9 ACTAEA (Lubbe 1927—The largest Poeticus in existence. Broad snow-white perianth of great substance and good form; the very large eye is broadly margined with dark red. A most beautiful exhibition flower.

1c ADA FINCH (de Graaff) 1927—One of the very earliest daffodils to flower. Pure white, overlapping perianth; large, finely shaped trumpet with deeply flanged and rolled rim. The immense flower is carried on a tall, stiff stem and the entire plant is beautifully proportioned. In contrast with many of the British white trumpet daffodils, Ada Finch is pure Ajax and represents the culmination of fifty years of breeding white trumpets. Immensely valuable for breeding as its good characteristics, earliness, size and purity of color are carried over into its seedlings. A.M.H. 1927. F.C. C.H. 1930.

Early season 18" tall The large perianth is white and of very heavy substance, the trumpet is narrow at the base but flares broadly at the mouth where it is conservatively ruffled. The trumpet color quickly stabilizes at the same white as the perianth.

2b. Adirondack (OBF) 1951 Late season pink. 11" tall $3\frac{1}{2}$ " perianth dia.
Flat, starry perianth - white. Moderately tubular petals yellow cup has a pale
peach edge. Very little fluting and a slight scalloping enhance the edge. 5
Very little flare. Foliage is narrow, a curious pale green color, quite erect in habit.

2b ADLER (de Graaff) 1929 — A universal favorite both among exhibitors and amateurs; a really marvelous flower with perianth of the purest white, overlapping and opening nearly flat, circular in outline and 4 inches across, with a beautifully proportioned cup of pure chrome yellow, shading to blood-orange at the deeply frilled edge; the most admired flower in many large collections. A.M. 1928, A.M.H. 1928.

Early midseason 12" tall 4" perianth diameter. Perianth remains cupped full until flower is fully developed. Foliage is bluish and narrow in width, lax, and grows at an angle to the stem.

1a AEROLITE (de Graaff) 1923 — Here is a golden daffodil that is replacing many of the present varieties as it becomes available; the large flower is beautifully proportioned, giving the impression of gracefulness, despite its size; perianth deep primrose, with a pure medium yellow trumpet which is left in bold relief by the broad pointed star formed by the flat opening outer petals, an inch and a half wide; medium early, but remains until late, and is one of the longest lasting of all daffodils either in the garden or after being cut.

Foliage is blue, blue, and erect.

Flat white perianth with round overlapping petals, and large cup of rich yellow bordered orange — Mitsch.

1a ALASKA (de Graaff) 1928—Giant flower of deepest gold; more graceful than most of the giant Ajax varieties as the trumpet is deeply frilled and recurved. This variety has been thoroughly tested in the greenhouse and on the Eastern cutflower markets and shows usual promise as a future florist's flower. Excellent for pots.

Color is a little darker with a definite flange which is densely ruffled. Foliage is blue, heavy, broad, and erect.

1b. Allegheny (OBF) 1951 late season pink trumpet. 15" tall $4\frac{1}{2}$ " perianth dia. Perianth is a waved white cupped fwd. The trumpet is well proportioned, and develops to a soft flesh pink with peach undertones. Broad flare at mouth of trumpet is scalloped and slightly ruffled. Color is more intense deep in the throat. Foliage is lax, med width, blue, and carried at an angle to the stem. 10-

ALOHA 3b (OBF) 1950 ^{late} _{midseason} 14" tall $3\frac{1}{2}$ " perianth dia.

White Perianth is of Pectin form and substance. Cup is evenly cut and ruffled at edge. Cup color is deep yellow edged with a wavy rim band of orange vermilion which follows the edge contour. Foliage is lax and spreading; broad and green.

2b ASMODE (de Graaff) 1930—Very large flaring cup of deep yellow with distinct orange margin; petals pure white, well rounded and overlapping. Large flower, fully 4 inches across. A particularly fine show-flower.

ATOM FLASH 36(OBF) 1950 (Lat) ^{glossy} 15" tall 4" perianth dia.
Perianth is white posticus type. Cup is pleated and ruffled, cherry red to base making a striking contrast. Crown becomes quite flat with age. 5,-

2b Av Sable. (OBF) 1951 Late season pink 9" tall. Perianth diameter $3\frac{1}{2}$ "
Perianth is starry & greenish white when fresh. Substantial. Crown is quite ruffled & develops to
a pale pink with darker edge. Corolla is medium width, blue, and erect.

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AZALEA 2b (OBF) 1945 Late season pink. 12" tall ~~3~~ $\frac{1}{4}$ " petiole dia.
Pevanthe is flat, round, and white of fair substance. The cup is quite flared, pink
colored with darker tints laid over it. Deep pink rim. Foliage is broad, blue, and wet. The
flower exhibits good carriage despite a rather long neck. 3

AZTEC 2a (OBF) 1946. Early season. 20" tall ~~4~~ $\frac{1}{2}$ " petiole diameter
Golden yellow pevanthe of heavy substance. Broad overlapping petals lay
quite flat. The cup is very smooth and mid yellow with a bright hot
orange rim. Foliage is tall, semi erect, mid width, and slightly bluish.

2a BACKHOUSE'S GIANT (Backhouse) 1936—Finely proportioned, deep golden yellow star-shaped perianth. Cup narrow and long, almost of trumpet daffodil proportions and colored deepest orange-red. This is the closest thing to a red trumpet daffodil and should have great value in breeding. A.M.H. 1948.

Beautyglow 2b (OBF) 1950 Midseason Pink 12" tall $3\frac{1}{4}$ " perianth diameter
Perianth is white, med. full, and somewhat waved. Cup is semi-bowl shape. The
edge or rim is soft medium pink with trowings going into throat which makes the
flower seem to glow when looking directly into it. Delicate flutes and
foldings characterize the rim of the cup. Foliage is green & erect. 3 -

1c BEERSHEBA (Engleheart) 1923—A magnificent flower, large, perfectly flat perianth, trumpet long and beautifully flanged at mouth. A flower of great size, measuring nearly five inches across; a vigorous grower and a grand exhibition variety F.C.C., R.H.S. 1926, A.M.(e) 1925, F.C.C.(e) 1926 A.M.(c) 1929.

One of the best white trumpets. A most beautiful cut flower and a winner of many high awards. —Mitsch
12" tall 4½" perianth dia.

Folage is mid with, blue green, and oblique to the stem.

2a BENGHAZI (Rich.) 1941—A striking large flower, with rich bright yellow rounded flat perianth and a very large, almost flat crown, heavily banded bright orange-red shading to gold in the center. Tall, strong, very free grower.

Rounded flat rich yellow perianth and rather flat crown banded orange red, fading to gold in the center. —Mitsch.

Cup is fluted to the throat.

Folage is narrow, bluish, and oblique to the stem.

1a BEN HUR (de Graaff) 1927—A glorious "loud speaker" trumpet, deeply frilled of pure Roman gold, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches across at the mouth; in spite of its immense size the whole flower is finely proportioned, one of the best of the new trumpets. A.M.H. 1930.

6b BERYL (Williams) 1906—A lovely little Cyclaminous hybrid bearing graceful drooping flowers with primrose-yellow, slightly reflexing, perianth and small globular bright orange cup shading to gold; ideal for the rock garden and pots, height 8 inches. A.M. 1936.

Lovely little flower; reflexing yellow perianth which fades to cream, and orange cup fading to gold 9-12" tall. 2³/₄"-3" perianth dia. --- Mitsch.
Perianth open yellow & rapidly reflexes. Leaves are very round and whitish though reflexing. Slightly fluted orange red cups. Very long lasting in the sun or cut. Foliage is midwidth, bright green, and rounded.

2d BINKIE (Tasmanian)—Rare new color break, the perianth being pronounced lemon-yellow, the large, flaring cup a pale lemon, bleaching to almost pure ivory. Good grower, attractive garden and show plant, highly recommended.

12" tall $3\frac{3}{4}$ " perianth is lemon yellow, flat, rounded, and substantial. The cup is smooth yellow when fresh, developing to an off white with darker rim. Foliage is medium wood, bluish, and oblique to stems.

1b BONINGTON (Radcliff) 1936—Attractive bicolor trumpet, pure white glistening petals, cup deep canary yellow. An entirely different type of bicolor trumpet daffodil than Spring Glory, Queen of Bicolors, etc. Good show flower.

Trumpet is long and tubular with some flaring at ruffled mouth. Trumpet color is soft canary yellow. Foliage is wood, bluish, and erect.

A most unusual flower opening. Greenish Sulfur Lemon with the crown fading to almost white —— Mitsch

A most distinct but rather curious flower raised in Tasmania; it is really a reversed bicolor. A flower of very good form + quality, with broad flat pointed perianth and well proportioned cup. Opens sulfur yellow but the cup gradually passes to almost white.

1e BROUGSHANE (Wilson) 1938—A glorious giant white Ajax of perfect form and balance. The trumpet is widely flanged, reflexed and frilled but does not overbalance the immense perianth, which is fully 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter, the outer segments being up to 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide. The great flower, which is of immense substance and is quite exceptionally durable, is carried on a strong stem well over two feet high, while the foliage measures as much as 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches in breadth. Plant of immense vigor. A.M. 1943, A.M.H. 1948.

The most spectacular white trumpet.

2b BRUNSWICK (Williams) 1934—Flower of good form, balance and proportion, well posed on a tall strong graceful stem. Well modelled flat clean-cut cold white perianth of very firm texture and a perfectly balanced crown that is nicely-flanged and frilled. Clear icy white in the base, gradually shading up to sharp very green lemon at brim. Extraordinary lasting power. F.C.C. 1939.

An extremely long lasting flower of beautiful quality. Pure white with light lemon crown which fades to white except at the rim. — Nitoch.

Early season. 17"-20" tall. $3\frac{1}{2}$ " per. dia.

Foliage is med width, blue-grey, and erect.

Buff Beauty 26 (OBF) 1946. ^{late} Midseason, 12" tall 4" perianth dia.

Perianth is a flat white star of good substance. Flower looks up slightly. Cup is evenly tapered and fluted. Opens buff-yellow, and develops to buff pink with true buff fringed edge. Foliage is med width, bluish, and oblique to stem. 4-

BULBOCODIUM—The Hoop Petticoat or Medusa's Trumpet daffodil. For the rock garden, edgings and small beds, these beautiful little daffodils are most charming, while if several bulbs are planted in pots or pans they are greatly prized for indoor decoration.

- 10 BULBOCODIUM CITRINUS—The large sulphur Hoop Petticoat. Very beautiful pale citron flowers, height 6 to 8 inches; delights in a damp sandy peat soil; no manure should be given.

10 BULBOCODIUM MONOPHYLLUS or Clusii, the white Hoop Petticoat, native of N. Africa, producing in winter little snowy white flowers of exquisite beauty; charming in the rock garden or may be grown in pots in a cold frame or cool room; as soon as signs of growth are seen give water freely, height 6 inches. On no account should manure be given.

Strong grower with very stiff stems, excellent form and habit. Flowers short-necked and carried well above the foliage. In our opinion the very best of the many yellow-red flowers introduced in England. Holds its color well and should prove invaluable for breeding.

2a CARBINEER (A. M. Wilson) 1937—A magnificent flower of splendid carriage and great substance. Broad flat golden-yellow perianth standing at right angles to the large bright orange-red cup. F.C.C. 1938, A.M. 1931.

Brilliant orange red crown of nice proportions set on a wide overlapping deep golden yellow perianth of geometric symmetry. — Mitsch.
Folilage is med. width, erect, and blue-green.

2a CARLTON (Williams) 1927—A fine clear yellow self-color of great size. Flat overlapping perianth and large expanded crown frilled at brim, a magnificent plant of great vigor. A.M. (g) 1936, F.C.C. (g) 1939.



10 *TRIANDRUS ALBUS*—The dainty little "Angel's tears" daffodils were found by the late Mr. Peter Barr in the mountains of Spain and Portugal, growing in very hard, firm fine gritty soil, sometimes in the narrowest fissures of granite slatestone rocks. They make beautiful pot-plants and do very well in the rock garden where they form a picture of grace and beauty. They prefer shade, a gritty soil and a well-drained position; no manure should be given.

10 *TRIANDRUS CALATHINUS*—One of the most beautiful little daffodils in existence. The flowers, which are produced in drooping clusters of two or three, are snowy white, and more than twice the size of *Triandrus Albus*, with long goblet-shaped crown prettily fluted; the foliage has a curious habit of curling over, height 7 inches. For pots and the rock garden it is a perfect gem. This beautiful little daffodil thrives best in a mixture of leaf-mould, heath soil and coarse sand, with just a little bone flour added; no other manure should be given. The late Mr. Peter Barr collected this rare daffodil some years ago on one of the sea-swept Glenan Isles (off Brittany). Unfortunately it is no longer found there, the sea having washed away all trace of this little species. It is, however, readily raised from seed.
