lighter near the throat. Vigorous grower. 02-152 \$3.00 each net.

**COOL FLAME** (Mitsch) 1969 2W-P. LM. 18" (Precedent x Accent) B37/6. Only on rare occasions do real color breaks occur. Another forward step was made with the production of Cool Flame, one of the numerous progeny of Accent. Informal, waved, somewhat reflexed ivory white perianth, and an attractive flared trumpet. 06-157 \$30.00 each net.

**CREDO** (Mitsch) 1978 2W-P. M. 15" (Accent x Rima) F6/1. Somewhat smaller than Accent, this is a smoother better-formed flower, with deeper rose pink crown. Excellent substance and form should make this a good show flower. 02-158 \$6.00 each.

**CRYSTAL PINK** (Mitsch) 1986 2W-P. LM. 13" (Accent x Debutante) F3/7. One of the whitest perianths we have seen on a pink cupped daffodil. The broad, pointed perianth segments resist tears often caused by a ruffled cup. The overall affect of the glistening white perianth and soft clear pink cup, ruffled at the border is dazzling. In spite of being handicapped with a shorter stem than we would like, it makes a lovely showing in the field as well as on the display table. 02-159 \$7.00 each.

**CULMINATION** (Mitsch) 1982 2W-P. M. 20" (Romance x Cool Flame) LL14/1. Quite a large flower with broad, very flat, well overlapping white perianth of fine substance and smooth finish. The good sized crown is soft salmon rose, not as red as Cool Flame but more the color of Romance. A sister to Music, this one also contains evidence of pink coloration in the perianth in our climate most seasons and may be valuable for breeding all pinks. It seems to be more free of flaws in the petals than either of its parents and has been a consistent performer. Tall strong stems and good carriage. 02-160 \$20.00 each net.

**DAINTY MISS** (Mitsch) 1967 7W-GWW. M. 15" (Rubra x Coverack Perfection) x N. waitieri) V96/1. A very pretty little white flower, with flat perianth and saucer-shaped crown. 07-161 \$2.00 each net.

**DAWN BLUSH** (Havens) 1976 2W-P. M. 19" (Precedent x Carita) FEJ8/5. A tall plant with large blooms, having a flat white perianth, and bowl-shaped, crimped, and pleated crown of rich, nearly pure pink coloring, the shade being rather like that of Flamingo. 02-162 \$6.00 each.

**DAWNCREST** (Mitsch) 1978 2W-PPW. E. 16" (Carita x Accent) C7/22. One of the very first pinks to open. A flower of good size, extra heavy substance, with broad, flat white perianth, and a quite large crown of deep salmon pink, shading to cream at the margin. Very broad, upright foliage; strong stems. Very popular with visitors. 02-163 \$7.00 each net.

**DAZZLER** (Mitsch) 1984 2Y-OR. M. 20" (Matlock x Falstaff) Z162/1. In our fields it produces an intense gold perianth and a fiery orange red almost flat fluted crown combine to make this a very distinctive garden flower. It has received much comment in our display locally. 02-164 \$15.00 each.

**DECOY** (Mitsch) 1981 2W-R. LM. 17" (Y43/1 x Cool Flame) JJ17/1. Although this has been registered as having a red crown, it will in all probability be reclassified as a pink. Very much like its pollen parent in color except that it opens with a rose red crown, whereas Cool Flame opens yellow and changes to near red as it develops. A well formed white perianth which may be slightly more pointed than its parent but less prone to have notched petals. Strong grower. 02-165 \$25.00 each.

**DESERT BELLS** (Mitsch) 1984 7W-Y. L. 12" (Quick Step x juncifolius) II134/1. Small flowers, two or three on a stem, with flat perianths and attractive goblet shaped crowns. 





**DRONGO** (Mitsch) 1986 4W-WY. L. 20" (Gay Time x Stainless) LL66/20. A number of seed were collected from this cross in hopes of a "Stainless double". This near white is the most rapid increaser of the group and possesses very nicely arranged petals, double perianth with additional segments arranged in whorls, the inner petaloids being white and yellow upon opening and fading to cream. Tall strong stem and heavy substance enhances it as a garden as well as show flower. We wish the neck were a bit shorter, but the preceding is compensated by the well poised flower. 04-170 \$20.00 each net.

**ECHELON** (Mitsch) 1981 2Y-YYO. M. 18" (R62/1 (Playboy x Ardour) x P4/1 (Aranjuez x Tamino)) JJ63/1. A large flower with broad, flat, overlapping perianth, sometimes slightly reflexed. Rich golden yellow. The bowl shaped crown is of slightly deeper tone with a narrow frilled orange rim. Strong grower with good stems. 02-171 \$8.00 each net.

**ECLAT** (Mitsch) 1971 2W-YPP. LM. 15" (Caro Nome x Accent) A5/5. The flat, overlapping, rounded, white perianth is well endowed with substance. **EMINENT** (Mitsch) 1963 3W-GYY. LM. 22" (Green Island x Bithynia) P32/1. A large, tall, smooth flower. The beautiful, broad, smooth, pure white perianth reflexes slightly. The rather small saucer shaped crown is pale lemon, shading to deeper lemon in the deeply frilled margin, with greenish tones in the throat. **EMPHASIS** (Mitsch) 1982 2W-P. LM. 17" (Precedent x Accent) D17/30. This has been winning awards at shows in California, and at the request of fanciers, it has been released for others who may wish to exhibit it or use it for hybridizing. A well formed white perianth and bowl shaped crown of brilliant orange pink, or tomato red as sometimes described. Strong grower and good stems. 02-178 \$7.00 each net.

**ERLIROSE** (Mitsch) 1973 2W-P. EM. 17" (Precedent x Accent) B37/9. A white, reflexed perianth of exceptional substance, and a large bowl-shaped crown make this a very striking flower early in the season when few other pinks are in bloom. Strong, stiff stems. **FIRE RIM** (Mitsch/Havens) 1984 2W-GYR. EM. 19" (Tigard x Snowgem) 2H95/3. A descendent from Snowgem that is similar, but earlier and somewhat larger flower. **FIRST FORMAL** (Throckmorton) 1974 3W-YWP. LM. (Aircastle x Gossamer) T66/21/1. When it first opens, this beautifully correct flower would remind one of Aircastle with a narrow pink rim. The flat and expanding corona possesses a greenish eye with shadings of opalescent colors, out towards the rim, which later becomes a cinnamon gold as the flower matures. The perianth is white and becomes whiter with age as well. This is a flower to delight as it goes through its color changes which are subtle and yet notable. **FRUIT CUP** (Morrill) 1979 7W-Y. L. 12" (Green Island x N. juncifolius) 61-1-1. The trumpet shaped crown opens with a similar shade but soon fades to almost pure white. One of the strongest contrasted flowers making a startling display in the garden. **GOLD CHAIN** (Mitsch) 1986 7Y-Y. LM. 20" (Top Notch x N. jonquilla) KK99/5. One of those groupings of flowers noticeable at a distance for its prolific bloom and depth of color. Well formed individual deep lemon gold flowers are borne double on tall stems, the cup being a slightly deeper shade than the perianth. The cup, nearly  $\frac{3}{4}$  the length of the perianth is straight with a flared frill at the margin. Lovely jonquil fragrance and heavy substance. 07-195 \$8.00 each net.

**GOLD COIN** (Havens) 1980 2Y-Y. LM. 15" (Ormeau x Butterscotch) FEJ7/9. For us it is a marginal trumpet and we are advised in some habitats it measures trumpet. Its bloom appears later than most yellows. **GOLDEN POND** (Throckmorton) 1982 3Y-YYO. ((Oasis x Green Island) x (Aircastle x Irish Coffee)) T70/2/10. This flower is capable of being the best in any show. One of the truly most beautiful of the small cupped yellows, Golden Pond is a large flower of impeccable form, having very broad overlapping yellow perianth and a small saucer shaped crown of golden glowing yellow with a slightly darker rim which borders on orange. **GRADUATION** (Havens) 1976 2W-WWP. M. 13" (Empress of Ireland x Accent) E64-1/1. Perianth opens pale lemon and deepens in color as it ages, reflexing somewhat in maturing. The crown opens lemon, fading out to nearly white, with a little gold rim. One of the best reserves we have raised. 02-213 \$17.00 each.

**INCA** (Mitsch) 1985 6Y-WWY. E. 30 cm. (Barlow open pollinated) JO1/1. The fruition of Grant Mitsch's work with reverse bicolor cyclamineus hybrids has been in Swallow and Wheatear and now Inca, with a form very distinct from the previous two. Of beautiful glistening color, the slightly reflexed greenish lemon perianth segments are quite broad and complement the long straight cup which fades to nearly white with a distinct gold band. **INCA GOLD** (Kanouse) 1965 1Y-Y. EM. 22" (Parentage unknown). Unique in its class, this is one of the largest yellows we grow, and perhaps the deepest yellow. The entire flower opens lemon and the cup becomes white with a narrow lemon rim and a white halo on the perianth at maturity. **LEMON TARTS** (Mitsch) 1985 7YW-W. L. 48 cm. (Quick Step x Daydream) D80/11. A flaring and fluted bowl shaped crown is of intense reddish orange, appearing as deep red in comparison with other pinks. **MEADOW LAKE** (Havens) 1982 2Y-Y. E. 20" (Nazareth x Butterscotch) FEJ6/6. One of the first standard size yellows to bloom in our fields. It is similar in form to Asteroid, with its rolled trumpet-shaped corona and flat broad perianth, but of considerably lighter color, clear medium yellow. **MONITOR** (Mitsch) 2W-WWP. M. 48 cm. (Precedent x Audubon) G10/1. Immediate attention is drawn to this flower by the brilliant red thread-like rim on the cup, accentuated by a perianth of glistening white. **NILE** (Mitsch/Havens) 1W-W. M. 46 cm. ((Vigil x Empress of Ireland) x Panache) JJ57/10. Very large white flower with a greenish cast at the throat, the trumpet is of classical style with narrow base and a slightly rolled flange. The broad spade shaped perianth segments of equal length to the trumpet make a nicely balanced flower. The perianth may tend to slightly campanulate, but can easily be groomed. Hardy, prolific and floriferous, it makes a welcome addition to the white trumpets. 01-259 \$14.00 each.

**OCCASIONALLY** (Mitsch) 1986 2W-Y. M. 18" (Wahkeena x (Silver Dale x Kancenjunga) x Preamble) H122/4. Another to be added to the roster of borderlines — Once In A While and Doubtful. It combines the attributes of an intense red pink rim, white mid section and green eye in the flared crown with clean white neatly formed round perianth segments. The trumpet is quite narrow giving it a classical show form. This appears to be one of the finest yellow trumpets raised here and should prove a good show flower. Quite an unusual flower with good sized rounded perianths of ivory buff, and nearly flat crowns of buff yellow with pinkish rims. Two or three good sized flowers on each stem. **PURE JOY** (Mitsch) 1976 2W-Y. LM. 22" (Easter Moon x Aircastle) D34/1. The svelte poise and classic charm, along with the smooth silken texture of this flower has captivated many visitors. The tall, strong stems hold the graceful blooms well aloft. Very rounded clean white perianths and bowl-shaped lemon crowns with a deeper frill characterize this show flower. **02-305** \$7.00 each net.

**QUEEN SIZE** (Mitsch) 1978 3W-Y. LM. 22" (Pretender x Aircastle) D47/2. A very large, well-rounded overlapping flat, white perianth. Saucer-shaped, ruffled and frilled, small lemon crown. Though not possessed with a broad perianth nor with formal build, this has been one of our favorite cyclamineus hybrids due to its very smooth texture, the cool clear lemon yellow coloring, and its keeping qualities, both in the field and when picked. **REDSTONE** (Mitsch) 1983 2YW-P. M. 13" (F25/ (Leonaine x Daydream) x Milestone) KK45/2. The nearest to red we have approached in breeding yellow-pink Daffodils. It is rather smaller than others of this class raised here. Flat smooth well overlapping lemon yellow perianth, and a well balanced reddish pink crown. **RINGING BELLS** (Mitsch/Havens) 1984 5W-W. L. 16" (Quick Step x triandrus albus) C52/3. A vibrant flowing yellow in both perianth and trumpet, and a green area where these parts join. Broad but pointed perianth segments reflexing about 30°. **RUBYTHROAT** (Mitsch) 1973 2W-P. M. 14" (Precedent x Accent) C35/5. This is a larger, more rounded flower than Cool Flame, and it has much more color on first opening. 



**SCHOLAR** (Havens) 1977 2Y-W. LM. 18" (Bethany x Butter-scotch) FEJ4/3. This definitely appears to be a trumpet and pressing the perianth forward against the corona would confirm this, but measurement with a rule contradicts the other evidence. Perhaps grown in other gardens will indicate a new classification. A very large flower with broad, flat overlapping perianth and corona with nicely rolled flange. 02-321 \$9.00 each net.

**SEAFOAM** (Mitsch) 1978 2W-W. LM. 21" (Easter Moon x Carnmoon) F139/2. Rather like its seed parent but with shorter, more fluted crown, and a whiter perianth. Fine stems, uniform growth, and quite consistent performance. Should be a show flower and be of value to hybridizers. 02-322 \$5.00 each.

**SENTINEL** (Mitsch) 1974 2W-P. M. 18" (Precedent x Carita) A34/3. Among the larger pinks and certainly not for the show bench but for those wanting something splashy and spectacular one need look no further. Has been dubbed the "pink Pinwheel". Tall stems with large rounded flat perianths, and a huge, nearly flat crown of apricot salmon to pink. 02-323 \$6.00 each net.

## PROGENY COLLECTION — New Hybridizer and Exhibitor

It was developed from a cross of (Mabel Taylor x Green Island). Pollen parent, Eclat (1971) was developed from a cross (Caro Nome x Accent). Both of the preceding are Mitsch cultivars. Eclat as a selected seedling had demonstrated the ability to carry coloration to a high percentage of its offspring. The overall attempt of the G13 cross was to produce offspring with the good form of Precedent and bright coloration of Eclat.

Mitsch hybridization program with the reverse bicolors had its origin in the mid 1940's with encouragement from the late Guy Wilson. Perhaps Mitsch's best known reverse bicolor is Daydream, a sister to Nazareth and also extensively used in hybridizing programs.

Pollen parent, Butterscotch, a deep gold color and heavy substance of good show form presented an ideal flower to combine with the traits of reverse bicolors.

## TRIANDRUS HYBRID SEEDLING COLLECTION

### THE NEW REVISED SYSTEM OF CLASSIFICATION OF THE ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY, 1977

1. The classification of a daffodil cultivar shall be based on the description and measurements submitted by the person registering the variety, or shall be the classification submitted by such person.

2. Colours applicable to the description of daffodil cultivars are abbreviated as follows: — W white or whitish; G green; Y yellow; P pink; O orange; R red.

3. For the purpose of description, the daffodil flower shall be divided into perianth and corona.

4. The perianth shall be described by the letter or letters of the colour code most appropriate.

5. The corona shall be divided into three zones: an eye-zone, a mid-zone, and the edge or rim. Suitable coded colour descriptions shall describe these three zones, beginning with the eye-zone and extending to the rim.

6. The letter or letters of the colour code most accurately describing the perianth shall follow the division designation.

7. The letters of the colour code most accurately describing the zones of the corona shall then follow, from the eye-zone to the rim separated from the perianth letters by a hyphen. In Division 4, the letters of the colour code most accurately describing the admixture of petals and petaloids replacing the corona shall follow in proper order, using 3, 2, or 1 colour codes as appropriate.

8. If the corona is substantially of a single colour, a single letter of the colour code shall describe it. Using these basic requirements, daffodils may be classified as follows:

**Division 1: TRUMPET DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN** Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; trumpet or corona as long or longer than the perianth segments.

**Division 2: LONG-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN** Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.

**Division 3: SHORT-CUPPED DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN** Distinguishing characters: One flower to a stem; cup or corona not more than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

**Division 4: DOUBLE DAFFODILS OF GARDEN ORIGIN**
