



HERMITAGE GARDENS are located at Aspen, Md., 7 miles north of the Md.—D. C. line on the Brookville (Seventh Street) Pike, route 97 out of Washington; and from Baltimore through Ellicott City to Olney, then south on route 97 about 5½ miles.



An exhibit of the popular varieties is maintained during the flowering season, which begins in late March and continues to mid-May. Visitors are cordially invited to see it, as well as the gardens in which are growing more than 400 of the better varieties and thousands of seedlings. Among the seedlings that bloom each year are many of the very highest quality. They must be seen to be appreciated; it is not possible to describe them in the limits of this catalog. The best are offered to appreciative daffodil lovers at very moderate prices.

Figures in parentheses following name indicate the relative season of bloom, 1 being the earliest, and 6 latest. F. F. C., indicates First Class Certificate, the highest award given by the Royal Horticultural Society (and by others); A. M., Award of Merit.

Orders accepted subject to crop and previous sale. If any variety is sold out I will substitute a variety of similar character and value unless the purchaser instructs otherwise.

NEW AND RECENT ORIGINATIONS

BELLE AIRE. Bicolor Incomparabilis. (4) An attractive flower of large size. Broad, flat, well overlapping almond-shaped petals standing at right angles to the flaring yellow crown with a straight edge slightly serrated. Each \$2.50.

CHEYENNE. A white Jonquil hybrid 2 inches in diameter bearing two or three flowers on a 12-inch stem. Broad pointed well overlapping petals; beautifully flared ivory cup three-fourths inch in diameter with crinkled edge. Each \$3.00.

DAVID GRIFFITHS. Yellow Trumpet. (2) A fine big flower of wonderful substance with broadly overlapping petals at right angles to the trumpet $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter, and a shapely trumpet 2 inches across and $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep; rich deep yellow, borne on a 19-inch strong, stiff stem. Plant very vigorous and productive, with broad foliage. First in yellow trumpet and seeding classes and best flower in show, Takoma Horticultural Club, April 10-11, 1935. Each \$8.00.

HIAWATHA. Poetaz. (5) A charming small flower from Cassandra x Paper White bearing three or four flowers on a 10-inch stem. Round, white perianth; small spreading pearl-white cup. Fragrant, prolific. Has proved perfectly hardy through two below-zero winters. Each \$4.00.

KATONAH. (3-4) It is not "just another King Alfred seedling" although it is a seedling of this grand old variety from which it inherits wonderful rich yellow color of a uniform shade throughout. A large upstanding flower of excellent form, quality, vigor, and productiveness that attracts attention because the flowers "look up at you." The broad, overlapping perianth segments stand at right angles to a shapely flaring trumpet with a beautifully serrated rim, 4 inches in diameter; trumpet $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches long by $1\frac{5}{8}$ inches in diameter; 17 inches in height. NANJEMOY. Bicolor Trumpet. (3) A large flower from Madam de Graaff x Weardale Perfection well poised on a tall, strong stem. Long, flaring, dark-yellow, bell-shaped trumpet having a nicely serrated brim. Perianth segments one-third overlapping and slightly curved or twisted. Each \$4.00.

NAKOTA. From Phyllida x Gaza. (5) This is a decided acquisition because it comes into bloom after all the other giant Leedsiiis. It has a large crown and is tall and vigorous. Broad, flat, well overlapping shovel-pointed perianth segments; flaring, cream-colored crown with a finely frilled edge. A really outstanding flower in size, form, and substance. Each \$4.00.

NONOTUCK. (5) A very late Poeticus-Barrii resembling a Poeticus in growth. Broad well overlapping white petals form a very round medium-sized flower. The spreading eye is finely fluted, orange-yellow narrowly edged orange-red. Each \$5.00.

OCONEE. Triandrous hybrid. (5) A veritable gem because of the decided contrast in color, unusual form and late-flowering period. Two to three flowers on a 12-inch stem. Flaring light-yellow crown; white perianth pointing slightly backward. Vigorous and a good increaser. Each \$3.00.

PENTUCKET. Poet. (4-5) From James Hogg x Dactyl. A medium-sized flower of the highest quality. Flat, very overlapping white perianth making an almost circular flower. Rich yellow eye with a crimson edge. Medium height and a good increaser. Each \$2.50.

ROSY MORN. Bicolor Barrii. (4) A striking seedling from King Edward x Bernardino. Large flower, 3½ inches in diameter, with very broad overlapping heart-shaped perianth segments that slightly reflex before the flower fades; brilliant bowl-shaped yellow cup with red edge. A long-standing, well-poised flower of medium height. Each \$2.50.

SUWANEE. (2) An attractive Incomparabilis of appealing interest from Expectation x Fortune. Bright-yellow broad flat overlapping petals that make a flower 3½ inches in diameter. Medium-sized flaring deep-yellow crown shading to rich orange-red. Each \$5.00.

WABAN. (3-4) A very vigorous and prolific bicolor Incomparabilis from Bernardino x Tenedos. Broad overlapping pointed petals 3½ inches in diameter, that recurve slightly and give the flowers a delightful informal effect. Lemon yellow bell-shaped crown 1¾ inches in diameter, with delicately crinkled edge. Of good substance and long lasting. Each \$3.00.

YELLOW TRUMPETS

The Trumpet class comprises those big, bold daffodils with trumpets that are as long as or longer than the perianth segments. They are the kings and queens of the Narcissus family; the most popular for cut flowers and for garden decorations because of their size and stunning appearance. Early to midseason.

DIVISION 1a. Yellow or lemon-colored trumpets and perianth of the same shade or lighter (but not white).

Aerolite. (2) The large flower is beautifully proportioned and gives an impression of gracefulness despite its size. The petals are deep primrose, broad and flat, and the shapely trumpet of a medium yellow. A long-lasting splendid garden or cut flower. Doz. \$1.25.

Alasnam. (2) Wide, short, densely frilled trumpet of pure deep yellow, a shade deeper than the perianth; finely placed with good neck; flower "looks you in the eye." Excellent for landscape groups and forcing. Doz. \$1.25.

Bulwark. (3) A. M., Haarlem. Very large and imposing rich yellow flower of great substance. Much overlapping perianth of great size and breadth, standing well at right angles to the bold, large trumpet. Each 50c.

Dawson City. (3) A superb large flower of faultless form and one of the most refined of the long, golden Trumpet class. The color is purest golden yellow. The flower has a broad flat overlapping perianth of smooth substance and is extremely handsome in a group. It leads all varieties for garden decoration in the estimation of English growers. 18 inches high. Dozen \$2.00.

Diotima. (5) One of the best of the new super-giant yellow trumpets; despite its huge size (perianth being 5 to 6 inches across) the whole flower is beautifully proportioned and is carried gracefully on strong 2-foot stems. The broad overlapping petals form a star-shaped perianth of medium deep primrose; trumpet somewhat more deeply colored. Each 75c.

Emperor. (3) Perianth deep primrose; trumpet rich full yellow. Flowers borne on long, strong stems, firm in substance, and of well-balanced form. Will succeed where many others fail. The most valuable yellow Trumpet for naturalizing. Doz. \$1.00.

Godolphin. (3) A. M., R. H. S., and Haarlem. One of the most beautiful yellow Trumpets yet raised; of perfectly smooth texture, sturdy habit, and fine poise. Very broad overlapping perianth; large, well-balanced trumpet expanded at mouth, of a uniform clear yellow. A fine show flower and garden plant. 24". Each \$1.00.

KATONAH. See Page 3.

King Alfred. (2) The most popular yellow Trumpet because of its large size, fine substance, refined finish and uniform intense rich golden-yellow color. It is tall, vigorous grower and free bloomer. 22". Doz. \$1.25.

King of the North. (2) A grand clear yellow of largest size, very broad overlapping perianth and fine expanded trumpet with well-serrated brim. Very striking and valuable for breeding. Each 50c.

Lord Wellington. (4) F. C. C., Haarlem. An enormous flower but of perfect show form and self-yellow color throughout. The large perianth is very smooth and stands at right angles to the large golden-yellow trumpet. Each 50c.

Obvallaris. (1) The Tenby daffodil regarded by Bowles as "the most perfect in proportion and texture of any deep yellow trumpet, and for 'close-up' observation unlikely to be improved upon unless it be in constitution." Splendid for naturalizing. 12". Doz. \$1.00.

Royalist. (3-4) One of the most perfect exhibition yellow Trumpets; faultless in form and flawless in its exquisite quality and wonderfully smooth, fine texture. Clear yellow of a tone similar to Cleopatra. Each \$1.00.

Sassenheim's Giant. (3) An enormous flower with deeply serrated, flaring pure yellow trumpet. Tall, strong stems. Doz. \$1.50.

Solid Gold. (3) A tall deep clear self-yellow trumpet of just nice size, fine parchmentlike texture and beautiful form; flat overlapping clean-cut perianth and well proportioned slender nicely flanged trumpet. A really refined well-bred looking flower; one of the best of the newer yellow Trumpets. A. M., R. H. S. Each \$5.00.

Statendam. (3) A. M., Haarlem. An extremely large golden-yellow daffodil of superb but graceful proportions. Massive overlapping deep golden-yellow perianth; large flaring well-formed trumpet. Very vigorous. Each \$1.00.

Warwick. (2) A striking King Alfred seedling that is outstanding and very early. A refined flower with a star-shaped, golden-yellow perianth of great substance, and trumpet a shade deeper in color. 21". Doz. \$1.25.

YELLOW TRUMPET SEEDLINGS. Large, vigorous plants grown from different crosses. Flowers are large and of first-class form, substance, and color having a considerable range from light to dark rich yellow. Doz. \$1.50.

WHITE TRUMPETS

DIVISION 1b. *Varieties with white trumpet and perianth.*

Beersheba. (2) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S. A flower of outstanding quality. Magnificent perianth at right angles to the large open uplifted trumpet. Free bloomer, early, vigorous, a rapid increaser, and a wonderful flower for cutting because of its long lasting quality. Give it a sheltered spot in the garden where its snowy white flowers may be enjoyed. Each \$1.50.

Corinth. (2) A splendid and immense flower of astonishing cardboardlike substance. Broad pure white perianth of superb quality standing at right angles to the bold ivory trumpet. Has wonderful substance, small bulb, but vigorous. Each \$2.00.

Eskimo. (3) A. M., R. H. S. A well-built flower of great substance and very lasting. Broad perianth standing at right angles to the open-mouth trumpet which is pale primrose on first opening but the entire flower soon passes to an intense white. Each 75c.

Gaza. (3) A beautiful flower on the border line between a Leedsii and Ajax. Broad smooth perianth, and symmetrical trumpet with a pleasing tinge of green at the base. Each 50c.

Imperator. (4) One of the largest of the white Ajax. Pure white perianth; large flaring creamy white trumpet with a well-frilled edge. Each 50c.

Kenbane. (4) A late and immense flower of great substance; broad white perianth and ivory bell-mouthed trumpet. Each \$1.00.

La Vestale. (3) A. M., Haarlem. Giant deep cream-yellow trumpet with ivory-white perianth of informal design. Fine for small groups or to naturalize in dim shade. Although of delicate appearance it is of extra good substance and lasts well. Each 25c.

Moray. (3) A sensational pure white daffodil of giant size somewhat resembling Tenedos but a better flower, considerably larger, whiter, and of greater substance. An arresting plant from Nevis x Tenedos. Each \$1.00.

Mrs. Ernest H. Krelage. (4) H. C., R. H. S. A refined, creamy white or pale primrose trumpet and white perianth; trumpet of perfect form with reflexed mouth. Often called the white King Alfred. 16". Doz. \$1.50.

Roxane. (3) A. M., R. H. S.; F. C. C., Haarlem. One of the largest white Trumpets and a very good show flower. Broad overlapping flat perianth; large, somewhat flaring trumpet with a beautifully rolled brim. Each 75c.

BICOLOR TRUMPETS

DIVISION 1c. *Bicolor varieties i. e., those having a white or whitish perianth and a trumpet colored yellow, lemon, or primrose, etc.*

Empress. (3) An old variety that is unsurpassed in substance and contrast. Pure white perianth and a rich yellow trumpet. Of medium size and height. The best bicolor Trumpet to naturalize. Doz. 75c.

Golden Beauty. (3-4) Golden-yellow trumpet of the deepest yellow in narcissus with sulphur-yellow perianth; an attractive well-proportioned flower. Well overlapping shovel-pointed petals pointing slightly forward; trumpet flaring with rather deeply serrated brim. Of medium height and size, but outstanding because of the strong contrast. Doz. \$1.50.

Lovenest. (3) One of the so-called "pink" rated a white Trumpet by some growers. Ivory-white perianth star-shaped and of informal design; nicely proportioned trumpet of saffron yellow turning to apricot pink. Each 50c.

Mrs. John Hoog. A free flowering daffodil of unusually strong texture. White perianth; primrose-yellow short trumpet widely open at the mouth. 3 for 50c.

Silvanite. (3) A striking new variety with broad, overlapping creamy white perianth and light-yellow trumpet. Strong grower of graceful habit. Each 30c.

YELLOW INCOMPARABILIS

The Incomparabilis class comprises those daffodils with crowns or trumpets that are not less than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments, and with yellow or red crowns and yellow or white petals. Because of their size and form, and the remarkable color of the crowns of many varieties they are second in popularity to the Trumpets. Early to midseason.

DIVISION 2a. *Yellow shades with or without red coloring on the crown.*

Abelard. (5) A. M., Haarlem. Broad yellow crown with orange tint at edge and showy orange anthers; broad well-overlapping primrose perianth of exceptionally good substance. A large, showy and unusually long-lasting flower that is particularly beautiful in the unfolding bud. Each 40c.

Alroi. (3) A. M., R. H. S. A large flower of the very finest quality; clear soft yellow throughout. The perianth is beautifully even, very broad, and perfectly flat; the crown large and evenly serrated at the mouth. Each \$2.00.

Aviemore. (3-4) A very tall, strong grower and rapid increaser from Beacon x Fortune. The perianth is soft yellow, very broad, and of great substance; the crown is bowl-shaped, bright orange-red shading to gold at the base. A. M., R. H. S., and Birmingham. Each \$1.50.

Bokhara. (2) A Fortune seedling. Beautifully formed flower; rich clear-yellow perianth and dark-orange crown. Tall, vigorous; free of bloom and increase. Quite early. Each 60c.

Calif. (2) Broad overlapping yellow perianth and spreading orange crown. Tall, vigorous, free of bloom and increase. Early. Each 50c.

Cheerio. (3) A most outstanding and remarkable flower; one of the best of Fortune's progeny. Soft-yellow immensely broad overlapping almost circular perianth of extraordinary thick substance; bold widely expanded frilled bowl-shaped crown of bright orange red shading paler at the base. Very tall, vigorous, and free of increase. Each \$2.50.

Cocarde. (4) Petals light lemon yellow, overlapping, round, and flat. Crown wide, spreading, pure yellow but darker toward the edge and almost flat. A large flower with a very strong stem and a free bloomer. Each \$1.00.

Cornish Fire. (2) A very strongly colored red and yellow flower of good size. Yellow perianth and well-expanded crown of the most intense and fiery red-lead orange scarlet, solid to the base. Strong, vigorous grower. Each \$2.00.

Croesus. (4) F. C. C., R. H. S. An outstanding flower of great substance, with large rounded and imbricated pale-primrose perianth, and a widely expanded crown of deep red. A very showy flower. Doz. \$1.00.

Damson. (3) A. M., R. H. S., and Haarlem. A flower for those who delight in brilliance of color; of very attractive form, tall and somewhat drooping. The crown is an intense fuchsia red which attracts one's attention at a distance. 22". Each \$1.00.

Defender. (5) A. M., Haarlem. A very good and attractive flower with a widely flaring almost flat yellow crown with orange edge. Light yellow overlapping perianth of good substance. Each 25c.

Florinda. (4) One of the daintiest flowers in the class; of medium size, and fine for exhibition or garden use. The flower is of excellent quality and pure yellow throughout. 17". Each 25c.

Fortune. (1) F. C. C., R. H. S. Undoubtedly the most sensational daffodil of recent introduction and invaluable for the exhibitor and breeder. A giant of perfect form and gorgeous color on a two-foot stem. Grand flat overlapping perianth of great substance and of clear deep lemon gold; very large bold crown of wonderfully glowing coppery red-orange. Vigorous and a good doer. Earliest of the Incomps. 24". Each \$2.50.

Fortune's Crest. (2) A. M., R. H. S. The most striking flower in the garden. Very widely rounded pale-yellow overlapping petals, and large wide deep orange-red crown. The strongest color of any Fortune seedling. Tall, perfectly balanced; vigorous. Unsurpassed for the show bench and a splendid garden plant. Each \$8.00.

Garibaldi. (3) The perianth is bright yellow, rather pointed, and of good substance; the crown is of brightest glowing orange-red. Fine for cutting. Tall strong grower and very free of increase. Each 40c.

Golden Frilled. (2) Golden-yellow perianth, and large crested frilled crown, almost a trumpet. Vigorous, early; a rapid increaser, and an outstanding garden flower, also excellent for growing in pots and bowls. Each 25c.

Golden Pedestal. (2) Large and of perfect form and quality; clear, golden self-yellow. When this variety was introduced in 1930 the introducer said of it: "This is without doubt the finest self-yellow *Incomparabilis* yet seen." Each 50c.

Havelock. (2-3) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S.; A. M., Haarlem. A fine self clear-yellow variety of beautiful form and smooth texture, with very broad overlapping perianth, and large well-balanced crown of a slightly deeper shade, expanded at mouth. A remarkable garden plant; flower of great durability. 28". Each 75c.

Helios. (1) Although this is the earliest *Incomparabilis* to bloom it is a flower of good size, excellent substance, very lasting, vigorous, and prolific. Broad overlapping shovel-pointed yellow petals which stand at right angles to a large broad yellow crown with well serrated brim. A. M., R. H. S. Doz. \$1.00.

Henna. (4) A sensational flower of large size, fine form, and great substance. Deep primrose-yellow broad overlapping perianth; large broad crown of deep fiery orange-cadmium. 24". Each 50c.

Henrietta. (2) Clear yellow rather pointed spreading petals; large, very open chrome-yellow crown, funnel shaped and beautifully frilled at the brim. A soft yellow counterpart of the *Leedsii* Her Grace. Fragrant. 17". Each 25c.

Hopeful. (3-4) A splendid giant of grand form with very broad much overlapping segments of great substance and well-proportioned crown somewhat flattened at the brim. Rich self-yellow throughout. Tall plant of great vigor. Each \$1.00.

Ilospodar. (2) An early, large, upstanding flower on tall, strong stems, with well-overlapping clear-yellow flat perianth, and deep-orange crown that holds its color in the sun. Very free bloomer and increases rapidly. 22". Doz. \$1.50.

Jubilant. (3) A. M., R. H. S., and Haarlem. Large, of exceptional smoothness, high quality, and substance; deep rich yellow. Long stem. Fine in the garden and on the show bench. Each 50c.

Killigrew. (3) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S. A good-sized flower of high quality, lovely form, perfect balance, and refinement; texture beautifully smooth and solid. Yellow perianth and finely frilled, brilliant deep rich orange-tangerine crown. It holds its color better than the average highly colored flower, and is very lasting. Tall, strong plant and a good doer. Each \$1.00.

Leontes. (2) A smooth and shapely self-yellow of very good quality, large size, and a fine garden plant or for cutting. Doz. \$1.00.

Lucinius. (4) Large, broad, pointed petals of very clear yellow; large crown of a darker shade opening white but quickly turning darker. Doz. \$1.25.

Merkara. (4) Very large flat much-overlapping sulphur-yellow perianth. The large expanded crown is deep orange-red. A showy and attractive flower. Each 75c.

Montpellier. (4-5) A. M., Haarlem. An outstanding flower of excellent form and substance that holds its color in the sun better than most varieties. Flat, well-overlapping yellow perianth and expanding red crown. Each \$4.00.

Morea. (3-4) One of the best red and yellow flowers raised by the late Mrs. Backhouse. Very large broad much overlapping circular clear yellow perianth of remarkable thick waxy texture; rather short ruffled bright orange-scarlet crown. A brilliant and striking flower. Tall, strong grower. Each \$1.50.

Osiris. (3) A well-built flower of great substance, with broad flat perianth of fine form; bold, shapely crown. Deep, rich gold throughout. Tall, vigorous, and long lasting. Each 40c.

Pilgrimage. (3) A. M., R. H. S. A large and remarkably beautiful rich yellow self of perfect show form, great substance, and exquisitely smooth, waxy texture. One of the best of the class for show and garden culture. 3 for \$1.00.

Porthilly. (4) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S.; A. M., Birmingham. One of the most sensational flowers yet offered. Large and tall, of beautiful form and quality, having broad beautifully shaped smooth clear-yellow perianth and open frilled crown of the most amazing deep and intensely vivid orange crimson—a really marvelous color. Very vigorous plant. Each \$8.00.

Prosperity. (4) A Dutch variety of the Golden Frilled type. Large bright golden-yellow overlapping perianth, and beautifully frilled orange-yellow crown. Each 50c.

Red Cross. (3-4) Soft yellow broad overlapping perianth, and very large crown of deep orange-red. Splendid exhibition and garden flower. 24". Each 25c.

Rustom Pasha. (3) A large flower with most intense color that does not fade in the sun. The large flat perianth is deep golden yellow, and the rather long crown is deepest solid orange-red. Tall strong grower and a very good flower. Each \$7.50.

St. Ives. (2) A. M., R. H. S. Probably the tallest deep, clear yellow variety in this class; a most promising market and garden variety. Clear, brilliant yellow spreading perianth; crown somewhat deeper in color. The foliage is a striking deep Maximus blue-green. Each 40c.

Scarlet Lancer. (4) A. M., Haarlem. A brilliant flower with broad flat pale-yellow perianth, and a widely expanded crown of solid deep, orange red. Each 75c.

Sir Watkin. (2) Wide expanded petals of pale yellow; crown bright yellow. Large, long-stemmed flowers. Very popular for cutting. 21". Doz. \$1.00.

Sparkler. (4) A. M., R. H. S. Sulphur-yellow almond-shaped perianth segments which hood and fold in slightly; spreading crown of pale orange half way down. Showy flower of excellent form and a fine garden plant. 3 for 50c.

Star of the West. (3-4) A very striking exhibition flower with deep-yellow perianth and lovely orange-red crown of medium size. Very free bloomer and rapid propagator. Each \$2.50.

Sunglow. (4) A. M., Haarlem. Perfectly round pure white petals; large flat deep-orange crown. Each 75c.

SUWANEE. See page 4.

Torrid. (3) A wonderful plant of extraordinary vigor, the flowers over 4 inches in diameter. Yellow perianth of good substance; large expanding crown of solid deep fiery red of fierce intensity. Each \$1.50.

Trenoon. (3) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S. Probably the richest yellow *Incomparabilis* and the finest yet introduced. Of excellent form and good size, and substance, well poised on a 20-inch stem. The buttercup-yellow segments are broad, overlapping, and smooth, and the deep cadmium-yellow crown, about three-fourths as long as the segments, is reflexed at the mouth. Each \$8.00.

Trevisky. (3-4) A. M., R. H. S. One of the finest and most brilliant flowers bred by the late P. D. Williams. Very clear-cut and of splendid firm texture. Perianth beautifully smooth and flat, of King Alfred yellow; crown clear deep orange red. Very vigorous plant with strong stem. Best flower in the 1934 London show. Each \$10.00.

Whiteley Gem. (1) A. M., R. H. S., Haarlem, and Penzance. Similar to Fortune but several days earlier and not quite so large. Smooth yellow perianth with a large crown of coppery orange-red. Of good substance and very lasting. Each \$2.50.

Winter Joy. (4) Large round overlapping petals of deep yellow; crown darker yellow, wide, reflexed, and heavily frilled. In aging the crown reflexes more, giving the impression of making a roll. Unique flower. Each 75c.

Yellow Poppy. (2) Visitors always comment on this outstanding flower of fine form and substance because of its unique light lemon-yellow color. Tall, vigorous, and prolific. Fine for cutting. 20". Doz. \$1.00.

BICOLOR INCOMPARABILIS

DIVISION 2b. *Bicolor varieties with white or whitish perianth, and self-yellow, red-stained or red crown.*

Elvira. (3) Large-flowered Poetaz of good substance, three or four on a stem. Broad white perianth; bright-yellow cup edged orange. 24". Doz. 60c; 100 - \$4.00.

Glorious. (2-3) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S. One of the finest Poetaz in cultivation. Pure white perianth very round and flat, about 2½ inches across; cup most brilliant orange scarlet. Strong grower; often two or three flowers on a stem. Each 50c.

Helios. (2) An early variety bearing five to eight yellow flowers on a strong stem. Popular for cutting. Doz. 75c.

Ideal. (3-4) White perianth and yellow cup. A strong grower carrying several flowers on a large, stiff stem. Doz. 75c.

La Fiancee. (2) Broad and thick pure white flat perianth and tangerine-orange cup. Very early and free flowering. Doz. \$1.25.

Medusa. (3) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S. A very beautiful flower with pure white perianth of splendid substance, and a large expanded cup of intense orange scarlet. A magnificent garden plant second only to Glorious. Doz. \$1.25.

Red Guard. (3-4) A. M., R. H. S. A most uncommon novelty. The somewhat star-shaped long perianth segments are of pale, though bright buff-orange coloring, while the cup-shaped corona is a vivid orange-scarlet. POETS

The Poets are the latest to bloom and generally are fragrant, tall, and prolific of increase and flowers. They have very flat, white petals, and a flat eye edged more or less deeply with red or crimson.

Actaea. (5) The largest Poeticus and a most beautiful exhibition flower. Broad snow-white perianth of great substance and good form. The very large eye is margined with dark red. Each 40c.

Caedmon. (5) A. M., F. C. C., R. H. S. A most striking and beautiful flower with broad snowy-white perianth of great substance and a very bold center broadly rimmed bright red and having a rich green eye. 17". Each 50c.

Dactyl. (5) A. M., R. H. S. In size and quality this is one of the finest Poeticus. Beautiful clean-cut perianth of mathematical evenness and extraordinary solid smooth substance. Large broad flat citron eye, edged with a boldly defined rim of deep red. Each 50c.

Pearly Queen. (3) A. M., R. H. S. A Triandrus hybrid that bears two or three flowers on a stem. Star-shaped, creamy-white perianth; clear lemon-yellow trumpet. The distinct pearly sheen provides the name. Of drooping habit, free flowering, and a strong grower. Each 25c.

Thalia. (3) Often called the orchid-flowered daffodil it is probably the purest white of the Triandrus hybrids. It is of exquisite beauty for artistic arrangements, unsurpassed for the show bench, and a garden gem. 3 for 50c.

LILIES

Callosum. A rather attractive and dainty plant that is useful because it flowers in July when no other lily of its type is available. It bears from 5 to 25 small, dull-red to orange-red nodding flowers with tightly reflexed segments faintly spotted at the base. Plants 2 to 5 feet tall, very slender, with short, narrow, scattered, dark-green leaves. Each 25; Doz. \$2.00.

Formosanum. A superior trumpet lily that is fast becoming very popular. The large flowers are pure white with an emerald-green throat and shaded externally with wine-purple or occasionally white.
